#### Woman in stable condition after shooting

LONGWOOD - A Longwood-area man faces charges related to a latenight shooting that occurred at 11:30 p.m.: Thursday.

When authorities arrived on the scene, they found 33-year-old Angela Williams had been shot in the back, near the right shoulder, with a high powered rifle.

She was taken to Orlando Regional Medical Center by helicopter. As of 3:20 a.m., she was listed in stable condition, authorities

Deputies found her husband, 44-year-old Alric Shock Williams, hiding outside their apartment at 1855 South U.S. 17-92. He is accused of domestic violence involving aggravated battery. Other charges are pending further investigation, authorities said.

The couple's 11-year-old daughter was also inside the apartment at the time, but was not injured, said Steve Olson, a spokesman for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

## Sanford officer demoted

**SANFORD** — Sanford Police Department's highest ranking black officer has been demoted and suspended without pay for a week because he violated department policy.

An Internal Affairs investigation found Lt. Willie Harden acted improperly during an incident when an officer drawing

her weapon in the department's training room. Internal Affairs also found Harden violated procedures during a child abduction investigation.

As a result of the findings, the 16-year

veteran was demoted to the rank of Sergeant, and received 40 hours suspension without pay. He is appealing the disciplinary action, according to a department spokeswoman.

Police Chief Brian Tooley declined to comment regarding the disciplinary action, in order to ensure Harden's right of appeal.

Harden also declined to comment. The Internal Affairs report indicates that on Oct. 27, Harden, Officer Darlene Ladoczky and Officer Robert Shull were in the department's training room, standing within three to four feet of each See Officer, Page 6A

## Sex offender moves into county

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Benefiting from a controversial 1999 U.S. Supreme Court ruling which enables the early release of prisoners, a registered sexual offender and felon has moved to Altamonte Springs after his prison term for homicide was

Keith Donahue King, 26, registered on Monday with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office as a sexual offender and felon, listing his address as 1134 Rosecliff Circle in Sanford. Later this week, King moved to 1316 Amanda Street in Altamonte Springs, although he has a sister still living at the Sanford residence, authorities said.

King, an unemployed laborer, was released on Dec. 29, 1999 after serving five years of a 15year sentence at the Hamilton Correctional Institute in **Broward County.** 

He was sentenced on March 17, 1994 to 15 years in prison for Supreme Court ruling of Gomez

homicide, on Nov. 13, 1990 for four counts of sexual battery by an adult with a victim under age 12, and on Nov. 1, 1989 for lewd and lascivious acts

under age 16. In addition, King was sentenced for rob-

## Planners urge city adopt new zoning rules

SANFORD — Nearly 40 people persevered through a fivehour long Planning and Zoning Commission hearing Thursday as a proposed ordinance requiring social service programs and other businesses to get permits to operate within the city passed unanimously.

Under the proposed ordinance, which has stirred heated debate in the city, new social service programs would be required to receive approval by

both the Planning and Zoning Commission and the City Commission, similar to the way the city approves on-site sales of alcoholic beverages

In addition to social services, other programs affected by the ordinance would include churches, temporary labor services, day care facilities for six or more people, residential care facilities for 15 or more residents, outdoor noncommericial amusement facilities, retail sales and services, pawn shops and bail bond companies.

rezone property located next to Crystal Lake from A-1, agriculture, to R-1AA, low-density residential. However, the Commission also unanimously decided not to grant the development preliminary site approval on the basis of "sup-

Martin Luther King, Jr. Day is Jan. 17 this year, the third Monday of the first month. Events will be underway for most of the weekend.







changes to the Florida statutes that grant prisoners eligibility for early release credits, including emergency gain time, administrative release credits, and provisional release credits.

The Gomez case involved a challenge by prison inmates to the denial of overcrowding credits for time periods after the control release program became operational in January, 1991.

The U.S. Supreme Court's action upheld a May 1999 Florida Supreme Court ruling that said the prisoners were eligible for early release under state statutes.

More than 70 percent of the offenders released by the ruling are due at their probation office within 24 hours of their release. The Department of Corrections estimates that 58 percent of those released under Gomez will have only 30 days deducted from their

prison terms. crimes committed by people who are eligible for release under the Gomez decision have been receiving notification through a letter from the Department of Corrections of the impending

Inmates are instructed by corrections officials on how to stay drug and alcohol free, find gainful employment, and seek community assistance for food, housing and counseling.

Continued from Page 1A other. Harden was making comments to Ladoczky to demonstrate how she drew her weapon on a call that day involving a mentally ill person, the report said.

Ladoczky drew her weapon and pointed it in the direction of Shull's head, then holstered her weapon realizing she had made a mistake, the report said.

Harden took Ladoczky and Shull into the break area of the police department and counseled Ladoczky that what she had done was wrong and to not let it happen again. He told them that the incident would end there.

Harden did not document the incident nor did he advise Ladoczky's supervisors. He did not advise anyone in his chain of command, the report said.

Following an internal affairs investigation, Ladoczky was found to have violated two policies and procedures regarding the display and discharge of a firearm, and dry firing.

"I never tried to conceal or hide anything from anybody," Harden said in testimony.

In the Oct. 27 incident. Harden was found to be in violation of five General Orders. Standards of Conduct -Performance of Duty;

 Standards of Conduct -Substandard Performance - (A) Incompetence, (B) Carelessness;

 Standards of Conduct -Obedience to Lawful Orders;

 Standards of Conduct -Conduct Unbecoming -Disclosure of confidential information of an administrative investigation.

 Discipline - Disciplinary procedures.

For her actions in the training room, Ladoczky received a written reprimand.

On Nov. 11, two weeks after the training room incident, Harden was walking with his children from Hamilton Elementary School to his police vehicle when Officer Jordan Beckner approached and informed him of that an elementary-aged child had reported an attempted abduction, according to an internal affairs investigation by the department.

Beckner informed Harden he had called in the complaint. Harden then left the school to take his own children home, telling Beckner he would return.

However, Harden did not return to the school, located at 8th Street and Scott Avenue. He also did not inform the police communications center of any of his activities during the inci-

dent, the internal affairs investigation concluded.

"There was no threat or immediate danger to the child at that point right there," Harden said in testimony during the investigation. "I saw nothing in the area that indicated that anybody was still there. or anything."

Harden passed Officer Darlene Ladoczky, who was responding to the call on 7th Street near Wades Grocery.

Ladoczky investigated the complaint and determined that no crime had been committed. The boy returned home with his mother, the internal affairs report said.

Meanwhile, Harden did not acknowledge to the police communications center that he had been at the scene. He did not call, inquire or direct any police activity or personnel responding to the call, the internal affairs

report said.

"I didn't get on the radio (to) direct anybody because they were coming to the scene," Harden said in testimony.

On Nov. 17 at approximately 9 p.m., after being instructed not to discuss the on-going internal affairs investigation with anyone except legal counsel or the investigator, Harden in uniform went to Ladoczky's home, the report said.

"All I wanted to know was who was making accusations against me, where this was coming from," Harden said in testimony. "That was my only reason for talking to her."

He told Ladoczky that he was under internal investigation for the incident of the attempted child abduction, as well as for the incident in which she drew her gun in the department training room.

Harden showed Ladoczky the

written notifications of the investigation, and also told her to not tell anybody that he had come and talked about the internal investigations to her because he could be fired, the report said.

He asked Ladoczky if she knew who was behind the complaints on him. Harden also asked her if she had seen his children in his vehicle when they passed on 7th Street, and had additional discussions with Ladoczky concerning the investigation from when she drew her weapon in the training

room, the report said. The investigation also found Harden had once used an onduty subordinate police officer, Corporal Michael Taylor, to pick up his children at Hamilton Elementary School and transport them to Midway.

As a result of his actions on Nov. 11, Harden was found by

Standards of Conduct -

Performance of Duty. Standards of Conduct -Substandard Performance (A)

Incompetence; (B) Carelessness. Standards of Conduct -Obedience to Lawful Orders -

The Planning and Zoning Commission said that it also would like hospitals, medical clinics, hotels and motels, funeral homes and crematoriums to be required to seek permitting under the ordinance.

"This is an opportunity to provide the kind of planning that is needed in the city," said Planning and Zoning Commissioner Michael Skat.

dential historic district said the ordinance represents an opportunity to protect the downtown area from "undesired" business-

es and agencies. "None of us would want a day care center with 35 screaming kids right next to where you live," said David Kelly, who resides on Magnolia Avenue. "I think you'll find that nearly 100 percent of the historic district

residents are behind this." Meanwhile, church clergy and leaders of social service programs said that city leaders need to be careful to maintain an ability within the city to assist the needy.

"In every major religion there is some perspective of going out and caring for people who are considered to be poor," said Al Cole, a priest at Holy Cross Episcopal Church in Sanford.

The zoning ordinance will require final approval by the City Commission to become law. Although it may be discussed Monday, the ordinance is not on the City Commission's agenda. It will require two hearings by the City Commission.

"The thing we're talking about will effect the entire city and not just the downtown area," said Thelma Mike, director of the Good Samaritan Home in Sanford. "We have to look at the fact that there are people with needs no matter where they are."

Three out of the five city commissioners — Velma Williams, Brady Lessard and Mayor Larry Dale - have said that they support the ordinance.

Programs already legally established would not be affected. However, new programs would need to meet changed zoning requirements.

The programs would be sepa-

rated by at least 1,500 feet from similar businesses or agencies and would have to be at least 300 feet from any residential area. The programs would also need to demonstrate that they would not be detrimental to the character or development trends in the area.

"I think to say that there should be a distance between buildings is just common sense," said Dianne Newton, who resides on Oak Avenue.

According to a city survey provided by the Department of Engineering and Planning, out of 20 social service type of programs such as the Salvation Army in Seminole County, 14 are located in Sanford.

The majority of the programs are clustered in Goldsboro and the city's historic district, city officials said.

The 1990 U.S. Census lists 16.3 percent of Sanford residents as

living below the poverty line. Much of the debate concerning the ordinance has centered upon a proposed program to provide meals to the needy within Sanford's historic district.

Jean Metts, director of Seminole Volunteer Enterprises, plans to hold the dinners for the needy several days per week from 4:30 p.m. to 7 p.m. The agency is located within an area zone for special commercial use, near homes within the residential historic district.

Metts said that the ordinance could be detrimental to incoming social service agencies.

"It's costly for a non-profit organization to come before the boards, and it takes a lot of time," Metts said.

Opponents of the program at Seminole Volunteer Enterprises say that it will lower property values by attracting crime, vagrancy and prostitution to the historic district.

Although the programs at the agency would not be affected by the ordinance, residents of the historic district said that the conflicts over the programs are an example of why the ordinance is needed.

"The better controlled all the categories can be, and the less loop holes, the better," said Steven Myers, who resides on Oak Avenue.





Walt Disney World Speedway. Gregoire, driving the Mexmil G Force/Aurora, ran only a few warm-up laps Jan. 5 and did not get up to speed. But he said the team came out prepared Thursday.

"We had a good basic setup, and we haven't changed much," said Gregoire, a native of Neufchateu, France, and resident of Indianapolis. "Dick Simon and the team did a very good job to figure out a good baseline to

start with. "I was impressed from the beginning, because I could feel the car had a lot of downforce. It had good handling, especially in Turn 1, and it didn't take me long to be flat out in

Turn 2.° Robby McGehee, driving the Energizer G Force/Aurora, Was second fastest for the day at 166,984 and Scott Sharp was third in the Delphi Automotive Dallara/Aurora at 166.883.

Sharp holds the track record of 171.371, set in qualifying in 1999 with a 4-liter engine. Indy Racing League teams are using 3.5-liter engines in 2000.

Greg Ray remained supreme at the 1-mile tri-oval, however, with a speed of 168.445 set Jan. 5 on the first day of the two-day Indy Racing League open test.

Ray was also fastest at the two-day December Open Test, at 169.165. Ray and Team Menard did not test Thursday. The team conducted private tests early this week and returned to their Indianapolis headquarters.

Al Unser Jr. completed his first official Indy Racing League test on a good note by posting a speed of 164.979, picking up nearly 3 mph from the first day.

"I feel that this was a very good test," said Unser. "The car ran flawlessly and my crew is doing a great job. I need more time to figure out the car to get it quicker, and I need to learn the track, but we are going to test here again on January 19th and 20th, so I think that we will accomplish more during those two days."

Two accidents marred the day's testing.

The Treadway Racing 1999 G Force/Aurora driven by Sam Schmidt did a 180-degree spin exiting Turn 2 and made contact with the outside wall, heavily damaging the left-rear side of the car.

Schmitt, from Las Vegas, was transported via air to Orlando Regional Medical Center immediately after the accident, which occurred at 9:20 a.m. A three-year Indy Racing vet-

eran, Schmidt finished a career-best fifth in the final season paint standings in 1999 for Treadway Racing. He earned his first ever pole and victory at the Vegas.com 500 in late September at Las Vegas Motor Speedway.

Dr. Henry Bock, Walt Disney World Speedway medical director, reported that Schmidt is listed in critical condition in the intensive care at ORMC with some paralysis. Schmidt, 35, is conscious and siert.

About one hour after Schmidt's accident, rookie Doug Didero, driving the Mid-America Motorsports 1999 Dallara/Aurors, lost control of his car exiting Turn 2. The car did a 90-degree spin then straightened but made light contact with the inside retaining wall, damaging the left side suspension. Didero was unhurt.

indy Racing drivers completed 2,310 iaps during the two days of testing, with defending race winner Eddie Cheever Jr. completing 323 laps, the most of any driver.

Cheever's brother, Ross, also tested the Team Cheever Dallara/infiniti. He posted a fast speed of 161.936 and com-

pleted 72 laps.







Last year, more than 11,300 congregations together generated \$2.5 million for worthy charities in communities across the country. The effort has raised an aggregate of \$7 million for hungry and hurting people since it became national in 1993.

Organizers don't touch the money, nor do we tell participants where to send the funds. We ask only that someone from each participating group report the amount collected via www.souperbowl.org or by calling (800) 358-SOUP (7687) on Super Bowl Sunday, so that the grand total can be determined and announced to the media.

Our dream is to see 20,000 churches, synagogues and the like encourage members to join together in loving God and neighbor by giving \$1 each as they leave services (or school) on Super Bowl Sunday, Jan. 30,
