## Minority to decide county's fate

Democrats won't be choosing elected school, county officials; 18 percent turnout predicted

**SEMINOLE COUNTY** - The future of Seminole County rests in the hands of about 32,000 citizens, who are expected to vote in the primary election Sept. 1. Other than in the judges' race, which is non-partisan, all candidates are Republican.

Of 182,069 registered voters in the county, 91,566 are Republicans and 61,957 are Democrats, according to **Sandy Goard**, supervisor of elections for the county. And since the primary is a closed election with only Republicans running for seats on the school board, county council and city commissions, that means only registered Republicans can vote. The general

election on Nov. 3 is open and not restricted to party affiliations.

"In the general election voters can cross party lines," Goard said.

Though difficult to gauge, Goard predicted an 18 percent voter turnout in the primary next month.

What some voters may not real-

ize is that up until Aug. 3 they could switch political parties and vote in the primary by filling out the back of their voter registration cards. Citizens can switch back after Oct. 2.

**Dede Schaffner**, community relations coordinator for Seminole County Public Schools, in an e-mail message notified teachers and administrators of their option to switch parties and vote for the

school board candidates of their choice.

"We try to keep our employees updated about the status of the school system," Schaffner said. "It's very important to get out and vote because this affects all of us. We're not talking anyone who to vote for."

Many people, she said, had no idea they could vote in the primary

## Sanford made greener with 149 trees planted

**SANFORD** - In late January of this year, the City of Sanford was awarded an Urban and Community Forestry Grant in the amount of \$10,000, for planting of new/replacement trees on various right-of-ways throughout the city. Thanks to the grant plus additional funds provided by the city, 149 trees were installed.

Among the areas receiving trees were Brynhaven, Mayfair Oaks, Mayfair, the downtown historic area, Goldshore along West 15th Street, and near the Seminole County Mental Health Clinic at Park Avenue and 25th Street.

The grant is provided through the USDA Forest Service and administered by the Florida Division of Forestry. It is intended to provide financial assistance to local governments and others to cost-share enhanced urban and community forestry programs and improve the environment within the State of Florida.

According to Program Coordinator **Howard Jeffries**, in planting these trees, the city staff had three goals:

- To add replacement trees to the city's street tree canopy.
  - To demonstrate proper planting techniques and the importance of arboriculture.
  - To familiarize our citizens on the importance of "right tree - right place" and recommend tree varieties to use.
- Not only did the city accomplish these goals, in some instances property owners were motivated to take better care of their landscaping, including planting additional trees.
- Because of the success of the grant, the city staff has applied for a second grant for the coming year. If approved, 115 additional trees will be installed along the city right-of-ways, primarily along portions of **Holly Avenue**, **Second Street** Streetscape, and in various medians in the **Hidden Lake** area.

## Lake Mary three-story office building too high under codes

**LAKE MARY** - **Robert Horien** wants to build a new professional office structure in Lake Mary. He has plans for the building, property on Lake Mary Boulevard, and apparently all of the other necessities required to undertake the project,

all that is, except the city's approval.

Horien has previously sought to obtain approval for a two-story structure at the same location, but had the request denied when complicated city codes came into play requiring a number of variances.

Now he is requesting approval for a three-story building, which

would actually be lower than the original two-story building which was designed as having a high pitched roof with gables that would have reached beyond city code limits. The three-story structure is planned with a flat roof to help reduce the total height.

"Taintsville has been here as long as I have been here and that's awhile. They call it Taintsville because it taint in Oviedo and it taint in Chuluota."

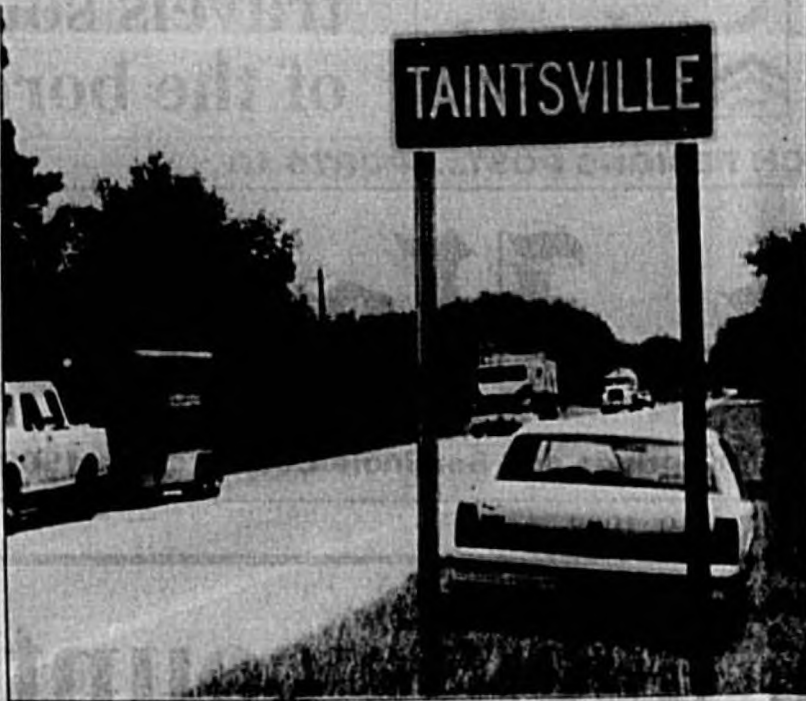

Most variances pertain to ground level matters such as reductions in landscaping, parking areas and other requirements.

This Thursday night, the proposal comes before the Lake Mary City Commission under new business. It is listed as a "Request for conditional use approval for an office building which is 35 feet in height; north of Lake Mary Boulevard between Wilson Drive and Crystal Drive."

If the commission determines that additional changes in Horian's plans are required, it would take the matter back before P&Z at some future meeting, then back to the commission.

If the commission approves the present proposal without additional changes, it would either have to give approval with the five feet in height added as a special exemption, or change the building height codes to allow for 35 feet for three story structures. If so, it may also require a change in the city's comprehensive plan.

If the commission approves the present proposal, Horian would then submit a site plan, which again would have to receive P&Z and commission ap-

With three rather than two floors, the square footage at the base has been able to be reduced, eliminating other variance requirements which had been requested regarding such matters as the amount of open space around the building and buffers.

While the three-story structure plan would appear to be more suitable, it is also higher by five feet than the city's requirements for such a building.

It came before the city's Planning and Zoning Board last month, with Chairman John McMenamy questioning why a change in height was being presented as a variance.

# Winter Springs nixes public swimming pool

WINTER SPRINGS - Winter Springs won't get in the swim of things, after commissioners nixed the idea of a public swimming pool.

Parks and Recreation Director Brook Seal at a recent meeting had lobbied commissioners to add the pool to his programs.

"Kissimmee has a pool like this one proposed. They have 400 hundred people in line to use it and they are making money," Seal said.

The differences in cost and maintenance between a larger and smaller pool were also discussed. Seal maintained that a pool could pay for itself immediately if 200 swimmers used it each day.

Commissioner Robert Miller said, "We would also have more square foot surface with the larger pool and use less water."

But Commissioner Eddie Martinez wasn't sold on the idea. "It would be a cold day in July before you get 200 people

in that pool. I cannot fathom the expenditure of this. The expense could be used for other projects. Your costs are way out of line."

Commissioners agreed that recreation should pay for itself. Commissioner Cindy Gennell added that her concerns centered on congestion at the pool.

In the end, the commission voted down building a public swimming pool, sinking the whole idea for now.

by switching parties. She estimated that out of about 6,200 school district employees about 3,000 have e-mail capabilities and access to her July 20 message.

"This is such an unusual election because all the school board candidates are Republican and it'll all be decided in the primary and many people don't realize that," she said. "People should have this information."

Local party leaders expressed mixed feelings over the party switching process and the e-mail message.

Jim Stelling, chairman of the Republican Executive Committee in Seminole County, said more and more people are changing parties for reasons of convenience, not necessarily because they have adopted a different political philosophy. Even political candidates switch over when running for office in the county because Seminole is predominantly Republican, Stelling said.

"That's the way the process works," he said.

Stelling said he did not have a problem with Schaffner's e-mail message because it did not promote a particular candidate.

"It's their right to do that," he said. "It (the message) promotes involvement in the election."

Wanda Hampton, chairwoman of the county's Democratic Executive Committee, said she understood the need for teachers to have a voice in the future of the school system, however, she said the e-mail message was inappropriate coming from a government agency to its employees.

"It wasn't proper," she said.

Hampton agreed that switching parties is expedient and convenient. Giving voters more options, however, might help rectify a one-party situation like Seminole County, she said. Opening up primary elections is one way to help balance party activity. A strong Democratic candidate in future elections is the party's goal.

"Democrats will have a true choice by having their own candidate," she said.

## Remembering Andres Duany's view of downtown development

Mention was made at a Sanford City Commission meeting recently, of renowned architect and town planner, Andres Duany, and his vision of Sanford's lakefront. Duany was contracted by the city to undertake a study of possible improvements which would enhance the city and improve its lifestyle and economy.

Duany did an initial examination of the city early in 1992, and in April, submitted a "Master Plan for Old Sanford" to the city and the Sanford Historic Trust. We believe his observations are worth repeating, as the two sides battle for or against turning Fort

front Master Plan Steering Committee, which has been established to suggest ways to improve the waterfront area of the city.

We quote that document pertaining to the hotel/conference center:

(The center with a 200 room hotel and 50,000 square-foot conference center), "this facility would be located between City Hall and Sailpointe Condominium, using additional land derived from the closure of Myrtle Ave. The hotel would be oriented to Lake Monroe, and the conference center, connected directly to the waterfront through the hotel by a pedestrian bridge, would be oriented to First Street and Oak Avenue where the impact of downtown commercial establishments would be greatest.

Waterfront activities including meeting rooms, restaurants, cruise docking and a water garden would be connected to the hotel and center by an all-weather pedestrian bridge over 17-92. Garage parking and service yards would be between the hotel and center, with vehicle traffic into the facility funneled down Fulton Street to the garage, avoiding traffic tie-ups on Seminole Boulevard and First Street."

While using the area next to City Hall for a hotel/conference center sounds like a logical solution to the disagreement, the city has already dedicated City Hall property to the county in connection with another controversial matter, the rebuilding and enlargement of the Seminole County Courthouse. So where does that leave plans?

Many people against the use of Fort Mellon Park say they are not against the hotel/conference center for Sanford, they are just against the use of Fort Mellon Park property for that purpose. OK then, if that's the case, find a developer who would be willing to build such multi-million dollar facilities somewhere else. Thus far, no one has found such a financial angel.

We believe, as Andres Duany wrote, that the city-owned Fort Mellon Park should be utilized in part for this development. The retention of a six-acre passive park should answer everyone's needs. The key is compromise. A city that does not make the best use of its assets will soon be a ghost town.

Mellon Park into a combination hotel/conference center area, which would still have a certain amount of park area.

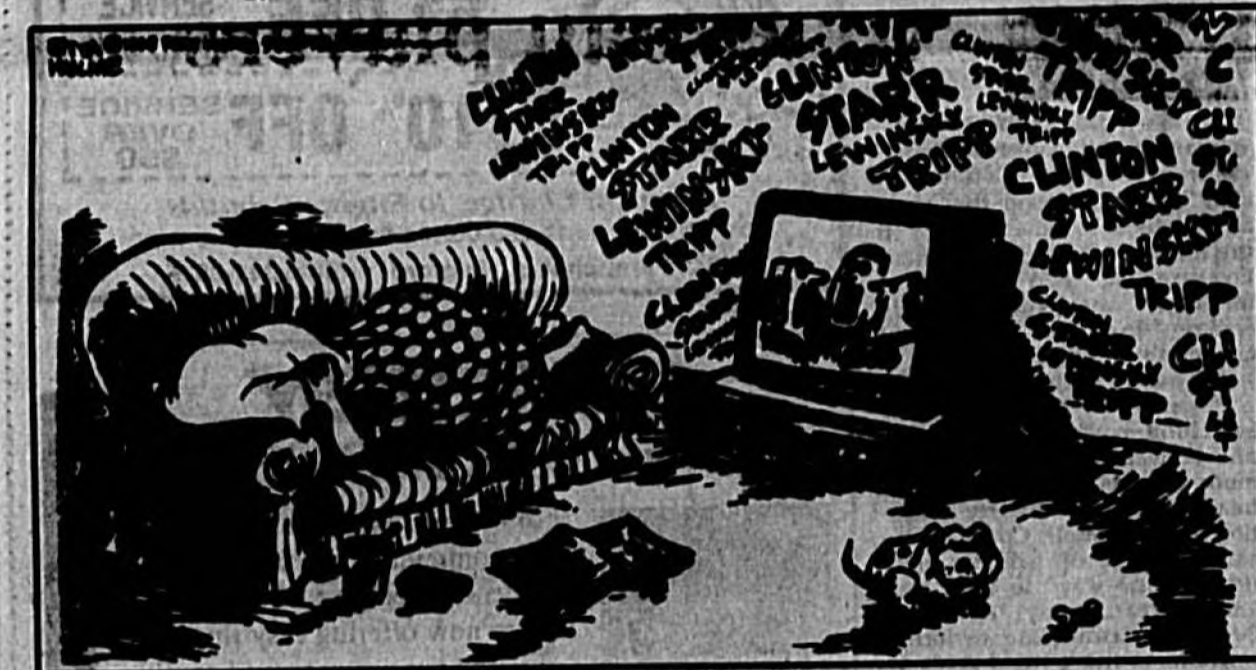
Duany wrote: "Another thing that Sanford should consider is using city owned land such as the post office parking lot, and the other under-utilized sites that are along the lake. The lake is also an amenity. These sites should be used for buildings that have an arcaded first floor for restaurants and shops, and at least three floors above designated for apartments.

If this land were owned by developers rather than the city, those developers would consider themselves to be wealthy simply by the ownership of this land. It is typical for municipalities not to realize the real estate value of what they own.

I urge you to prepare a very precise master plan, and then invite developers to do joint ventures with the city, thereby sharing the profits of development along this front.

Sanford might end up with enough profit in hand to do an extraordinary job with the rest of the downtown. In other words, instead of using the tax base, which is completely committed, or to go after grants that are minuscule amounts, Sanford should act like the private sector and take advantage of the assets that the city fathers, in their wisdom, acquired for the city."

But to be fair to both sides in this matter, we also re-quote a document submitted to the city on July 11, 1994 from the Water-

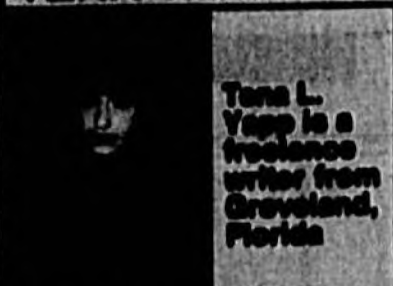


## Revision 11 means more choices in all elections

Here are the provisions of Revision 11: 1) It would make ballot access requirements the same for all candidates, whether major party, minor party, or independent; 2) It would make school board elections non-partisan; 3) It would allow gubernatorial candidates to run in primary elections without having named a running mate; 4) It would allow all registered voters, regardless of party, to vote in a party primary when the primary winner will face no general election opposition; 5) It would change Florida's minimum voting age from 21 to 18; 6) It would provide limited public financing of campaigns for statewide office candidates (not legislative candidates) who agree to certain spending limits.

Sounds like a solution to me. Floridians need more choices, more freedom, and more say in who we elect to get out and vote.

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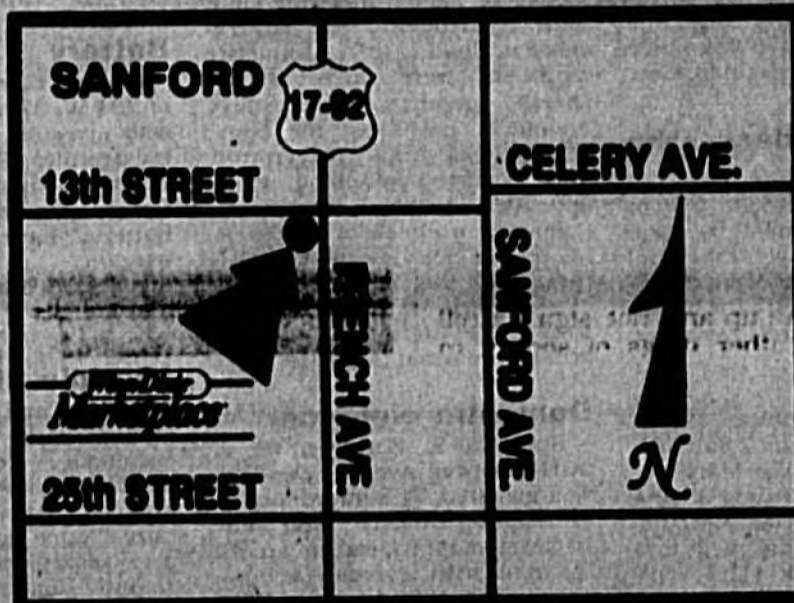

## Angler's at Walk-In-Water are now walking on water

**SANFORD** - Don't be surprised when you start hearing more about Lake Wee-wee-waka (A.K.A. Lake Walk-In-Water, Polk County's largest body of water and "best kept fishing secret.")

Until recently, this 7,500-acre deep bowl-shaped lake has received about the same respect as comedian Rodney Dangerfield.

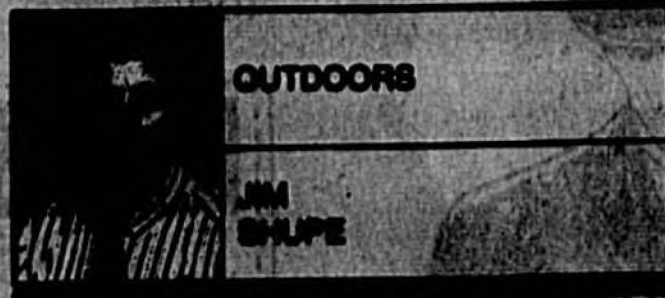
While conservation-minded Sunshine State anglers frequently gather on lakes Okechobee, Kissimmee, Toke and the St. Johns River, Lake Walk-In-Water has quietly and consistently churned out magnificent catches of largemouth bass.

It's not unusual for Florida's Game & Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC) staff to receive reports of individual anglers landing and releasing anywhere from 15 to 50 fish per day, even during the hot, humid months of summer when bass commonly sulk in deeper waters while attempting to stay cool.

The lake is located in central Florida, about four and one-half miles south of State Road 60, between Lake Wales and Indian Lake Shores. Many who view Walk-In-Water for the first time are awed by the lake's clarity.

On a clear day when the surface is smooth, a person can clearly see the lake's bottom structure, even without polarized sunglasses.

Controlled lake fishing is a popular pastime and both licensed and unlicensed anglers are welcome.

a scarcity of housing developments and an absence of husbandry operations along its shores.

Vegetation consists of 15 to 20 percent emergent or submerged hydrilla controlled by the Department of Environmental Protection's Bureau of Aquatic Plant Management, plus numerous stands of beneficial bulrush, smartweed and oel grass.

Although 10 to 15 feet at its deepest, the lake's average depth ranges from five to six feet, perfect for a wide variety of artificial and natural baits.

Feeding into the Kissimmee chain via Wee-wee-waka Creek and Lake Ronalee, Walk-In-Water's major feeder stream is Tiger Creek located at the lake's southeast corner.

creasing the length minimum from its current 14 inches to 16 inches, and stressing catch-and-release.

Biologists are even considering the establishment of a slot limit of some sort in an effort to rapidly transform this lake into a prime trophy bass fishery.

There are two launching ramps onto Lake Walk-In-Water. One is a private ramp located at Uncle Joe's Fish Camp on the west shoreline, just north of the county park's public ramp.

Uncle Joe's has guide services available, in addition to a few duplex apartments, RV sites and restrooms.

While the county park launching ramp is in good condition, parking spaces are limited. It's been suggested that fishing clubs planning to hold tournaments on Lake Walk-In-Water limit participation to 25 to 30 boats maximum because of vehicle parking limitations and a scarcity of dockage or boat parking areas.

To find Uncle Joe's or the county park, turn south off State Road 60 onto Walk-In-Water Road.

Because the lake historically has enjoyed relative anonymity, Walk-In-Water is currently unpressured.

But, as word spreads through bass fishing circles, look for increased visitation.

Fishing in the lake is outstanding and if we'll all treat it with care and respect, Lake Walk-In-Water could and should be an angler favorite for decades, say GFC officials.

heat and can be found in deep river bends. Mussels and worms work well on both species. Plastic worms and small Rapalas work well on bass.

Expect good catch and release snook action at Sebastian Inlet. Fish to 20 pounds readily strike large live shrimp or small baitfish. A few flounder, redfish and trout can also be caught. Snook and tarpon are hitting back in the Sebastian River.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports spotty offshore action. Dolphin and wahoo are not reliable. King mackerel and a few cobia are roaming Pelican Flats and 8 A Reef. Flounder are biting finger mullet inside the Port, while reds and trout are rated as fair on the flats of the Banana and Indian Rivers.

Sheepshead are the main attraction at Ponce Inlet. Live shrimp or fiddler crabs are the top baits for sheepshead to 6 pounds. Drum, redfish, small bluefish, and jack crevalle can also be caught in fair numbers. A few flounder are hitting finger mullet around the south jetty. Trout and reds are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoon.

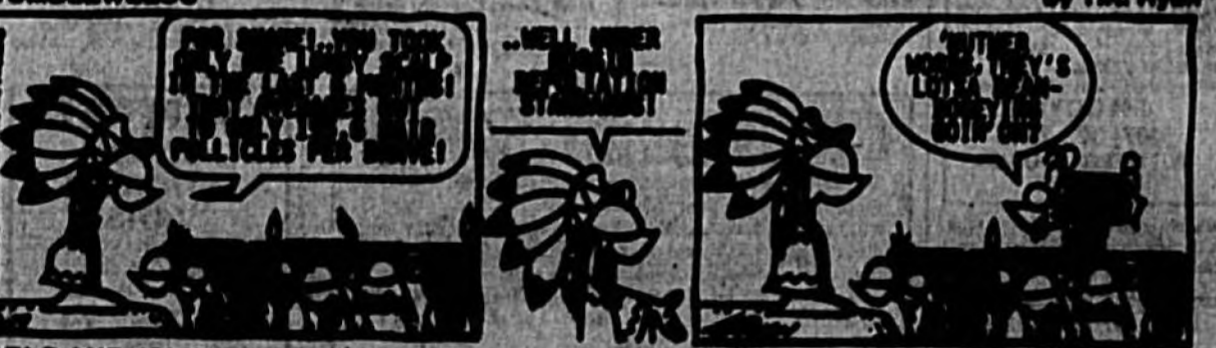

Does neck injury require surgery?

DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT: I wish there were a pill. If I could find one, I'd retire in style instead of doing what I do. No, I talk that back. I really enjoy being a practicing physician. Sure, the pressures and frustrations have increased, but basically, people haven't changed. I enjoy the personal contact and the friendships I have established. With respect to the question of aging, that's in the genes. So I thank my parents for the gift.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband fell off his mountain bike two months ago, landing straight on the top of his head. Because of extreme pain, he had X-rays and a CT scan that showed subluxation between C5 and 6. Our HMO has refused to allow him to see an orthopedist, yet we've seen a neurologist who thinks he may have nerve damage. Should we pay out-of-pocket to see an orthopedist? Is surgery on the agenda? Will the nerves repair themselves in time?

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been reading your column for years and have lots of questions I would like to ask you. But first - what kind of pill have you been taking to make you young? Everyone I talk to wants to know!

DEAR DR. GOTT: Subluxation of the spine simply means that one vertebral bone is overriding a neighbor - in your husband's case, the fifth and sixth bones in the neck. This is certainly a possible consequence of his injury. In such instances, spinal nerves can be pinched or compressed, leading to pain and numbness.

Your husband may be helped by an intensive rehab program of physical therapy. The neurologist can order this.

If, after a few weeks, your husband is still in pain, he will require more testing, such as an MRI scan. If there is significant and continuing pressure on the nerves, your husband may need spinal surgery.

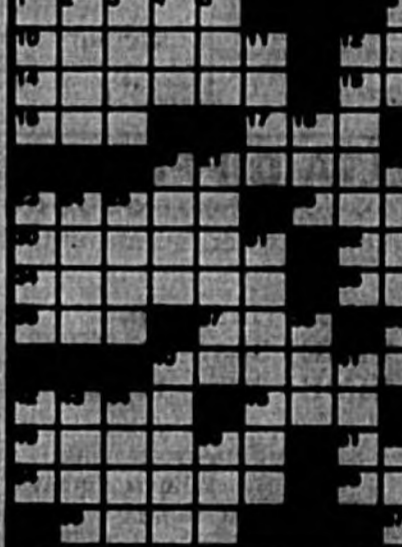
Hold off on the orthopedist for now. Try the more conservative approach first. Should this be unsuccessful, you can always scream bloody murder to your insurance company and, I hope, get the help you need.

I explained that with A-Q-x of a side suit in your hand and three low cards in the dummy, you should cash the ace first, planning to lead toward the queen on the second round of the suit. Very clever, and all that. But when I used the deal in a lesson, two outplayed me.

The room was in six spades. The deal was actually like yesterday's, with West having king-doubtton of hearts. Yet two skilled players, Doty Hayes, of Darien, Conn., and Alfred Spellerink, of New Canaan, Conn., would have made the contract even if West had had king-third. Here's what they did.
