Beckham Beer King Unable To Raise Bail Of \$150,000.00

NEW YORK, June 19.—(AP)—Arthur Fleckenheimer known in England, where he is recognized as a big shot in the beer business, as "Dutch Schultz," learned yesterday that what he termed a mistake was destined to cause him much trouble and inconvenience.

Schultz, taken from his spacious Fifth Avenue apartment where he has been living under assumed responsibility, was a prisoner in the West Side jail, unable to furnish \$150,000 bail fixed by Magistrate Hughes as the price of his temporary freedom.

He is held on three charges—being in concert in felonious assault, and two counts of violating the Sullivan anti-foreclosure law. He was carrying an automatic pistol when arrested.

The gangster said a case of mistaken identity led to his present plight and the appointing of one of his hoodlum followers, Daniel Amico, who is in a hospital with a wound in the abdomen and two bullets in his left arm.

Amico was shot when he drew his revolver when he, Schultz, and three other gangsters, were approached by two detectives as they stood outside the beer runner's apartment, Schultz said. He missed them for easy gangsters.

Police questioned Schultz but were unable to ascertain the identity of the three gangsters who escaped by leaping over a low wall of Central Park.

Probe Is Begun Of Report That Girl Is In French Legion

SIDI BEL ABBES, Algiers, June 19.—(AP)—The Foreign Legion has begun a systematic search to determine the truth of a report which has circulated persistently to the effect that there is a woman masquerading as a man in the ranks of France's "hard-boiled" army.

The legion officers have been forced to take cognizance of the report chiefly because it has happened in the past that women actually have been found masquerading among the desert soldiers.

Each squad of the legion was ordered to the showers for inspection and the program will be continued until it is determined if the report is true.

Despite the vigilance of medical examiners, the Legion records show that a woman enlisted and fought against the Moors for six months in 1908. She was the twin sister of a German boy who ran away from home to join the Legion. The girl so admired her brother that she dressed as a boy and followed him.

They resembled each other and the boy was able to take the medical examination for both. One of the ranks the girl undertook was fighting hardships in the Sahara often falling out of ranks. It was six months, however, before a situation arose when her brother could not find her in carrying out the duties. She was ordered to the showers when he was away and she confessed to the officers that she was a woman.

Mellon Talks To British Financial, Political Leaders

LONDON, June 19.—(AP)—Andrew W. Mellon, secretary of the United States treasury, spent the day with British political and financial leaders yesterday.

He spent an hour with Prime Minister MacDonald, Foreign Secretary Henderson, and Montagu Norman, governor of the Bank of England, at the prime minister's private quarters in the House of Commons, and considered more than that with Norman in a hotel.

Although it was officially known that Mellon's visit was more than a pleasure trip, he is expected to visit London at Cambridge, there was a possibility of his connecting with the momentous negotiations and war reparations.

He announced yesterday that he would visit London on the 21st. He will be accompanied by Chamberlain, British minister in Washington, and by the American ambassador, Charles G. Duggan.

U.S. Action Against Alphonse Capone Called Hypocrisy

WASHINGTON, June 19.—(AP)—Events leading up to the arrest of Al Capone for violations of the income tax and prohibition laws were characterized yesterday by Henry H. Curran, president of the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment, as "a thrilling climax in administrative hypocrisy."

Curran asserted that never before had a situation existed as "now we see it in the papers every day" where the government was "trying to lock a man up for his (prohibition) felonies with one hand and with the other hand trying to collect a good income tax out of the fruits of his felonies."

"While Mr. Mitchell edges him (Capone) up to the jail," Curran said, "Mr. Mellon halts him at the door to make a thrifty touch for the Capone liquor income tax."

"However, this administrative hypocrisy is no different from the judicial hypocrisy which sets aside bargain days for small fines on big bootleggers. Just because there are not enough jurors to try a tenth of all the bootleggers, big and little, who abound in these hard times of national prohibition and national economic depression."

New Archipelago Is Predicted After Island Discovery

WASHINGTON, June 19.—(AP)—The forecast that a whole new archipelago like Japan may emerge from the South Atlantic ocean "in a few hundred thousand years" was made yesterday by Rev. Frederick W. Shohon, Georgetown university seismologist.

This was the scientist's conclusion from reports of the discovery of two new islands, coupled with records in the seismology laboratory.

"I think it highly probable a complete archipelago is growing up," Father Shohon said. "It would not surprise me at all if it developed, with volcanoes, like Japan. We, of course, shall never see it."

Father Shohon was away at a convulsion of seismologists when two ship captains reported the discovery of two new islands near St. Paul's rocks, off the coast of Brazil.

Yesterday the scientist found seismograph reports showing there were earth tremors at the time, at the same distance from here as that of the reported discovery. Latin-American scientists suggested the phenomenon might mean the re-emergence of the "lost continent Atlantis."

Father Shohon discarded the "lost continent theory," believing the discovery more logically bore out his own belief that a new island group might appear.

Committee Named To Probe Charges Of Graft By Ford

DETROIT, June 19.—(AP)—Mayor Murphy last night announced appointment of a committee "to make a disinterested investigation into the charges of the Ford Motor company against the public welfare department."

The announcement followed a conference with United States Senator Couzens, a former mayor of Detroit and a former business associate of Henry Ford. Couzens said he has "no particular interest in any controversy, except as it may have a bearing on public welfare."

The committee, the mayor said, will be asked to make a thorough investigation of, and report on charges of the Ford company that there have been wholesale frauds in administration of the \$1,500,000 a month dole system and that, specifically, 329 men drew doles from the city and wages from the Ford company simultaneously.

In a statement following his conference with the mayor Senator Couzens recalled that when he was mayor during the depression of 1921, "I adopted the policy, with the approval of the common council, of looking after the needs of the unemployed. If I remember correctly Mr. Hoover, as secretary of commerce, highly endorsed the Detroit plan. I am now anxious to give every possible assistance to the mayor in perpetuating that policy."

"Why is it," he said, "that expenditure of \$75,000,000 to \$100,000,000 each year by private individuals on fellow citizens less privileged is not a dole, and yet when done through a government agency, it is a dole?"

Supreme Court To Hear Arguments In Appeal Of Carver

TALLAHASSEE, June 19.—(AP)—The state supreme court today will hear oral argument in William Raymond Carver's second appeal from a first degree murder conviction and a sentence of life in prison for the ax slaying of his wife.

Carver, a former Philadelphian, was charged with killing his wife and child with an ax and then shooting a negro servant at his home in Sebring. The state charged he killed the negro to cover up the slaying of his wife and child.

Carver claimed he shot the negro to death when he discovered the servant leaving his wife's bedroom where he claimed, the negro killed the young mother and her baby. He was tried only on the wife murder charge.

The state's case against Carver was based on circumstantial evidence. He was convicted of first degree murder in the first trial runs before a jury. The jury returned a verdict of life in prison.

was offered and used there.

"When it comes to talk of a very big federal campaign on gangsters throughout the country it's like Mark Twain's remark that the report is greatly exaggerated," the attorney general said, explaining that local agencies should look after their own problems and should not expect the aid of the federal government.

"In the last analysis it's a local problem," he said.

William J. Froelich, special assistant to Mitchell who has been in charge of the Chicago campaign, will remain there for two or three months, it was said, as will some of the larger corps of special agents of the Internal Revenue Bureau. Others have been transferred to New York to assist in the investigation which has been going on there for several weeks.

Froelich will aid local officials in clearing up the numerous cases there and will make available to local agencies information relative to gangster killings which was turned up in the intensive inquiry conducted in Chicago. It is understood.

Mitchell said yesterday that special prohibition agents are available to run down gangster operations wherever they appear, and if any particularly obnoxious situation should arise which required the federal government's aid it would be attended. But no large concentration of agents such as in Chicago and New York is expected elsewhere at this time.

a filibuster of roll calls and other parliamentary tactics that delayed action through Wednesday and up to time of adjournment yesterday.

The Tomassello amendment, which carried the governor's plan of distribution, provided that funds should be distributed to counties by a centralized board at Tallahassee as provided by laws of 1929. Distribution would be: Three cents to the state road department; one cent to counties on a basis of population; one cent on a basis of area; and one cent on the basis of contributed road mileage.

The Tomassello amendment set July 1, 1931, as the time for the bill to take effect.

Tomassello's plan replaced a compromise plan previously agreed upon by large and small county blocs of the House to distribute the money through county commissioners on a slightly different plan.

The bill passed despite cries of opponents that it was an "offshoot" of what they termed the Brown-Crummer bills of 1929, calculated to make the state responsible for county and special road and bridge district bonds.

Representative Mathews, Duval, charged that the bill as framed was unconstitutional and that the next Legislature, instead of having to deal with a state debt of \$1,154,000 as reported by Governor Carlton Wednesday, would have to make provisions to care for \$700,000,000 in outstanding county and special district bonds.

Representative Caldwell, Santa Rosa, asserted that a disease which he termed "Brown-Crummeritis" had seized representatives voting for the measure.

Proponents of the measure took little part in the proceedings, centering their efforts on advancing the bill to a final vote without debate.

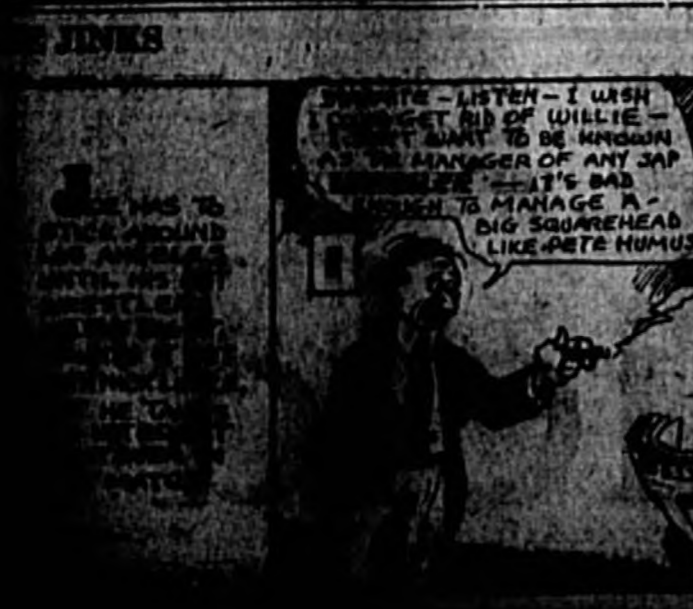
