'Did Hitler Have A Son?'

BONN, West Germany (UPI) - Werner Maser, a German historian who claims he has discovered a son of Adolf Hitler, said today he has arranged a meeting with

him somewhere in France. Reached by telephone at his home in the Rhineland town of Speyer, Maser said he was leaving for France today to see again the illegitimate son he maintains was fathered

by Hitler - then a soldier in World War I - in occupied He said the meeting would take place today but did not say where.

The Sunday Times of London, which first publicized Maser's claim, said the "son," Jean Lorret, lives "somewhere near the German border in northern France." The West German newspaper Bild Zeitung said he lives in the town of St. Quentin. The Paris newpaper

L'Aurore said he lives in the town of Wavrin. Maser's claim that Hitler had a son no one knew about was greeted with interest but some skepticism in Ger-

"Did Hitler Have A Son?" asked the Essen newspaper Neue Ruhr Zeitung on its front page.
"I Am Hitler's Son," bannerlined the Bild Zeitung, the

newspaper with the biggest circulation in West Germany.
"Adolf Hitler was my father," Bild quoted Lorret, a 59year-old Frenchmen, as saying.

SCA Boss: I've Given Commission What It Asked, Plus

The Rev. Amos Jones, executive director of Seminole Com-munity Action (SCA), said this morning: "I have provided much more information than was requested on SCA programs by the Seminole County Commissioners."

Commissioners, who are considering a county takeover of the rivate, non-prolit, anti-poverty agency, will discuss Tuesday a county staff recommendation the county not do it this year. "I have provided much more information than was requested d encouraged individual commissioners to look at our lions...to come personally. Most of them have."

Human Services Director Troy Todd that commissioners not consider this year a county takeover of the 11-year-old poverty-fighting agency. Todd also recommends the commission release \$23,000 to SCA. Todd's recommendation came at the conclusion of last Wednesday's meeting between county and SCA staffers.

During commissioners' budget discussions, the possibility of a county takeover was suggested by Commissioner Bill Kirchhoff, who said Orange County had undergone such a change and that a county takeover might result in more efficient spending of county

Kirchhoff and fellow commissioner Bob French said they wanted to see a breakdown of how much county money would be used in administering each of SCA's programs. The Rev. Jones said today he had supplied the requested information to both commissioners in writing before the budget was adopted.

Ozone Danger From Aerosol

Must Be Labeled Today

WASHINGTON (UPI) - As of today most food, drugs or cosmetics packaged in aerosol spray cans powered by fluorocarbon gas must have a label warning that the gas could be harmful to the upper atmosphere.

But consumers may not notice much difference. The industry already has largely switched from fluorocarbons to other gases. The required warning comes after years of controversy over whether the gas can erode

the ozone layer and allow more ultraviolet rays from the sun to filter through, increasing the risk of skin cancer.

\$3,000 Average To Keep Car

DETROIT (UPI) - The average owner of a typical 1977-model car spent 7 percent more or at least \$3,007 - to keep the car on the road for one year, according to Hertz Corp's annual auto expense survey.

The estimate by the nationwide auto rental agency is based on what Hertz called the typical American car — a normally equipped, mid-sized, two-door sedan driven 10,000 miles a year and kept for three years.

The firm said 1977 costs averaged 30:1 cents a mile, compared with 28.1 cents a mile - or \$2,810 — per year in 1976. Car expenses have risen nearly 50 per cent since the Arab oil embargo in 1973 when car costs averaged \$2,020 a year, Hertz said.

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) -The South African and Rhodesian governments reported killing 87 black guerrillas in two border battles. The South African government said its army killed 61 guerrillas and lost five of its own soldiers in a 36-hour battle last week along the border between South-West Africa and Angola.

LONDON (UPI) - Britain decided today to et the value of the pound move upward and it nmediately jumped more than 5 cents gainst the dollar to its highest level in more than a year and a half.

A treasury statement said the Bank of England's policy of intervening in the market o keep the pound's price down "is to be adsted." This was interpreted as a virtual 5 ercent upward revaluation of sterling.

Private Courts Quicker Justice?

A New York attorney, Carl E. Person, proposed the idea of private courts to deliver faster and less costly justice in disputes. Lawyers, judges and laymen attending a meeting of the Colorado Bar Association heard Person's ideas at a recent

Citizens could bypass overloaded state courts and take their disputes to private courts with judges of their own choice, the legal reformer told people at the conference.

Person contended that civil lawsuits of every kind could be stripped to their essentials and resolved quickly if the parties were allowed to choose a lawyer as arbiter, and agreed his decision would be final.

"Legal complaints could be simplified, pretrial discovery and delaying tactics could be curtailed and, by prior agreement, appeal courts would not be involved. Those wanting speedy justice could get it," Person said.

We think this gentleman has a good idea, albeit it may not get much advocacy by the legal profession in some quarters.

Denver Judge Raymond D. Jones endorsed the private court concept and said it would help temper unrealistic expectations about what courts can offer.

"Such expectations are rarely in arbitration because the parties have participated in the selection of an arbiter and they know they may both gain and lose in whatever compromise he orders," the judge said.

There has been a growing trend in arbitration in the nation. Many contracts stipulate such in case there is a future dispute. One method is to have a clause in the contract which allows each party to select one arbiter to select one other person as a

The idea of private courts is not new. It has been practiced with success for generations in many parts of the world and has taken many forms but all rely on the prior consent concept to make the

With present-day congestion in the courts, costly lelays are the rule rather than the exception. Many delays are instigated only to gain an advantage b wearing down limited financial resources with the hope of forcing a settlement. Such delays, become a poor example of justice.

Many times litigants find, by the time of setdement, that only the legal profession has gained anything through lengthy and delayed trial

Why not a place in the marketplace for a private enterprise method of resolving differences by arbitration? It might be a real winner in bringing justice out of chaos.
