Justice Douglas

Douglas, who served on the Supreme Court longer than any other man, died at 10:09 a.m. today, a spokesman at Walter Reed Army Medical Center said. Douglas, 81, who retired from the nation's highest court in 1975 after suffering a debilitating stroke, died at the hospital where he was admitted Christmas Eve. He was suffering from


pneumonia and kidney failure. Appointed to the court on April 17, 1939 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Douglas became a staunch defender of individual freedoms. He once said his most important decisions were abolishing legalized segregation and the "one-man, one-vote" rule for state legis-

In a 1965 ruling striking down a Connecticut law making it a crime to use contraceptives, Douglas set out the right to privacy — a right he called "older than the Bill of Rights." Douglas served almost 37 years — the

longest tenure on the court. In the 1970s, he found himself i creasingly isolated as the liberal court he personified the previous decade took a conservative turn under Chief Justice Warren Burger. Over the years Douglas had weathered

several illnesses. He had a heart pacemaker since 1968. On New Year's Eve, 1974, while vacationing in the Bahamas, he suffered his stroke. Partially paralyzed, he eventually returned to the bench. But the effects of the stroke forced him to step down Nov. 2, 1975 — a frail, fragile shell of the

In a letter to President Gerald Ford innouncing his retirement, Douglas said, "I have been bothered by incessant and demanding pain which depletes my energy to the extent that I have been unable to shoulder my full share of the

On occasion emergency services in Seminole County have

Olympic Heads: Ask Athletes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U.S. Olympic Committee officials say any decision to boycott the summer Olympics in Moscow would have to come from the American athletes themselves, regardless of what Viesident Carter recommends.

Secretary of State Cyce Mark and White House aides met with U.S. Olympic Committee Chairman Robert Kane and the committee's executive director, F. Don Miller, Friday to discuss a possible boycott in retaliation for the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan.

Tito May Get Amputation

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (UPI) - Officials today delayed the daily medical bulletin on President Josip Broz Tito by several hours, raising a possibility the 87year-old leader may be undergoing surgery, possibly to amputate his inflamed leg.

Tito's ailing leg has continued to deteriorate, creating what a Communist Party source called a "very worrying" situation that could result in an urgent decision to amputate - even though Tito reportedly has resisted such a measure

Evans reported the foods in vending machines at Lake Howell are "fortified" and therefore not junk foods. Evans said he knows the foods are nutritionally fortified because the vending machine suppliers said so. "The dealers are all you have to go by," he said. "Who else's

Evans said there are fruit drink machines in the school, t he does not know their ingredients. Darvin Boothe, principal of Lake Brantley High, said the agriculture ban is unlikely to achieve its long-term goal. "Six hours here at school won't change their eating habits," he said. "But the ban will hurt students directly by dealing a

very severe blow to our athletic program." At Lake Brantley, Boothe said roughly \$15,000 per year earned for the athletic program through coke sales alone. "This money goes to pay off a stadium built almost exclusively without taxpayers' money," he said.

Some of these sales are during games which would not subject to the Department of Agriculture ban. At Lake Howell, Evans said the revenues of \$8,000 to \$12,000 per year from so-called junk food sales support the band and

Revnolds estimates that Seminole High would lose in excess of \$5,000 a year if the ban goes into effect. as many as those who ask other judges," Williams said.

In Florida could you not sell fresh fruits,

such as oranges?"

In preparing the final regulations for the ban, Department of Agriculture spokesperson Diane Jenkins said comments from 2,500 members of the public are being taken into consideration. The department also held hearings on the matter and solicited opinions from representatives of the American Dental Association, the American Medical Association and the Secondary Principals Association. An Altamonte Springs woman, found drowned in her bathtub on Jan. 3, was probably murdered, says Seminole Medical Examiner G.V. Garav. There is a "99 percent chance" Sophia Miller, 19, was held

under water, causing her death at her home at 319 Hayman St., Garay said this morning. Deputies report Ms. Miller's body, clothed in a nightgown, on

Jan. 3 was found dead at 7:30 p.m. by George Bass of Oviedo. a friend who had come to visit. She died earlier that day, between 1 and 3 p.m., Garay said. There is no evidence a seizure killed Ms. Miller, nor was there any trace of alcohol or drugs in her body, said Garay.

The death was immediately investigated as "suspicious" by deputies who so far have announced no information on their The body was found completely submerged in the bathtub,

Since Jan. 4, the date of the autopsy, Garay said his final report had been delayed by a problem getting test results on the possibility of drugs or alcohol in Ms. Miller's blood. Although samples were immediately sent to the sheriff's office for transportation to the Sanford state crime lab, as of

A deputy there attributed the delay to "cataloging," but an employee of the medical examiner said the samples had probably just been forgotten, because the deputy transporting them was told to take them straight to the lab. - DAVID M RAZLER

Say 'Stop' When You Can't Take Smell Anymore Scientists Worried

"The point at which we'll stop would come when the board member says, 'Look, I can't stand this anymore," Walter Honour, chief of the city's Bio-Environmental Services

Honour is the author of a proposal before the board, calling on Jacksonville, a city known for pervasive chemical and paper plant smells, to become the nation's first to draw up community standards for offensive odors. Under Honour's plan, the board, which is made up of two doctors, two professional engineers, two industrial plant

managers, a conservationist and two "discreet" citizens, would set the community's standards of smell. "We're in 'frontierland' on this thing," Honour said in describing the plan. "I don't know of anyone else doing it. We still need to work out the details."

In general, however, Honour envisions his division breaking down "pure native compounds of the odorous products" obtained from the city's chief odor offenders, the chemical and paper companies most frequently named in citizen com-

After the board members have gotten a whiff of various levels of the malodors and have decided individually up to what point they can stand the stench, the results will be averaged out and the standards published. Then, whenever a citizen complains of a bad odor in his or her neighborhood, Honour said, an inspector from his division will go out with an air quality control sampling bag and obtain

a sample of the offensive smell. This will be brought back to the city's laboratory, where it will be analyzed and compared with the community standard. Frequent offenders of the smell standards will be subject to fine. They also will have to eliminate the odor. 



Contederate Cash Has Risen Again

FT. McCOY, Fla. - People used to laugh whenever Southerners, saving their Confederate money, insisted their region would rise again. No one laughs any longer. Dixie has most of the fossil fuel, an increasing piece of the population, and, of course, the president of the United States. Now it seems even their money has come

Numismatist Grover Criswell says the Confederate dollar is presently worth more than comparable United States currency. And Criswell should know. Aside from being a governor of the American Numismatic Assn., he is reportedly the richest man in the world in terms of Confederate money. In 33 years of buying and

selling the obsolete notes and coins, he has

amassed a face-value treasure in excess of

Not all of Criswell's Confederate money has returned to glory. A good lot of it is still well below the equivalent value of modern currency. Yet, on average, the Confederate dollar is worth five to eight times today's U.S. note, and there is one Confederate half dollar

that is worth \$500,000.

That half dollar was minted in New Orleans luring the Civil War (1861-1864). It was never vere struck. One of the specimens was given to Jefferson Davis, president of the Conederacy. Since then the value of the coin has tisen by one million percent.

The awesome growth of the coin, as well as hat of other Confederate notes, would of course, be astonishing to the old South. When the money was made, actually, it was not worth its face value. Before the end of the war between the states, moreover, the Rebel currency was to become essentially useless.

Not that the South didn't have high hopes for its money. The Confederate Congress authorized the printing of \$500 million in coins and notes to defeat the North and build a new ation. Things soon got out of hand, however; Criswell says at least another \$500 million in uthorized cash was also circulated. Then too there was all kinds of private

LONDON (UPI) - Sir Cecil Beaton, photographer and stage designer, died Friday at his country home. He had celebrated his 76th birthday only four days before his death. His private secretary said Beaton, who suffered a stroke in | the Clerk of the Circuit Court of 1975, died of heart failure. He had been in good health recently, she said, and was in the process of resuming his career. Beaton was a designer, author and painter but perhaps best known as a photographer of British royalty.

He took his first royal photograph in 1939 when Queen Elizabeth, now the queen mother, summoned him to the palace. He continued to photograph the royal family through the births of the present Queen Elizabeth's children. 



Demand For Calculators Led To Home Computer

By TOM NETSEL Herald Staff Writer

The decade of the 70s saw the birth of the hand-held calculators and a whole new industry was formed around the miniature electronic devices. The first units were simple and expensive. For a couple of hundred dollars you could get one that would add, subtract, multiply and divide, and little else. They proved to be popular, however, and more and more companies got on the band wagon. As competition grew, the devices grew smaller, more complex and cheaper. The price for the simple

the art increased at a tremendous rate. Later models featured more advanced functions: square roots, memories, logarithms, trig functions, scientific notation and statistics. These met many of the specialized needs of students, businessmen, housewives, and scientists, but still the technology increased and components became smaller until programmable calculators were developed capable of handling a wide range of specialized

units finally dropped to less than \$10, but the state of

This demand for personal electronic calculators spread to the computer industry as well. Expensive, temperamental, room-sized units, once found only in large corporations and universities were made smaller, more reliable and cheaper, until they finally came within reach of the average wage earner. Captain Ed Graves lives at Mariners Village in Sanford and makes his living by teaching sailing and navigation, plus writing articles for boating magazines. He has owned a computer for three years and uses it in his business and for his own enjoyment. Graves, talking about computers and how they are now used in numerous small businesses, mentioned that while we are going through an inflationary period, the cost of computers has been steadily decreasing, "and it all began with hand calculators and the miniaturization of circuits on silicon chips." One might say Graves is "into" computers for he can

trace their development from the guidance system used by the Germans in their WW II buzz bombs to the miniaturized central processing units which are the heart of today's computers.

There are many home computers on the market today and Graves said a person can buy one for as little as \$200, with the high end somewhere around \$5,000. Nursing Profession May Cease To Exist By 2000 A.D.

Job Satisfaction is the Key", the keynote speaker said that unless something is done to stem the flow of nurses leaving the field it may cease to exist as a profession by the year 2000. Jerome P. Lysaught, Ed. D., professor, College of Education at the University of Rochester, N.Y. said that while more than 2 million persons in the United States have received nursing licenses, less than half a million are actually providing patient

Many are in supervisory positions or have left the field entirely for better paying positions. It is becoming more difficult to find "nurses who are willing to work at the salaries that hospitals are willing to pay and under conditions that hospitals offer" said Lysault at the seminar sponsored by the Rush University System for Health in Chicago.

Lysault said many have fled the profession because they refuse to work under the constraints they encounter in hospitals. In some metropolitan hospitals the turnover rate has reached 200 percent, he added. The acting director of nursing at Seminole Memorial lospital agrees with a number of statements Lysaalt made in

his speech. "Salaries have a lot to do with it," said Edna

Robinson, a registered nurse with 20 years experience, "and he amount of responsibility we have." Other complaints are the different hours and shifts nurses are required towork. Illness has not been controlled to coincide with a normal 8 to 5 working day. Patients need 24-hour care and someone has to work the more undesirable shifts, she said. "The choice hours are not available for every nurse," said Ars. Robinson, and many times the hours do not go with the needs of the nurse's family at home. Holidays and weekends must be covered like any other day. "Somebody has to work the undesirable hours," she said. Seniority does allow some



they can "fall back on." Some nurses work for awhile to help the family, or while her husband goes to college. Later when the financial situation has improved, they will quit but retain their license should they desire to go back to work. Mrs. Mercer said many nurses have licenses in more than

said a nurse may move to another state to work but keep her license back home should she decide to move back. Others keep their licenses current for the ego value it provides. They may be retired or have no intention of working but they still like the feeling of having a valid license. The numbers may be disputed but there is a shortage of trained registered nurses available in this area, said Mrs. Robinson. "Especially over the holidays" when the number of applications from nurses traditionally decreases. She did say

that this shortage in no way jeapordizes the patient or the quality of care he receives at the hospital. To increase the morale of nurses and keep more in the profession is a complex problem with many factors involved. Mrs. Robinson feels one way would be to offer "primary care." This would allow one registered nurse to work closely with a maximum of five patients and those five would be her sole responsibility. The patient would get to know the nurse and
