

ORLANDO, Apr. 18. Florida's fruit growers must expect greater than usual competition from Tex-es citrus sest fall and winter, R. B. Woolfelk, vice president of American Fruit Growers, declared here after a study of cros conditions in the Rio Grande Valley, and be termed the Texas ultestion "serious" from the standpoint of Forlda producers. "All indications are that Texas will have from 25,000 to 30,000 carloads of fruit next season, as compared with only 9,000 ears this past sea-son," Mr. Woolfolk said.

Trans prowers are much sur-prised at the way citrus trees re-covered after the freeze of a year ago. These groves now look en-tirely different from the way they did last August and September. The groves practically all show prospects for a heavy crop. The trees have dust passed the bloom

stage. Whose groves which had the best crops this year will have two to three times the quantity of fruit this coming season and there are, in addition, large acreages of younger trees which had no crop at all last sesson that now show prospects for quite a heavy crop. The total production the past year was approximately 9,000 cars and from all appearances there will be at least 25,000 cars of fruit available next fall and winter if there is no serious climatic damage," Mr. Woolfolk continued.
