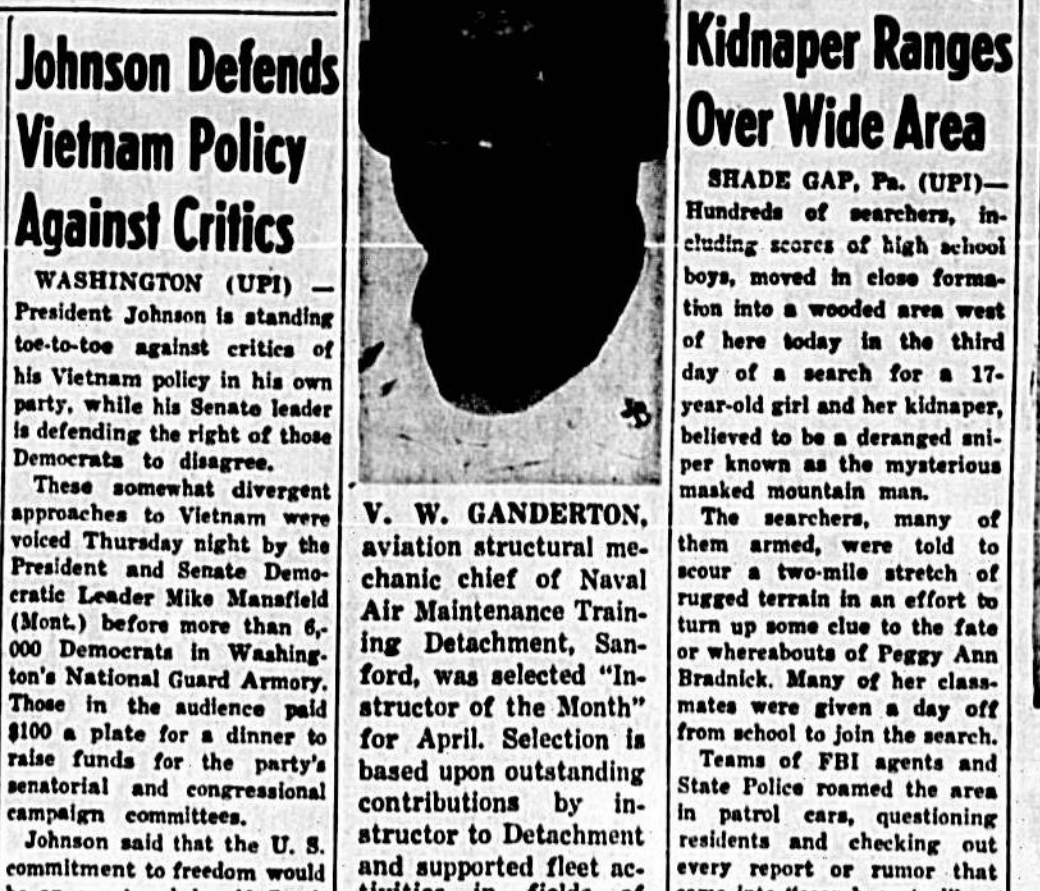

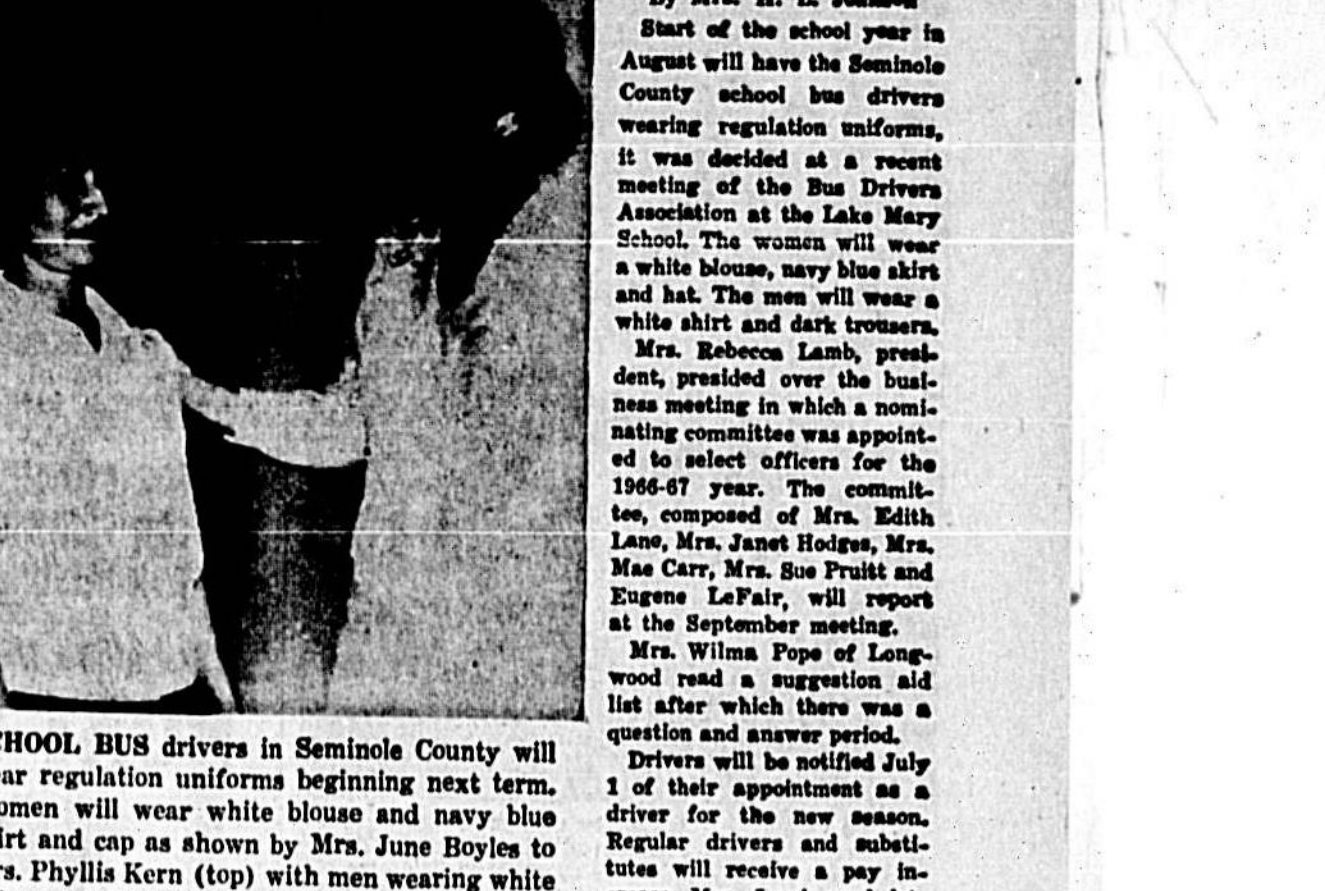

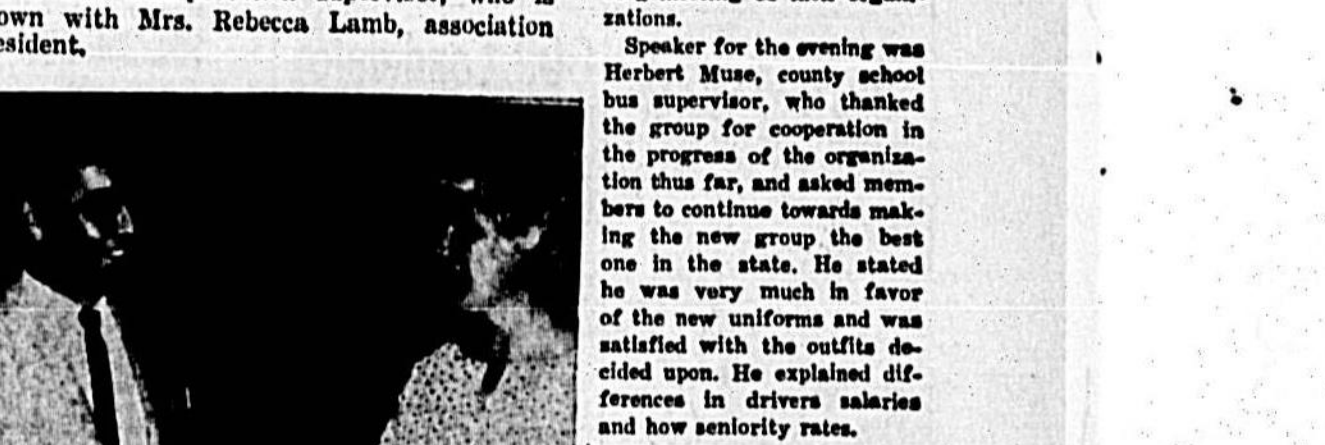

McNamara, Solons Start New Squabble

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara and the House armed services committee are at it again—this time over who is backing whom in the hands over development of a big new bomber.

The committee staged a full-dress, televised news conference to refute McNamara's claim that all of the Joint Chiefs of Staff—except one—supported his view that the United States should hold off a final decision on whether to build a new manned bomber for the 1970s.

Rep. F. Edward Hebert (D-La.), with the enthusiastic backing of committee chairman L. Mendel Rivers (D-S.C.), charged that McNamara had overridden and suppressed the views of the Joint Chiefs, that they all backed the plan, not just Air Force Chief Gen. John F. McConnell.

Not so, retorted McNamara, who seldom suffers in silence. He said the accusations were "without foundation" and he quoted from Pentagon documents to support his position.

It all began last month when an armed services subcommittee, headed by Hebert, charged that McNamara had on his own—without development of a new bomber, preferring to phase out manned bombers in favor of missiles.

McNamara fired back with a news conference April 28. He declared that the subcommittee was wrong, that all the Joint Chiefs but Gen. McConnell—whose position is well known—did support his view in the matter. He quoted from previously classified documents to back his stand.

Then it was the subcommittee's turn. Hebert came up with some previously classified documents of his own to refute McNamara. He made public, over Pentagon objections, testimony given in closed sessions by McNamara, Westmark, second vice president; Mrs. Arthur Putnam, secretary; Mrs. Robert C. Westmark, treasurer; and Mrs. Milton Tinsley, delegate.

Divorce Flaws Still There

After months of debate, testimony and parliamentary compromise, the New York Legislature has passed a bill drastically revising that state's divorce law, the first change in a statute that provided the establishment of the United States itself.

For 170 years, the only ground for divorce in New York has been that of adultery. The new law, to go into effect on Sept. 1, 1967, increases the number of grounds, as well as adding a mandatory predivorce conciliation procedure.

New York has thus thrust itself boldly into the 19th century, which is about where the 48 other states of the Union stand in the matter of divorce.

New York's reform will eliminate some of the prejudice, collusion and hypocrisy fostered by the adultery-only restriction. No longer will there be need for staged scenes of "grate delicto" between a divorce-seeking spouse and a professional accomplice. No longer will thousands of divorces need to be granted under the fiction of amulment. No longer will governors' wives and other dignitaries be required to file a statement to gain their freedom.

Perhaps by the 21st century, some states—possibly California, a center of much divorce reform agitation—may bring itself to recognize that the law in the last party that should be consulted in a founding marriage, just as the undertaker is only brought into the sickroom after all the efforts of the doctors have failed.

What American society needs is not more or fewer ground for ending marriages but more medicines that can heal them, in the form of family therapy by psychologists, social workers, clergymen and others who are paid to save marriages, not to dissolve them.

Through the efforts of various prominent spokesmen inside of government and out, it seems the American people now have the right to be as thoroughly confused as Red China as they ever will.

Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara has defended the war in South Vietnam as a war of containment against a predatory Red China bent on the conquest of the whole of Southeast Asia and ultimately the world.

United Nations Secretary General Thant has depicted the Chinese on the verge of a nervous breakdown and, therefore, capable of the foolishness of any deranged mind. Some wiseones before the U.S. Senate foreign relations committee, along with prominent politicians, have proposed that the way to prevent a U.S.-Red Chinese war is to persuade to accept the Russian Communist line of policy.

More lately, U.S. officials addressing a foreign policy conference of editors and broadcastmen suggested that Red China even now may be in a state of transition which is ultimately could see the ideological differences with the Soviet Union—presumably meaning the Chinese might be persuaded to accept the Russian theory of peaceful co-existence as opposed to the Mao-Tse-tung theory of violent revolution.

Addition of the new wing will bring capacity of the hospital to 200 beds and include several innovations and the most modern equipment.

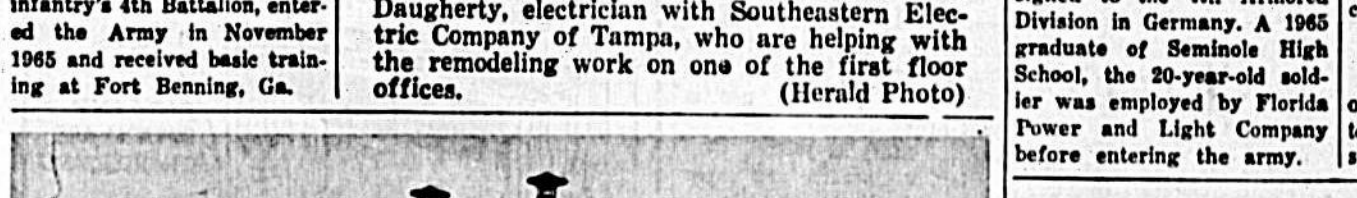
Construction of the three story wing began in January, 1964 with General Development Corporation as the prime contractor.

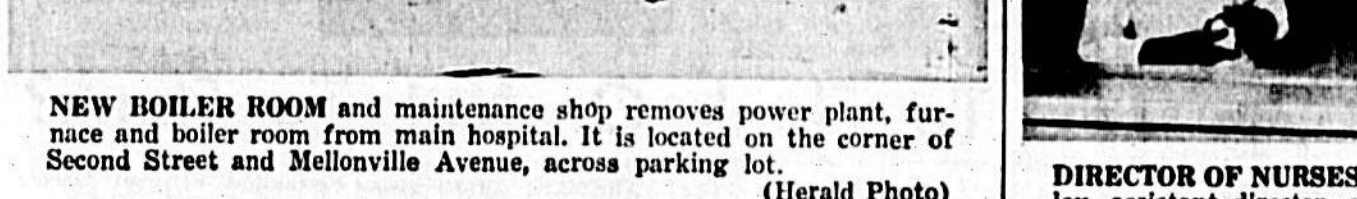

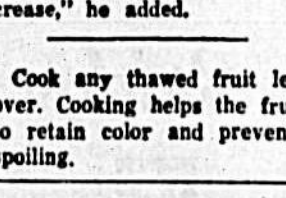

Hot Shoppe Is Closed Two Days

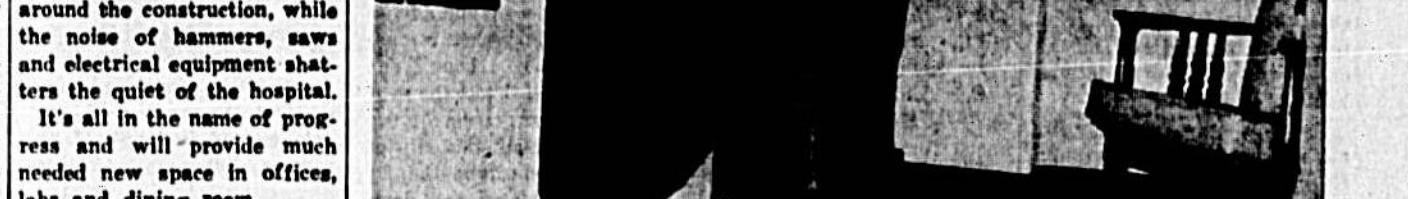

In conjunction with extensive remodeling going on the present lobby will be greatly expanded, making it more spacious and more attractive.

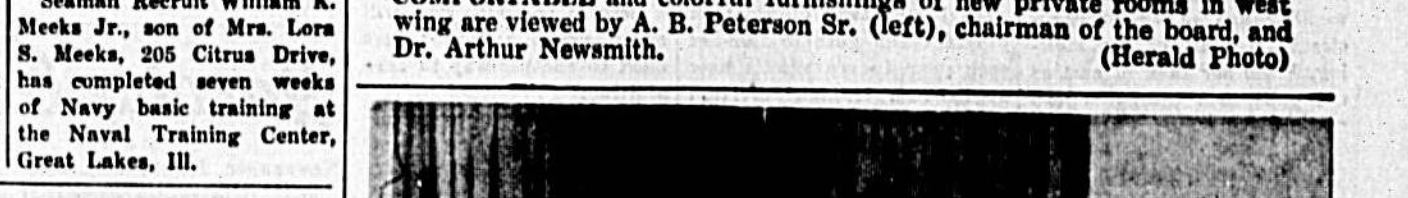

It's all in the name of progress and will provide much needed new space in offices, labs and dining room.

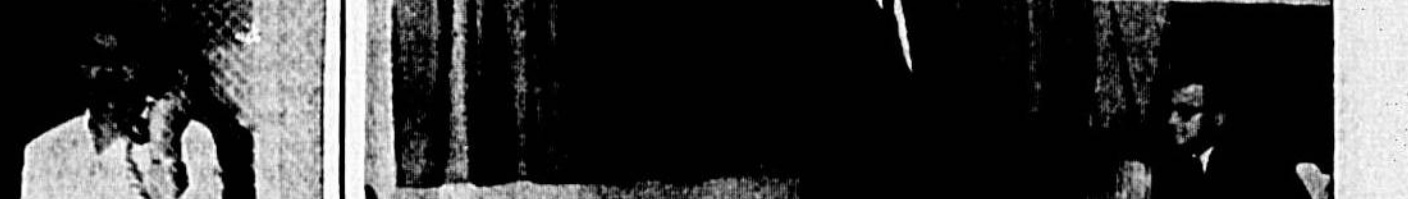
