## SUFFRAGE WAS DEFEATED IN MISSISSIPPI ATTENTION RETURNS TO DELEWARE

### Fight Turns to This State After Defeat In The South

#### DAY PROBLEMATICAL

Dover April 1 (By Associated Press) With the defeat of suffrage in the Mississippi legislature yesterday Delaware resumed her place of leading interest in the fight for the Anthony amendment today. Another effort will be made to bring the measure to vote in the lower house today but it is problematical if it will be called up as friends of the measure hesitated to bring it to test because of the uncertainty of success.

## PLUNDERING IN RUHR DISTRICT

#### GERMAN STRIKERS HAVE LOST ALL DISCIPLINE AND BREAKING UP.

Amsterdam April 1 (By Associated Press) Plundering under the guise of requisition is the order of the day in parts of the Ruhr valley and advisers here state the disintegration of the Communist army and a lack of discipline adding to the seriousness of the situation.

## EMPLOYEES OF CHICAGO ON STRIKE

#### CITY IS PARALYZED BY WALKOUT OF EVERY EMPLOYEE ON THE LIST.

Chicago, April 1.—Officials were busy today in another attempt to solve the problems caused by the strike of city clerks and stenographers for more money. Those who walked out yesterday, paralyzing business, picketed the city hall today and union leaders said they were firm in their determination to remain out until their demands for 25 per cent increase per month was granted.

The firemen's organization announced that 90 per cent of the firemen would resign if they were re-

fused an increase of \$300 a year. Seventy four food inspectors, who supervise the handling of the city's food supply, decided to strike today. Collection of garbage had ceased as a result of a strike two days ago of 200 garbage handlers. Sewer workers were called on strike today and members of the engineers, draftsmen and architects' union announced they were preparing to strike unless wage increases were provided.

The city council had before it a \$130,000,000 budget bill carrying pay increases averaging 10 per cent for the city's 18,050 employes when it convened. The measure lacked only three votes for adoption when the body rested yesterday.

## POLICE BARRACKS ATTACKED

#### IN IRELAND NEAR AND POLICEMEN WOUNDED.

Skebereen, county of Cork Ireland March 30 (By Associated Press) Over one hundred armed men attacked the police barracks in Durres with rifles and petrol bombs last night. A portion of the building was destroyed and two policemen were wounded before the attack was repulsed.

## GOVERNMENT'S ULTIMATUM DISREGARDED

#### GERMAN REBEL MILITARY HAS NOT DISARMED OR STOPPED FIGHTING.

Berlin, March 30 (By Associated Press) A report from the rebel military headquarters at Muenster says the government's ultimatum to the insurgents to disarm has been disregarded generally. Attacks on the northern front are continuing and reinforcements have been brought up by the insurgents.

The Hague March 30 (By Associated Press) Rebellious German workmen have resumed the attack on Wesle according to a despatch to the Niouw Courant of Rotterdam. Hamm in Westphalia and several other places are reported plundered. A general strike is proclaimed at Essen according to a despatch to the Niouw Courant and is being carried out in full force.

## AVIATION FIELD IS NAMED

#### COMMITTEE DECIDES UPON "CELERY CITY FIELD" PAUL RADFORD GETTING THE \$20 GOLD PIECE.

The aviation field south of this city was named this morning by the committee composed of A. P. Connelly, J. D. Ball and F. L. Miller. Several months ago a gentleman who resides near this city and who is greatly interested in aviation gave \$20 in gold to the person giving in a suitable name for the aviation field. The donor does not want his name to be mentioned in connection with the contest although he may later and the only stipulation he made was that the names be handed in to the Herald office and the committee appointed decide upon the name.

Strange to say only about twenty five names were handed in for this contest that did not cost the people a cent to enter and the lucky one to get \$20 in gold.

The committee took about two hours of their time to decide upon the name most suitable carefully weighing the various titles and their connection with the field and the city of Sanford and finally decided upon the name "The Celery City Field" suggested by Paul W. Radford of this city who is a student at Randolph-Macon Academy at Bedford Virginia.

The committee wanted a name that would mean something in connection with Sanford and while many of the other names were good and the committee had quite a time making a selection they finally took the "Celery City Field" as the most appropriate and the \$20 gold piece was given to Mrs. Radford here to send to Paul.

And hereafter the name of the aviation field will be known as the "Celery City Field" and take its place upon the aerial maps and aviation journals.

## SOCIALIST MEMBERS ARE TURNED FROM ASSEMBLY AFTER BITTER DEBATE

#### First Instance of Kind In History of America

### MUCH ORATORY FLO'D

FROM NEW YORK LEGISLATURE AFTER HOT ORATORICAL FIGHT AND MUCH FUSS.

Albany N. Y. April 1 (By Associated Press) The five Socialists members of the New York state Assembly expelled early today after the debate which continued all night crammed with fiery oratory. Separate votes were taken for each of the expelled members but forty votes were the maximum mustered by the defense in any of them. The vote to expell the members ranged from 110 to 116.

Albany April 1 (By Associated Press) Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., was among those voting against expulsion of the Socialists, Louis Waldman August Claussens Charles Solomon Samuel Dewitt and Samuel Orr charged with disloyalty and the action of the Assembly marks a precedent as the first time in history when all members of a party have been expelled from a legislature body.

## WORKERS LEADERS AMNESTY

#### GERMAN WORKERS IN RUHR VALLEY GIVEN 48 HOURS TO QUIT OR ELSE.

Paris April 1 (By Associated Press) The German government has granted the leaders of the workingmen's forces in the Ruhr district forty eight hours extension time in which to accept or reject the terms of the ultimatum sent to Essen last week Berlin advices state today. Negotiations are proceeding at Berlin and it is believed that the conflict in the Ruhr valley will be settled without any further hostilities.

## METHODISTS WOULD CENSOR THE MOVIES


#### CONFERENCE AT KNOXVILLE DECIDED TO PRESENT MEMORIAL.

**Chairman Smith Says  
No Hitch In His  
Arrangements**

**WORK IS STARTING**

**CONTRACTS HAVE BEEN LET  
FOR MUCH OF THE RE-  
ROAD WORK IN THE  
STATE.**

Tallahassee, March 26.—"I noticed an article a few days ago in the Jacksonville Metropolis which stated that there is grave danger of Florida losing her apportionment of federal aid because of failure on the part of the road department to comply with the requirements of the federal government in getting a sufficient number of project agreements for the expenditure of federal aid signed roads," said Chairman M. M. Smith of the state road department.

"There is positively no danger that the foregoing will be the case. In this connection I wish to state that there is absolutely no 'hitch' between the federal government and the state road department, as suggested in the Metropolis in regard to receiving federal aid for Florida.

"This is a matter which the state road department has been carefully looking out for. I make the foregoing statements for the benefit of those who may become uneasy for fear of the loss of Florida of federal aid for road building.

"A contract has just been let which in itself when signed up between the government and the state will take care of all federal aid apportionment for Florida during 1920 and a sufficient number of other pro-

jects are now under way to more  
than take care of the balance of  
federal aid which will be coming  
to this state under the apportion-  
ment for 1921.

"The bureau of public roads is  
very particular to see that every-  
thing is in first class shape pertain-  
ing to projects where a request is  
made for aid, but in every case where  
the work of the road department has  
been properly done through its en-  
gineers and the requirements of the  
bureau of public roads has been lived  
upto, there has been no hesitation on  
their part to sign up agreements for  
aid under Florida's apportionment.

"It would appear that there is  
no amount of red tape to be  
gone through with in getting federal  
help for road construction. At the  
same time the bureau of public roads  
is only 'playing safe' and cannot be  
blamed.

"It is further true that to the de-  
partment of agriculture, road build-  
ing is in a measure a new proposition  
as it is with the different road de-  
partments throughout the country,  
and there is no doubt but that in  
time a better working basis, looking  
toward the elimination of 'red tape'  
and a shorter cut to road construction  
will be worked out by the de-  
partment of the bureau of public  
roads, and that it will be possible  
within the next few years through  
this elimination of 'red tape' to fa-  
cilitate road building.

"The road department has now  
under way and almost ready to sub-  
mit to the government for its ap-  
proval 12 miles of road in Putnam  
county and 20 miles in Volusia county  
on road No. 3. It is also construct-  
ing 11 2-3 miles of bituminous con-  
crete road No. 2 in Alachua county;  
has completed nine miles of concrete  
and grouted brick on road No. 7 and  
six miles of concrete on road No. 2  
in DeSoto county. It has six miles of  
brick under construction in Santa-  
Rosa county on road No. 1.

The department is also construct-  
ing a highway bridge across the Ap-  
alachicola river on road No. 4; is ad-  
vertising for bids for the construc-  
tion of a bridge across the Chocto-  
watee and Blackwater rivers, both  
on road No. 1, has completed 10  
miles of road in Okaloosa county on  
road No. 1 and is building six miles  
in Madison county on road No. 1.

"This department also built or ad-  
ded in the construction of 15 miles of  
road in Liberty county; it aided in  
the construction and completed 12  
miles of grouted brick road in Osceola  
county on road No. 2 and is super-  
vising the construction of approxi-  
mately 20 miles of asphalt road in  
Osceola county on the Kissimmee-St.  
Cloud-Melbourne state aid road, and  
in addition to the foregoing the de-  
partment has today 18 camps of  
units of prisoners at work, which  
units are composed of approximately  
650 prisoners.

PEEK LAST WEEK  
HIGHEST AVERAGE**

**About 240 Cars Were  
Shipped By Re-  
frigerators**

**VERY LITTLE LEFT**

**ANYWHERE EXCEPT SANFORD  
AND PRICE IS BOUND TO  
STAY PUT.**

Last week was probably the big-  
gest week in the history of celery  
movement here this season. About  
240 cars of velery were shipped under  
the refrigeration and many others  
went by express and some by boat  
via the St. Johns river line. In all  
it was a big week not only from the  
number of cars but from the stand-  
point of price as the growers realize  
from \$2.50 to \$2.75 per crate and  
counting 350 crates to the car one  
can easily figure where the Sanford  
section was enriched by many thou-  
sands of dollars.

The weather is too hot just at  
present for the celery to carry as  
well as it might and the poor icing  
that the cars are getting is another  
source of worry to the shippers but  
the price is holding up well so far  
and the growers are taking comfort  
in the thought that the peak of the  
movement was reached last week  
and as there seems to be but little  
celery anywhere except in the Sanford  
section there is no good reason for  
celery taking a tumble unless it is  
the hot weather and the weather  
man has promised cooler weather  
for to-day and the balance of the  
week.

It is almost certain that not more  
than 120 cars will be shipped this

week and several good authorities  
on celery conditions here think that  
April will witness about 100 cars a  
week going from this section or 500  
for the month which will practically  
clean up the celery crop as far as  
the golden celery is concerned and  
the market will then be bare of  
celery except the green celery which  
is coming along nicely and should  
bring the growers good money.

Taking the entire celery season  
of 1920 it has been a most profitable  
one and while the big prices of last  
year have not been in evidence the  
season as a whole will almost reach  
the big figures of last season and  
Sanford will benefit greatly thereby.

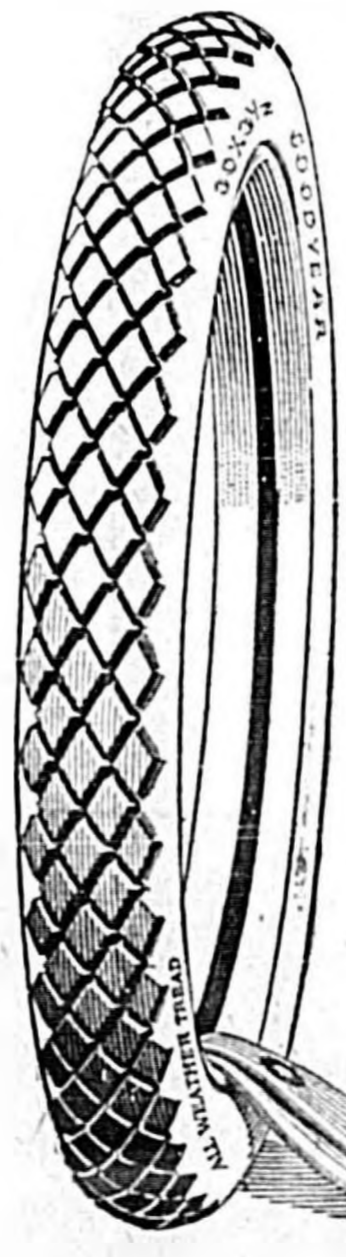
