

County Approves \$3.2 Million Courthouse

 Go courthouse! The County Commission gave the green light to architect John Burton IV this morning with unanimous approval of the revised schematic for the \$3.2 million, two-unit court complex and jail addition. The approved schematics include a

square footage as requested by courthouse elected officials Monday afternoon. Schematics approved included plans for exterior walls, floor space and location of offices. Next phase to be completed by the architect will be the design and development stage. Commission Chairman John Alexander was authorized to in-

itiate the schematics and to arrange meeting with county fiscal agent, D. Kirk Gundy and the architect to discuss financing for the project. Revisions to the schematics, estimated to cost \$285,000, were approved by the Commission in an informal meeting late yesterday afternoon.

Present for the meeting were County Judge Kaylie Householder, Tax Assessor Harry Berle Walker, Tax Collector Troy Ray Jr., Supervisor of Elections Camille Bruce and County Clerk Arthur Leckwith Jr. Schematics as revised ad-

Office facility now has the office of the tax assessor and tax collector on the first floor; County Commission meeting room, chairman's office and secretary's office, waiting room, county attorney and circuit court clerk on the second floor; storage space, county judge's office, chamber and hearing room, waiting room and juvenile judge's office as well as Civil Defense and Veterans' Administration on the third floor and multi-purpose room, supervisor of elections, large general office, central machine room, planning and zoning, drafting room, conference room and employees' lounge on the fourth floor.

In the court facility will be the law library, maintenance room, toilet room, large and small courtrooms, suite for waiting, witness room, jury room, judge's chamber and hearing rooms and two attorney conference rooms on the first floor and parole and probation, large courtroom, judge's suite, witness and jury rooms and judge's office and hearing room on the second floor. The board instructed the road superintendent to clear the county's property at Grandview and 25th Street. The north end auto in-

Krider Optimistic Although Outlook Dim For Lake Causeway

An optimistic attitude concerning the success of the Lake Monroe causeway project is held today by John Krider, manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, despite reports the facility may not be constructed unless Volusia County participates financially.

A letter from Sam Draper, revenue projects director of the State Road Department, which was read to the County Commission during a work session Monday afternoon, included opinion of the unlikelyhood bonds for the project would be valued for Seminole without cooperation of Volusia County in which the causeway would extend.

Krider, who has been working on the Monroe causeway project for the past 12 years, pointed to "other projects which have been accomplished and which were in the states at one time or another. All that is required is some vision and ingenuity and that is what we hope to use here," he declared.

"We will wait and see a full text of the legal opinion and will then probably have to approach the project differently. If it is feasible, we will find a way to do it. I still see hope for the project," Krider said.

In other items discussed at the County Commission work session, it was tentatively agreed to pull SR 427 from Longwood in Silverville out of the state road program for the next fiscal year and place it in the bond issue in order to

have necessary funds to "do other things." Commissioner Edward Yarborough made the suggestion.

Yarborough further suggested widening and resurfacing of SR 13 be taken out of the state program since it currently holds priority of 21 on a lengthy list.

Yarborough said the road might be done in the county program at a considerable savings.

Bassett Replies To 'Lambast'

Rep. E. Pope Bassett, secretary of the Seminole-Orange local legislative delegation, today blasted County Commissioner John Fitzpatrick for his "irresponsible and cavalier" treatment of the severe utility problem in some areas of the county.

In a telephone interview from Tallahassee, the Seminole County legislator declared to the editors of The Herald that the delegation has taken unanimous action to help solve these problems. The only two local bills we have offered this special session are Seminole County bills. It is unfortunate that Mr. Fitzpatrick does not represent his county as well as the delegation does.

"Although the County Commission originally wanted to turn all utility regulations over to the state Public Service Commission, public hearing that the delegation held established that the PSC did not have the funds or manpower to properly regulate utilities in Seminole County. Thus, the only way to protect our home owners is to authorize the County Commission to regulate utilities," Bassett said.

"Mr. John Alexander, (County Commission chairman) is totally incorrect as to the cost of local regulations. The cost will be paid by the per cent gross receipts tax on the utility companies as it is done in many other places. The only possible reason for a five to six per cent cost as Alexander stated would be inefficient regulation by the County Commission.

The delegation does not represent the County Commission, it represents the people," Bassett stated emphatically. "and has met its responsibility to the people by providing for utility regulations in the only way possible at this time. Now the people will have the chance to see if Mr. Fitzpatrick and the Commission will accept or abdicate their responsibility," Bassett concluded.

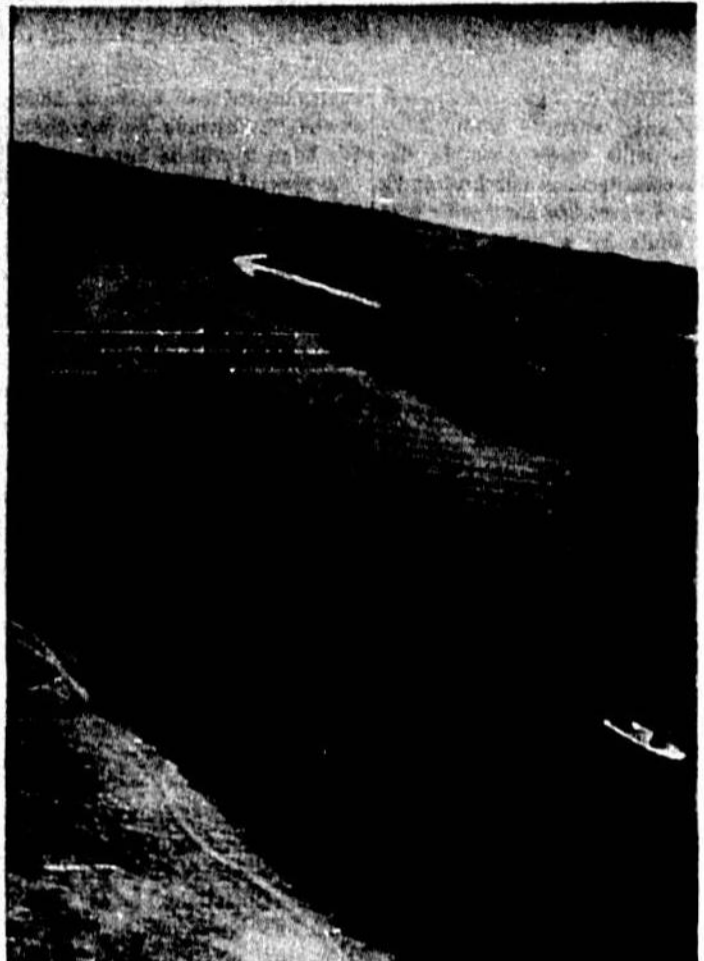

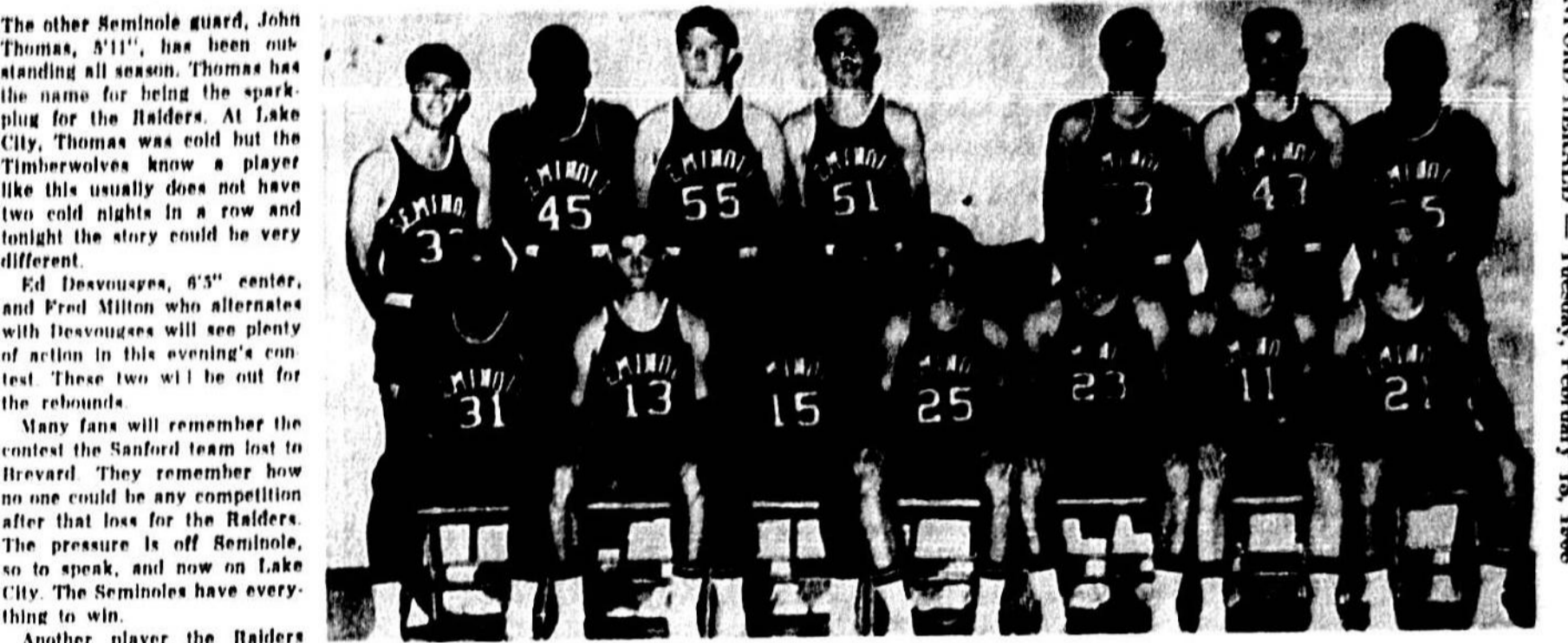

Malicious Mail Hits War Widows

WASHINGTON (AP)—Grieving women who have lost husbands and sons in the Vietnam war are being subjected to a barrage of antiwar diatribes sent anonymously through the mail. Some of the antiwar diatribes are worse than cannibals. The Associated Press obtained copies of this material from the widow of a soldier killed in combat. It came in hand-addressed envelopes postmarked Sanaville, Calif., and bearing the return address: P.O. Box 977, Sanaville, Calif. "That post office box number is held in the name of H. L. Hummel. The same name appears at the end of an essay included in the antiwar material mailed to the widow. Also included was a reprint of an antiwar essay printed last summer in The Christian Century, a highly respected non-denominational religious weekly published in Chicago. On Dec. 18, 1967, The Christian Century filled an order for 100 reprints of the article. A telephone call placed to an H. L. Hummel in Sanaville was answered by a woman. She said her husband is 87 and could not hear well enough to carry on a direct conversation. She related questions to him. He answered into the telephone himself. The man, a sheet and blanket salesman, said he had ordered the 100 reprints of the Christian Century article "because I wanted to read them." Asked if he had ever mailed

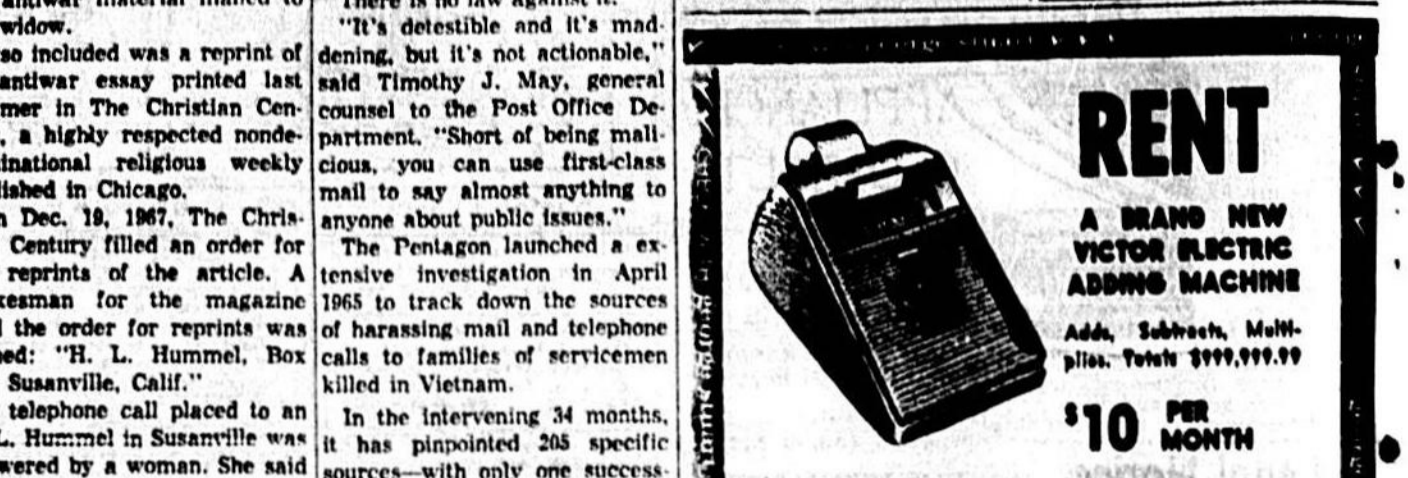
