(Continued from Page One) scenic trip with the monotony of the heaving, dull green sea as is found in the east coast route.

In addition to seeing the natural beauties, yachtsmen would follow the deep, well-marked channel of the river where the trees afford protection rather than the route where the heavy winds and rolling seas threaten, members of the party pointed out, often impairing travel for the smaller vessels.

Mr. Van Anden, stated that in his belief many yachtsmen would make Sanford headquarters for their boats, due to the large supply of fresh water, if access to the city could be made through the proposed canal.

Mr. Van Anden, his wife and a friend, Arthur Burns of Nova Scotia are the only members aboard the craft driven by a 100 horse power engine and indicated their intention of remaining in Sanford indefinitely.

More than 20 signatures were obtained from representatives from middle-western states other than Indiana like Michigan, Illinois, Ohio, Nebraska. A score more were set down by Californians, or Washingtonians. Pennsylvania contributed 17; New Jersey added half a score.

Pardon Board Gives Relief In 121 Cases

Prisoners Will Be Released From Raiford On Monday; Fewer Than Usual

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The State Pardon Board announced today it had approved 121 clemency applications out of 1,300 heard at the four-day meeting two weeks ago. The number is far less than was granted at previous board sessions.

Ninety-two were new cases. The prisoners will be released next Sunday. Others are extensions of former paroles and restorations to citizenship. Many of the conditional pardons went to short time prisoners who have served most of their time. The pardon board gave a conditional pardon to Fred Shannon, sentenced to four years in 1936 for assault to commit manslaughter. Clemency was recommended by many, including five.

Four Delegates From Steel Workers Are Charged With Murdering Young Girl

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Four delegates to this week's convention of the steel workers organizing committee were held on a technical charge of murder today while police investigated the death of 20-year-old Rose Aull whose nude body was found in their hotel room. Inspector of Detectives Walter Monagan said Jacob Weikard and Morris Ennsold, both of Brooklyn, were being detained here and that New York police had taken Louis H. Grogan of Brooklyn and Fred A. Odenwald of Ozone Park, Long Island, into custody on murder charges pending an investigation. Dr. J. W. McManus, the coroner's physician, declared a post mortem examination gave no clue and said the cause of the death was "undetermined."

Sarasota Ships First Celery Car For This Season

Plans Are Made By Control Group For Orderly Marketing. With the shipment of the first car of celery from the state today, members of the recently appointed Control Committee of the Celery Marketing Agreement are making final preparations for their activities during the coming year, according to an announcement of Harry Nicksie, local farmer and member of the Control Committee. Among the preparations being made by the committee is the hiring of inspectors whose duty it will be to compute as nearly as possible the number of rates of celery in the field before cutting. These figures will be given to the Control Committee as a basis for its work and also as a foundation for prorating shipments of the farmers when this is deemed necessary. Four of these inspectors will be employed in the Sanford district, one in the Bradenton district and two in the Sarasota district. Mr. Nicksie will be in charge of the employing in this district, B. F. Wholeser in the Oviedo district and Mr. Powell in the Sarasota-Manatee section. The first car of celery is being shipped from Sarasota today and regular shipments are expected from the remaining districts beginning next week.

Fishpool On Pier To Be Rebuilt And Lighted By City

Extensive repairs have been made to the fish pool on the Municipal Pier at the foot of Park Avenue under the supervision of Superintendent of Parks James Moughton. The front wall of the pool which heretofore hid the waterfall, because of its height, has been removed and rebuilt about two feet lower so that a full view of the water may be had as it spills from the big bronze shell at the foot of the flagpole and falls into the pool which will be stocked with gold fish. The bottom of the pool, which was broken and leaking, has been rebuilt and the whole interior is being replastered. Floodlights for the pool and colored lights from the flagpole will be installed soon. Other repairs have been made to the pier. The handrail has been replaced and the woodwork in the building has been repaired and painted. Because of the sink holes under the sidewalks that bordered the pier, they were removed and the holes filled with cinders.


Seminole Old Age Pensions Reach \$2,787

Tax On Profits Is Continued By House Committee

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The tax subcommittee turned down today a Republican proposal to repeal the controversial tax on undistributed corporate profits. Chairman Vinson, Ken. Democrat, said the vote along party lines was 4 to 3. He said Representative Cawthorpe, New York Republican, moved that the committee adopt a plan by which the present normal corporate tax of 15 to 16 percent would be boosted to 8 to 10 percent and the capital gains tax fixed at 12 to 13 percent. Vinson said the committee had been informed that if this plan had been in operation for the present tax year the government would have received \$100,000,000 less in revenue. A new demand by the American Federation of Labor that the administration's wage hour bill be shunted back to a House committee for overhauling forced the measure's backers to redouble their efforts. William Brown, president of the A. F. of L., wired his views to every House member. The A. F. of L. objects to a provision giving an administrative agency wide discretion to its minimum wages and maximum hours. Legislators reported that officials of the Federation also were busy presenting their objections by telephone, and some expressed the opinion that the labor leaders were making headway.

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Two Leopards To Arrive Saturday At Sanford Zoo

Two young African leopards have been purchased for the Municipal Zoo and will arrive in Sanford late Saturday evening, Superintendent of Parks, James Moughton, reported today. The animals were purchased by the city from Messrs. Bros. and Ward, Inc. of Long Island, New York and are reported to be in good condition. The company offered the following description: "These animals were brought in by our man only a short time ago from Sierra Leone, West Africa. They are an unrelated pair, weighing 30 to 40 pounds and are about 2-12 feet from head to hind quarters. The male has grown his second fangs and both are in perfect coat." This will be the second addition to the Zoo within the past few weeks. Eckel and Little Floral, two American Bears, were the last additions and were purchased by the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce. Phil King, negro entrepreneur, said that a native "Jerry" himalayan baboon, is on the way from Africa. During the past year a number of attempts have been made to obtain a mate for the animal but because of the secrecy of that type of baboon in captivity, all efforts have met with failure. Mr. Moughton, today was supervising work on the remodeling of two cages in preparation for the leopards.

Henry Hill, negro boy, was reported in a critical condition at the local hospital today as a result of injuries sustained when his playmate, James Anderson, 13-year-old negro lad, stabbed him in a quarrel late yesterday evening near their home in Georgetown. It was learned at the Police Station this morning. On his arrival by members of the Police Department, the Anderson boy, alias "Jack the Rabbit," stated that he thought the larger boy, of whom he said he was afraid, was going to draw a knife on him and he beat him to it. The boy is being held on charges of assault and has been lodged in the Juvenile Court.

SHANGHAI, Dec. 17.—(AP)—With flags fluttering at halfmast the little United States gunboat Oahu arrived at Shanghai tonight bearing the dead, wounded, and rescued survivors of her sister ship Panay.

The United States government's concern over the belated information that Japanese boats had machine-gunned the Panay before she went down with flags flying was emphasized when a naval court of inquiry boarded the Oahu down the Whangpoo River at 10 o'clock. Norman Allen, Universal news-reel photographer from Hollywood, disclosed that the Panay was bombed before leaving Nanking and was shelled going up the river before the air bombardment which sent her to the river bottom. Meanwhile the Chinese-Japanese warfare threatened to spread to the south China coast. (Continued on Page Three)

Survivors Of Panay Affair Reach Safety

Continued From Page One In far-flung attacks of the Japanese "not satisfied" with the capture of Nanking.

A Japanese communique announcing the formal triumph entry into the fallen Chinese capital declared the "armed forces of the Empire are determined in their endeavor to carry on to a conclusion of the purpose of the present expedition—establishment of lasting peace in the Orient."

TOKYO, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The Japanese Foreign Office today formally charged the Soviet Union with acting in a manner "entirely unthinkable in any civilized country" in connection with arrests of Japanese in Russia.

The Foreign Office protested to the Soviet Embassy citing what Japan called numerous cases in which Soviet authorities had arrested Japanese and held them without trial.

The memorandum accompanying the protest said Japan wished a "reasonable" answer. Almost concurrently the Tokyo newspaper Yomiuri charged that Russia was continuing to strengthen her military forces at Vladivostok, Russia's Far Eastern seaport.

The United States stiffened its attitude toward the sinking of the gunboat Panay upon the arrival in Washington of official information that the vessel was machine-gunned by surface craft as well as attacked by airplanes.

Officials said Secretary of State Hull had additional information as follows:

While survivors were escaping from the sinking Panay, airplanes dived and machine-gunned the small boats from an extremely low altitude, wounding two persons.

Bullet holes later found in the Panay's outboard motor Sampant before the Panay sank, some Japanese military boarded the Panay and stayed there five minutes, although the American colors were flying and the nation-

The "spinning" process, which has not been adapted to mass production, consists of bending a twirling disc of metal over a wooden form. Various types of conical and spherical pieces are turned out.

Joseph Nagel, a metal spinner for 19 years, produced the aluminum alloy noses used for the dirigibles Akron and Macon. He uses a tool resembling a screw driver, with which he shapes the whirling disc to conform to the outline of the wooden form.

Among other products are coffee urns, kitchen utensils, ashtrays, airplane engine cowls and purely decorative pieces.

Helps For Housewives

This view of the gateway to Fort Marion at St. Augustine during the Mexican war (1850-58) is now believed among first pictures of a United States War. Previously Civil War views were considered earliest. This picture has been of great value to the Department of Interior in reconstructing the old fort. It is a daguer type as compared with the "set plate" which the photographer had to carry his solution for plates with him—used in Civil War pictures. The picture is owned by H. Armour Smith of Yonkers, N. Y., and was lent The Associated Press by the New York Museum of Art.
