"There's an awful lot of fruit bruised on this road," said Meisch, "and it is important for Seminole County."

Dial explained to the Seminole County delegation that there is between 3 1/2 and 4 million dollars in the budget for this district, including Federal Aid. "We will have to evaluate these roads on a basis of need," Dial said.

Senator Douglas Stenstrom, accompanying the Seminole County delegation, asked Dial, "does 45 have Federal Aid?" He said, "our thought is to begin to get a good access road now into 17-92 and French Ave. If Federal Aid can be obtained, it won't cost much money."

Dial told the group, "we don't have enough dollars to go around, but based on traffic needs, we will come up with a budget."

Senator Stenstrom declared that "records show that our county has been at the bottom of the 12-county district list for years. Time has come for us to get some of the money."

Referring to an analysis of money spent in Seminole County, Dial told the group that only \$1,586,000 had been spent in Seminole County since 1935. And he added, "there hasn't been an exact equality in counties, I agree with you."

Chairman Meisch added, "the biggest portion of that money has been in resurfacing work."

Senator Stenstrom said, "we're most hopeful that the northern section of 17-92 will be put in the budget for this first year."

And he added, "I think you'll agree that Orange, Volusia, Alachua, and other counties have done pretty good."

Road Board Member Dial, interrupted Senator Stenstrom to say, "I'm trying not to consider these roads on the basis of counties. Rather, we are trying to consider them on a basis of need and sufficiency." And he again added, "I don't think you've been properly briefed."

Stenstrom said, "we feel like our request is a good logical one."

Referring to the question of moral support for 415, Dial said, "I venture to say I've had more calls and more letters on this project than any other to come before me."

Asked about the progress to report on 17-92 from the Orange County line to Five Points, Board Member Dial and District Engineer Richie Green revealed that plans are now 75% complete. "We expect to get the pencil sketches out of Ford by Nov. 1," District Engineer Green said.

Those making up the delegation from Seminole County for the six-month interim budget request were: Seminole County Commissioner Chairman John Meisch, Commissioner B. C. Dodd, Otis Fourakre, Fred Dyson, Brown Miller, County Attorney and Representative Mack N. Cleveland Jr., Senator Douglas Stenstrom, Representative Vellie A. Williams Jr., W. Pitt Varney, James A. Wright, Brailley Odham, Forrest Breckenridge, and George Youby.

Mack N. Cleveland Jr., spoke to Board Member Dial, and the District Engineer when he said, "I want to publicly thank you and the staff here for the work that's been done for Seminole County."

Dial said, "I've attended several meetings in Seminole County, and at times tempers were short. If I have offended anybody in my efforts to do all I can for Seminole County, I want to apologize."

It was also revealed, at the budget hearing, when Dial was asked about plans that Orange County might be making, that "a request from the Orange County Commissioners has been made to widen and fourlane 17-92 from the Seminole County line to Lee Road." Dial said, "it is the thinking of the Orange County group that 17-92 would be completed next year."

James A. Wright, referring to the State Road 46 project, and asking the cost of the overall paving and widening, when told that it was \$100,000, said, "it seems to me like you can pave this one out of petty cash."

In concluding the more than half-hour budget session, Road Board Member Dial said, "I don't think you'll have any reason to be dissatisfied when you see the completed budget."

Palacio a Laredo, Tex., high school student, gave in to Sanders 3 and 1 in the title match yesterday, despite a rally at the start of the final 18 holes. Sanders, a native of Cedartown, Ga., led 5 up after the first 18, but Palacio then won the 20th, 21st and 22nd holes with birdies to get back into the fight.

Sanders finally put the match away on the 33th.

Sanders who starts work as an insurance man in Miami, Fla., in a few days, joined in the praise for Palacio. "I had to play par golf to beat him," said Sanders. "He's good."

Miss Clifford, daughter of the British vic at the host club, defeated Nán Hervey of Mexico 3 and 1. Sandra, who's been playing golf just 22 months, hopes to enter the U.S. National next year.

instance, he said, in Florida, we have 36,000 enrolled in colleges and that enrollment is expected to go to 106,000 by 1970.

"The pressure will soon be on," he said something must be done about it.

"There are two choices," he said. "Limit the enrollment or try to expand the facilities to meet the growing needs."

Bracken quoted Dr. William Carlsson, who said, "if we limit college education we limit our national welfare." And he has an overwhelming number of followings in his belief, said Bracken.

"What is it to be, limited enrollment or expansion," asked Bracken. "My belief," he revealed, "is to strike a happy medium somewhere." "I think they're going to have to expand soon, and I also think that they're going to tighten up on the requirements."

The colleges are already starting to crack down, Bracken told the Kiwanis Club yesterday. The Six Semester rule is the first step in making it harder to attend college. "The six semester rule will weed out the playboys," he said.

"There are a lot of students who are lost, when they go to college, they just don't have the background," Bracken said. "We've got to teach the students how to study, we've got to let them know what it is to go to college ahead of time."

Bracken concluded by saying, "it's pretty hard for a school teacher to tell the student about all of the walks of life—not just the three."

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The salvation of a major league baseball operation is down on the farm, says General Manager Roy Hamey of the Philadelphia Phillies.

Hamey announced that the Phillies would operate a pre-season rookie school next spring, from Feb. 8 to the 29th at the club's Clearwater, Fla., training site.

### Horse Migration Is Under Way Again

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The annual horse migration is under way, with 3,200 thoroughbreds headed for Florida and another winter racing season.

Gulfstream Park bedded down 47 head yesterday, and first arrivals are expected at Hialeah and Tropical later this week to await the season's opening Nov. 28.

Transporting these spirited animals from Northern tracts is a risky and expensive business. The ordinary horse car provides 18 stalls. Fifteen of the stalls are for the horses themselves; the remaining stalls are used for feed, water and other supplies.

The horses stand three abreast on fresh beds of shavings. They are fed hay and plenty of water, but oats are taboo. Being a heavy food with body heating qualities, oats bring the horse's temperature up and induce shipping fever.

**Men Accompany Horses**  
Men must accompany the horses, and six are allowed in each car. They get a free ride. The horses are given generous doses of raw, unseeded oil, repeated frequently during the trip South.

Overfeeding and drafts, two of the dangers facing thoroughbreds in transit, must be warded off by alert stablehands who sleep with one eye open.

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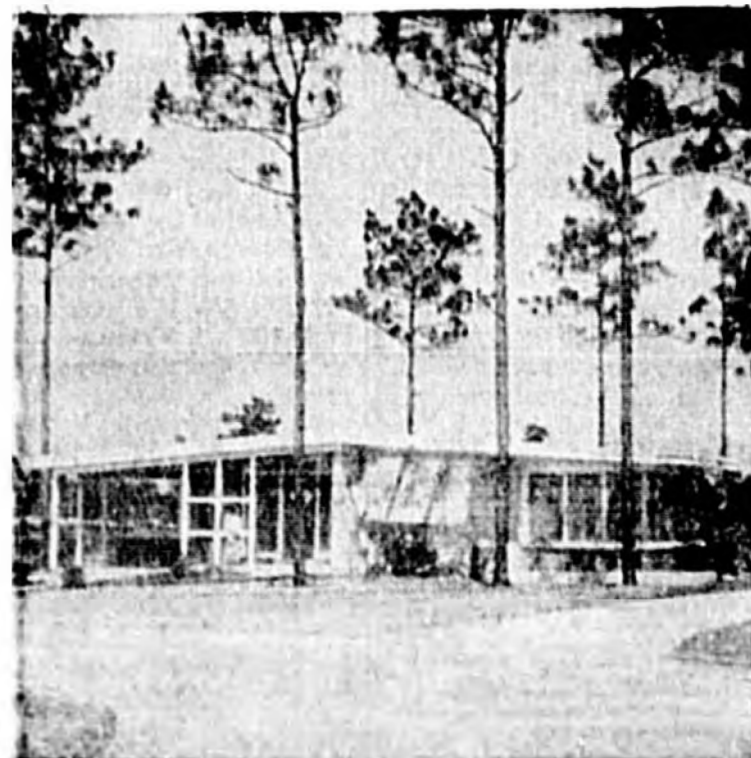

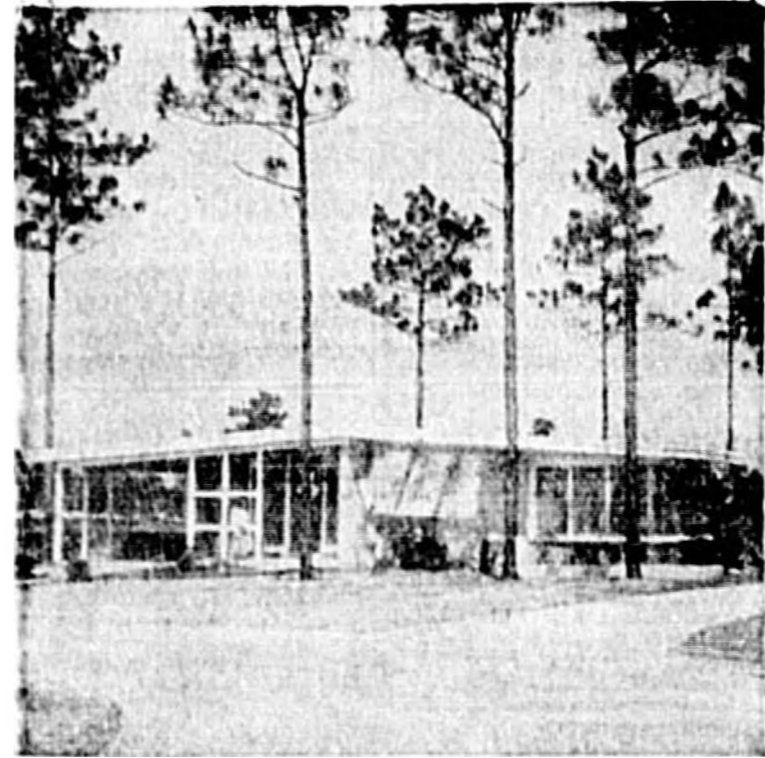

(Continued From Page One) tional economy when such a huge sum is distributed to the American public. Individual security will be increased when nearly a third of the total is re-deposited in permanent savings accounts. Debt will be reduced when a substantial slice of the billion is used to pay accumulated bills. Department stores and merchants will feel the boost when those 12½ million members start their Christmas shopping. And Santa Claus will seem more real than ever when Johnny and Jane find those bikes and dolls under the Christmas tree.

The 1955 payoff is the largest in the history of the Club and represents an increase over 1954 of 56 million dollars (4.5%) with three hundred thousand more members. The average check this year amounts to \$90.40 for each member.

Of the 6,400 institutions 154 had clubs in excess of \$1,000,000 each. As in past years, New York leads with 2,483,553 members and \$236,334,189, followed by Pennsylvania with 1,903,199 members and \$171,478,524 and then New Jersey with 1,146,514 members and \$129,876,622.

In 1910 when the name, idea and plan of Christmas Club was originated, there were less than \$7 billion in all savings deposits in the nation, and these were divided among only 15 million savers. In 1954 savings totaled 180 billion dollars with nearly 100 million savers. Many millions of these savers made their first banking contacts through Christmas Club, Dorset said.

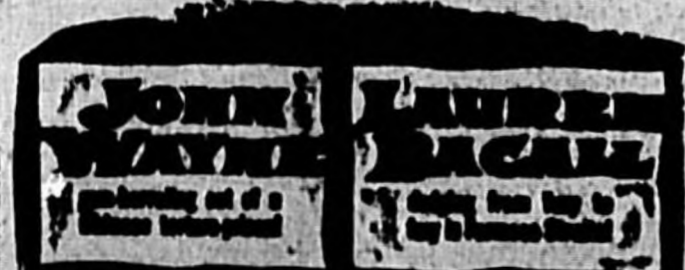
