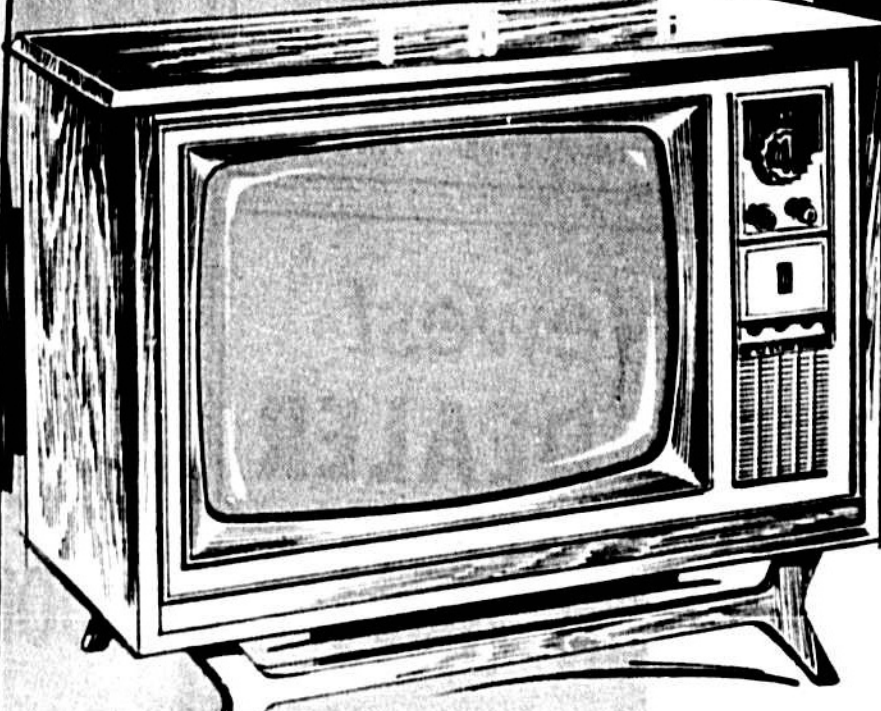

Forgetting The Elderly

Sunday is a lonely day for the elderly. An elderly woman sits on one of the benches along First St. at 8:30 in the morning. She watches the cars carrying people to church speed by. What kind of home does she come from? We can imagine. It probably consists of small parlor, an even smaller bedroom, and a kitchen. One cannot help but notice the excessive modesty probably found in all the rooms. Boredom is a great inventor for work. We imagine few friends stop by during the day. Most of them now reside in a variety of cemeteries throughout the country, along with her husband. Occasionally she walks a few blocks, her eyes noting the many changes taking place in the town. Much of her time is spent mentally reliving the past. The days weren't always like this — memories of an active, useful life fill her mind with nostalgia at times. We imagine after her evening meal, the ritual of reading the Herald begins. This is a big part of her day. Sometimes though this can be a chore, she usually is accompanied by vision problems. The day ends early for the old woman — illness can tax the strength in a surprising manner. Who is this lady? Unknown perhaps to her, she's a member of a large number of Americans — the forgotten elderly, a paradox blighting the social structure of every area of America. In a nation that stresses youth, she's been forgotten. She occupies no vital spot in a fast-moving race of people. Her many years of experience in living add up to nothing. Fear, loneliness, and insecurity dominate her being. For her, and many others like her, the day is a day-by-day chore of waiting — waiting until she too will occupy a carefully sectioned plot of ground in a local cemetery. Her income is derived from a variety of monthly checks, all small in amount. Her maintainer is from the old-age assistance program, operated as a federal agency by the State of Florida. Her monthly check is by no means high. The state allows a maximum of \$75 per month payment. However, the average is \$49.50 for each person. Neighboring Alabama pays about \$10 more a month, while Georgia is about the same. Florida ranks number 45 among the states in old age assistance payment. A total of 78,600 persons receive them monthly. This amounts to 3.8 per cent of the national total of persons receiving assistance, but only 2.7 per cent of the total national amount of money paid to needy elderly persons. Elderly persons needing assistance can perhaps be thankful they live in Florida, rather than Georgia, Mississippi, Indiana, Nebraska, or South Carolina. These are the only states that pay less per person than Florida. The national average is \$68. California pays \$101.35 monthly and New Hampshire, \$98.80. It seems unfeasible that standards of living can vary greatly between California and Florida to justify a \$49.50 difference in payments. Are Californians more concerned about the deep problems of their aged? Perhaps.

Analysis Of The News

WASHINGTON (AP) — Those were President Johnson's gold coins, 1965. This summer of 1967 is hot for him but for the cold days, getting colder. If he pays attention to public opinion, and he does, it's enough to make him shiver. Starting out in 1965 he had all his own way, thanks to the 1964 election. In Congress his Democrats swamped the Republicans, with 295 to 140 seats in the House, and 67 to 33 seats in the Senate a two-thirds edge. So wonder then, with their majorities and his ceaseless prodding, the Democratic Congress produced the most remarkable legislative year in history. And he had time for his prod in these days. The Vietnam war was in babyhood. He had just begun the U.S. military buildup in 1965, with only 30,000 American troops in the end of the year. He was not wanted for being involved in the war at all, but standing with the voters was high. In the first six months of 1967, the troop buildup had begun in earnest, the Gallup poll showed they wanted Johnson to make the war tougher. He had been talking of a war dragging on indefinitely. The American death toll in Vietnam was back up from 1,265 at the end of 1965 to over 12,500 now. And already there is a bad odor from the upcoming elections in Vietnam. They were supposed to have been a shining symbol of how the United States was helping the people establish a democratic society. On top of the empty basket from Congress, the endless war, and Johnson's realization that he had to ask for a tax boost to pay for the war, he was drenched in the summer of 1967 with riots, the worst in history. Few can doubt he wants to be re-elected in 1968 but the Gallup and Harris polls over the weekend must have chilled his blood. 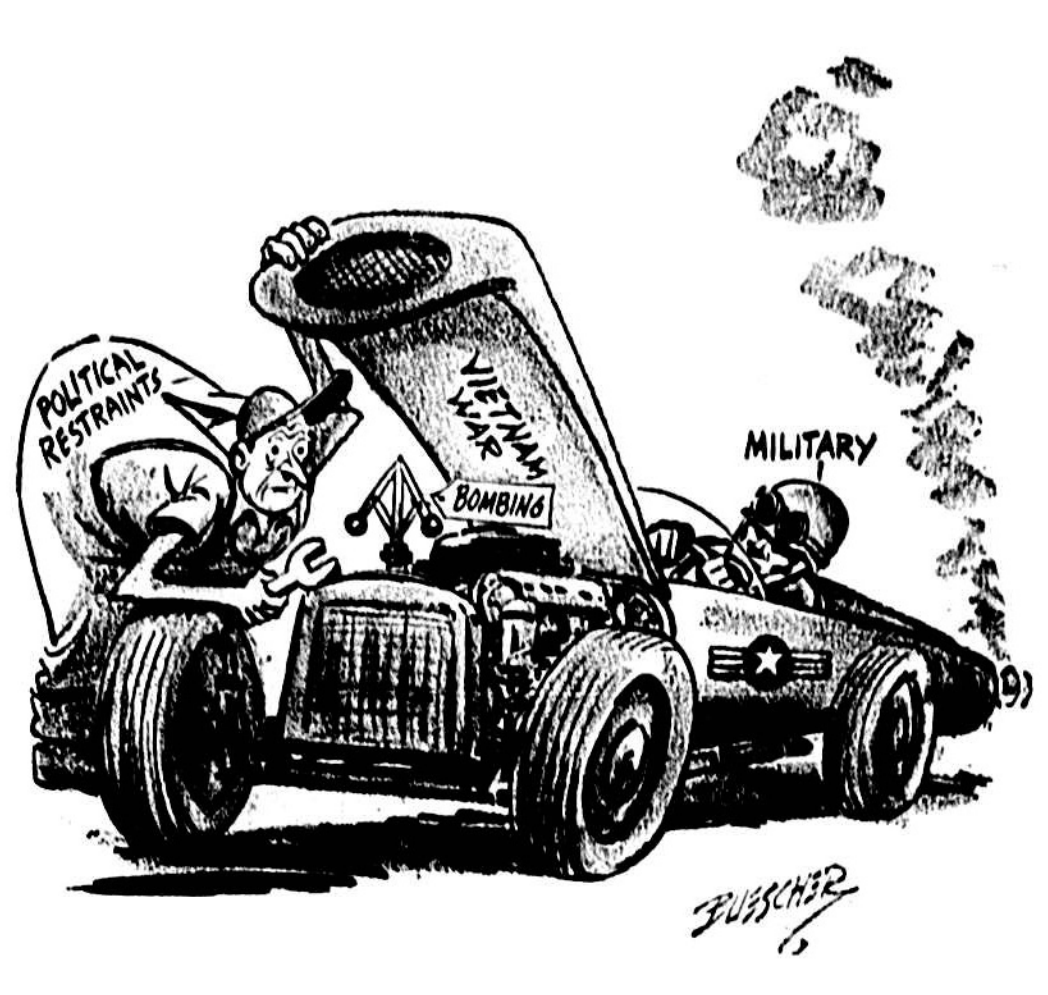

WASHINGTON (NEA) — A survey made by this reporter of data from 12 states coastline indicates a pattern in the clandestine narcotics and liquor selling and prostitution in a sizable number of high schools and even junior, high and intermediate schools. From Boston there are reports of traveling liquor stores that do a boom business selling cheap liquor to youngsters at black market prices. From Washington state and the Northwest comes the report that teen-agers in some numbers engage in prostitution to raise money for pop pills, marijuana or LSD. That information is echoed from coast-to-coast. In upper New York state, a principal of a middle-class neighborhood elementary school reports picking up one, two and sometimes three or four empty tubes of airplane glue daily on school grounds. On some high schools and in college campuses in a number of states, it is reported marijuana is as easy to acquire as candy bars. From Alabama, there are reports of open sex facilities where teen-agers can bring their girlfriends for illicit relations. In Massachusetts, reports tell of teen-agers taking spiked oranges to school in their lunch boxes. Hypodermic needles are used to shoot gin, Scotch or vodka into the fruit. These phenomena are no reports of neighborhood, state or race. The data comes from middle-class suburbs, from the poorer sections of towns and from high-income neighborhoods. The youth involved are both white and Negro. At one leading East Coast university, where surveys indicated 15 per cent of the stu-

Homemaker's Corner

Mrs. E. Bellhorn of Slavia asked for a recipe for Sweet Potato Fluff with Raisins. Miss Sandra Weis prepared this for the 431 adult leaders banquet last week and it was so very good. So here it is for you.

POTATO FLUFF WITH RAISINS

1 No. 10 cans sweet potatoes
1 lb. of 1 cup melted butter
1 cup sugar
1 lb. of 4 oz. or 1 qt. raisins
Dash sweet potatoes and season with butter and nutmeg.
Soak raisins for 1/2 hour and drain well. Combine potatoes and raisins. Mix well and put in oiled baking dish. Bake in 375 degree oven for 30 minutes. 50 portions at 4 ounces each.

SWEET POTATOES AND RAISINS

(This recipe makes 50 portions but you can cut it down)

- 1 top nutmeg
- 1 lb. of 4 oz. or 1 qt. raisins
- 1 can sweet potatoes and season with butter and nutmeg.

Soak raisins for 1/2 hour and drain well. Combine potatoes and raisins. Mix well and put in oiled baking dish. Bake in 375 degree oven for 30 minutes. 50 portions at 4 ounces each.

GUMDROP BREAD

- 3/4 cup flour
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. salt

Combine, then add to dry ingredients.

- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 3/4 cup milk
- 2 tsp. salad oil

Add:

- 1 cup gumdrops, cut up
- 1/4 cup nutmegs, chopped

Pour into greased loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour or until done.

TOMATO SOUP CAKE

- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1 tsp. soda

Combine powdered sugar and peanut butter. Blend until the appearance of biscuit mix. Spread half of the mixture on one shell. Combine cornstarch, sugar and salt. Add scalded milk and mix well. Pour small amount over beaten egg yolks, mix well, then return to milk mixture. Cook in top of double boiler until mixture thickens. Add butter and vanilla; then pour into pie shell. Top with meringue made from the 1 egg whites. Sprinkle remainder of peanut butter mixture over meringue. Bake at 325 degrees until meringue is brown.

SOUP CREAM PECAN PIE

- 1 cup broken pecans
- 2 tps. flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 egg yolk butters
- 1 tsp. grated lemon rind

Unbaked pie shell. Line piepan with pastry and sprinkle it with pecans. Combine flour, salt and sugar in top of double boiler. Add sour cream and cook until slightly thickened. Add eggs, beat. Remove from heat and add lemon rind, then pour mixture over pecans in shell. Bake in 425 degree oven for 30 minutes, then reduce heat to 325 and bake until firm.

HAWAIIAN COLESLAW

- 4 cups shredded cabbage
- 22 oz. can mandarin orange slices
- 1/2 cup crushed pineapple, drained
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. ginger
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1/2 cup pepper
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise or tart salad dressing

Shred cabbage into large bowl. Drain mandarin orange sections and save juice, drain and measure the pineapple. Add orange juice and pepper. Toss lightly. Add the drained fruit, toss all with a fork. Stir in mayonnaise. Chill well before serving. Serves 6.

BROCCOLI CASSEEROLE

- 2 pkgs. frozen broccoli
- 2 tps. butter
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/4 cup pepper
- 1/4 cup grated cheese
- 1/4 cup chopped almonds

1/2 sliced bacon

Cook broccoli until just tender. Drain and place in greased casserole. Make a sauce of the butter, flour, salt, milk, pepper and cheese. Sprinkle almonds over the broccoli then pour sauce over all. Sprinkle top with bread crumbs and bacon. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until bubbling hot and brown on top. Serves 4-6.

Vice Policemen Have It 'Rough' In San Juan

SAN JUAN, P. R. (AP) — The young Argentine prostitute, surveying the dance hall filled with sailors and soldiers and middle-aged tourists, said: "At the rate I have been going, in a few months I will be able to return to Argentina and buy my own apartment and beauty shop."

She added she smiled at two laughing sailors. "There, I will be a lady again."

She is one of the hundreds of prostitutes from Latin America who come to San Juan for short periods, attracted by military money and the tourist boom of this Spanish-speaking island commonwealth. There are Navy, Air Force and Army bases on the island, and last year nearly 80,000 tourists came to Puerto Rico.

The prostitutes offer their services in bars and night clubs on fashionable Ashford Avenue among expensive tourist hotels. Together with nearly 1,000 in all, prostitutes have a market where their trade is not illegal but has not been legalized either. The law prohibits the act of prostitution in a house of prostitution, but not in the prostitute's apartment.

Even soliciting is not illegal unless it is excessive, a police agent says. He cannot explain what excessive soliciting means. There is no court, we could do a vice squad office as he points out the difficulties involved in gathering evidence that will stand up in court.

Recently police filed suit against a night club and hotel owner. The evidence presented was the account of two police agents who described in detail before the court their personal experiences in the line of duty — with two of the night club's hostesses in the night club owner's hotel.

"We should not have to resort to this sort of thing to obtain evidence," an officer said. The police department is making a study to be submitted to the legislature with a request for "legal tools to deal with the problem."

Social Security News

Q I am receiving benefits as a minor child on my father's social security account. Can I get these benefits after I am 18?

A Yes, if you are a full-time student in an accredited school or if you were continuously disabled since before you were 18.

Q I am 67 and have not had Medicare first started I did not sign up for the doctor bill insurance. Can I start now?

A No, but you may sign up in October, November or December of this year. However, your insurance would not start until next July.

Q I am going into business for myself. I won't make much money for the first few years. Can I "freeze" my social security record in order to keep my benefits high?

A No. A "freeze" is granted only in disability cases. A few low years are dropped when security records since a low year are dropped when benefits are figured.

Q I heard that I can get free social security credit for the time I was in the Navy. How do I get this on my social security record?

A Military wage credits will be considered at the time a claim is filed on your record. All that will be needed is your discharge from military service.

Q My mother has been ill for several months and is confined to her home. She requires an air conditioner to make her rest easily. Will Medicare help pay the expenses of an air conditioner?

A No. This is considered a personal comfort item.

Successful Year Is Reported By North Orlando

North Orlando had a successful year, according to reports presented at the August council meeting by Charles McIntosh, commissioner of finance, who showed revenue and expense of the village for the past three years.

Exhibit one was a chart which showed the revenue that comes from permits and licenses, the police department, cigarette tax, utility taxes, franchises, and miscellaneous. This totaled to \$9,657.74 for the year 1965, \$9,645.39 for 1966, and \$10,382.26 for 1967. In 1967 approximately 20 per cent of the revenue was from utility taxes.

Exhibit two, which followed, listed expenses. It cost the village \$5,709.10 to operate in 1965, \$5,862.33 in 1966 and \$6,307.85 in 1967. The five most outstanding expenses were wages, the police department, utilities, insurance, and legal and accounting. In that order.

In 1965, \$3,723.55 was left after expenses and in 1966 the village was \$110.99 in the red as a result of this and the fact that operating revenue was down 30.73 from the preceding year while expenses were up \$3,192.16. Utility taxes were increased in July, 1966.

Expenses for operating the village have increased 4.2 per cent over 1966 and 62 per cent over 1965. The revenue has increased 4.2 per cent over 1966 and 15.6 per cent over 1965. In 1967, 85 cents out of every dollar was spent.

At the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 1967, the revenue minus expenses was \$1,531.03. Balance sheet of that date shows a total unappropriated surplus of \$7,023.49 and a total liabilities of \$2,442.19. Assets to liabilities ratio is 115 to 1.

McIntosh said references for the finance report were village records, including reports, journals, and ledgers of the village kept by Robert L. Kramer, accountant, Orlando.

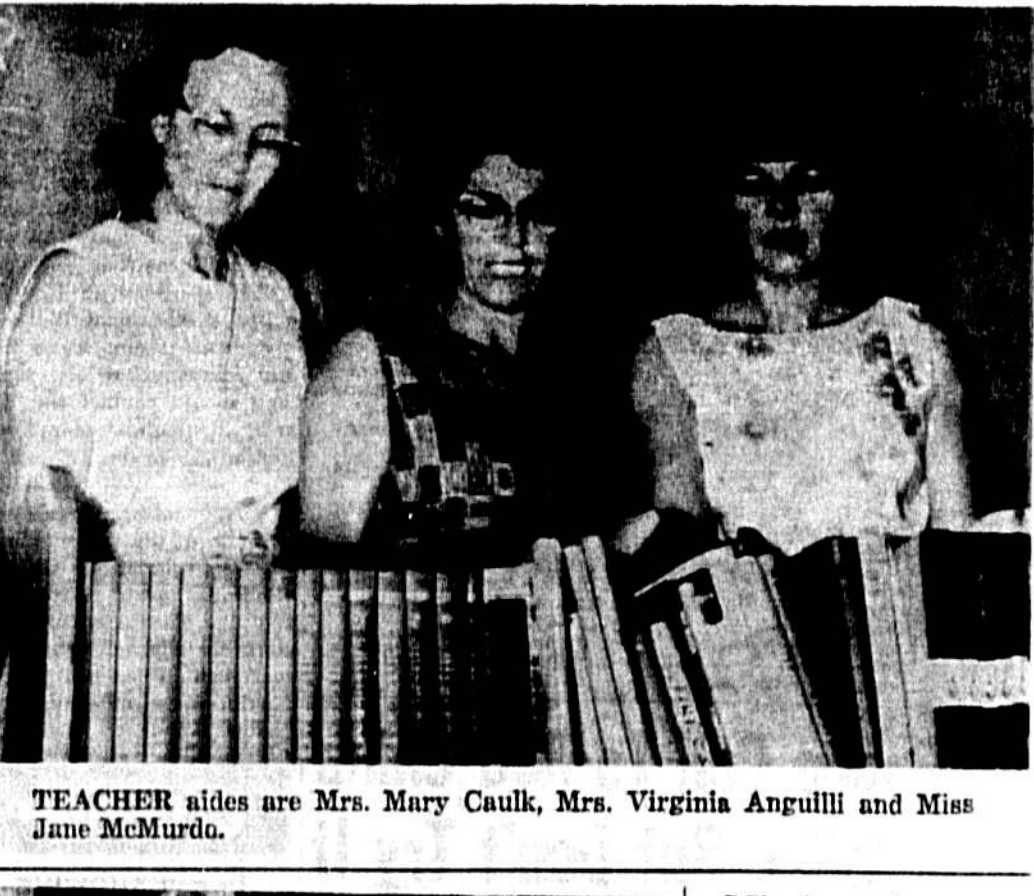
