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Officers demolish crack houses

Nine structures torn down after numerous arrests; property owner still owes taxes

SANFORD — For more than a year, Seminole County Sheriff's Department Deputy Jason Bender has been working to get the nine "crack" houses torn down on the corner of 18th Street and Southwest Road.

Monday morning, several

SCSD officials and nearby residents watched as a demolition crew — funded through a \$21,000 Community Development Block Grant — took several hours to level the nine decrepit structures. The houses were originally located at the Sanford Naval Station and were moved to the Goldsboro Community in the 1920s.

"This is probably the largest

number of structures we have torn down at one time," said Bender, a Seminole High School graduate. "I worked this area for awhile and I made arrests (at these homes) for people smoking crack cocaine."

Bender, who used to work as a beat cop in the Sanford area and has recently been assigned to property crimes investigations, estimates he made almost a dozen arrests in an eight-month

The Barn, a famous stop for country music greats, will reopen in June

SANFORD — For more than four years the Barn on U.S. Highway 17/92 and 13th Street has sat vacant, but Tuesday afternoon the faint twang of country musicians could almost be heard again as new owner Tom Wetherald opened the front doors.

Although the Barn will not officially open until the middle of June, Wetherald plans to start taking applications for employment late next week.

He anticipates to hire 40 employees to man the 18,000-square-foot facility built for boot-scoot boogeyin'.

"I have been in this business for more than 20 years," said Wetherald who is originally from Indiana, but currently resides in Heathrow. "I didn't know much about the bar until I got down here and everybody is talking about how somebody has bought the Barn. It's definitely a hot topic."

The reopening of the Barn is such a hot topic that Wetherald even received calls in Indiana asking if he was the Wetherald that had purchased the Barn.

Few changes will occur at the Barn as the last owners left the bar in fine working condi-

tion. One of the main changes is the club will no longer be called Miss Libby's Barn, but just the "Barn."

Another slight change is the Barn will be open five nights, but not every night will be dedicated solely to country western music. Wetherald

plans to have one night a week dedicated to different events like karaoke, ladies night, a disc jockey playing classic rock and a battle of the bands.

However, Friday and Saturday night will always be country at the Barn and Wetherald plans to have at least one national act

play at the Barn each month. "It's got a hell of a sound system," said Wetherald who has had famous groups like 2Live Crew and the Red Hot Chili Peppers play in his clubs in Indiana. "They (national

SCC founder Weldon dies at 71

SANFORD — Dr. Earl S. Weldon, founding president of Seminole Community College, died Saturday, May 19, 2001. He was 71.

"It's a sad day here at the college," President Ann McGee said Monday morning. "It's hard to explain, all of us are going to miss him. He was such a good and close friend to all of us." McGee replaced Weldon upon his retirement five years ago.

"Seminole Community College suffered a great loss with the passing of our founding president, Dr. Earl S. Weldon," McGee said. "His leadership and commitment to the institution and higher education have been an inspiration to the entire faculty and staff of the college. Dr. Weldon's legacy will provide SCC with enduring strength for many years to come. He will be dearly missed."

Officials break ground for PublixDirect

LAKE MARY — Online grocery shopping is one step closer to becoming a reality for area consumers.

Maitland's Realvest Partners Inc., officially broke ground Tuesday for PublixDirect, an Internet-based distribution and fulfillment center located in the Skyline Business Center. Operations at the facility are scheduled to begin next spring.

"The walls should be up in three weeks," Realvest Chief Operating Officer Geoffrey Longstaff said. "We plan on handing it over to Publix in September."

Earlier this year, Publix Super Markets Inc. negotiated and finalized a lease agreement with Realvest for construction of its second on-line market in Florida. The term for the seven-year, \$5 million lease begins in January.

The facility's initial construction should be completed by the end of this year, Longstaff said.

Once Realvest completes its portion of construction, PublixDirect will begin tenant renovations, including the placement of coolers, a bakery and other items needed to operate the distribution center.

Police bust businesses for serving alcohol to minors

Friday, May 11, officers from the Sanford Police Department Juvenile Unit of the Special Operations Division, along with members of the State Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco, conducted an alcohol compliance check of local stores and restaurants within the City of Sanford.

During this operation, underaged juveniles, accompanied by officers, were sent into 65 establishments. Out of the 65, a total of 10 arrests were made for establishment's owners/employees selling alcoholic products to under aged persons.

The following arrests have been reported.

• Amar Jyothi, 59, was arrested at Super Discount Beverage, 2473 S. Park Avenue. An 18-year old girl purchased one 12-ounce Bud Light beer. Police said Jyothi did not ask for identification.

• Izzat Mustafa Ideis, 59, was arrested at Ideis Food Store, 1506 W. 13th Street. While police said the defendant did request identification from the underage operative, he did not verbally ask about his age. The underage operative purchased a 12-ounce can of Budweiser.

• Severnia L. Lockhart, 33, was arrested at Lockhart's Fish Market, 1805 W. 13th Street. Police said the defendant requested identification from the underage operative and did not

Commissioners learn county has deficit in bus program

SANFORD — Seminole County Commissioners were stunned Tuesday morning as County Manager Kevin Grace informed the board the county's transit budget is facing an \$850,000 deficit.

Grace said the total operating transit cost is slightly less than \$2.8 million, up \$400,000 from last year. He said the county anticipates a combined contribution of \$250,000 from Oviedo, Altamonte Springs and Sanford. In addition, the 1/9-cent gas

tax for transit will generate \$1.7 million, but still leaves the county short of the \$2.8 million needed. Grace said commissioners will have to find more money or make a change in the current bus lines to balance the transit budget.

Commissioner Grant Maloy suggested several options to defray the costs including eliminating

some bus lines or pushing the cities for more money. According to Commissioner Daryl McLain, the city of Oviedo has paid the same contribution for several years although the transit service has steadily improved in the area.

"It's going to come down to a matter of priorities," Maloy said.

The single change to the current operating level of service from the current fiscal year is the addition of one bus on Route 46. According to the transit report, the additional bus is needed to maintain an hour schedule on Route 46. Currently the bus along that route has been consistently running behind schedule.

On the top of the commission's wish list to address the transit problem is a composite or ridership study from LYNX. With the study, commissioners are hoping

A GLANCE AROUND OUR COUNTY

Mansfield: One of many who fought the odds

Ever hear of Annabell Mansfield? I imagine few have. But according to my resource materials, she was born as Belle Aurelia Babb, on May 23, 1846 in Iowa. Her claim to fame is that she is considered the first woman to be admitted to the legal profession in the United States.

She was admitted to the Iowa bar in 1869, while teaching at Iowa Wesleyan College. According to examiners, "she gave the very best rebuke possible to the imputation that ladies cannot qualify for the practice of law." Apparently, her argument held firm, as today, authorities say more than 50 percent of law students, and the same number of graduates admitted to the bar, are females. Look at the listings in the local telephone book under Attorneys. Female names appear time after time, with many being partners in the law firm with which they are connected. Mansfield really started something.

Mansfield however, never did practice law. She continued her career as an educator, joining the faculty of DePauw University in Greencastle, Indiana, where she became dean of the schools of art and music.

She was one of the first women college professors and administrators in the U.S. She was also credited with being instrumental in the founding of the Iowa Woman Suffrage Society in 1870. She died in Aurora, Illinois on Aug. 2, 1911, at the age of 65.

That's many "firsts" for one woman — but over the centuries, we have had others who probably qualify for such a designation. History records the first woman to fly an airplane, drive a motor vehicle, be allowed to vote in an election, be elected to a government position, etc. We also have "the first Black, or African American" woman to accomplish some feat, such as Dr. Velma Williams, the first African American woman to be elected to the Sanford City Commission.

Sandra Day O'Connor was the first woman associate justice on the U.S. Supreme Court in 1981. Geraldine Ferraro was nominated to run as vice president in the Walter Mondale presidential campaign of 1984.

These women were and are role models for women around the globe. Hopefully, schools teach this, not only for the enrichment of knowledge for the girls, but to teach the boys more about the role females have and are having in our society.

Look around us. We have females doing what they were never found doing several decades ago. There are women on our road construction crews, even driving bulldozers, female police officers and firefighters, and on-and-on.

Mansfield was a true pioneer in the professions. For school youngsters, consider this as you select a career for yourself. Just because women have not done something doesn't mean you can't do it.

Homeless man found in shallow grave

Seminole County investigators discovered a shallow grave Saturday near the intersection of State Road 46 and Rhinehart Road.

Investigators received a tip from a social worker that a grave was located at a homeless camp on the five-acre tract of property. The grave was described as less than four feet deep at its deepest point, and deputies said there were some signs

of intentional concealment of the grave.

An autopsy performed Sunday, revealed that the man, John David Dykeman, 41, died of what appears to be foul play, according to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

Preliminary investigations have identified another homeless man, Gary Lee Miller, 46, as having information and or involvement in the death. According to SCSO, to consider Miller a suspect is incorrect because much of the evidence is

"hearsay," however they do believe he has some "pertinent information" about Dykeman's death.

Investigators also believe Miller may no longer be present in Central Florida, but is still in the state. Miller has an outstanding arrest warrant in Osceola County on failure to appear and contempt-of-court charges.

Officers plan to enhance enforcement of Zero Tolerance

It's Zero Tolerance. In other words, law enforcement officers are simply not going to put up with the use of alcohol and drugs during upcoming graduation or school's-out parties.

Law enforcement officers will be conducting an enhanced enforcement of the Zero Tolerance policy with regard to alcohol consumption by underage persons.

During the period of May 29 through June 2, law enforcement will be on the lookout for graduation parties

where alcohol is being served to, or consumed by persons under the age of 21. Law enforcement will also patrol local motels as well as monitor routes to and from the beaches.

Parents are also being put on notice that they face criminal charges if they supply alcohol to persons under 21. Even under parental supervision, it is still illegal for their children, and their children's friends, to be consuming or in the possession of alcohol.

The Zero Tolerance effort also

applies to the possession and/or use of drugs.

Officers warn that any incident involving the possession of drugs or illegal use of alcohol will result in the arrest of the offender.

Agencies involved in the Zero Tolerance program include the Seminole County Sheriff's office, State Attorney's Office, and police departments from Sanford, Altamonte Springs, Lake Mary, Casselberry, Oviedo, Longwood and Winter Springs.

Fond memories

Weldon's legacy will be remembered by many

Everyone who knew Dr. Earl S. Weldon will have fond memories of not only him, but what he accomplished in his 30 years at Seminole Community College.

When he first started his presidency of the state's newest junior college in 1965, the school had only 600 students. Most of them were in portable buildings, but he made certain the quality of education could never be judged by the quality of the buildings themselves.

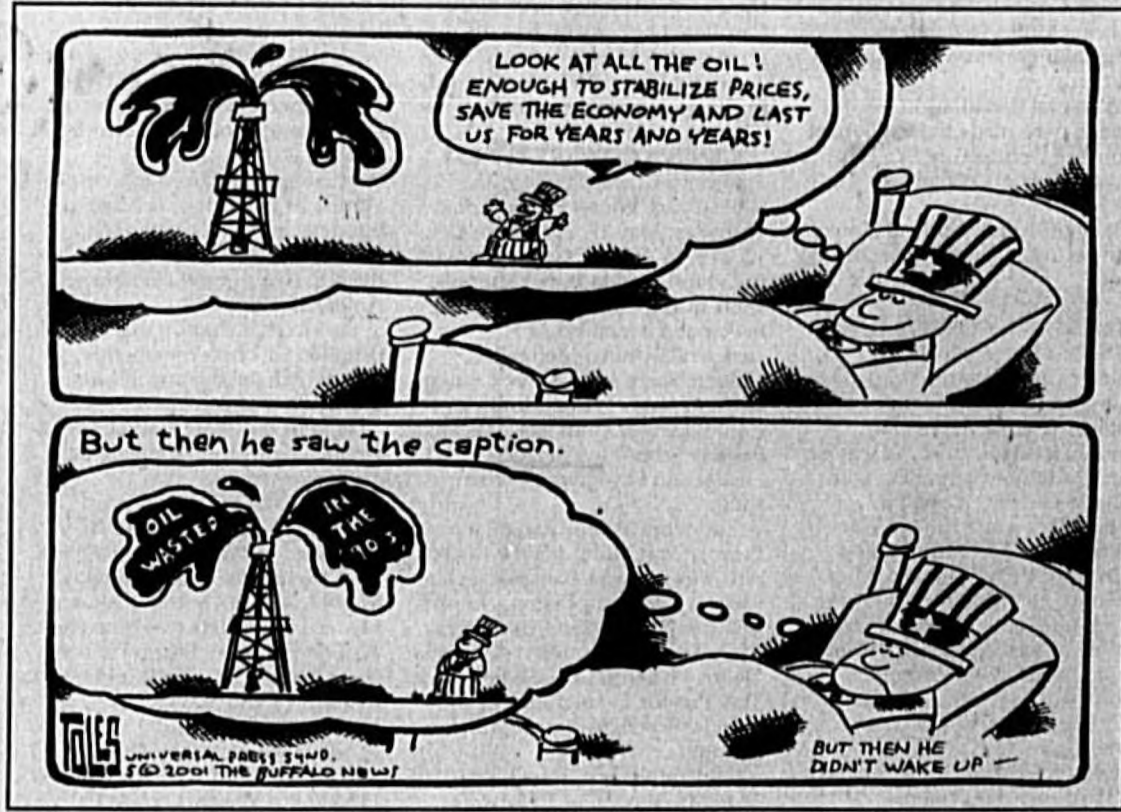
When he retired in January 1996, his leadership had transformed the junior college into one of the leading Community Colleges in the state. More than 30,000 students each year attend classes at one of SCC's campuses, which are no longer populated with portables, but rather magnificent buildings designed to provide top-notch learning facilities.

But Dr. Weldon's work at SCC is only one of the roles he played in the community. He was very active in the Salvation Army and served as a member of the advisory board. He was former chairman of the board at Central Florida Regional Hospital, and president of the board of directors and executive committee of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce. He was also president and board member of Kiwanis Club of Sanford, active in Prison Ministries and Central Florida Boy Scouts.

Dr. Weldon became deeply involved in every board or organization with which he was affiliated. In his attendance at the meetings of these various organizations, Dr. Weldon was an unassuming, soft-spoken member. His gentle way, however, belied the leadership the man provided to any organization he was a part of.

Dr. Weldon's easy nature allowed him to converse with anyone, and he developed friendships easily. A very modest man, Dr. Weldon was pleased to be recognized for his accomplishments — Weldon Boulevard, the main entrance to SCC from U.S. Highway 17-92 is named in his honor — but preferred to focus on the accomplishments of his faculty and students. Out of respect, friends and colleagues addressed him as "Dr. Weldon," but he was just as happy to be known as "Earl."

Dr. Weldon died Saturday. A special gathering will be held Thursday, May 24 at 2 p.m. in the Fine and Performing Arts Center of SCC to pay tribute to his life. It won't be a time for good-byes, however, because Dr. Weldon's legacy will continue to live on through the lives of students, alumni and faculty of Seminole Community College, the institution he so dearly loved.

Soan disturbed construction on memorial delayed

As a Charter Member of the World War II Memorial Society I am greatly disturbed to learn that construction of the National World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C., has once again been delayed indefinitely. I understand that still another public hearing will be held June 13 and 14, 2001.

This hearing appears to

stem from a procedural technicality which opponents of the Memorial are using to try to derail the project. Such a technicality should in no way abrogate the previous approvals by the National Capital Planning Commission and other commissions and boards responsible for preserving our national heritage. After all, these approvals are the result of 22 public meetings, held in accordance with the Commemorative Works Act, since 1995. And based on these approvals a groundbreaking ceremony was held on

Veterans Day, November 11, 2000. A construction permit was issued in January by the National Parks Service to build the Memorial in its approved place of honor on the National Mall.

I am a combat veteran of World War II, having served with the 101st Airborne in the European theater. I am the lone survivor of five Sloan brothers who all served in combat during the war. I will be 80 years old a week after the public hearing in June and I long to see the Memorial completed in my lifetime. For

War on drugs all about punishment, not treatment

Regina McKnight is a pathetic crackhead who has no business having babies. The 24-year-old Conway, S.C., mother of three ought to be sentenced to a supervised drug treatment program and subjected to random drug tests.

Instead, she now faces 12 years in prison. In a verdict that sets a dangerous precedent, a South Carolina jury on Wednesday found her guilty of killing her unborn child by using cocaine while she was pregnant. This may be the first time that a woman has been found guilty of homicide because she used illegal narcotics during her pregnancy.

Posing as a child's avenger, prosecutor Bert von Herrmann said, "The state needs to press forward because a child ended up dead." Don't be fooled. This case is not about protecting children but rather about providing an opportunity to merge the interests of anti-abortionists and war-on-drugs hard-liners.

For a decade, the anti-abortion movement — unable to reverse *Roe vs. Wade* — has conducted a guerrilla war on reproductive rights, chipping away at late-term abortions, fighting the abortion pill, forcing parental notification for teenagers wanting the procedure. If anti-abortionists can persuade a jury to consider a fatal injury to a fetus a homicide, they win a major battle.

Indeed, the U.S. House of Representatives recently passed the so-called Unborn Victims of Violence Act, which would make it a crime to kill or injure a fetus during the commission of one of 60 federal crimes. It represents a full frontal assault on *Roe vs. Wade*, the landmark 1973 Supreme Court ruling legalizing abortion.

And, of course, the hard-liners of the so-called "war on drugs" want to incarcerate every man, woman and child who has ever sampled illegal narcotics, no matter how many Americans end

up under lock-and-key. President Bush's new drug czar, John Walters, is an extremist who has mocked drug treatment as "the latest manifestation of the liberals' commitment to a 'therapeutic state' in which the government serves as the agent of personal rehabilitation."

Even proponents of drug treatment would admit that it is no magic bullet. Those most dedicated to their own "personal rehabilitation" may experience many setbacks and slip-ups; among recovering alcohol and drug addicts, relapses are common. And forced rehab is most difficult with irresponsible crackheads like McKnight, who says she is pregnant again.

Addicts like McKnight often destroy their children, if not with outright abuse, through neglect. Children of crackheads go hungry. They are left alone to burn up in house fires or to be molested by predators.

They are not sent to school. Those children need the intervention of state authorities.

But there were more sensible ways to force

McKnight to get clean. If the state of South Carolina cared about her children, it would find a decent foster home for them and give McKnight a year to get her act together. If she didn't, the state should have gone to court to terminate her parental rights and put up her kids for adoption.

Even a sentence of forced long-term contraception — using Norplant, for example — would have made more sense. The use of Norplant as a sentence for often-pregnant crackheads is controversial, but it would have been less harsh than 12 years of incarceration. After all, it is fully reversible and would give McKnight the opportunity to a mother again if she ever broke free of her cocaine addiction.

But that would require a drug policy that actually wants to see drug addicts — including poor and unsympathetic crackheads like McKnight — redeem themselves. That's not the drug policy America has put in place. Ours is a "war on drugs" that makes war on drug users.

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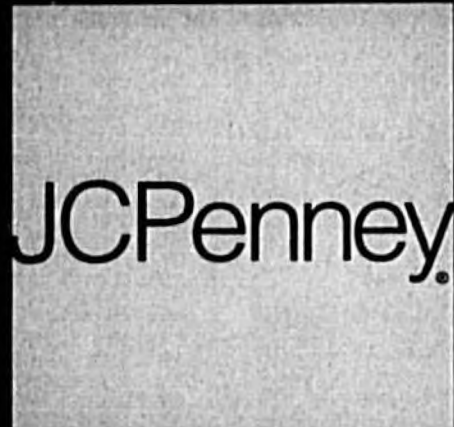
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Program to honor Williams

SCC schedules free Mars viewings

Mars will be making its closest approach to the Earth in fifteen years next month. Only the one in 2003 will be closer.

While the SCC Planetarium will be closed for renovations this summer, we have joined with the Central Florida Astronomical Society (CFAS) to bring the Central Florida public and media a chance to see this event close-up, through our telescopes. Five watches have been scheduled for the month of June, one every Friday evening to allow for more opportunities to visit one as well as allowing for possible poor weather on some nights. All Mars Watches are free.

June 1: This first Mars Watch will be a joint CFAS/SCC Planetarium event hosted at the

University of Central Florida's Robinson Observatory on Neptune Drive on the UCF Main Campus. The Robinson Observatory houses the second largest telescope, a 26" Schmidt-Cassegrain, in Florida, and one of the largest in the world routinely available to amateur astronomers and the public. In addition to the 26" telescope, there will be some smaller telescopes available as well as the SCC Planetarium's computerized telescope equipped with a video camera for people to view Mars on a monitor in between views through the other telescopes. The Mars Watch will begin as soon as Mars is high enough in the sky to see, about 10:30 PM. This Mars Watch will provide an excellent opportunity for live remote broadcasts on local 10

o'clock and 11 o'clock news programming.

June 8: Our second Mars Watch will be at the SCC Planetarium on the Main Campus of Seminole Community College at 100 Weldon Blvd, Sanford, Florida at 9:30 PM.

June 15: Our third Mars Watch and all others will also be at the SCC Planetarium on the Main Campus of Seminole Community College. Mars Opposition, i.e., when Mars is exactly opposite the Earth from the Sun, will occur with 24 hours of this Mars Watch on June 16th. This Mars watch will begin at 9:30 PM.

June 22: Mars will reach its closest point to the Earth on this

date and the members of CFAS will be joining us at the SCC Planetarium for what should be the best of the Mars Watches starting at 9:00 PM.

June 29: Our final Mars Watch will begin at 9:00 PM for all those who missed earlier chances, once again at the SCC Planetarium.

Mars is currently a brilliant orange-red "star" in the late-night southeastern sky. Already surface details and the polar ice cap are readily visible in our telescopes. By June 22nd, even more details as well as clouds should be easy to see, so don't miss this amazing event.

Born in Gainesville, Weldon moved to Central Florida in 1965. He was a member of First United Methodist Church in Sanford.

A University of Florida graduate, he began his career in the Florida Junior College system in 1962 as Dean of Instruction at St. Johns River Junior College.

In 1965, the Seminole County School Board selected the 36-year-old Weldon to establish the state's 23rd junior college. His vision, commitment and dedication helped to move the Junior College, originally a few small buildings, mostly portables, to one of the state's finest post-secondary schools.

During the time he served as President, the school grew from 600 students to over 30,000 with more than 600,000 students enrolled at SCC during his 30 years.

While heading up the college, Weldon served as chairman of the Council of Presidents of Florida's Community Colleges, president of the Florida Association of Colleges and Universities, and the Florida Community College Activities Association. In 1994, he was awarded the Florida Association of Community College's President's Award for Professional Excellence.

Weldon retired as President of SCC in January 1996 after 30 years in that position. The members of the SCC District Board of Trustees unanimously voted to name him President Emeritus.

Locally, he was an active member of the Seminole County community. He served as board member, president, or advisory committee member to numerous civic and service organizations.

Weldon was past Chairman of the Salvation Army in Sanford, and served on the Salvation Army Board in Seminole County.

He was a former chairman of the board of directors and executive committee of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce, board member of First Federal of Seminole, president and board member of Kiwanis Club of Sanford, and a member of the "President's Council" of the Prison Ministries Council and Central Florida Autistic Society. Weldon also served on the advisory committee of the Central Florida Boy Scouts of America.

He served in the U.S. Army during the Korean conflict. Survivors include wife, Geraldine "Gerry" Weldon, Sanford; son, Steve, Howell, N.J.; daughter, Janice Hickson, Sanford; sister, Patricia Wilson, Huntsville, Alabama; four grandchildren.

Funeral services will be 2 p.m., Wednesday, May 23, at First United Methodist Church in Sanford, with Major Bruce Williams of the Salvation Army and the Rev. Jim Bradshaw of First United Methodist Church officiating. Burial will be in Evergreen Cemetery.

There will be a special memorial ceremony, Thursday, May 24, at 2 p.m., in the Seminole Community College Concert Hall (Building-G) at the Sanford/Lake Mary Campus. The memorial ceremony is open to the public.

 period at the tract of homes. He said other agencies have also made numerous arrests.

Although several houses were occupied by residents, the remaining homes were a haven for vagrants and drifters, which ultimately resulted in illegal activities. The ousted tenants found refuge in nearby low income housing units after having three weeks notice.

"These houses were some of the worst in the area," Bender said. "We used to drive in here with an unmarked car and it was amazing what you would see here."

The property is currently owned by David and Tonya Rowland, but according to Al White, Seminole County code enforcement agent, the landlords owe \$13,000 in back taxes and "really didn't care for property." It's estimated the landlords did not pick-up the monthly rent from tenants for more than a year, however there is still speculation of what will become of the property.

If it was up to some local residents the land would be used for a new park.

"They may not realize it, but

they sure are helping the community," Johnny Knight said as he watched the demolition. "They'll (crack users) just go someplace else, but at least they won't be here anymore."

According to Knight while he was in the first grade his sister rented one of the homes and he frequently stayed with her.

"I spent a many a night in that raggedy-ass house," he said.

"They don't have anything out this way for the children and this would be a great place for a park."

Another resident, Lovett Thomas, was glad to finally see the homes go and also thinks the land would be a great place for a park.

"They should of been down 50 years ago," Lovett said. "You'd get tired of looking at them

when you'd drive through here." No matter what becomes of this property, identifying problem areas in the community is one of SCSD duties, according to SCSD Lt. Bernie Erwin. "We have had all our uniformed deputies to get out in the community to identify problem areas," he said. "We're real big into solving problems in the community."

 Publix as our partner," Longstaff said. "We are counting on them being here for a long time."

Lake Mary's facility is the second PublixDirect under construction in Florida, PublixDirect President Tom O'Conner said. A similar facility in Broward County is nearing completion, and the company also recently broke ground for a PublixDirect distribution center in Atlanta, Ga.

"This is another way of serving our customers," O'Conner said. "Publix entered this new venture to offer multiple channels to our shoppers."

Once complete, the Lake Mary facility will serve as a warehouse distribution center for people ordering groceries on the Internet, O'Conner said. The distribution center will serve people, who make their selections on the Internet and pay by credit card, in a 25-mile radius, and

orders will be delivered within a 24-hour period through a small fleet of vehicles.

When the distribution center opens in spring, it will create about 300 jobs during a four-year period with an average salary of \$31,700. The facility will include a 121,000 square-foot distribution center with an estimated capital investment of \$17.3 million.

As one of the demonstration sites for Publix' new venture, Lake Mary City Manager John Litton said the facility is a clean addition to the city's I-4 corridor extension.

"It means that Lake Mary's reputation has gone a long way in attracting a quality industry such as Publix," Litton said. "Applying a new technology is what our city is about."

 to find areas where the transit service can be trimmed.

"We have to evaluate all our options," McLain said. "Originally, we looked for routes from Seminole County to go to Orange County, but now commuting east and west within the county is more of a priority. We need to reevaluate the money we are spending on mass transit."

According to Grace, this is just one of the "budget challenges" the commission will have to face as they prepare next year's budget in July.

The discussions surrounding the high transit operating cost swayed as commissioners also discussed the future of the light rail transportation system.

"I don't think it's that complicated," Chairman Dick Van Der Weide said. "If they don't address these two things (Sanford Airport and Altamonte Springs) they won't get any cooperation. I think Seminole County is in an excellent position to have our issues heard, and quite frankly prevail."

"Our major focus is moving people within the county, first if

people want to ride the rail to go to Orange County fine."

According to McLain, the Metropolitan Planning Organization technical committee is planning to have completed its study of the light rail in the upcoming month, however McLain said "we might not prepared to vote on this in June."

Several commissioners are balking at that new study that has the light rail traveling near Interstate 4 because the secondary roads that lead to Interstate 4 are already jammed.

Mexican Tea: An interesting botanical find

The Mexican-tea is related to pigweed and other weeds, and considered by many as just another weed. In reality, it is one of those plants that have many possible uses but many of them have just been overlooked.

The aromatic leaves impart an unusual flavor to cooked dishes and it is commonly used to make tea. It has been found to have anti-parasitic, anti-bacterial, anti-fungal and antiviral properties without noticeable side effects to people and higher plants. The plant is host of natural predators that are effective bio-control agents.

A weed with these many remarkable properties certainly deserves a second look.

Botanical Aspects

The Mexican-tea, *Chenopodium ambrosioides* is native to tropical America but has naturalized throughout much of the United States including Florida. It is an herb with alternate, elongated, toothed leaves, about 1 inch long.

The most characteristic feature of the plant is the presence on the lower surface of the leaves, of strongly scented, tiny, golden-colored, glandular, resinous dots that can be seen when viewed with a 10 times hand-lens.

The flowers are tiny, green, in spike-like clusters. Individual flowers lack petals, have five persisting sepals enclosing the fruit, and have five stamens. The stem is grooved and can reach up to 3 feet tall. The plant has a pungent odor.

General Uses

Leaves of this plant are added to other foods as a fla-

avoring agent for corn, beans, rice, soups, fish and seafood. It is used to make tea in Mexico, Germany and the West Indies.

Medicinal Uses

In Mexico, the tender new growth of the Mexican-tea is used as an additive to foods. This intensive daily use for flavoring food makes it an effective treatment for controlling intestinal parasites because it is a mild toxicant and does not completely kill these parasites.

The repetitive use of the plant is necessary to maintain a person free of worms. The active ingredient is called "ascaridole" and has been described as effective in expelling intestinal parasites. The oil extracted from this plant is very dangerous because the therapeutic dose is close to minimum toxic levels. Overdoses of this oil lead to vomiting, convulsions, weakness, sleepiness, and cardiac and respiratory difficulties.

Experiments indicate that the oil produces a toxic action of the liver and, when severe poisoning occurs, induces a fatal coma. Amazonian Indians use this plant as a purgative, intestinal worm medicine, contraceptive and to induce labor.

In the Philippines, poultices of this plant are applied to abdomens of children to cure stomachaches. In Africa, according to some reports, its seeds are used to control insects.

Ecological Considerations

Mexican-tea probably plays an important role as a host for at least 28 predator insect species and nine species of spiders. This observation indicates that it can be used to increase

the number of predator insects that may attack harmful insect that feed on crop plants.

Insecticidal And Fungicidal Properties

The oil of this plant has been found to inhibit the growth of a plant parasitic fungus, and treatment of soil with leaves of Mexican-tea, reduces soil-borne diseases.

It is one to five times more effective than benomyl, a very well known fungicide used to control the same disease. The anti-fungal activity is enhanced when combined with the oils of other plants with similar properties.

Infection by tobacco mosaic and sunn hemp rosette virus on several natural hosts was reduced almost by 100 percent with an aqueous extract of ground Mexican-tea leaves. Other experiments showed that Mexican-tea oil greatly reduced infestations of cowpea weevil in wheat.

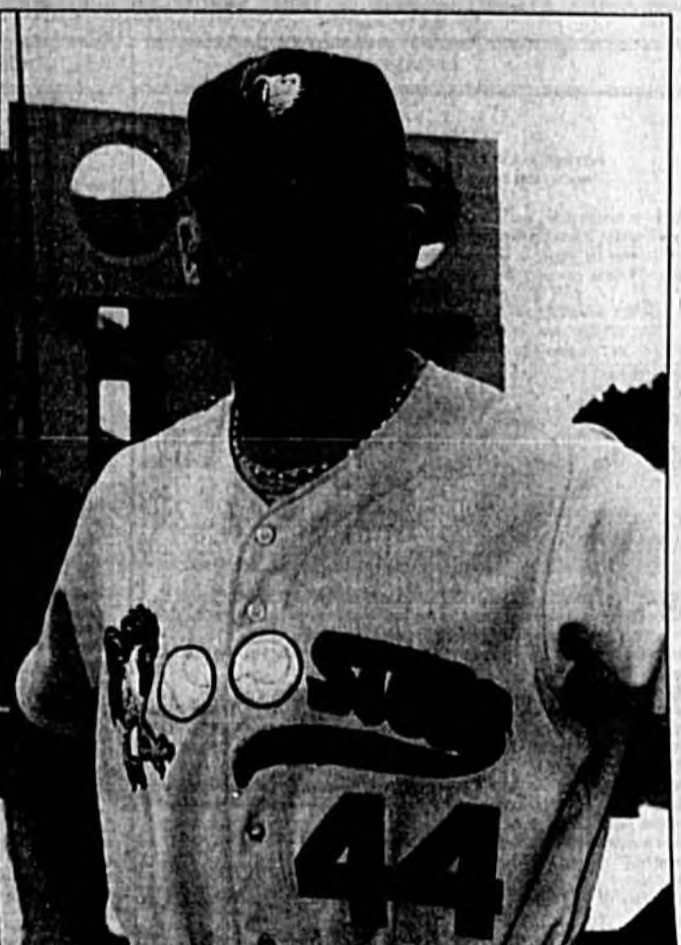

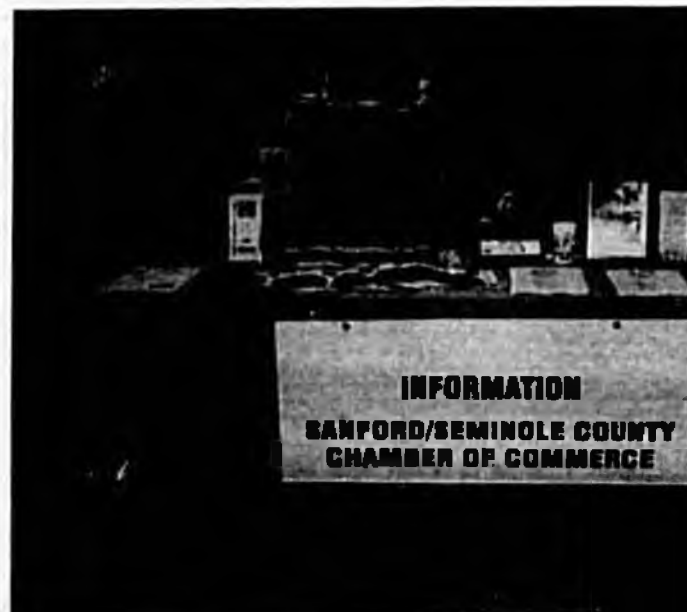
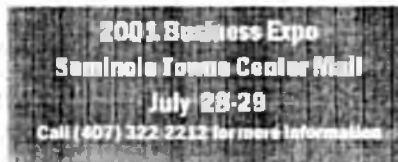
