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Tank-Led Drive By Korean Reds Fails To Take Allied Hill

About 700 Communist troops hit the strategic slope west of Chorwon after a deafening preparatory bar-rage from Red murtars and field

The U. S. Eighth Army said United Nations detenders killed an estimated 100 Chinese attackers and wounded 150.
Allied reinforcements acrambled

up the slippery hill shortly after the battle began The Reds' guns opened up on Old Baldy Thursday night and 50 minutes later Communist troops aslocity fire from Communist tank guns raked the hill.
United Nations tanks answered

and at least one of the Red ar mored vehicles was set afire.

The Red tanks pulled out of the fight shortly after midnight and the infantry assault was blunted by 1:45 a. m. Sporadic firing conthrued, however, and the Commu-nists did not give up the assault until 3:45 a. m.

The U. N. seized the strategic hill five weeks ago.

The fighting was the most in-tense in more than a week of routine action across the front. Cloudy weather grounded most Allied warplanes today. Fifth Air Force planes made a few strikes before noon on Red Western front positions and hit one rear area supply dump on the central front but clouds prevented observation



No Army Sedans

Army officials have instructed officers appearing before Congress to refrain from the use of the word "sedan" to describe automobiles purchased for the army. The officials believe that "sedan" holds a connotation of plushiness for economy-minded congressmen and they maintain that there is nothing plushy about army cars.

The United States has more automobiles than any other country in the world. The word sedan has been accepted as a description of a type of automobile having four doors and it is unlikely that even hard-bitten Congressmen would object to the Army owning sedans. But Army brass believes in taking no chances.

Sedans once meant a portable chair, seating one man, and carried by two other men on long poles. Perhaps high ranking army officers fear that the senators will believe that enlisted men have been carrying officers around in sedan chairs. They haven't.

Tomorrow's Man

R. A. Wardle, Professor of Zoology at the University of Manitoba, has ventured a few predictions as to what the "man of tomorrow" will be like. The professor believes that the man of the future wil be less quick to mature, less muscular and somewhat slower than present day man. He also believes that the man-to-be will be more intelligent and rational and less liable to be swayed by emotion.

Venturing to guess what man will look like in several thousand years and how he will behave is fairly safe business. It is not likely that anyone who bets the professor is wrong will be around to collect when his conclusions are proved or disproved. Conjecture about the future is always interesting.

Those who have heard the dire predictions of pessimists who believe that the world will shortly end in a burst of atomic bombs may be cheered by the professor's predictions, however much they may disagree with him. It is encouraging to hear someone baldly state that there will be a man of the future.

Reducing Illiteracy

Burma has undertaken a program of education designed to reduce the rate of illiteracy in that country. Ten per cent of the national budget has been set aside to teach those who cannot read and to elevate the general education standards of the country. Literacy standards in Burma are much higher already than in many parts of the world.
