Burns, High Claim Strong Support From Kelly Camp

MIAMI (UPI)—Robert Kelly High and Gov. Bayton Burns went about their separate ways today, a strong claim of support from the Kelly camp to Burns' re-election campaign, when Kelly was elected to the first primary.

Gov. Burns, speaking today in his capital office, announced a number of additional campaign officials for Kelly have joined his ranks. They included James J. Mangus, Hillsborough County Kelly chairman, Albert K. Kelly, Hillsborough County chairman, and Judge Howard Livingston, Hillsborough County and a former state legislator. Earlier it was announced in Jacksonville that C. Leman Cannon, state commander of the American Legion, and Kelly campaign coordinator for seven northeast Florida counties; Alan Brode, Miami-Dade County executive; and Guy Burnett, Kelly coordinator for 12 counties, are actively supporting Burns.

Burns celebrated Kirk's Day between picking in Tampa Sunday while his opponent slipped away for a quiet day in the Florida Keys. The Governor said the major issue in the race is conservative fiscal principles versus ultra-liberalism.

Although High spent most of the weekend organizing support through to his camp, Burns said Sunday he was getting help from the Kelly ranks. Burns spent some time Sunday at the Tampa home of Guy Burnett, whom the governor described as a Kelly coordinator for 12 counties. Burns said Burnett is now in the governor's camp.

The governor also attended a Latin fiesta at the Cuban club in the Ybor City section of Tampa. Burns' wife, daughter and grandson joined him in Tampa for a family Mother's Day celebration. In speeches to supporters, Burns said the basic issue of the runoff campaign was "progressive conservatism versus ultra-liberalism."

"Ninety to per cent of Florida's voters rejected on May 5 the ultra-liberal candidate of the Boston-New York-Washington axis," Burns said. He apparently referred to his earlier charges that New York Sen. Robert Kennedy was backing High in order to get High's support as governor.

Mercury At Freezing Through Northland

Gemini 9 In Final Tests; Astronaut To Take 'Walk'

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—The Gemini 9 spacecraft will take astronauts Thomas Stafford and Eugene Sernan on a rendezvous and space-walk flight face a string of tests this week to clear the way for launch on May 17.

The capsule was bolted to Titan 2 rocket Sunday after engineers resolved a problem with a leaky oxygen bottle in Gemini's special maneuvering unit without disrupting the launch schedule.

The Gemini 9 and the Atlas-Agena rendezvous rocket will be put through a full-scale dress rehearsal countdown designed to iron out any snags that might otherwise interrupt the actual countdown.

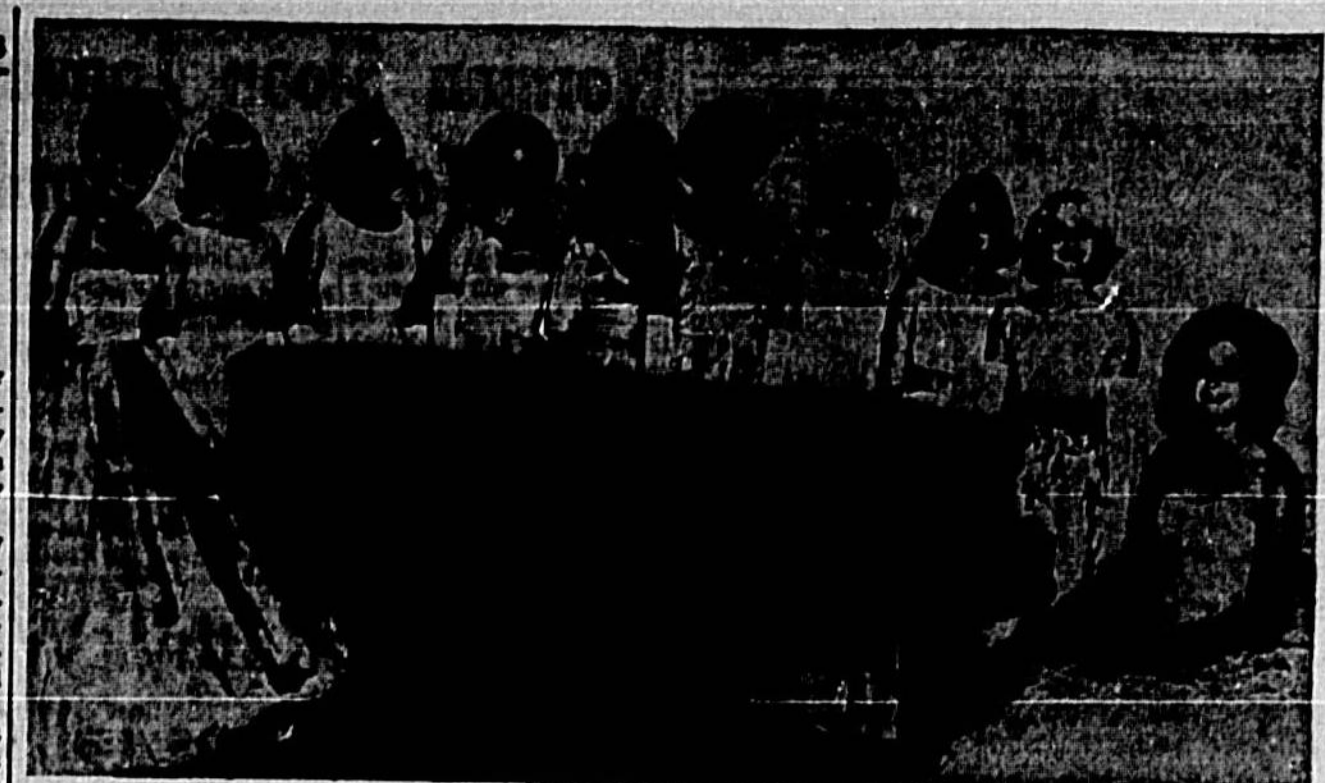

Garden Gate

By Mamie Crife
Late April through May is the time to plan for beautiful borders along the patio, in place of permanent landscape plantings. The special spot around beds or the house grounds.

Prior to planting, cover the area with a layer of peat moss (2 to 3 inches deep). If you have a drainage problem, make it deeper. Spade at least six inches deep working in high phosphate fertilizer (10-20-20) four to six cups per 100 square feet of bed. Work up the bed several days before planting so the dirt will settle.

Plants used in bed need to be arranged in a color of plants to go with color of your house. Also select variety and plants to allow for long growing plants in front with tall ones in center and tallest in back.

A very attractive border being white caladiums in front—salvia behind and marigolds in front of permanent landscape plantings; dwarf celosia (cocks comb) in front of day lilies; or white sweet alyssum in front of six cups alum with similar or marigolds in rear.

There are a few combinations. Caladiums are so beautiful in many different whites, reds and pinks and planted in partial shade and watered will last all summer. The border will be a lovely lavender spire flower in summertime. There is also a variegated Lilipoe which is most attractive and will work beautifully with any of many borders.

In planting caladium bulbs let top of bulb be 1/2 to 3 inches below surface to get the best results. Starter plants from small pieces of bulbs develop into good plants and are much cheaper. Set bulbs of plants 8 to 10 inches apart and plant thoroughly to pack soil around them.

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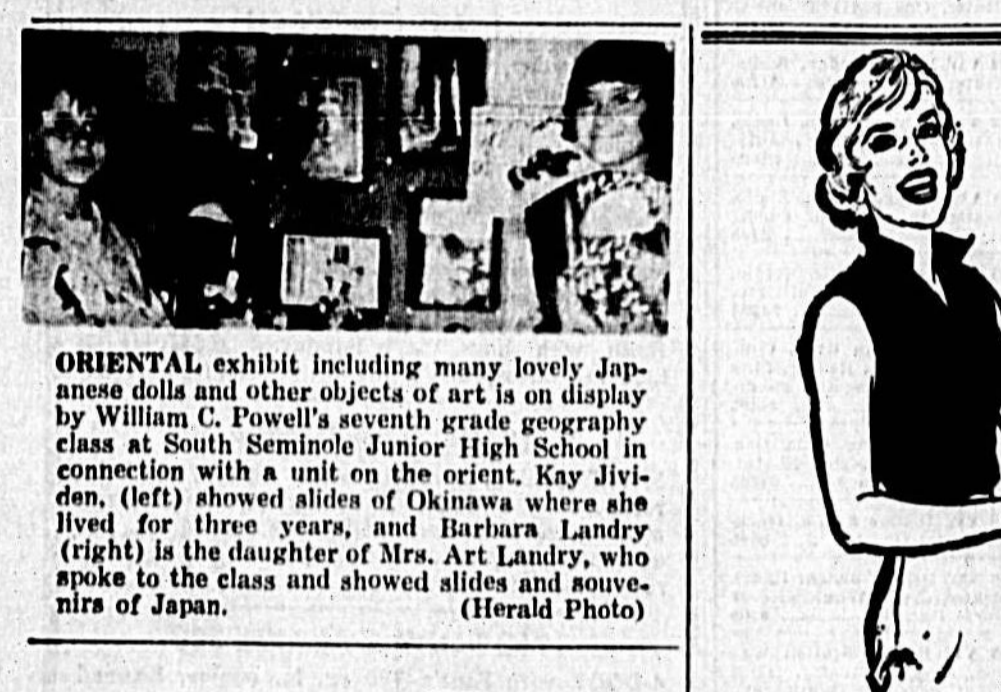

The decision to cut down the operation reflects the increased importance of intercontinental missiles in the U. S. military arsenal and, as McNamara put it, "the declining importance of bombers in relation to missiles."

The Pentagon said the airborne alert had cost \$10 million a year. It said the planned reduction would save \$64 million a year.

The continuous airborne alert was started on a modest scale during the Kennedy administration.

The idea was that catastrophe from a missile attack would be averted by keeping some bombers always aloft and ready to counterattack while others remained alert.

Unemployment Dips Slightly In April

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's unemployment rate dropped one-tenth of one per cent in April, dipping to the 3.7 per cent level for the second time this year, the Labor Department reported.

The 3.7 per cent jobless rate, reached first in February, was the lowest since November, 1953.

Officials said the unemployment figures were evidence of "continuing strength" in the economy.

But April's small drop in the unemployment rate may not add much weight to the case for an anti-inflationary tax increase.

A decline of only one-tenth of one per cent is "not much of a change over-all," officials said.

More Valuable Than Gold

We worry a lot about the balance of payments problem. That is, we worry about the outflow of gold from the United States, and about the outflow of dollars from the United States.

The United States, like every other nation, exports raw materials and manufactured goods, and imports raw materials and manufactured goods. The balance of payments is the difference between the two.

For many years, however, the balance of payments has been in deficit. This means that we are exporting less than we are importing.

Marion Harper Jr., president and chairman of the board of Interpublic, the import and export of brains is becoming a matter of more serious concern than the flow of gold or the import or export of goods.

The vital difference between nations, says Harper, is not becoming one of human capability. We have traditionally thought of that of rich and poor countries, of countries endowed or not endowed with natural resources or production skills.

"What Gives You the Idea I Want to Go Anywhere?"

It may be more accurate, he says, to think of the "capable nation" or the "less capable nation."

As the same time as there is a gap between rich and poor nations, there is a more truly widening gap between the countries of the world.

The United States currently exports a surplus "balance of payments" in the brainpower department.

In international dealings in currency, notes Harper, we have mechanisms like the International Monetary Fund to correct imbalances.

"Perhaps we should develop some kind of International Brain Bank to correct imbalances in brains."

The swirly stick sign in front of Jim Spencer's restaurant is going to stay up—but the City of Sanford's sign ordinance is going to come down.

City commissioners voted Monday to authorize the Zoning and Planning Board to rewrite and submit to them a rough draft of a new city sign ordinance.

Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts moved that "any existing legal action concerning the sign ordinance be discontinued." Although the matter was not specifically mentioned Monday, the sign ordinance commission is going to do so.
