Accident Victims Still 'Critical'

\$\$ Sought For Dallabridas

Seminole High School Principal Don Reynolds, today organized students to collect funds to assist the Albert Dallabrida family of Sanford. The Miller family of Sanford is paying hospital and burial bills for members of the family who were injured or killed in a truck-van accident Friday night.

Sanford, were fighting for their lives today in critical condition at Orange Memorial Hospital in Orlando with injuries suffered Friday night in a truck-van collision on U.S. 17-92 in Sanford.

Betty Dallabrida, 51, and Richard Dallabrida, 14, remain on life support machines suffering from "multiple trauma" and broken bones and head injuries, according to Nursing Coordinator Ann Bradner.

Bobby Dallabrida, 15, and his sister, Robin, 16, died Friday and Saturday, respectively, when the van the family was riding in was struck broadside by a 28-foot truck on U.S. 17-92 just north of Airport Boulevard near the Burger King Restaurant. Both were students at Seminole High School.

Albert Jr., under went surgery Sunday for his injuries which included a broken leg. He said he doesn't remember the accident until he woke up in the hospital. "I don't remember anything until I woke up here," Albert Jr. said.

He said the family had spent several hours at the Moore Lodge, 2660 S. Palmetto Ave., before they went to pick up Frank Dallabrida at his job at Cumberland Farms at Sanford Avenue and Airport Road. The family, with Albert Sr. driving in the front with his wife and the Miller boy, was headed for Burger King restaurant to see DALLABRIDAS, Page 2A

Literacy Tests: To The Court?

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Lawyers, school officials and legislators say that Florida's literacy tests, given for the first time this month as a prerequisite for graduation, will ultimately end up in the courts.

The tests were given to 130,000 11th-graders in recent weeks. The results are not back, but those who fail will get two more chances.

Charles W. Cherry of Daytona Beach, president of the Florida NAACP, says he expects a disproportionately large number of minority students to fail in much larger numbers than most whites.

State officials agree. They, too, expect blacks, migrants and Spanish-speaking pupils to fail in much larger numbers than most whites.

Education Commissioner Ralph Turington insists that the tests underwent rigorous examination to filter out racial and cultural bias. He and other officials are confident that it — and the basic skills tests given to third, fifth, eighth and 11th graders — can withstand any court challenges.

Rep. Bill Sadovnik, D-Miami, notes that a desegregation case for the Detroit schools recently led the Supreme Court to affirm a judge's right to order major remedial programs to erase the vestiges of past discrimination. That decision, he says, could lead to litigation aimed at expanded remedial training in Florida.

Even some school officials agree with that objection. They say lawmakers should have given students more notice.

"Two or three years' notice seems inadequate for a test which measures 12 years of cumulative learning; such notice may constitute a due-process violation," McClung says.

"If we start with the 11th graders, it's automatic that we're going to penalize some kids," says C. Don Stager, an official of Pinellas County schools. "It seems to me that it might be more appropriate to start back with the third and fifth graders."

Going hand-in-hand with the new tests is the compensatory education program that lawmakers funded this year with \$10 million and promised to expand to \$25 million next year.

Historian Plans Meeting

'Did Hitler Have A Son?'

BONN, West Germany (UPI) — Werner Maser, a German historian who claims he has discovered a son of Adolf Hitler, said today he has arranged a meeting with him somewhere in France.

Reached by telephone at his home in the Rhineland town of Speyer, Maser said he was leaving for France today to see again the illegitimate son he maintains was fathered by Hitler — then a soldier in World War I — in occupied France.

He said the meeting would take place today but did not say where.

The Sunday Times of London, which first publicized Maser's claim, said the "son," Jean Lorret, lives "somewhere near the German border in northern France." The West German newspaper Bild Zeitung said he lives in the town of St. Quentin. The Paris newspaper L'Aurore said he lives in the town of Warrin.

Maser's claim that Hitler had a son no one knew about was greeted with interest but some skepticism in Germany.

"Did Hitler Have A Son?" asked the Essen newspaper Neue Ruhr Zeitung on its front page.

"I Am Hitler's Son," bannerlined the Bild Zeitung, the newspaper with the biggest circulation in West Germany.

"Adolf Hitler was my father," Bild quoted Lorret, a 39-year-old Frenchman, as saying.

Maser, a historian who specializes in the Nazi era, put forth his theory Sunday in London's Sunday Times.

He said Hitler met Mlle. Lorret when he was a corporal in a Bavarian infantry regiment, and the son was given his mother's name and brought up by his French grandparents.

SCA Boss: I've Given Commission What It Asked, Plus

Human Services Director Troy Todd said commissioners need to see a breakdown of how much county money would be used in administering each of SCA's programs. The Rev. Jones said today he had supplied the requested information to both commissioners in writing before the budget was adopted.

"I contacted Kirchhoff when I became aware he wanted the information. I met with him. He mentioned he wanted a breakdown of the percentages of our staff time devoted to each program component. I did that. I submitted it in writing to Kirchhoff and French during the budget process several weeks before the final review of the SCA budget," the Rev. Jones said.

"When I talked with commissioners, they didn't even raise the questions Mr. Todd brought out at last Wednesday's meeting," the SCA executive director continued.

Todd's questions at the meeting involved detail in SCA reports showing program effectiveness, whether the SCA board of directors had the proper number of members, personnel costs of SCA and whether written management control procedures of the anti-poverty agency were sufficiently detailed.

Why have county commissioners and staffers been critical of SCA? The Rev. Jones said, "For the last couple of years, individual commissioners have said supporting social programs should not be the role of local government." Commission Chairman Dick Williams said in a recent television interview he would support less public support of the programs next year. The first time I talked with Todd, reduced funding was on his lips."

Commissioners are focusing on SCA, the Rev. Jones said, "simply because SCA has been in existence longer than most agencies providing social programs in the county. It's perhaps the largest and it's the most publicized."

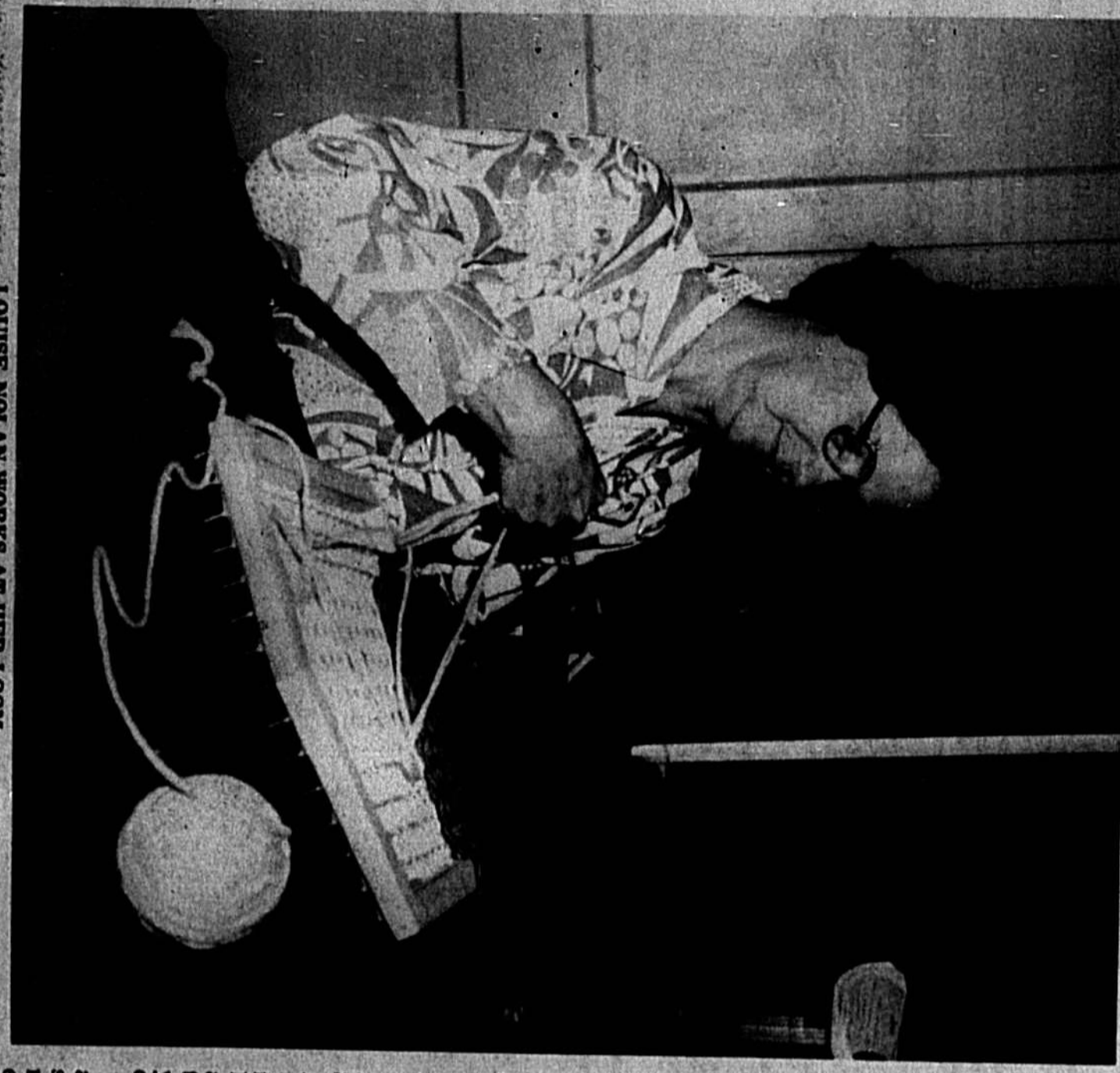
Verla Butler, an Altamonte Springs Club member, said, "You get so many ideas from other clubs. I always use the recipes we share with each other."

87 Black Guerrillas Reported Killed In 2 Border Battles

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — The South African and Rhodesian governments reported killing 87 black guerrillas in two border battles. The South African government said its army killed 61 guerrillas and lost five of its own soldiers in a 36-hour battle last week along the border between South-West Africa and Angola.

ISRAEL: Labor Strikes Follow Regime Plan To Raise Prices, Taxes

TEL AVIV, Israel (UPI) — The Histadrut, Israel's labor federation, today launched a nationwide campaign of strikes and demonstrations to protest the government's new economic reform package that sharply raised prices and taxes.

A walkout by maintenance workers crippled operations at Ben Gurion Airport and grounded the national airline El Al. At Ashdod, the nation's second largest port, workers walked off their job in a 24-hour protest.

The Histadrut — the Israeli equivalent of the AFL-CIO and run by the opposition Labor party — marshaled the walkouts and a series of protests throughout Israel but called off for the moment from calling a general strike.

Mutual Hostages: Answer To Arms Race?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Should the United States swap about a million Americans for an equal number of Russians, with each group serving as hostages to the other's cities?

The ad was placed by a Pennsylvania political science professor working temporarily at the Pentagon. Dr. Martin E. Goldstein, who holds the temporary title of assistant to the deputy director for negotiations and arms control, said he drafted the appeal in an effort to generate "a fresh source of ideas" on ways to stop the spread of nuclear weapons.

"I asked myself how it would be possible to reach people who have been thinking of this problem but who don't know how to make their views known," said Goldstein, a 37-year-old assistant professor at Widener College in Chester, Pa., now at the Pentagon on a fellowship.

The Travelers Insurance Co. seeks punitive damages from attorney James Davis II and osteopath Mory Fox, who are appealing their convictions on 104 counts of insurance fraud. They face eight-year prison terms and fines totaling \$57,000.

Gout A Defect In Cell Tissue

DEAR DR. LAMB— Each year at this time I get the gout in my toes and my Achilles heel and ankle. I am taking Colbenemid tablets which don't seem to be very effective. I take a vitamin pill daily and also 100 units of vitamin E. I am on a low cholesterol diet and am wondering if it has any effect on my gout. What causes the gout? Is there any value in taking vitamin E for it as that seems very controversial today?
DEAR READER— Gout is caused by an overproduction of uric acid by your own body cells. It is really a defect in the way your cells function. Medicines are designed to relieve the acute attack, to help the body flush out excess uric acid by your own cells. I am sending you The Health Letter number 24, Gout, Uric Acid, to give you much more information on what gout is and what to do about it. Others who want this information can send 50 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it to me in care of this newspaper, P.O. Box 1851, Radio City Station, New York, N.Y. 10019. No vitamin E will not help. It has no effect on how your body produces uric acid. This is a good example of why I get annoyed with outlandish claims advertising vitamin E. It prevents people from getting the medical care they need while wasting money on something that will not help them.

The low cholesterol diet is done by different techniques and may be normal even when they are 240 to 250. If you have both high blood pressure and a high cholesterol you certainly should do something about both. Weight control is extremely important and of course if you smoke you should stop at once.
