#### Eaglewatch project summary

The Audubon eagle watch project, co-sponsored by the Florida Audubon Society, the United States Department of the Interior's Fish and Wildlife Service and Darden Restaurants Foundation, continues to assist in the identification, verification, monitoring and documentation of activity and productivity of Bald Eagle nests in urban areas throughout the Central Florida region.

A year-end summary of the program activity for the 1996-1997 Bald Eagle nesting season include: 174 individuals currently registered as program members with 164 active volunteers; 180 total nests assigned for reconnaissance by program participants; and 140 eagle nests located with activity at 111 nest sites.

In Seminole County specifically, 18 nests were assigned to 10 volunteers. 18 nests were located and one unrecorded nest was documented. Fourteen of those nests were active and 19 eaglets produced and fledged.

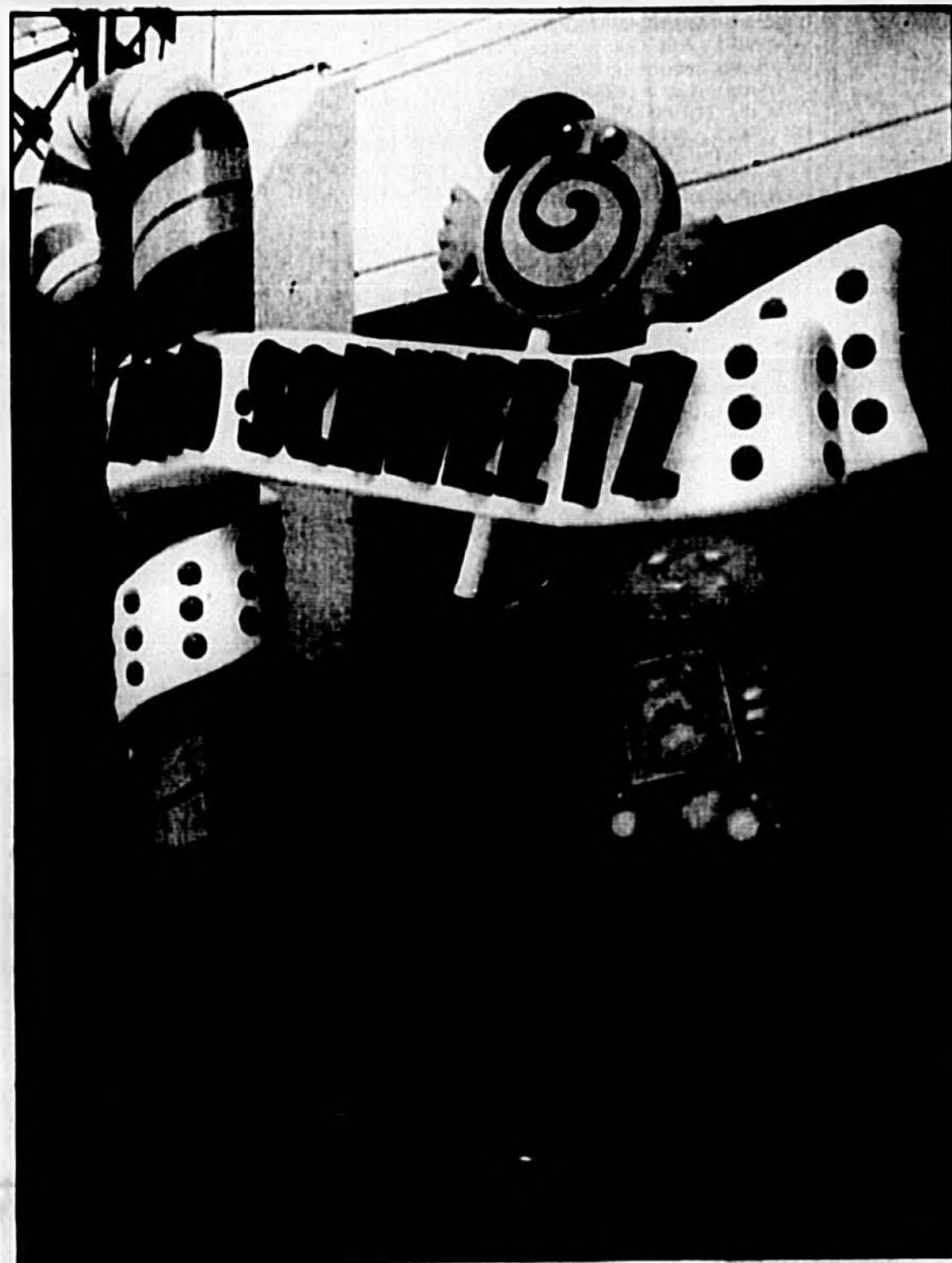

## Sanford company visible part of magical toy store

## Violent night

August arrived violently in Sanford with a convenience store armed-robbery late Thursday and a 2 a.m. drowning on Friday at the Lake Jenny Apartments swimming pool. The Sanford Police Department is investigating both incidents, said Officer Tom Skiba.

A black male dressed in black and wearing a white cloth over his face brandished a black semi-automatic pistol when he robbed the Handy-Way Store at 1301 W. Airport Blvd. at 10:48 p.m.

Josephine Armstrong, 66, was the clerk on duty and was unharmed. The robber escaped with from \$30 to \$50. The police have the incident recorded on video tape from the store.

Joe Cephas Banks, 35, of Geneva was pronounced dead at Columbia Medical Center-Sanford at 2:50 a.m. after being taken to the hospital by a Sanford Fire Department rescue team which responded to a call from the Lake Jenny Apartments at Santa Barbara Drive.

The Sanford Police report said that according to witnesses, Banks stripped to his under-shorts and jumped into the deep end of the swimming pool at the apartments. He was pulled from the pool five minutes later.

Timothy Howle of 97 Seminole Gardens and Sandra Jones of 62 Seminole Gardens gave the police their account of what happened. Skiba said that no foul play is suspected. If drugs or alcohol were used, such will be determined by an autopsy.

## Schools' tax bite to hurt less

The Seminole County School Board unanimously and without much discussion approved on Thursday a tentative school budget of \$485,819,944, a 10.6 percent increase over last year.

The 1997-98 proposed fiscal budget reflects an operating budget of \$278,472,464 which includes salaries and benefits for the school district's staff, materials and supplies, utilities, maintenance, building operations, and student transportation.

Capital projects comprise \$134,769,912 and include construction and renovations for Goldsboro Elementary School, Lake Brantley High School, Rock Lake Middle School Gymnasium, Sanford Middle School, and Seminole High School. Oviedo will get a new middle and elementary school and one other elementary school on a site yet to be determined.

## Controversy continues over city's report card

LAKE MARY - Joel Ivey told the Lake Mary City Commission last night that the selection of the firm that will prepare the Evaluation and Appraisal Report has been "long, arduous and frustrating."

Ivey is a principal in the firm of Ivey, Harris and Walls, which was chosen to proceed with work on the EAR, a report card on the city's comprehensive plan, at the July 10 commission meeting. But the ranking of Ivey's firm is now in jeopardy because of questions raised concerning the procedure used in selecting the team that selected the firm.

Doug Forner, civic activist and member of the Local Planning Agency, challenged the legality of the selection process at the July 24 commission meeting and City Manager John Litton, "in an abundance of caution," asked the city commission to allow city staff to start the selection team process over again, "going back to that place in the process where questions were raised."

City Planner Matthew West reported to the commission last night that "it has become apparent that only the city commission is the appropriate body," and asked the commission to review, rank and select a consultant. West had said last week that the Local Planning Agency would be charged with picking the selection team, and would solely determine the members of the board, which may or may not include the original team, or any members of city staff. But after speaking with members of the board, West reported there is apparently no one on the board suitable to serve in that capacity and asked the city commission to "appoint itself as the review, short-

list, ranking and selection committee."

It was at this point, during the discussion of the agenda item that Ivey asked to be allowed to address the commission concerning the matter, Ivey said, "If I was affluent or lazy, I would withdraw from this process completely." He said he would not because the choice of his firm was a "legal choice, the process has been overly reactive and I have no desire to back down to bullying from one citizen, and we believe we are the best firm."

At the July 24 commission meeting, Forner cited Ivey, Harris and Walls as the engineering firm responsible for the flooding problems experienced in his neighborhood of Crystal Ridge. The city spent \$45,000 last year making repairs to the cul-de-sac where Forner's home is located. Forner indicated that it was possible that the city did not want him on the selec-

tion committee because he would be perceived as being biased against Ivey Harris and Walls. Forner charged that a telephone poll of LPA board members, taken in May, to choose the LPA member to be on the EAR Selection Team, was done outside of the tenets of Florida's Government in the Sunshine Law.

After Ivey spoke, Assistant City Attorney Bill Reischmann commented that it would be "imprudent to suggest that there was absolutely, positively no violation of Chapter 286.011 (Government in the Sunshine)." Reischmann said that in order for the city to go forward without the fear of further retribution, it should do as City Attorney Donna McIntosh had suggested, and begin the process over. The committee voted in favor of West's recommendation, and the matter will come before the commission again on Aug. 14.

## British sugar momma charged with indecent assault

A British woman who ran away with a 14-year-old boy and was found in Monroe County last week, was charged in England on Thursday with abduction and indecent assault.

Tracy Whalin, 33, and Sean Kinsella, both of Nottingham, flew into the Orlando Sanford Airport July 15.

The case received international attention and photographs of the two had been released and broadcast over major television stations.

Following an international search, the two were located in a Florida Keys condominium after Sean made a call to his parents.

Whalin, the mother of three, had withdrawn \$5,000 from the family bank account to fund the trip to the United States. Sean is the best friend of Whalin's son. The two boys had played soccer together for the past two years.

The pair had been having a sexual affair for the past year, according to reports. When arrested, Whalin admitted they had engaged in sex acts since arriving in the Keys.

Whalin, who had been charged with lewd and lascivious behavior in a Florida court, was released to British police custody this week. She is out on bail in England after a brief hearing there.

It is illegal in England to have sex with children under 16.

### Senate passes tuna-dolphin bill

WASHINGTON, DC--The U.S. Senate voted on Wednesday to enhance protections for dolphins and other marine life in the Eastern Tropical Pacific (ETP). The Senate passed S.39, the International Dolphin Protection Program Act, after reaching a compromise on the bill's provisions late last week. The bill is endorsed by the Center for Marine Conservation (CMC), which has helped lead the charge for stronger measures to protect dolphins and the marine ecosystem in the ETP.

"This is a victory for dolphins, the marine ecosystem, and consumers," said CMC President Roger E. McManus. "We applaud the Senate for recognizing that only a binding, international, science-based agreement will protect dolphins in the Eastern Tropical Pacific tuna fishery. We hope the bill will move swiftly from Congress to President Clinton for his signature."

The bill passed today will require Congress to provide \$118 million over the next four years to fully fund studies into dolphin health and biology and will lift the current tuna embargoes for signatory countries once they commit to an international agreement to protect dolphins, other marine life, and the tuna fishery. The bill also calls for a three-year study to verify that tuna can be caught in a manner that is safe for both dolphins and other marine life. The "dolphin-safe" label could be modified to mean that no dolphins died or were seriously injured in the harvest of tuna labeled "dolphin-safe" pending the outcome of that study. The bill now must go back to the U.S. House of Representatives, which passed its own version, H.R. 408, in May 1997.

"We may now have in this bill the international solution to dolphins drowning in tuna nets," said CMC Marine Mammalogist Nina Young. "Strong implementation of this legislation could eliminate dolphin deaths in the Eastern Tropical Pacific tuna fishery."

## Pro-life or pro-choice Church attendance, abortion issue linked

Florida Voter, a bi-monthly political opinion publication generally looks at issues and events being brought up in Tallahassee or Washington, D.C. The magazine is published in cooperation with the University of Florida Department of Political Science, and the Graduate Program in Political Campaigning.

For the June/July edition however, the magazine took a new look at a very controversial subject: abortion/pro-life/pro-choice/etc. Not that it hasn't approached the subject before, but this time, it reported on findings of feelings in comparison to church attendance.

This was the basic finding: that the more people attend church, the more they will be "pro-life" advocates. Those who never attend church or do so only a few times a year, are more apt to be pro-choice.

At the outset, the survey began to seek what differences there may be in pro-life feelings between Catholics and Protestants. The results were surprising.

Rather than give any marked difference, it was eventually proven that the percentages were nearly the same, based on church attendance.

For Catholics interviewed who said they never attended regular church or did so only a few times a year, the percentage of pro-lifers was 25 and 27 percent.

For Protestants who never or only occasionally attended church, the percentages were 22 and 27.

For Catholics who said they went to church every week, 67 percent were pro-life. For Protestants, the figure was 68 percent. Why, was the next question.

According to a Florida Voter observation, "Attitudes toward abortion are much more dependent upon church attendance than religious affiliation."

Clearly, the congregants to whom priests and ministers preach each Sunday do not identify with pro-choice beliefs.

The magazine concluded that church attendance probably reflects a voter's psychological commitment to a particular religion and the general moral tenets of Christianity. Stronger religious attachments increase attendance, since devotion for most people is best expressed within the walls of a church.

It continues, it is also possible that regular attendance exposes voters to anti-abortion propaganda from fellow parishioners or clergy.

As for others, the report said that people

without a religious affiliation tend to support unregulated abortions.

The document adds that Jewish voters had a tendency to not respond when asked their opinions in the survey.

As the study was conducted by a publication designed to give "political opinions," other factors were also weighed in the public support of pro-life and pro-choice.

**POLITICS** - Most political scientists saw little difference in a party affiliation, but the publication states, "pro-choice attitudes increase as voter identification moves from strong Republican to strong Democrat."

**EDUCATION** - The survey indicated voters who did not finish high school exhibited predominantly pro-life views. Voters with college experience were more pro-choice.

**AGE** - Older voters are more likely than younger voters to exhibit pro-choice views. The survey said older voters have more knowledge of abortion restrictions prior to Roe v. Wade, which clearly has altered many points of view.

One point should be noted however, of the persons saying they were either for or against abortions, the majority, over two-thirds, indicated they believed there should be stipulations added to the situation.

## Brunell has become a hero for Jags' fans

SANFORD You saw the headlines: Mark Brunell, \$35 million.

That's become as much the mark of an athlete these days as their uniform number or team name.

People don't say, Mark Brunell is the Jacksonville Jaguars' quarterback, do they?

No, from now on, they'll refer to Brunell as the \$35 million quarterback.

That's too bad, because Brunell is a bargain at \$5 mil.

Okay, that sounds absurd, right? Nobody deserves \$35 million even if it's for five years. Guess again.

Shaquille O'Neal makes \$108 million. Juwan Howard is at \$90 million.

Mike Tyson earns nearly \$40 million every time he enters the ring for a bite to eat.

Brunell is a bargain. Name one athlete in professional sports who means more to his team than Mark Brunell.

Start with baseball. The Chicago White Sox without Fran Thomas still have Albert Belle, without Ken Griffey, the Mariners still have Randy Johnson. Jeff Bagwell at Houston? Craig Biggio.

Move on to basketball. Without Jordan, the Bulls easily make the playoffs. So do the Lakers, Jazz or anyone else in the NBA.

In football, the only player in the league close to being a one-man team besides Brunell is John Elway, who is treated rather well in Denver.

But when the chips were down last December, it was Brunell that singlehandedly carried his team to victory, over Elway's team.

To understand Brunell's importance, you have to look past the Jaguars. Brunell is the only real hero in the history of a city with no real history.

Think about it. Florida's blue-collar town up on the St. John's River. Grimy Jacksonville, the place that other Floridians roll their windows up for every time they are headed someplace further north.

Jacksonville is only two hours away from Orlando and anyone here would be challenged to come up with even one event in the history of the city of any importance.

Actually, the place was the birth place of the film history (true story). Most of the famous Charlie Chaplin silent movies were filmed there and it was thriving after the turn of the century before some religious zealots found the movie crowd to be unacceptable and sent them fleeing to California (again, true story).

Since then, the city has nothing to show for the last 60 years until Jacksonville shocked the world by being awarded an NFL franchise three years ago. Suddenly, Jacksonville had a dateline in major newspapers that didn't include the state and people learned to find it on a map.

Still, it didn't have a hero. Then, coach Tom Coughlin swindled Green Bay out of Brunell for a fourth-round pick. Brunell spent a half-season on the bench and the rest became the biggest thing in the city's history.

So tell anyone in Jacksonville that Brunell doesn't deserve \$35 million. Look at last season and Jaguar fans can dream about the future. When the season started, the Jags were coming off a 4-12 season with little hope of improvement. Brunell racked up yards and fired three or four interceptions per game. He seemed shy around the media and, a walk through the Jags' locker room gave no indication that Brunell was the leader of the team.

Forward ahead nine weeks. By that time, Brunell led the league in touchdowns, passing yardage, rushing yardage and interceptions.

He made bad decisions that arguably cost Jacksonville at least two wins.

Then, troublemaking wide receiver Andre Rison was released and the mantle of leader was turned over to Brunell. For a wild final five games of the season, Brunell was a changed quarterback. No interceptions and he made the term, "Brunell to McCardell", a popular SportsCenter phrase.

Then came the playoffs. The transformation was complete. Brunell actually started

# Expert: Bug zappers are useless

If mosquitoes and other insects are taking a bite out of your summer fun, don't bother with one of those electric bug zappers, says a University of Florida pest control expert.

"They are a total waste of money. Bug zappers will not control mosquitoes or other biting insects such as horseflies, dogflies or deerflies," said Jonathan Day, associate professor of entomology with University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences.

"They simply do not work as advertised. In fact, bug zappers actually make things worse by attracting more mosquitoes into your yard, and...killing thousands of beneficial insects that don't bother people."

Devices have been on the market for more than 30 years, and prices range from \$30 to more than \$200 for those sold in upscale stores and catalogs. They all have an ultraviolet light that attracts bugs to an electric grid that electrocutes them.

"When people buy one of these bug zappers, they want to see and hear bugs fry. That's one of the great attractions of

these things. You hang them in your yard, and they really put on a show. As the bugs hit the electric grid, they arc. There are a lot of light flashes and snap, crackle and pop sounds. That's what people get for their money."

While the UV light in these bug zappers draws a wide range of insects, mosquitoes and other biting insects are more attracted to the carbon dioxide exhaled by people and pets. They are also attracted to carbon dioxide that is passed through human skin.

"The main reason bug zappers don't work is that mosquitoes are extremely sensitive to carbon dioxide," Day said. "They see the UV light in your yard, but once they pick up even the slightest trace of car-

bon dioxide from people, they change direction and zero in on the source of that odor. They are expert at detecting carbon dioxide at levels as low as 50 parts per million."

Some zappers claim to interrupt the mosquito breeding cycles, and others promise to control pests over an acre or more. Both of these claims also are false.

Even some of the new electric bug zappers that have been fitted with an octenol packet -- which he described as "the latest marketing gimmick" -- are virtually useless for controlling mosquitoes. Compared to the powerful attraction carbon dioxide has for mosquitoes, octenol is a minor chemical insect attractant and will not improve the overall performance or effectiveness of the device.

Test at the University of Florida/IFAS Florida Medical Entomology Laboratory in Vero Beach show that thousands of beneficial insects -- not mosquitoes -- are the main victims of the electric devices. Out of some 10,000 insects destroyed by one bug zapper during a one-night test period, only

eight were mosquitoes.

Seventy-one billion nontarget insects are zapped by these devices across the nation every year. Most are beneficial beetles, moths, ants and midges along with parasitic wasps that control other insect pests.

Some people say the only good bug is a dead bug, but they don't understand the relationship of insects to the overall ecosystem. "Whether it's for pollination or food for birds and other vertebrates, the vast majority of insects are beneficial. We would be in bad shape if we killed all our insects."

To ward off mosquitoes and other biting insects in the yard, Day recommends using an insect repellent containing an active ingredient called DEET. He said it's the most effective repellent developed in the past 40 years. Wearing protection clothing or simply going indoors also are options for battling pesky insects.

Since mosquitoes breed in standing water, Day recommends emptying birdbaths, kiddie swimming pools and other water sources in your yard or adding a briquets with alcohol to kill mosquito larvae.

# None escape cruel remarks by running away from them

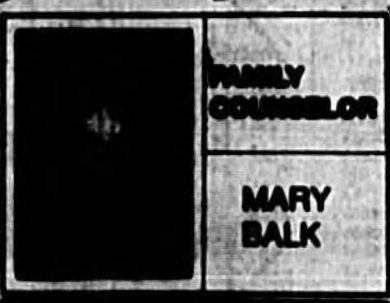
Dear Mary,

My little boy is starting 2nd grade. At the end of last year he was staffed into a Learning Disabilities class for reading and spelling. He started the classes in April and is supposed to go to LD for his reading this year. He's giving me fits about it. He doesn't want to leave his classroom because he says the other kids make fun of him and call him "dummy" and other names.

I hate to see him so unhappy and I'm afraid his attitude will undo any gains that might be made by attending the classes. I don't know whether I should just tell the school to forget the LD class and leave him in his regular class and let him struggle, or whether I should make him go to the LD class. I'd appreciate any insight you can give me in making this decision.

Undecided Mom

Dear Mom, It's a tough call since I don't know how severe your son's deficits are, but I do know that they must be significant or he wouldn't be eligible for the program. Kids can be really

cruel and they'll tease and call others names regardless of the situation, so I think that issue needs to be dealt with first. Your son needs to realize that no one escapes cruel remarks by running away from them. When someone makes a mean remark he needs to respond assertively and not let them know they hurt his feelings. He'll learn this now or he'll learn it later, but he's going to have to deal with rude people for the rest of his life.

I think he should attend the LD classes for several reasons. First, reading is the foundation of education. If he has to struggle with decoding and comprehension, he will probably want to avoid it as much as

possible. That could well influence higher education decisions, career choices, and future life-styles. Another consideration is the lesson of delayed gratification. In real life nearly everyone does things on a daily basis primarily because they want the long-term gain. Working for a pay check, going to school and making good grades, and saving money may be one of these lessons for your son. Help him to understand why he needs to get the specific instruction now so that school will not be so frustrating for him in years to come.

Finally, it would be great if you could find and encourage one of his areas of excellence. It may be baseball or art or even such things as cooperation or kindness. He's sure to have several characteristics he can feel proud of while he's dealing with his special education challenge.

**Is obesity linked to genes?**

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please comment on the recent media attention focusing on a genetic cause for obesity.

DEAR READER: As I reported more than a year ago, obesity does seem to be genetically determined.

In the past few weeks, researchers have confirmed that some forms of extreme obesity may be linked to genes.

Leptin, a compound released by fat cells, tells us when we have had enough to eat. Apparently, obese people lack such a cue; without it, they continue to eat, irrespective of satiety. Consequently, they gain weight. This is a genetically governed pattern.

Before you overweight readers find cause for celebration, let me state the obvious: Although a genetic flaw may explain obesity, diet is still the cornerstone of therapy. In short, since obese people eat more than they need, they can lose weight by dieting — whether the cause of the overweight is genetic or not. Such patients need to tailor their caloric consumption to their metabolic needs. Thus, while it's true that most of us want to stop eating when we have had enough, some people don't respond to this cue, therefore, they have to reduce calories consciously — and stop eating EVEN WHEN THEY DO NOT FEEL SATISFIED.

Recent research suggests that leptin, when added to the diet, reduces the craving for food. However, diet remains the single most important method of losing weight. In leptin-deficient patients, this may be a daunting task, for the rest of us, it's simply a question of self-discipline and commitment.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I work in construction. This causes my hands to become rough and dry, eventually, the skin splits and cracks. This is very painful. I've unsuccessfully tried various ointments over the counter creams and lotions. Do you have a suggestion?

DEAR READER: Actually, I have two. Lotin, a nonprescription cream, is an excellent antidote for the dry, cracked skin so common in construction workers. Apply it at night and your hands should feel better in a few days.

Another tried and true remedy — although old-fashioned — is pure lanolin, which you can purchase in most pharmacies. Regular application of this product will also aid healing and prevent cracking.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I think that I am allergic to Coumadin, which my doctor prescribed because I have atrial fibrillation and a history of "mini-strokes." When I take Coumadin, I get a purplish rash on my body several weeks later. Do I really need the drug?

DEAR READER: Because people with atrial fibrillation (irregular

pulse) are at higher risk for stroke, most authorities encourage such patients to take anti-coagulant drugs, such as Coumadin.

In view of your cardiac problem and previous "mini-strokes," I agree with your doctor that this therapy is appropriate and may help prevent a future tragedy.

I have never seen a patient who is allergic to Coumadin. In theory, it could happen but it must be a very rare occurrence.

In your case, the cause of the "rash" may actually be an improper dose of Coumadin. Some patients on anticoagulants develop large skin bruises when the dosage of Coumadin is excessive and the blood is excessively anticoagulated.

This is the reason why physicians order periodic blood tests, called "pro-

thrombin times," to assess the degree of anticoagulation and make adjustments in the amount of medication. You could be especially susceptible to the effects of Coumadin and may require daily doses well below the average of 5 milligrams.

In any case, you must work closely with your health provider to discover the dosage that is right for you. One that will effectively anticoagulate your blood without causing bruising.

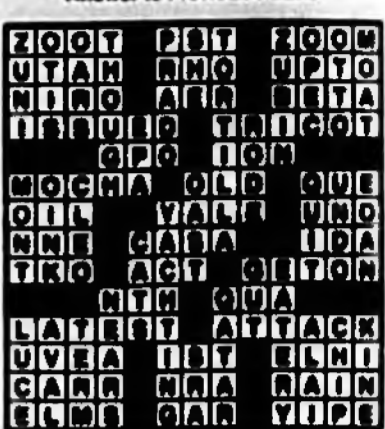

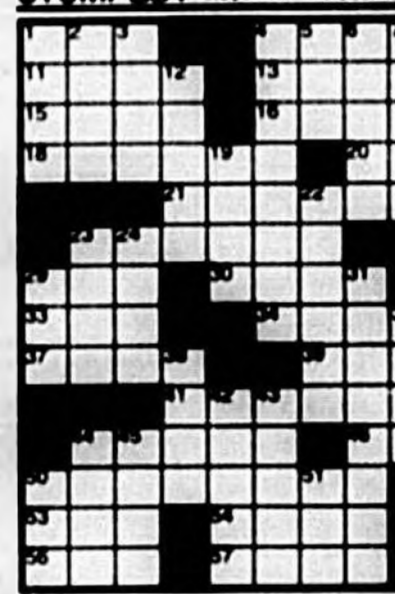

**The eight extra boards**

In principle, four teams from the Cape Town Zone 4 Championships (two open and two women) qualify for the Bermuda Bowl and Venice Cup world championships to be played next October in Tunisia. However, trying to force teams to play in last year's World Team Olympiad in Rhodes, the World Bridge Federation decreed that one had to play in Rhodes to be eligible for Tunisia.

This had an effect in Cape Town, where Egypt won the women's series but didn't play in Rhodes. So the team finishing third will presumably go to Tunisia. However, at the end of the semifinals there was a tie for third between Pakistan and South Africa. These teams had to play eight more boards.

Pakistan came to the final deal needing six points to win. Both Souths

were in four spades.

At the first table, the Pakistani West led the diamond queen at trick one. The declarer, Shirley Murray, played low from the dummy. Now a club switch defeats the contract, cutting declarer off from dummy's heart winners, but West continued with the diamond jack; plus 420 to South Africa.

In the other room, Maureen Holroyd led the heart five. Declarer, who may remain anonymous, cashed her top trumps before continuing with her other two heart honors. Now, rather than play a club to the ace and discard a diamond loser on a heart winner, declarer conceded her spade trick. West switched to the diamond queen. South completed an undistinguished performance by covering with dummy's king. This allowed the defenders to take three diamond tricks to defeat the contract; plus 50 to South Africa.

Thus South Africa was third, winning by 20-5.
