## Truman Offers Plan To Save Hungry Europe

### Meat Rationing May Be Resumed, If Nec- essary To Feed 15 Million Europeans

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—(AP)—President Truman is ready to call for a return to meat rationing if it is necessary to save 10 to 15 million Europeans from starving to death. However, the Chief Executive told his news conference today that he does not think such drastic action will be necessary.

President Truman said that he is vitally concerned with the prospect of widespread starvation in war-torn countries—some of them allies of America during World War two. Losses of wheat crop in some countries and of other grains elsewhere have accentuated the situation.

President Truman said he hopes that his wheat conservation order of yesterday may make it possible to ship 6,000,000 tons of wheat abroad during the first months of this year. He said that he knew of no cases of hoarding of wheat in this country.

The President said also that Canada, Australia and other countries with food surpluses are being asked to cooperate in the program of aid to Europe.

Mr. Truman also took up the matter of wages and prices. He said he hopes to have a formula ready in a day or two to cure our present industrial stagflation—particularly the big steel strike. He pointed out that it will be a temporary plan for meeting the present situation. Mr. Truman said the whole question is one of production—that if we get more production, the situation will adjust itself and then there will be no reason for a new wage-price program.

Still another issue brought up at the President's news conference was the nomination of Edwin W. Pauley as director of the Navy. Despite damaging testimony against Pauley at Senate committee hearings, Mr. Truman said flatly that he will not withdraw his nomination of Pauley. He said he thought Pauley is an honest man and a capable administrator. And he said Interior Secretary Ickes did not consult him in advance concerning his testimony.

President Truman also said that the unsettled labor situation will not prevent his vacationing next week in Florida. The President asserts he can still do business by telephoning from his yacht as he cruises in Florida waters. The Chief Executive made this assertion when asked if he still planned to go to Florida if the steel and electric strikes were not settled in advance of his scheduled departure.

The presidential yacht—the Williamsburg—slipped quietly into the Miami harbor yesterday to await his arrival. The President will be joined on a fishing trip here by Winston Churchill. The former British Prime Minister is expected to return to the beach from Havana tomorrow. President Truman is scheduled to arrive by plane Monday.

## Firemen Called To Large Grass Fire

High leaping flames from a large area of burning grass and weeds in the area of Mellenville Avenue and Twenty-fifth Street at 9:04 o'clock last evening, cast a lurid glow in the cloudy atmosphere which frightened many nearby residents. Repeated calls were received at the Fire Station, according to Chief Mack Cleveland. No damage to buildings was reported. The fire spread over an area bounded by Geneva, Mellenville and Orange Avenue and Twenty-fourth Street.

The little red booster truck with its 276 gallon tank was put into active use and assigned to Chief Cleveland, who was a major factor in controlling the fire. No aid was received from the Naval Air Station Fire department as formerly, due to the fact that the Navy had reduced its fighting force to a minimum. Prior to this the Naval and local departments co-operated under a mutual assistance agreement, Chief Cleveland said.

## Peacetime Training Bill First On Military Committee's Agenda

LONDON, Feb. 7. (AP)—The Ukraine has charged that British troops have been used deliberately to suppress a people's movement in Indonesia. ## China And Russia Express Approval Of Site For UNO

LONDON, Feb. 7. (AP)—China and Russia have expressed their approval of the Stamford Green-Winchester area of Connecticut and New York states as the site for the permanent headquarters of the United Nations.

France has asked a long delay in a final choice and a reconsideration of New York City as the interim site of the UNO's home. The French have objected to New York City on the grounds of its huge foreign-born population.

## Field Announces New Mailing Regulation

On Feb. 1 a ruling was received by Postmaster Joel S. Field that parcels not exceeding 11 pounds in weight or 42 inches in length or 72 inches in length and width combined, would be accepted for mailing to Navy personnel overseas.

TOKYO, Feb. 7. (AP)—No announcement will be made of the execution of Lieutenant General Yamashita until after the hanging has been carried out at Manila. The hanging will be secret and no newsmen or cameramen will be present.

## Barge Canal Faces Fight In Congress

### Michigan Representa- tive Engel States He Will Lead Opposi- tion In House

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 7. (AP)—The \$15,000,000 Florida barge canal appropriation faces a stiff fight in Congress. Michigan Representative Engel says he will lead opposition to the appropriation in the House. He previously tried unsuccessfully at the last moment to eliminate the canal entirely from navigation funds recommended for 1946-47.

However, Florida Congressmen express confidence. Senator Andrews claims Administration support on grounds that President Truman always voted for the canal while a member of the Senate and that the Budget Bureau approved the \$15,000,000.

## Plan To End Navy Officer Distinction Told By Forrestal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7. (AP)—A special Navy board has recommended a program to erase the traditional distinction between senior naval officers and the rest of the service.

The recommendations are contained in a report to President Truman. The contemplated program would give to officers transferring from the Naval reserve to the regular Navy equal opportunity in every way with a temporary academy fellow officer.

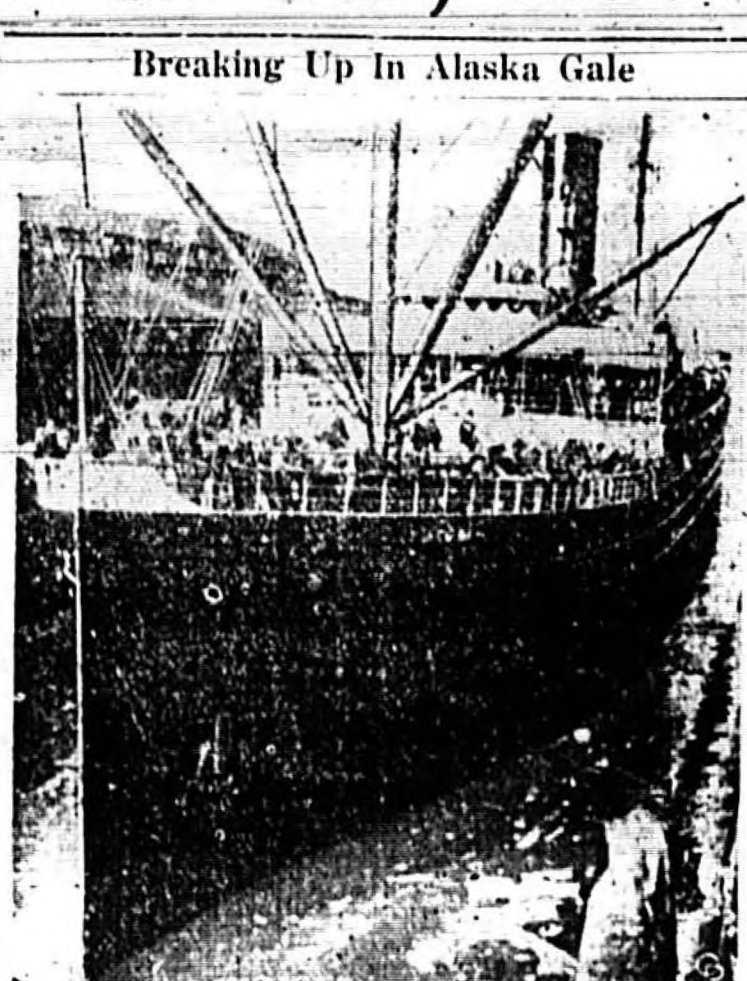

World Peace For Next 50 Years To Rest With Youths

NEW YORK, Feb. 7. (Special)—The hopes of world peace for the next 50 years depend upon what happens in the lives of boys growing up here in America and in the countries of Europe, Walter W. Head of St. Louis, president of the National Council, Boy Scouts of America, said in a statement for Boy Scout Week, Feb. 8 to 14, marking the 50th anniversary of the movement in America. Mr. Head said: "The theme of the Boy Scouts of America for the year 1946 is 'Scouts of the World—Building Together.' Regardless of what treaties or agreements may be made by the nations of the world, the last analysis what happens to our hopes of world peace for the next 50 years depends upon what happens in the lives of boys growing up here in America and in the countries of Europe. If we can impress upon these boys a sense of friendship and mutual respect, we shall go a long way toward establishing a better understanding among the nations of the world. Here in America we have nearly 2,000,000 members of the Boy Scouts of America. Throughout the world there are approximately 3,000,000 Scouts and Leaders. The Scout program seeks to train these boys for service to others and useful citizenship. With these millions of Scouts throughout the world working together, something truly magnificent can be done. We hope to develop a body of men who, because of their Scout training, will stand out in their native lands as our Boy Scouts. They will be the best example of the same ideals of Scouting as expressed in our Scout Oath and Law. Together they will, we believe, help to bring about a lasting peace and build a better world for the future."

Sunspot Activity Interrupts Radio And Cable Service

NEW YORK, Feb. 7. (AP)—Heavy sunspot activity has again been felt in the eastern part of the United States. Radio and Communications officials say the sunspot activity continued for several hours the morning, causing a serious interruption of public communications with Europe and South America. The condition reached its peak at 6:00 o'clock this morning. A traffic official for the MacKay Radio Service says messages were garbled and broken by the magnetic currents that resulted from the sunspots. A traffic official for RCA says the sunspot activity was fairly heavy all night. He said the sharpest interruptions were felt in the north Atlantic area. He added that communications between New York and points in the western United States were satisfactory.

Navy Reveals Air Reserve Plans For 28,700 Personnel

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7. (AP)—The Navy has announced that it is planning an air reserve of 28,700 Navy and Marine personnel. Deputy Chief of naval operations for air—Vice Admiral Arthur Radford has asserted that training will get under way about July 1, in order to be ready for an emergency. The program outline provides for the exclusive use of 15 Naval Air Stations and partial use of seven others. Pilots are to receive about 100 hours of flying and a two-week tour aboard a carrier vessel. The ready reserve is to consist of 1,600 Naval and Marine aviators, 2,800 ground officers and 19,800 enlisted sailors and marines. They will be trained to serve as air groups and squadrons aboard ships laid up in the inactive fleet. In addition to the ready reserve, a standby group of officers and men is contemplated. This would be made up of officers and men who cannot attend drills regularly. The 15 air stations selected for full-time use in the Naval air training program include three western bases at Squantum, Mass., New York and Willow Grove, Penn. Southern air stations to be utilized in the program are at New Orleans, Atlanta and Memphis. In the middle-west there will be training bases at Gracac, Ill.; Mich.; Olathe, Kan.; Glenview, Ill.; Columbus, O.; Minneapolis and St. Louis. Western stations to be utilized include facilities at Dallas, Tex., and at Livermore and Los Alamitos, Calif.
