attainment of "a great objective, a principle for which the American Legion worked faithfully for many years." I was voted by Congress, he said, "in the face of the same powerful and insidious forces which year after year had succeeded in crushing our efforts to have the government discharge its acknowledged obligation to the veterans of the World War, in spite of an opposition that was as ruthless as it was untruthful."
The legion's Americanism campaign, one of its primary activities from the day the legion was organized, was described by Murphy as "not confined solely to a campaign against communism."
"I firmly believe," he said, "that such a campaign is a proper one in order that our people may understand the principles of communism and be awakened to the knowledge that communists again have been sent to this country for the purpose of overthrowing our free democracy by force and violence, and substitute for it the political slavery of Soviet Russia."
"I am not, however, one of those who are a real behind every bush or who believe we are just one jump away from becoming a colonial possession of Moscow."
"The purpose of our battle against Communism, or any other foreign principle of government which would take away our American ideals, will be defeated if we permit ourselves to be swayed by blind passion. Our cause is supported only if our cause is supported by the reason and logic that which is best for all Americans."
The legion, according to

"does not oppose the right to propose changes in the Constitution in an orderly way. But the American Legion does say that whatever changes are necessary the American people themselves can handle without interference from abroad."
Continued development and improvement of American youth was described as "the primary interest of the Legion Americanism program," which now embraces 3,000 Boy Scout troops, hundreds of chapters of the Sons of the American Legion devoted to patriotism and clean living, the legion junior baseball tournaments in which 600,000 boys compete each year, and other health and character building work.
In highway safety, Commander Murphy called for legion support in a program of "first, a vigorous campaign of education, and, second, reasonable but safe traffic laws vigorously enforced." The 36,000 persons killed in traffic accidents last year in the United States exceeded the American losses in the World War, he said.
There must be no let-up, Murphy cautioned, in the legion's work for child welfare, community service and care for the disabled veterans of the war. He also said it earnestly hopes that at this session of the Congress some provision will be made for the widows and orphans of World War veterans."
Murphy declared the legion advocated "an adequate national defense—with emphasis on defense because it considered preparation the best insurance against war. This country," he said, "is not going out looking for war, and if we are prepared we shall have little to fear from a foreign aggressor."
Progress during the past year in the various phases of his broad program was reported to the legion by State Commissioner Arthur R. Borah of Pennsylvania.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 17.—(AP)—A delay in the completion of at least 40 of the 18 warships now being built by the Navy up to full authorized strength was disclosed in a Navy Department report on construction progress. Naval officials said the delay is attributable to the fact that the Navy is now building ships under the old Navy work program under the old Navy

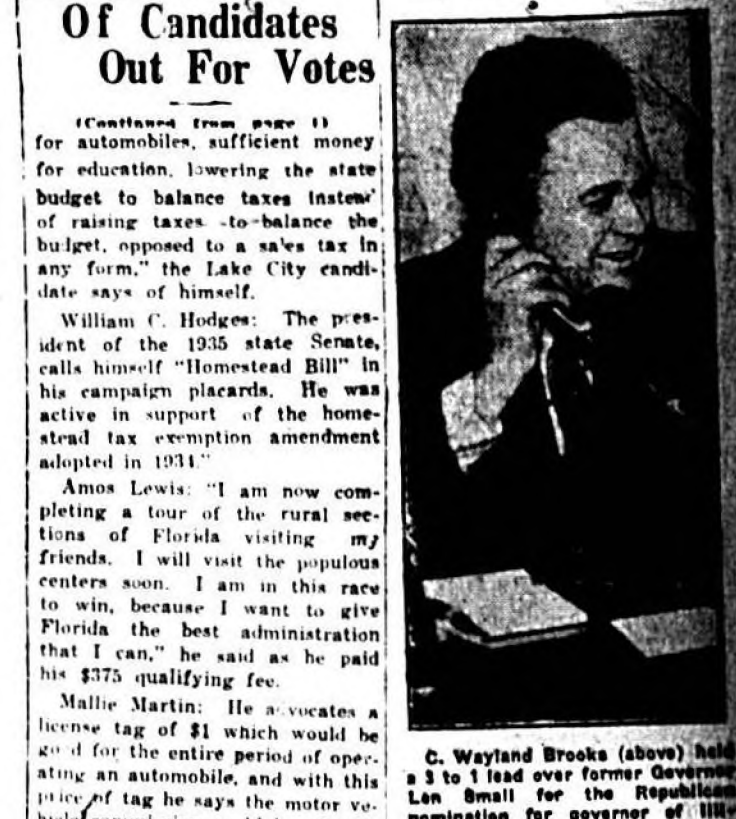

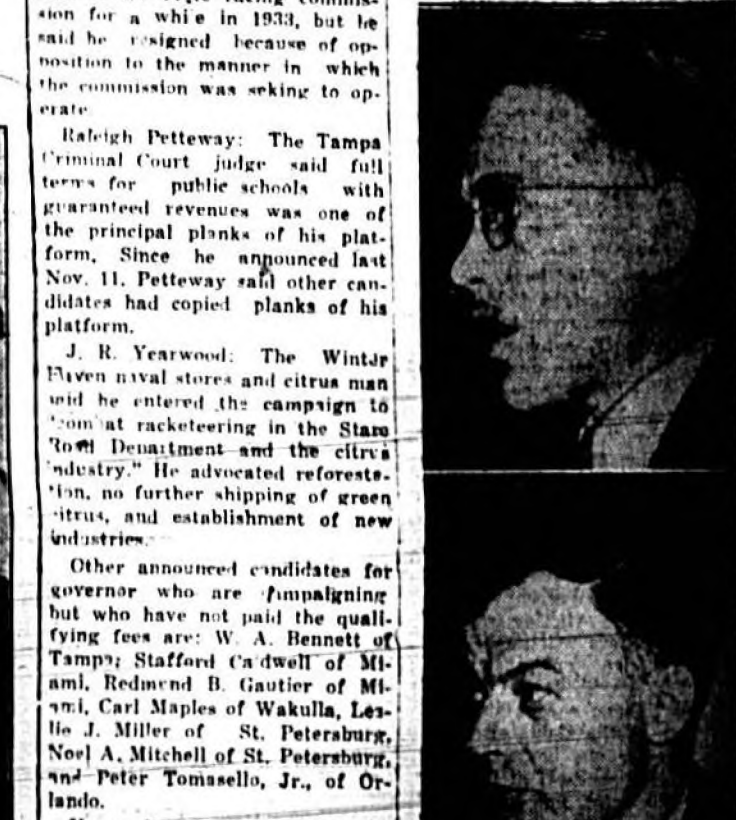

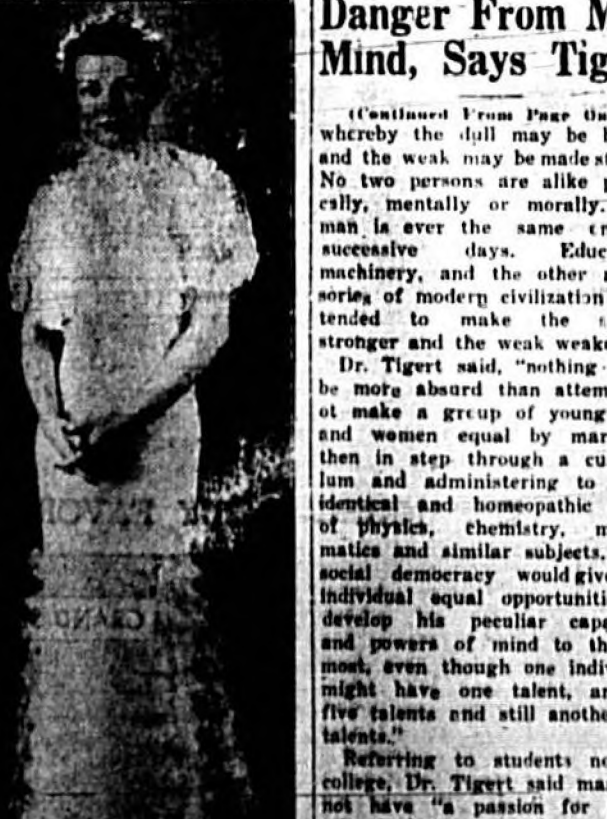

Local Legion Post Honored At State Meet

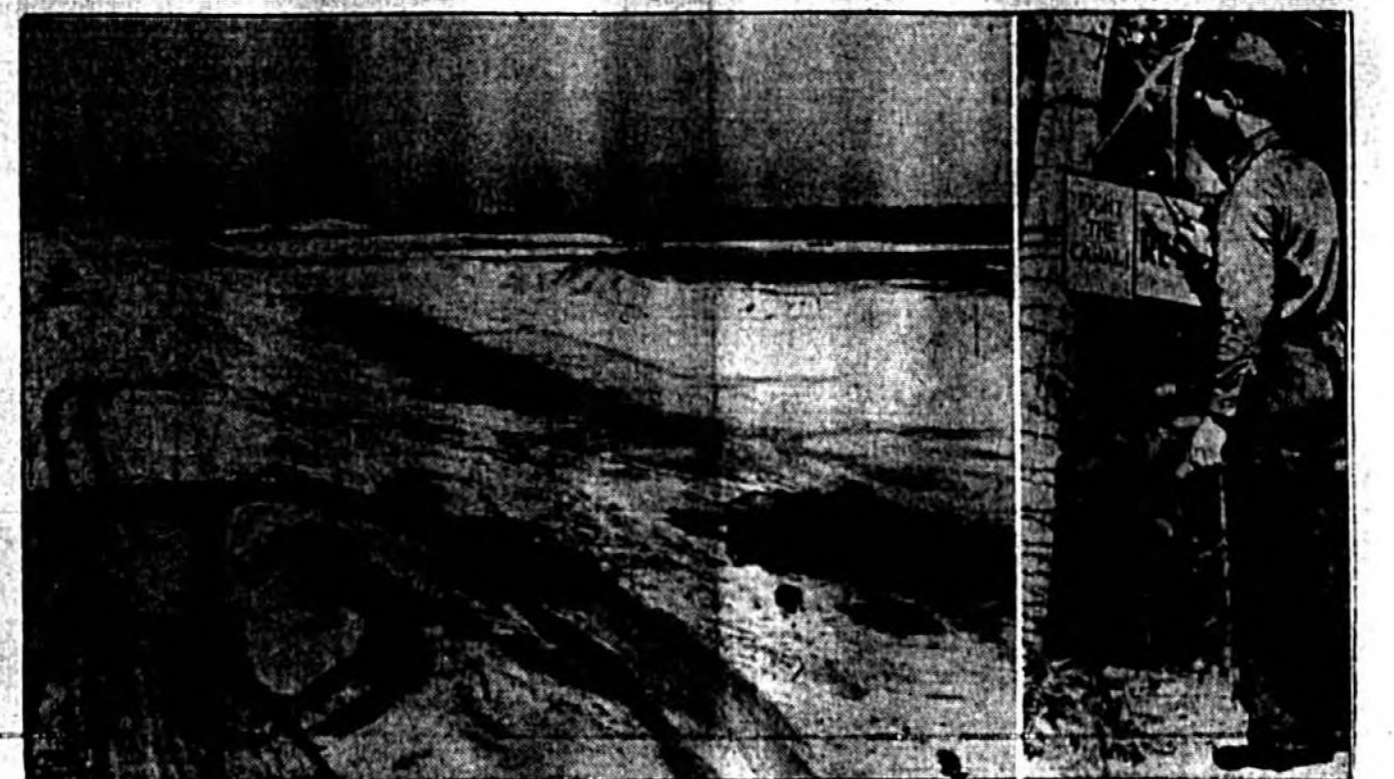
Leads Parade And Is Given Front Seats In The Convention Hall In Sarasota
