### Pressing For Reform

The Citizens Committee for the Hoover Report is pressing for hearings in the House on legislation to reorganize the Veterana Administration in accordance with the recommendations of the Hoover Commission. It charges that the House Committee on Veterans Affairs has heard from no one but members of Congress, representatives of the four largest veterans' associations which want to protect the VA from disturbance, and federal officials who in general are inclined to defend themselves and oppose any reforms in hanged. government.

The Citizens Committee has its eye on a start toward economy and greater efficiency in government. It makes the claim that ninety million dollars a year could be saved by reorganizing the VA. This prospect may appeal to the average taxpayer, but the leading veterans' organizations proposal." seem to be afraid that the ninety millions would be taken away from the veterans. As a matter of fact the veterans would probably lose nothing at all. If the Hoover Commission's analysis is correct, the individual veterag probably would be better served by a reorganized VA.

The prospect of better service applies to most of the reforms being sought on the bask of the Hoover Report. It is expected that these reforms would save money for the taxpayers, substantial sums in some instances, and this very fact stirs up opposition on the part of various groups which are obsessed with the notion that the savings would mean losses for them. 





WASHINGTON, D. C. Aug. 6-(Special)—Diversification of cartoes moving on the inland waterways is effecting a concurrent di-versification of industry along the navigable rivers and canals of the United States, according to Chester C. Thompson, president of The American Waterways
Operators, Inc., the national association of the barge and towing vessel industry.

"New cargoes are moving by berge up and down the inland waterways and new plants are being built at waterside to process those cargoes," the inland water-ways leader said.

Thompson cited the Mississippi River at New Orleans as typical of a national trend.

Barge traffic on the Mississippi River in the Port of New Orleans probably will exceed 15,000,000 tons this year. In addition to this water-borne commerce more than 5,000,000 tons of barge traffie on the Mississippi River will move through the Port of New Orleans for processing elsewhere.
