

Husband Learns Hard Way; His Wife's Work Isn't Easy

Richard Hansard agreed to do all of the things his wife ordinarily does as part of her daily duties in the home. Lyn Hansard took over the at-home activities of her husband.

"Did Richard last three months?" you ask.

The answer is a tired "no." He gave it up after only three weeks — utterly exhausted.

It all started when Hansard brought home a copy of Ms., a new magazine dedicated to women's rights. Lyn, who is a working wife, read it and became militant about housework. Instead of sympathy, her husband pooh-poohed housework with a "it's only trivial" remark.

That was too much for Lyn, so they agreed to the wager. If he won the bet, the cats would stay in a kennel instead of going along on the next vacation.

Hansard began bravely — he would not allow his wife into HIS kitchen.

After work, he would do the dinner dishes he was too tired to wash the night before. (Lyn would relax on the couch.)

He would cook dinner. (She was still relaxing.)

He would check to see if she picked up her work clothes. (He would bring her a drink.

They would eat. He would clear the table. (Time for more relaxing for Lyn.)

Bedtime — she would retire. He would straighten up the house.

"During the second week, I came home from work one night totally exhausted," said Richard. "That night she said she would let me do the dishes. I was so tired I didn't have to remind her to give me a light, either," said Richard.

"One night I started rearranging all the groceries on the kitchen shelves," Richard said. "She's 5-foot-4 and I'm more than six feet. She got upset at me for rearranging HER kitchen. But I told her it was MY kitchen."

Then, three weeks into their three-month bet, Lyn returned to her wifely duties. Richard said she did it out of sympathy. But when she returned to her chores, it was with a brand new automatic dishwasher — a gift from Richard.

"I found out," he said, "that there are a lot of things I could do to make her work easier. Now I cook dinner sometimes and I take out all the trash and pick up the rooms and my clothes. Still, she does more than her fair share."

Lyn said that it seemed like a vacation for her.

Since she began working about a year ago, she has been trying to get more household things done on week-nights and has failed.

Both agreed the change was good for their three-year-old marriage.

"Men do not realize all that women do," Richard said. "It is the wife who puts out that clean towel you reach for when you have soap in your eyes."

Lyn, who said she is in no way a rabid Women's Libber, explained that men are afraid of losing their comforts at home if they liberate their women. "Women go along as they have been raised and they do certain things. But who is to mop the floors is something a

McGovern Challenges 'Peace Talk'

Nixon's Course Denounced

CHICAGO (AP) — Sen. George McGovern says President Nixon has betrayed the nation's hopes for a Vietnam settlement by pursuing a course that "is not a path to peace, but a detour around election day."

At the same time, McGovern said Nixon was perpetuating "the same old lies" about Democratic domestic proposals.

"We see now," said McGovern, "that when the President's most important adviser announced that peace had come, it was actually a deception designed to raise our hopes, before we went to vote on Tuesday."

McGovern's remarks came in a nationally televised address Friday night which was spurred by Nixon's own broadcast 22 hours earlier.

The senator said Friday on television that both Nixon and South Vietnam's President Nguyen Van Thieu had turned thumbs down on the plan advanced by Dr. Henry A. Kissinger. Instead of the major breakthrough publicly claimed by the President "there has been a fatal breakdown," he said.

McGovern said the Kissinger outline had "almost the same terms" offered by the communists four years ago and "embraced the same principles" that he, McGovern, has long advocated.

"But Mr. Nixon has closed the door to peace once again," said McGovern. "If he escapes his responsibility, do you think he will win the war after the election, once he is free of the will of the American people?"

"Now they play politics with our prisoners and our soldiers and life itself. It is they who treat our men like toy soldiers, to be knocked over by the hand that should protect them," he added.

In Three Cities Qualification Closed

Longwood's veteran city clerk of 14 years, Omie R. Shomate won re-election unopposed to another two-year term as the candidate qualifying period for the Dec. 5 municipal elections in three of the county's six cities closed Friday.

Earlier this week, first term Councilman Troy Island of Winter Springs also won re-election unopposed as no candidates qualified against him for the group 5 seat on the governing body there.

In Longwood, three candidates including the current council chairman, a member of the city's charter revision board and a former councilman qualified to seek the office of mayor. Incumbent Mayor Kenneth Brown is not running for re-election.

Eugene Jaques, who has served a total of six years on the Council, is running for the chief executive post as well as Donald Schreiner and former Councilman Sandra Thompson.

For the two seats on the City Council, five candidates have qualified. Running for the district 3 post are former councilman and current zoning Board Chairman B. H. Ferrell and Kenneth DeWitz, a member of the fire department.

Seeking the district 5 office are former Councilman B. L. Helms, Norma Jean Henington and former Council Chairman Percy White.

Casselberry, meanwhile, has 12 candidates for the remaining one year of the unexpired term of Mayor Curtis Blow, resigned, and three seats on the City Council.

Vying for the mayor's office are former Councilman Bill Grier, Zoning Board Chairman Cecil Harmon and Councilman Harry Sambrook.

Campaigning for the three seats on the Council currently held by Thomas Napier (resigned), Sambrook and John Leighty are: Greg Driggers, Thomas Embree, Louis Kirby, Richard Leigh, Leighty, James Miller, Joseph Sumara, Richard Wirz and John Yamnitz.

Winners will be determined by the three top vote-getters. There is no provision in the Casselberry Charter nor in the Longwood laws for the winner to carry a majority of the votes.

Suit By Glenn Turner Tossed Out Of Court

NEWARK, N.J. (AP)—A federal judge dismissed Glenn Turner's suit against a Newark superior court judge Friday when Turner's lawyer said the milk oil promoter was \$11,000 behind in payment of legal fees.

Turner sued Superior Court Judge Morris Pashman earlier this year after Pashman banned the Orlando businessman's Dare To Be Great motivational firm from the state.

Friday Richard J. Donohue told U.S. District Court Judge Lawrence A. Whipple he hadn't been paid about \$1,000 in legal fees and some \$3,000 in expenses.

Whipple immediately dismissed Turner's suit on those grounds and grounds the hearings had been adjourned several times already at Turner's request.

In addition, Whipple ordered stricken from the dismissed complaint an allegation that Pashman was involved in a conspiracy. Another attorney involved in the case said a clerk presumably will file out such references before the record of the dismissed case goes into federal court's permanent file.

Whipple also ruled that Donohue doesn't have to turn over any of his legal work to any counsel Turner may employ in the future.

Turner already has paid \$600,000 into a superior court fund which would be divided among the alleged victims of Dare To Be Great if Pashman's order is upheld in an appeal to the 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Philadelphia.

Civil actions have been initiated against Turner in at least 42 states. He faces additional criminal charges in Michigan later this month.

Petite Blonde Hauls Florida Fruit To NY

WINTER BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Sharon Steele, a petite blonde, says she has developed a healthy set of muscles hauling Florida fruit to market in New York behind the wheel of a 73-000-pound truck.

Miss Steele, 21, and her father, William, take 33 hours to drive their 1966 semi-rig from Florida's citrus belt along the East Coast to New York.

"I used to drive timidly in the heavy traffic of New Jersey and New York," Miss Steele said. "But my father told me I had to learn to drive aggressively like the rest of the folks in those Northern cities. So now I do."

Once in Virginia, Miss Steele said, she had a blow-out but "fortunately I was only doing 40 miles per hour so I was able to keep it under control."

In Philadelphia they were robbed once and another time two men jumped their rig and flung open the rear doors fleeing when Steele said, he jumped out of the cab with a gun in his hand.

Miss Steele said she first drove the truck when she was 13 years old and had to quickly take the wheel when her father became ill on a trip.

Fire Control District On Tuesday's Ballot

The possibility of creating a fifth fire control district in Seminole County is one of two local county questions on the ballot in Tuesday's election.

The question is to be voted upon only in precincts 14, 24, 31 and 39 for those areas outside the incorporated limits of Longwood, Casselberry and Altamonte Springs.

This area is currently served by the Fern Park Volunteer Fire Department. It is anticipated in the event the question is approved that the equipment presently used by the volunteers will be transferred to the district.

County Commission Chairman Greg Drummond said one mill taxation within the district would generate about \$68,000. He added he would oppose a levy higher than one mill for the fire district.

Fire district budgets are reviewed line by line by the County Commissioners before approval is given.

New Sign Ordinance Considered In City

For the first time political signs pleading for citizen votes for a certain political candidate will be legal in Sanford, if the new city sign ordinance, approved Thursday night by the Zoning and Planning Commission is accepted Nov. 13 by the city commission.

Until an ordinance is adopted officially by the commission, it appears it is not legal to post political signs within the city confines, since there is no mention of such advertising in the present sign ordinance.

Albeit, the city has not tried to enforce a prohibition of political pandering, but has laid down certain "guidelines" in the past few years aimed at controlling the size and locations of the installations.

At first there was a brief effort to prevent any sign placing, but under threat of long court actions involving many prominent citizens as well as politicians, who realized the need for advertising in the election, the city turned its back and allowed the "sign cities" to be created hither and yon.

When legalized, the signs will still be restricted in placement and size, but some controls must be expected to prevent the sidewalks, poles and lawns from blossoming into gardens of paper, paint and weed.

A limit of nine square feet per sign in each premise involving residential zones and 32 square feet for a commercial or industrial zone. These signs must be confined within private property and not be less than 30 feet from the curbline of any street intersection.

Political signs may be displayed 30 days prior to seven days following an election for which it is intended. A temporary sign permit must be acquired from the zoning board

Three Bandits Die; Two More Fought

LAKE WALES, Fla. (AP)—A supermarket manager sneaked a quick telephone call to police Friday night and foiled a robbery attempt which resulted in the shooting deaths of three bandits and capture of two others.

Witnesses said the five robbers entered the Public Supermarket singularly and fanned out. Police said the men yanked out two of the three telephone lines inside the supermarket and then drew guns, but didn't get to manager Bill Saunders in time to prevent him from calling the Lake Wales police station a half mile away.

"The manager got off a call to us before the robbers entered the cashier's cubicle," Polk County Sheriff Lt. Larry Fuchs said.

Witnesses said Saunders received several blows to the head as the robbers took \$1,916 from the cash registers, but several customers held hostage during the holdup were uninjured.

Just minutes after Saunders' 7:22 p.m. call, 12 Lake Wales policemen and sheriff's deputies converged on the store. Their arrival coincided with the robbers' exit.

"They came out shooting and we returned the fire," Sheriff's Capt. Ray Willis said.

Reporter Finds Equipment In Deplorable Condition Student Progress 'Unlikely' At Crooms

Quality education... in excellent conditions... terms equaled again and again. Not so at Crooms High School, where deplorable conditions exist.

We visited the classroom of Miss Adrienne Epstein, who teaches English, French and Spanish, and who labors in an understatement, under conditions in which we find it a miracle that students progress. It can only be due to her interest in the students, and in talking with her on educational concepts, we found her to be one of the vital, progressive teachers in the county, who will literally "go out on a limb" to expose adverse conditions regardless of possible reprisals for the welfare of her students.

Desks in the class were formerly used as a lab, and she has requested since the lab desks are no longer operable, due to an apparent electronic problem, never repaired, they be removed and replaced by conventional desks. The request has not been acceded. She explained it is difficult for students to write on the present desks, which consist of various equipment.

The desks are antiquated, and one collapsed this week while occupied by a student. It is also virtually impossible to close the door in her classroom since the casing is almost entirely broken loose. Compounding the situation is the fact that although the public address system was inoperable for many weeks and students did not salute the flag, (until the Herald pressed the issue and two days after an article appeared the system was repaired.) Miss Epstein's class saluted the "flag."

FLAG MISSING

The only "flag" available was a map of the world, with the U.S. designated. A student finally brought a miniature flag, similar to that used on auto antennas, and the class presently pledges allegiance to them.

TYPEWRITER SHORTAGE

In one typing class, a shortage of typewriters existed until approximately three weeks ago. Students took turns, and

those not having a typewriter of course were bored. And herein lies the problem.

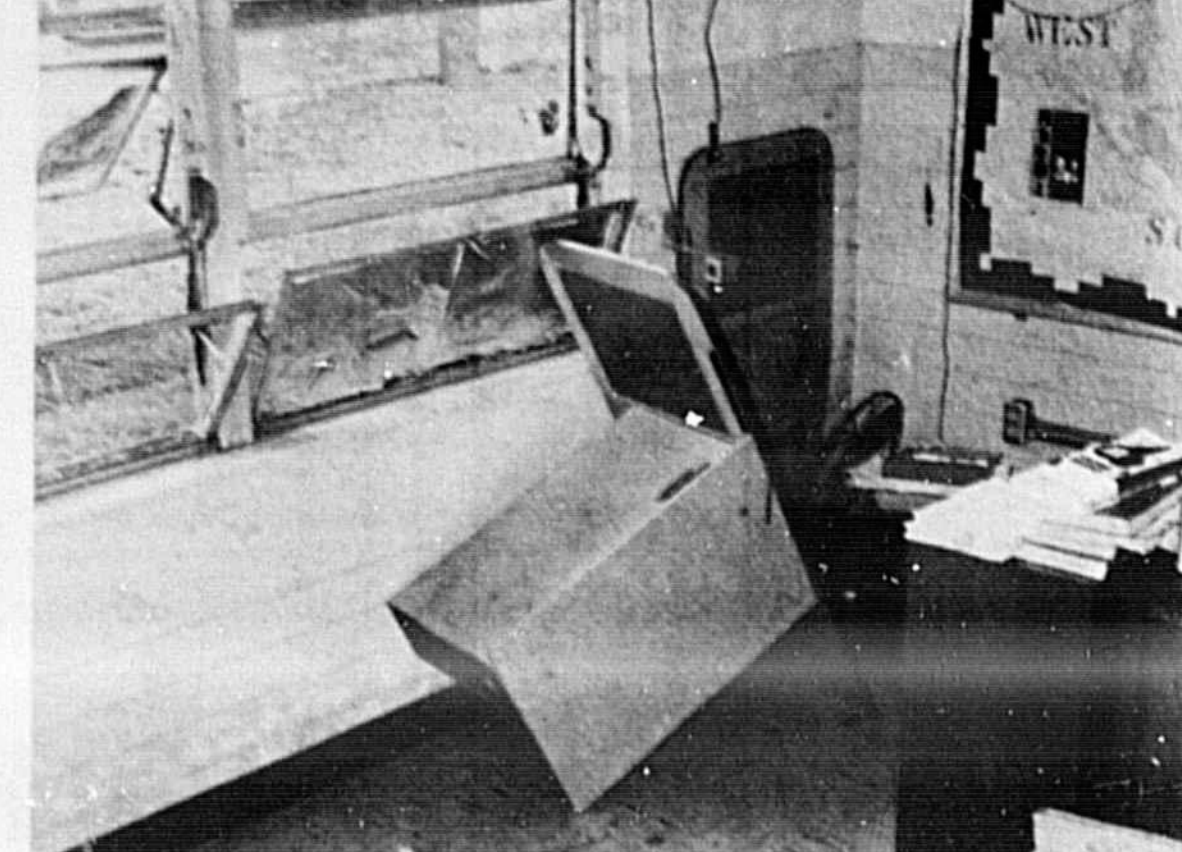
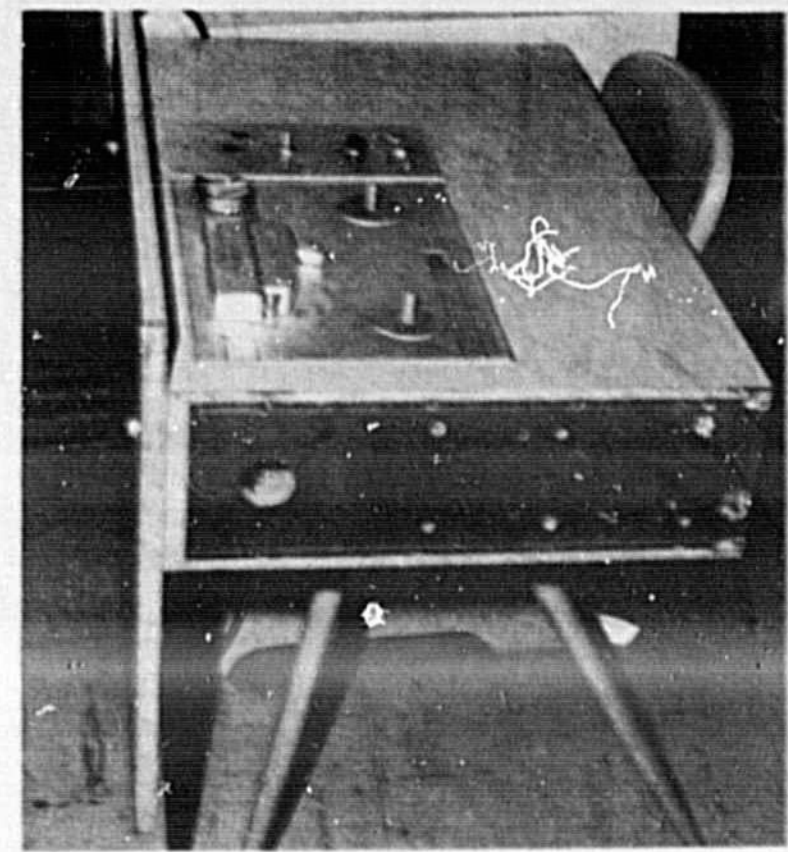
We asked Principal Edward Blackheare the situation regarding the typewriters and he replied so many students wished to take the course it necessitated two classes, (considering a delay of almost four weeks after the beginning

of school it would seem the company is located in outer Mongolia.)

The same situation exists in the Home Ec class relative to the sewing machines. Not a single one for each girl, they must work in teams on alternate days.

And the answer to "why" to all this is the proverbial, "the taxpayers won't vote enough money to adequately fund the schools.

Where in the world is the money we have funded through bond issues? New construction of course, but why, oh, why, do the older schools have to be treated like "red-headed step children?"

Sanford Charter May Be In Court

Amidst warnings from Commissioner Julian Stenstrom that the city is subjecting itself to the possibility of litigation at any time in the future, the City Commission at a special meeting Friday night approved its proposed new charter for publication.

With the deadline to begin advertising on the lengthy document Thursday, the Commissioners on a four-to-one vote decided to reverse procedures and start publication before the charter is adopted in ordinance form on Nov. 12.

Stenstrom cast the only negative vote with warnings of "trouble" in the future. The charter question will be voted on by the people at the Dec. 5 municipal election.

City Attorney William Hutchison gave the opinion that normally adoption of the ordinance would take place before the advertising once weekly for four consecutive weeks. But, 85% of the state law is 92-24, the order of procedure, it could be reversed in order, he said.

Commissioner Gordon Meyer, expressing concern about the decision at hand, questioned strongly why the ordinance adoption and advertising deadlines were not brought to the commission's attention earlier.

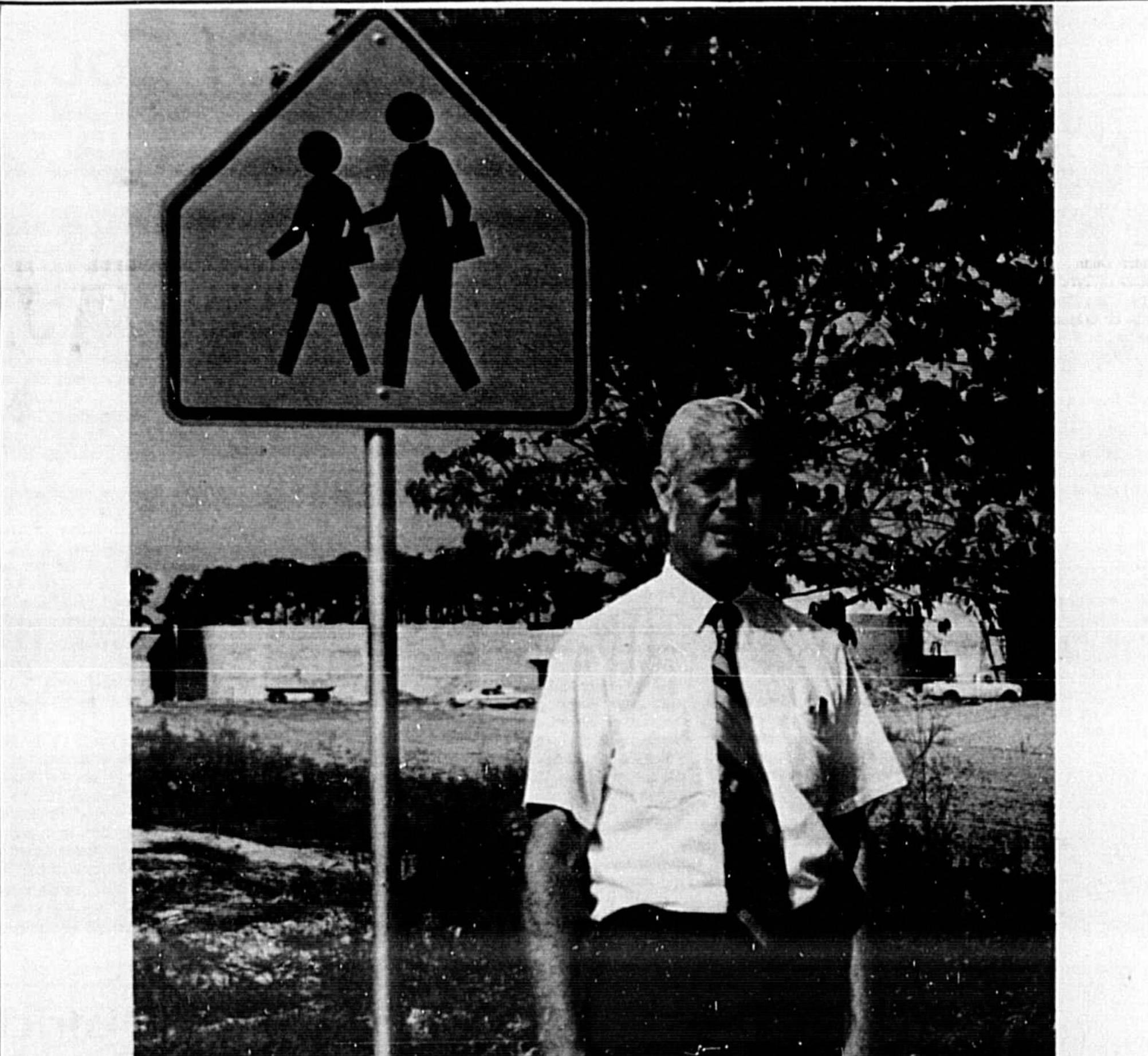
Hutchison facetiously placed the blame on the city's "stupid attorney" and then expanded

on his remark by pointing out the document in hand for 12 months before taking action and only approved it in content early this week. "A city attorney like a city manager sometimes needs direction," the attorney said.

The problem with adoption of an ordinance, he noted, is that the current city charter only permits adoption of laws at a regular meeting of the board and the next is not scheduled until a week from Monday.

Mayor Lee P. Moore relayed City Manager W. E. Knowles' feelings that the charter adoption should be a "clean" one in that there should be no question about its legality. Stenstrom echoed the manager's statement.

Donna's Deliberations

"The Peace Corps has been changed to the point where it is safe for Spiro (Agnew, the vice president) to go abroad without fear of being ambushed by young volunteers from the best colleges in the nation."

So declared Jack Vaughn, regional director for Latin America of the Corps in the Kennedy administration before he replaced R. Sargent Shriver as national director during the Johnson administration. Vaughn became ambassador to Columbia during the early part of the Nixon administration before resigning to run the presidential campaign of Sen. Fred Harris of Oklahoma.

Two things changed when he left the Peace Corps, Vaughn said. The membership changed from 11,000 to 12,000 and the emphasis was changed from youthful volunteers to those persons over 30, in most cases who were married, and were craftsmen such as plumbers, and electricians.

The former director said the government found the persons in their 30's were not as vociferous as the young people. "I am sure the world does have a need for plumbers and electricians but I am not sure plumbers, electricians and peace are related," he said. "The name of the game was better communications among people of the world and I am not sure the Peace Corps is accomplishing this goal now."

Talking a little nostalgically at times, but not with bitterness, he insisted, Vaughn said he used to travel 250,000 miles a year around the world and the impact of the Peace Corps and the young volunteers was "astounding."

"Maybe it was a thing of the moment. Perhaps it was like the swallows to Capistrano," he said. "But the young people really believed, as Bobby Kennedy said, that one man could make a difference, that one man could change the world. It was a great thing while it lasted."

Turning his attention to VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America), Vaughn said that movement now has 4,000 members when it should have 140,000 because the need is so great. He continued that both JFK and LBJ made it easy for young people to volunteer. The volunteers were taught the language of the area to which they were being sent, given free medical care and a small stipend to live on. This is no longer the case, he said.

The former ambassador lobbied for some time for a bill to allow income tax credit for up to 500 hours volunteer work at the minimum wage plus transportation and lunch expenses for those persons willing to give of their time to help their fellow man. "The bill did not get out of committee," he said.

How was the youth concept of the Peace Corps allowed to die? Vaughn was asked. "By electing Richard Nixon as president and that is not just New Frontier bias," Vaughn insisted, identifying himself as a Republican.

Si, Si, Sesame Street

He is moving to New York City where he will be working at Number 1 Lincoln Plaza in the home Television Children's Workshop, which will be preparing programs for the Latin American countries. Vaughn said 85 per cent of the people of Latin America have an eighth grade or less education and 50 per cent have a second grade or less education.

"There is no way for an illiterate person to be a good, active, and involved citizen," he declared. He added that programs such as Sesame Street would have a tremendous impact educationally in the countries where it would be beamed by local television. Despite the poverty of the people, many have television sets, he said.

Speaking of the ineffectiveness of the United Nations, which refused to or was not willing to, get involved in Bangladesh and Northern Ireland, Vaughn said by the United

States government sending George Bush as its representative to the world body it was downgrading the post. "Bush may be a great guy, but the administration by naming him ambassador was saying we don't hinge all that much hope on that organization," he said.

"The games many plan in the United Nations have little to do with peace," Vaughn added.

Speaking of his own political philosophy, the former ambassador said he is personally lobbying for a second vice president of the nation — one for domestic affairs and one for foreign affairs. He criticized the fact that the president's aide, Henry Kissinger, is in effect being used as a second State Department with a staff of several hundred. He also opined that the Department of Health, Education and Welfare should be split into three separate and distinct departments of government, all of equal importance with other cabinet offices.

Supreme Court To Decide

Pentagon Papers Trial Is Delayed

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Resumption of the Pentagon Papers trial of Daniel Ellsberg and Anthony Russo could be delayed until next spring if the U.S. Supreme Court decides to hear arguments in a wiretap issue that has stalled the case.

Should the high court reject the Ellsberg-Russo request for a hearing, however, the trial could resume within a few weeks.

Ellsberg, 41, and Russo, 35, both former Rand Corp. researchers, are charged with espionage, conspiracy and theft in connection with the leak to news media of top-secret papers detailing origins of U.S. involvement in Vietnam.

The defendants and their attorneys have scattered across the country since the trial recessed Aug. 9 and the 12 jurors and 6 alternates have been waiting since then for the call to return to court.

Ellsberg and Russo are the first persons ever charged with espionage for giving secrets to newspapers in their own country. Attorneys have seen their trial as a test of espionage laws as well as a test of constitutional rights to freedom of

speech and press.

The trial which began last July, was halted in August just after the jury was sworn in. At that point the government revealed secretly to the judge that

it had overheard the conversation of a defense team member during a wiretap of someone else's phone.

Defense attorneys demanded to know who and what was

overheard but the government refused to disclose the information. The judge said the government didn't have to tell, and the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals agreed. The defense then ap-

pealed to the Supreme Court. U.S. Justice William O. Douglas granted a stay of trial so the high court could decide if it wanted to get involved.

During the trial recess Ells-

berg and Russo have been traveling the country campaigning against President Nixon's re-election and pushing for a quick end to the Vietnam war.

Voter Says Paralysis No Excuse

FAIRFIELD, Conn. (AP) — Don't give Bill Clarke an excuse for not voting.

He's paralyzed from the neck down as the result of an auto accident, but he has already voted by absentee ballot.

What's more, he's working to get others to cast their votes.

William B. Clarke III suffered a broken neck in June 1968 and can move only his head.

On Wednesday, at age 24, he marked the one-year anniversary of his release from the hospital by answering calls at his home to a special telephone of the Committee to Re-Elect the President.

"It's been very interesting, but it's a lot for me to do," he said.

Answering a phone for Clarke is a job in itself. He must lift a plastic wand lying near his head by clenching it in his mouth. He uses the wand to press down a wooden lever that opens the phone circuit, permitting him to speak into a microphone near his bed.

Another switch signals the operator, who dials outgoing calls for him. The line also can be answered at a GOP mobile headquarters when it is manned.
