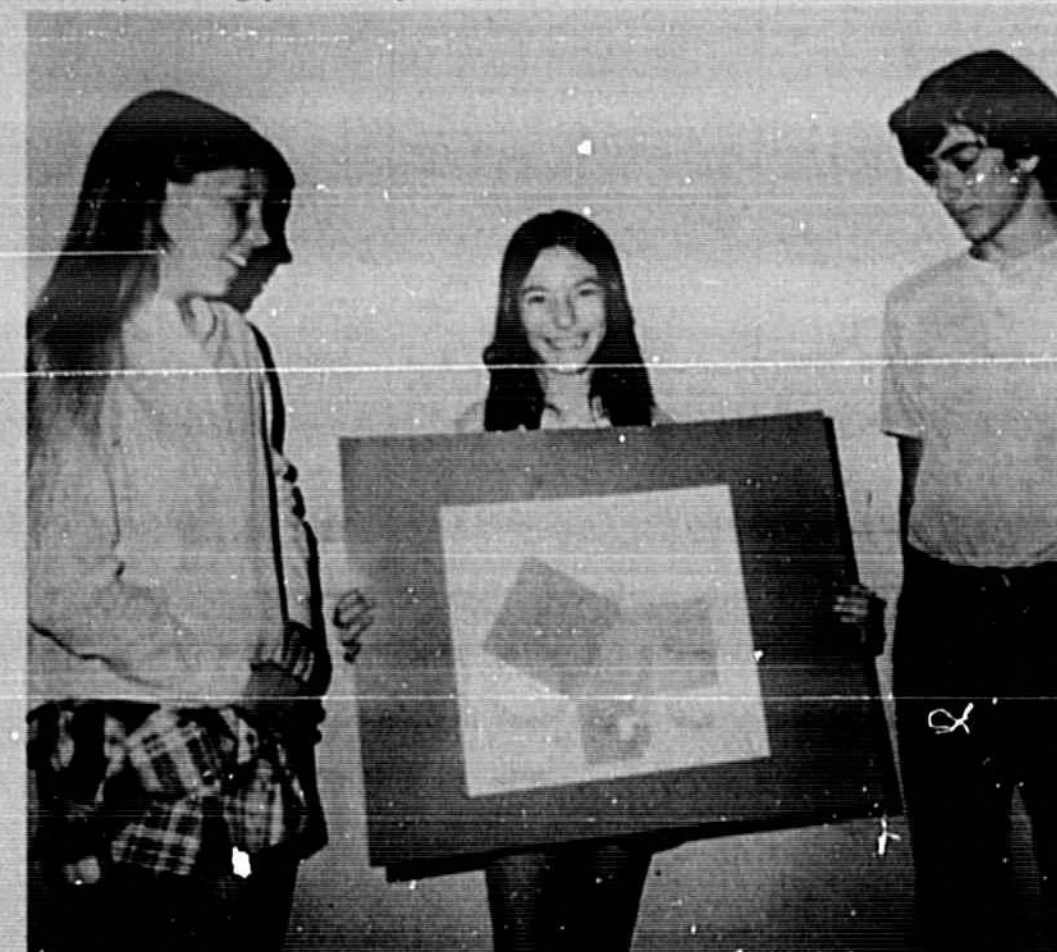

Hanoi Area Is Bombed Again By U.S. Planes

By GEORGE ESPER Associated Press Writer SAIGON (AP) — U.S. warplanes returned to the Hanoi area today for the first time in three weeks and bombed fuel and supply depots and other military targets on the edges of the North Vietnamese capital.

Question: What Will Nixon Do?

By LEWIS GULICK Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — Suspense and speculation as to what will Nixon do "hang thick over Washington today as the President considers the National Security Council under extraordinary circumstances.

One of the extraordinary circumstances was Nixon's mid-stream interruption of William P. Rogers' European journey so the Secretary of State could attend the top-level policy parley.

Since Rogers indicated he intends to hurry right back to Europe afterwards, this spurred speculation that — Nixon is shaping a new diplomatic move along with any military step-up in Vietnam, so he wanted the Secretary of State on hand.

The suspense has been building up with each report of further North Vietnamese advances into South Vietnam and White House declarations of presidential determination to bar the invaders from taking over the South by force.

Nixon has warned Hanoi and, in a more veiled way, the Soviet Union. He has beefed up American air power in South East Asia. He has briefly reopened the Paris peace talks and dispatched adviser Henry A. Kissinger to see North Vietnam's Le Duc Tho.

reliable American sources reported. The U.S. Navy planes from carriers in the Tonkin Gulf shot down several North Vietnamese MIG interceptors, the sources said.

The U.S. Command said it would have no immediate comment, nor was there any report of U.S. losses. Sources said the first raids on the Hanoi area since April 16 were ordered by President Nixon. They were launched about midmorning, a few hours before Nixon was to meet with the National Security Council in Washington to discuss actions that might slow the 49-day-old North Vietnamese offensive in South Vietnam and force Hanoi to enter into meaningful peace negotiations.

On the battlefronts in South Vietnam, North Vietnamese troops poured hundreds of shells into bases in the central highlands, and fighting erupted anew for control of Highway 14 between Pelida and Kontum. The northernmost defense line 20 miles north of Hue continued to hold.

A U.S. officer said that American planes have knocked out all 20 bridges along Highway 1 in the 30 miles between the northern defense line and the demilitarized zone. Informants said U.S. fighter-bombers have been averaging about 125 strikes per day over North Vietnam. The North Vietnamese Fort-

Iowa Waitress' Extradition Sought

By BILL SCOTT A 40-year-old Council Bluffs (Iowa) waitress will be extradited to Seminole County to face trial for the kidnaping and robbery of a Casselberry liquor store manager, I. L. Kriz, sheriff's investigator, stated today if Delores Donna McEvoy declines to waive extradition and seeks a hearing, the county will take whatever procedures are required to bring the woman back to Florida.

The investigator disclosed the woman had been arrested at her Council Bluffs home by police there armed with warrants forwarded from Seminole County linking her with Fulton Thayer Perkins and

Michael Whalen in the abduction and robbery of Casselberry.

Whalen and Perkins were formally charged with kidnaping and robbery of Barone on Feb. 26 but county authorities working on the case implicated Mrs. McEvoy just a week ago and warrants were obtained from Judge Wallace Hall and sent to Iowa. L. L. Kriz stated the suspect was in Florida at the time of the Barone kidnaping and robbery but left afterward to return to Iowa.

He said she was not involved in the murder of the liquor store's assistant manager, Richard Franklin Day, whose stabbed body was discovered on the campus of Trinity Preparatory School at Goldenrod on Dec. 27.

Whalen and Perkins, her two companions in the Barone incident, were charged with Day's murder. Perkins pleaded guilty to the Day killing and was sentenced to life imprisonment. Whalen's trial on murder, kidnaping and robbery charges has been set for the first week in June in Circuit Court here.

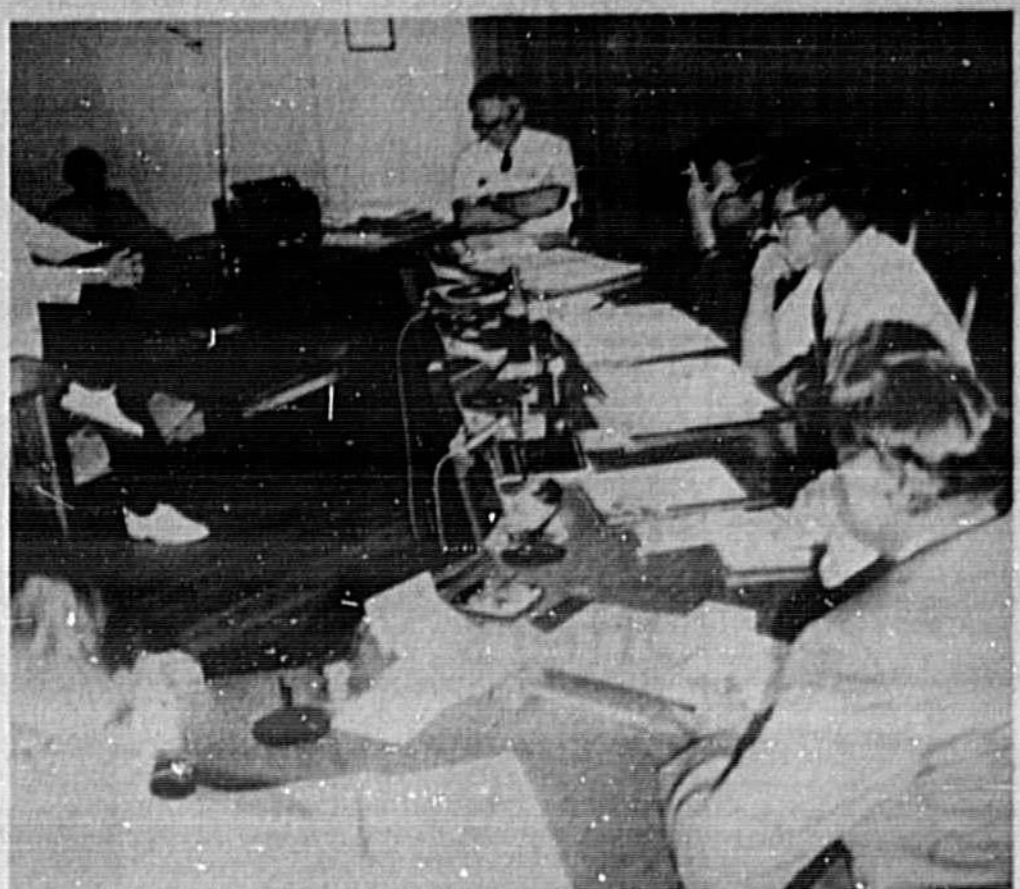
Takes Stern Measures Nixon 'Goes All Out'

By GAYLORD SHAW Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon has coupled the mining of North Vietnamese harbors with stern military steps intended to choke off Hanoi's war supplies — moves which imperiled his Moscow summit and rekindled domestic polemics on the Indochina war.

In a nationwide broadcast Monday night, Nixon delivered what amounted to an ultimatum for the Soviet Union to quit supplying arms and materiel to "the international outlaws of North Vietnam" within three days or face destruction of Soviet ships.

Besides risking collapse of summit talks with Soviet leaders due to begin in two weeks, Nixon's sea quarantine of North Vietnam posed the potential for perhaps the greatest confrontation of world superpowers since the Cuban missile crisis a decade ago.

The chief executive combined disclosure of the toughest mil-

At-A-Glance

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here at a glance are the key points of President Nixon's Vietnam steps announced in a broadcast address Monday night:

MEASURES — All entrances to North Vietnamese ports will be mined, U.S. forces will "take appropriate measures within North Vietnam's territorial waters, and rail and all other communications will be cut off to the maximum extent possible" to block North Vietnam's access to military supplies. Air and naval strikes against North Vietnam will continue.

SOVIET UNION — Directing specific comments to Soviet leaders, the President said "we expect you to help your allies" but "only for the purpose of their defense." He said the United States wants to continue building "a new relationship" with the Soviet Union and urged the Soviet leaders to join the effort.

NORTH VIETNAM — Hanoi has responded "with insolence and insult" to U.S. offers at the bargaining table and has "flatly and arrogantly refused to negotiate an end to the war." The North Vietnamese offensive has "reached the point that it gravely threatens the lives of 60,000 American troops."

SOUTH VIETNAM — The United States cannot turn "17 million South Vietnamese over to Communist terror and tyranny." In comments directed to the South Vietnamese, Nixon assured continued "firm support in your resistance against aggression."

UNITED STATES — Acknowledging that many Americans favor immediate withdrawal of all U.S. troops, Nixon rejected that as key but unwise choice. He appealed for public support.

Students Protest Mining Of Ports

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Antiwar protests erupted on more than a dozen college campuses Monday night following President Nixon's televised announcement that he had ordered all North Vietnamese ports mined.

Many of the marches and demonstrations were peaceful but there was violence at the University of California in Berkeley and Columbia University in New York City.

About 50 protesters in Berkeley overturned and set fire to an empty police car during a torchlight parade and ripped down an 8-foot-high chain-link fence around the former "People's Park" focus of a 1969 campus disturbance.

After destroying the fence, about 300 of the group headed back toward the campus overturning mailboxes, telephons booths and newsstands and smashing windows along the way. Several arrests were made.

Some 600 demonstrators in New York City marched down Broadway from Columbia and threw stones through windows of two branches of the First National City Bank. They also stoned a police car.

Club-swinging police charged twice, repulsing the demonstrators. They arrested 10 on charges ranging from disorderly conduct to inciting a riot. Half a dozen youths were seen being clubbed.

Everything halted last night as the world silently listened to President Nixon announce new measures — such as mining North Vietnamese ports — in latest efforts to stop the war. Even the Sanford City Commission stopped its deliberations in regular session to hear the President via radio.

Council Overrules Own Zoning Board

Sanford City Commission Monday night brushed aside zoning recommendations from its own zoning board and city planner and voted to set a May 22 public hearing to consider C-1 (commercial) zoning for an eight-acre tract located at the southeast corner of 25th Street and Airport Boulevard.

At a Thursday night session, the zoning board voted to recommend to the commission the property be zoned R-3 (multiple housing) in line with the Sanford land use plan, which was approved previously by both city and zoning commissions.

Former City Commissioner and abstractor Thomas McDaniel appeared before the Thursday zoning meeting and at Monday night's commission session to ask the property, which has recently been brought into the city, be zoned to allow for commercial development-a shopping center.

At Thursday night's zoning meeting, City Planner Gerald Duke advised the area would be a cluttered commercial corner if the city does not adhere to its plan.

Action to dissolve the city court came after the state voted approval of the Article V judicial reform act, which resulted in Seminole County receiving only one county judge to handle all its cases formerly adjudicated by justices of the peace and small claims court.

By deleting the Sanford court, the county can now qualify for a second judge to be elected in November to assist County Judge Wallace Hall in resolving the expected high litigation.

The commission set a May 15 work session to discuss a policy directive for City Manager W. E. Krowiec to use in considering pay increases for city employees during preparation of the 1972-73 city budget.

An operating agreement by Gordon Meyer, received which the city would take over the water, sewer and refuse functions of the Sanford Airport was approved by the commission.

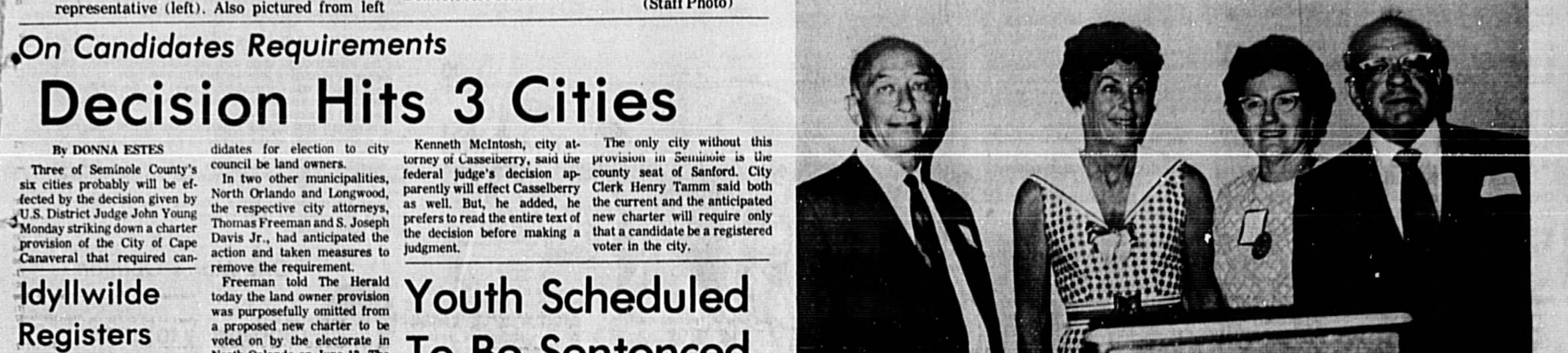

## Oldest Of All Foods Bread Is Staff Of Life

Bread is the oldest of all foods manufactured by man. It also ranks as the most widely eaten food and is often called the "Staff of Life." For thousands of years, people throughout the world have eaten bread in its many different forms.

The earliest breads were hard and flat. They were made from a mixture of ground grain and water and baked in the sun or on hot rocks. Most breads today are leavened, or raised, with yeast, baking powder or soda.

Most widely eaten bread in the United States is a white enriched loaf, which ranks as an energy food and a source of many nutrients. History records that seeds from various wild grasses were long used as foods. Many grains, including oats, corn, barley, rye and rice have been made into breads. Each gives the bread its distinctive taste, color and texture.

In many bakeries, mixing is done by machines, but fortunately for Sanford, Len Paulson at Len's Pastry on Park Avenue in the Food Fair Center, makes his bread the old fashioned way — by hand.

And this really is old fashioned. The Roman emperor, Trajan, founded a school of baking in 100 AD. An early bakery was found in the ruins of Pompeii, an ancient city destroyed by an erupting of Vesuvius in 79 AD. In these ancient communities, the

baking was done in the homes by slaves or by hand in the community bakeries.

Len works in an immaculately clean large kitchen in his shop on Park Avenue as he mixes, lets the dough stand to rise, prepares for the oven and then golden loaves of bread with their tantalizing aromas come steaming from the oven for the lucky folks waiting in line to buy.

Len uses no preservatives in his bread — there really is no need — it sells almost as fast as he can get it out of the oven and there is no doubt that it is used

# POLLY'S POINTERS

By POLLY CRAMER  
DEAR POLLY—I am answering Mrs. R. J. M.'s problem with setting in sleeves. I have been a sewing teacher for several years and one of the misconceptions I've heard in and out of the classroom is that sleeves should be gathered or pleated in and nothing makes a garment look more homemade. First, this sleeve is necessary for a proper fit and should be eased in—how? Sew two rows of gathering (long) stitches 1/8- and 1/4-inch from the edge over the top of the sleeve between the notches. Then pull these threads until the sleeve fits the armhole. Pin underarm seams, notches and the top of the sleeve to the shoulder seam. Pin in place by dividing the fullness evenly and smoothing down all puckers with pins—use plenty of pins. Baste and then stitch by machine. Remove basting threads, trim seam and press toward the sleeve. If sewing on wool or tailoring a garment this fullness can also be steamed out. Steam out the fullness on the steam allowance only. Shape cap of sleeve, using a pressing ham or miff (curved surface) before setting in sleeve.—MRS. M. C. B.

Citing the need of tax money to construct new schools, Greg Drummond, Seminole County Commission chairman, Monday explained his reasons for advocating the sale of Seminole Memorial Hospital to a private firm...

in adult service, \$50,000; intensive care, \$18,473; obstetrics, \$33,804; new born nursery, \$7,713, and pediatrics, \$17,857.

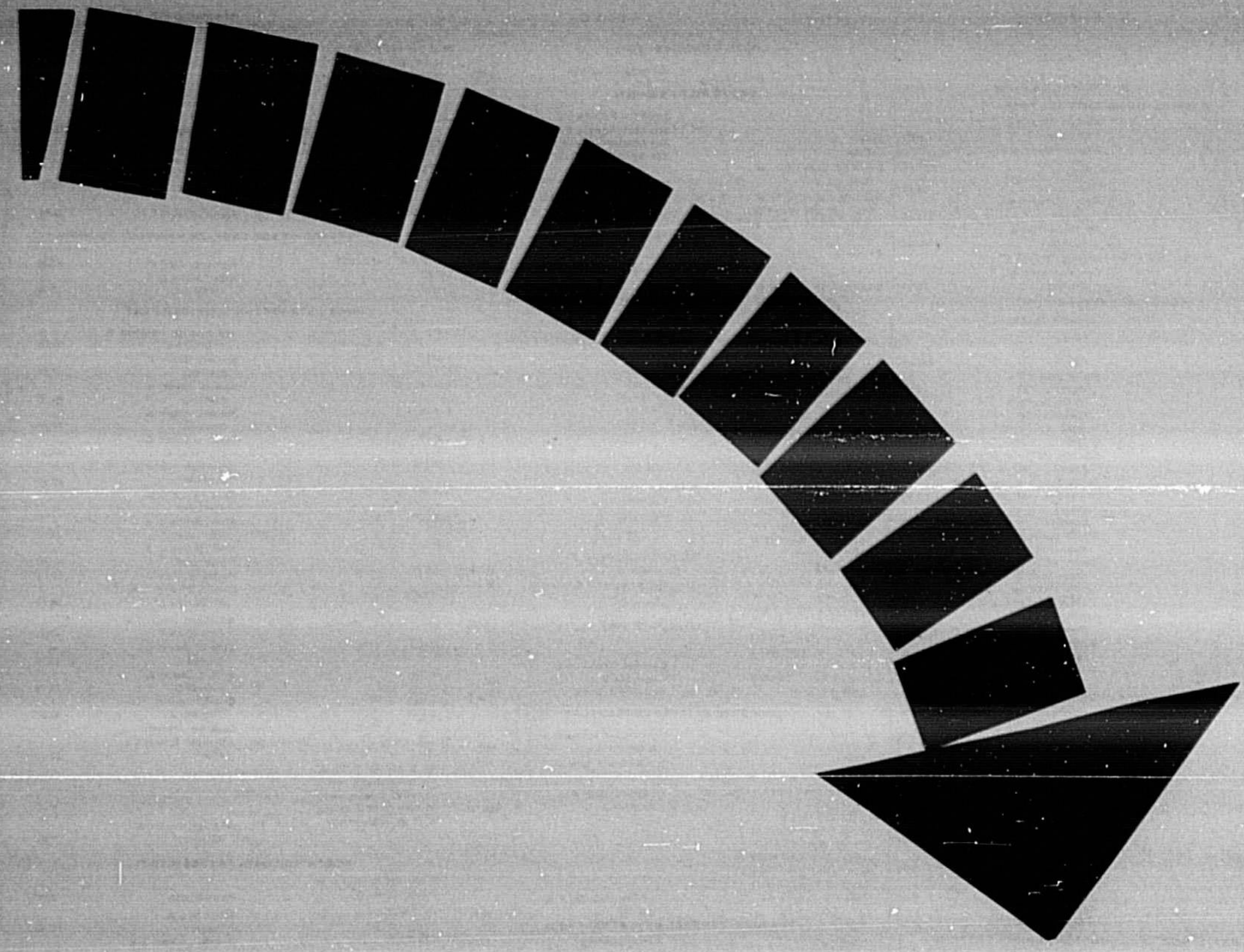

## Blackout Ordered For Orlando Trial

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — A total news blackout of information about a central Florida lottery trial involving 52 defendants has been imposed by U. S. District Judge Gerald B. Tjoflat.

The judge also barred newsmen from a pretrial hearing. Tjoflat acted on the heels of a news story in the Orlando Sentinel giving information the judge said was from a government brief which had been withdrawn from public records to prevent premature disclosure.

The trial, which starts next Monday, was transferred to Jacksonville from Orlando on grounds a fair hearing may have been jeopardized by news coverage there. Judge Tjoflat also told attorneys he will do all the questioning of prospective jurors. If attorneys have any questions, he said, they should submit them to him by Friday of this week.

## Schools Ask 4-Mill Levy

**"If it fails in November ballot, the Board would have a second chance"**

The Seminole County School Board Tuesday voted to request a special millage election of four mills to be placed on the November general election ballot. Action came on a recommendation of Supt. John Angel, who proposed the millage, if passed by the voters, would yield a total \$5,335,000 during 1973-74 and 1974-75 fiscal years. The amount would be used to complete phase 2 of an air conditioning program for existing schools, build a southeast county middle school during 1973-74, construct a North Orlando elementary school in 1974-75 and provide renovations and additions to existing facilities based on the 1970 State School Plan survey. Priorities will be developed in detail during the 1973-73 school year. Angel said the county currently is committed to debt service requiring 3.8 mills this year, 4.8 mills in 1973-73, 1.2 mills in 1973-74 and one mill in 1974-75. Should voters approve the millage request for capital improvements to begin during the 1973-74 school year, millage that year would be 4.6 of a mill less than the present 5.8 mill, the superintendent added. Other recommendations from Angel receiving board approval included authorization for a professional air conditioning survey of existing facilities to provide budget cost for air conditioning, an installation schedule for performance of work and a schedule of estimated owning and operating costs of equipment. Air conditioning of present schools, to enable 45-15 year-old school operation, will include two phases, the first phase in top priority schools up to a total \$445,000 cost, total amount now available. Phase two of those facilities to be air conditioned would hinge on the approval of the four mills by the voters. Angel disclosed if the millage fails to pass in the November election, the board will have a second chance for another millage request in May of 1973. Stuart Colpepper wanted to delay the vote on the millage request until the last week in May.

## Demo Chief Quits

Given a vote of confidence only one month ago, Mrs. Albert N. (Helen) Pitts, who accepted the chairmanship of the Seminole County Democratic executive committee at that time, has resigned for health reasons. Long time and active worker in the party, Mrs. Pitts told The Herald today she will continue to remain faithful to her political affiliation and will participate in political activities to the extent permitted by her health. She has been plagued with a visual problem for some months. Mrs. Pitts, who replaced John Kader, also has given up her precinct committee post. Her resignation will be acted on by the committee at its regular 8 p.m. meeting Thursday at Seminole Junior College.

Assuming the chairmanship temporarily will be Kenneth Krause, resident of Altamonte Springs and manager of Celery City Printing Company. Elected to the committee in 1970, he was chosen vice president of the organization last week to replace Mrs. Pitts in that office. Krause said today, although he has not given the matter much thought, "I imagine I will run for office of permanent chairman in a special election to be called within 90 days according to new by-laws adopted two weeks ago. The by-laws conform to those of the state executive committee."

## Shopping Center Zoning Approved

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Change in zoning to permit development and construction of a shopping center on the Valley Forge Country Club property fronting on SR 436, directly across the highway from the proposed Altamonte Mall, was approved by City Council last night following a public hearing.

Before adoption of an ordinance to formally change the zoning, however, the Council decided to again place stipulations in the change to require construction of a six-foot masonry wall around the perimeter of the development to protect residential property to the south of the tract.

Included in the motion to instruct the attorney to prepare the ordinance was the requirement that owners of the land execute a contract with the city providing a finished masonry wall from Boston Avenue in the west to Orange Avenue to where the apartment buildings begin. It was made clear that the wall would be built with a 10-foot setback from the right-of-way line prior to issuance of a building permit for the shopping center.

Adjacent property owners at the public hearing opposed the change in zoning before stipulation was made concerning the wall. Sanford Russell, of 221 Boston Avenue, insisting that although wall construction "is a fine thing, the residences are being pushed and squeezed and will be crushed" by promoters, speculators and investors who have no interest in the city after their projects are accomplished and their money made.

Russell said peace, quiet, tranquility and contentment of the area has ended with construction of nearby apartments. "Progress does not give anyone the right to indiscriminately take over and change the character of a neighborhood," Russell maintained. Mayor Lawrence Swofford urged those opposing the development to look at the record and they would find that the city has never hurt anyone in the community with changes in zoning and, in fact, property values have sharply risen.

An elderly woman challenged the mayor's remarks, insisting her property has been ruined and she has no desire to place on the market the home she has maintained and improved for the past 17 years. Harold Ripp, representing the owners of the land, insisted his company is not speculating and does not plan to move into the city, sell and move out. Ripp said the company has no desire to hurt anyone and will have the highest type development.

## I-4, 436 Plans Outlined

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Modifications planned for the intersection of SR 436 and Interstate 4 "were not designed to help 436, they were designed to help I-4," a representative of the state Department of Transportation told City Council last night. George Holder, of DOT, appeared before the board on invitation of the Council to explain the work to be done at the intersection in two phases over the next three years. Under the first phase, the median in the I-4 bridge is to be removed to provide space for east and west turning lanes for northbound and southbound traffic on the interstate and two turning lanes will be provided for a southbound traffic. Construction time for this phase would be 18 months, according to Holder.

When asked why a full blown clover leaf is not built at the spot, Holder said such a modification would give the interstate more traffic than it can now handle and speed the modification now planned is not a properly designed intersection. Mayor Lawrence Swofford called the limited modification "near-sightedness and poor planning" and insisted the intersection problems could still be solved for less than \$1 million, "but there is no one in the DOT or the Board of County Commissioners who desires to do so." "How does the plan help 436?" Councilman Dan Dorfman asked. Holder's answer was that it was not designed to help 436, which now carries more traffic than the interstate highway. Swofford assured any right-of-way that might be needed for the modification will be reserved from development by the city. None is needed which is now under city jurisdiction, Holder said.

## It's A Losing Race

A disturbed County Commission chairman, Greg Drummond looked dolefully at his fellow commissioners Tuesday afternoon and said, "We can no longer look to the end of September for the completion of the courthouse project, but must look to Nov. 1 and losing." He told the board the number of workers has decreased on the courthouse project. He said his sources in Tallahassee say that Greentek Construction Company in Tallahassee is on or way ahead of schedule. "It would appear that we are a sacrifice project. I don't believe we will see in that building before the first of the year, if then." Architect Richard Matz informed the board it would take at least three weeks to complete an analysis and inspection of the old courthouse building to give estimate of the cost of a structural renovation. He requested a fee of \$1,200 for the analysis. A cost proposal of \$186 was presented by Matz for the renovation of the east wing of the room to accommodate an oil painting which was donated. William Denson, engineer, said he had evaluated four cooling tower systems and he recommended one which would cost \$3,536 to install, with the chemicals for the system costing \$2,406 for a total cost of \$5,942. The charge for his services required to draw up the specifications for the cooling system, added to the cost for his evaluation of the system, totaled \$200. When completed, the specifications will be presented by Matz to the board.

## 'Albert Pit' Used For Land Fill

County commissioners were apprised of the continued usage of the area known as "Albert's pit" Raymond Albert is still using it to dump land fill. According to Assistant County Attorney Howard Marree, Albert has the option to use the area in violation of the law until the county obtains adjudication against him. In other action, Commission Chairman Greg Drummond instructed Administrative Asst Rodney Leyer to contact all groups interested in working together to provide transportation for senior citizens.
