Whiskey Tax Raised, But Receipts Decline

TALLAHASSEE, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Florida whiskey tax receipts for the first three months of this business year fell below the same period of a year ago, despite an increase in the tax rate.

The Legislature in regular session last spring boosted the tax on whiskey up to 96 proof by 25 cents a gallon and to 100 proof by 50 cents a gallon, effective July 1.

But receipts of \$1,721,877 for July, August and September fell \$31,924 below the total for the same three months in 1948.

Receipts for September alone were up \$10,780, however.

Despite the whiskey tax decline, total alcoholic beverage tax collections showed an increase of 75 percent for the three months. However beer and wine tax collections boosted the total to \$4,692,330, compared with \$4,659,405 in the same months of 1948.

Cigarette tax collections for the quarter dropped 3.28 percent from \$2,924,719 in the same period a year ago.

Beverage Department tax collections for the quarter were \$7,585,128, off 7.79 percent from \$7,915,102 last year.

PREMATURE BABIES—NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—(AP)—The widespread idea that premature babies will always be smaller, slower and even mentally backward just doesn't seem to be so, Dr. Henry Koenig said today.

Dr. Koenig, assistant professor of Medical and Clinical Pediatrics, Cornell Medical College, told the American Public Health Association of a study to learn what happens to premature babies.

"It takes some time for the small premature baby to catch up in height and weight," he said. "But even the smallest at birth have an excellent chance of growing up as large as the average child attending New York hospital clinics."
