Vandal drives over Christmas display in WS

WINTER SPRINGS — The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is looking for a Christmas display vandal who caused nearly \$500 worth of damage to a home near Winter Springs.

Early Thursday morning, at about 3:19 a.m. at 1201 Clinging Vine Place, a home security video captured the suspect running over a candy cane display, but missing the nativity scene.

The driver of a light-colored coupe is seen driving down the road, then turning into the victim's yard, then leaving the scene. The camera video cuts to another shot, just as the vandalism takes place, a press release said.

"Occupants in a Dodge Caravan may have witnessed the crime," the release said.

The owner of the home, Mike Ghali, said the damage was nearly \$500, with the loss including broken Santa displays and damaged candy canes.

According to an incident report filled out by Deputy Nathan Wilkerson, there were tire tracks through Ghali's grass and multiple decorations broken and laying all over the yard. The decorations included the candy canes and Saints, but also snowmen, Christmas trees and light strands.

On Ghali's video surveillance system, it shows the suspect vehicle driving in front of his home several times prior to causing the damage.

"There is no doubt of the intent of the perpetrator," Wilkerson wrote, "as the vehicle had to successfully negotiate a parked vehicle and tree which were in close proximity to one another."

Lawsuit claims wrongful arrest

SANFORD — The city of Sanford was served with a lawsuit last week after a man accused two Sanford Police Officers of wrongful arrest after he was apprehended in a drive through bank carrying a concealed weapon and drugs.

The suit was filed in November with the U.S. District Court and served to the city on Dec. 15.

The suit names Officers Lonnie

Taylor and Steven Vazquez, as well as the city, Police Chief Brian Tooley and other police superiors.

Lucious C. Conway of Altamonte Springs was arrested March 16, 2004, in the Orlando Drive Bank of America drive through lanes. He claims in the lawsuit that the officers had no probable cause to arrest him.

He is seeking compensatory damages in the amount of \$500,000 and punitive damages in the amount of \$100,000, plus court costs.

The officers said in an attached dep-

osition to the lawsuit that Conway was apprehended and arrested based on an incident that happened the day before.

Bank tellers called the Sanford Police on March 15, 2004, to report a man inside the bank with a gun in his waistband.

The Sanford Police Department arrest report states that Taylor responded to bank that day in reference to Conway carrying a gun on his side, and a capias was taken and turned in on Conway.

They called again the next day to say

that Conway was "back in drive thru...trying to cash another check," according to the suit.

After officers received the call that Conway was back at the bank, they initiated a felony stop on him and found a concealed weapon, crack cocaine and a crack pipe.

Conway was apprehended, imprisoned and strip-searched, but on Feb. 28, and Aug. 5, 2005, charges were dismissed when the court found no prob-

Men face murder charge in stabbing

SANFORD — Two men were arrested on Dec. 20 for the death of Robert Kearney, who was found dead in the breezeway of Pineaire Apartments last week-end.

At about 7:50 p.m., Investigator Chris Serino of the Sanford Police Department arrested Gustavo Lopez, 48, and Henry Ramirez, 28, both of 1120 Florida Ave.

Lopez and Ramirez were charged with first degree murder

in the death of Kearney, according to a police department news release.

Kearney's body was found on Dec. 17, at about 6:15 a.m., outside of apartment No. 207 of Pineaire Apartments.

"There was obvious trauma to his body," spokeswoman Cleo Cohen said last week.

According to the news release, investigators obtained information that Kearney went to Lopez and Ramirez's to look for his girlfriend. He allegedly broke the outside light cover and left the area. He returned a short time later, Cohen said, and broke a window to the apartment and then attempted to leave the area again.

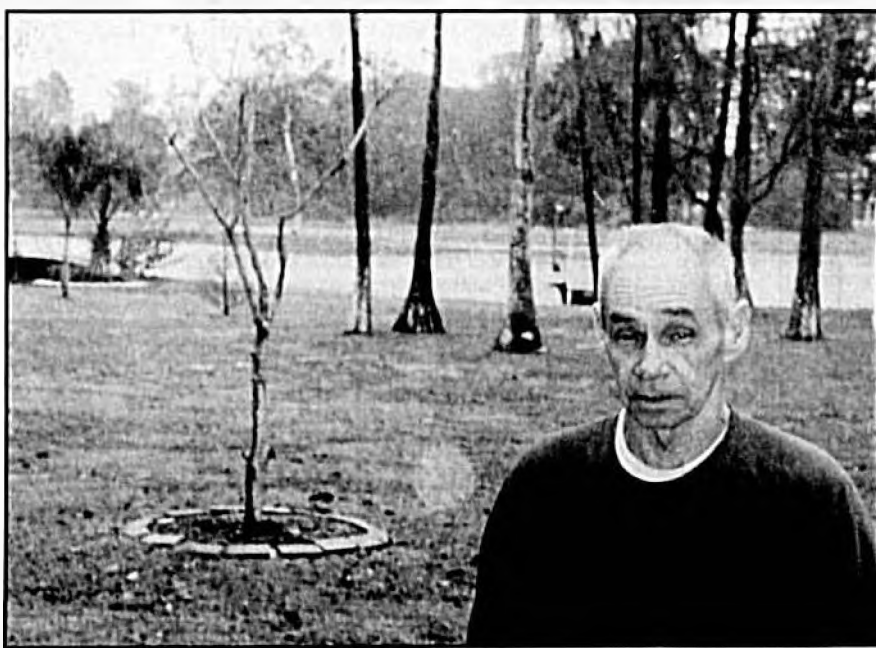
The suspects allegedly left their apartment armed with a baseball bat and a knife looking for Kearney. When they found him Ramirez reportedly struck

Residents fight to keep family of lakes pristine

CASSELBERRY — Roy and Bobbie DePew worry about what the new year will bring to their beloved Lake Yvonne and the four other Quintuplet Lakes in Casselberry.

The five small, but pristine bodies of water are surrounded by quiet neighborhoods just south of Seminola Boulevard. The city of Casselberry has tried to involve residents in what it calls the Seminola Boulevard East Small Area Study.

"With the growth that's coming, that's why I'm concerned," said Bobby. "The people that live on these lakes, they're kind to the lakes."

A few years back when low rainfall drained much of the water from the lakes, residents decided to clean up the exposed

area while they had a chance. They only recovered one small bag of trash from the five lakes, Bobby explained.

The DePews are worried what the study might allow along Seminola Boulevard and who might have access to the lakes.

Right now the only businesses adjacent to the lakes are a chiropractor's office and a new Mobil gas station and convenience store.

The gas station concerns residents the most, especially since an earlier one across the street contaminated the ground. The Mobil station backs right up to one of the lakes loaded with healthy lily pads.

Roy piloted his jon boat recently through a small passage into the lily covered lake. Fish jump right out of the water

Chamber loses CEO Gordon

SANFORD — The president and CEO of the Sanford-Seminole Chamber of Commerce resigned Thursday, about a week after the elections of new executive board members.

Mixed emotions surround the Dec. 22 resignation of Angelia Gordon from the Sanford-Seminole Chamber of Commerce.

In a phone interview Gordon said resigning was a major decision, and one she's been putting off for about a year.

When Gordon came to the Chamber she thought she would be working less than she had been, she said. It turned out she worked more than she ever had owning her own business, she continued.

Gordon said her main reason for resigning was to spend time more time with her daughter and other family members. She said her sister has cancer and she'd like to have the time to visit her often in Tampa. Another reason she said was to take care

Culinary twist on holiday drink

SANFORD — Nikki Norman of Winter Park has turned her culinary hobby into hundreds of awards, including the most recent for a new holiday drink made with pomegranate syrup.

Torani Italian syrup sponsored the Holiday Drink Makeover Contest, and Norman, who has a Casselberry mailing address, went to work producing a drink on the cutting edge.

"I really somewhat strategize," she said while driving south from her summer home in Tennessee. The contest called for a new twist for a holiday drink using one of the Torani syrups.

"I wanted something festive and something appropriate to the holiday season in color," she said.

To her, holiday drinks mean something warm, so she settled on the idea of mulling spices.

"There is no flavor more chic right now in the culinary world than pomegranate," she said. "We all like spices at holiday time, so I thought of a take off on the old fashioned ice tea, using mulling spices." She decided to add red wine to the final recipe called Mulled Pomegranate Warmer. The recipe was selected from 595 entries by a team of beverage experts, according to the Torani Web site, www.torani.com.

Norman, traveling with her husband L.C., won a catered cocktail party for 20 from Torani. Norman wants to hold the party around Valentine's Day, when a warm mulled drink would still be appropriate, she said.

Norman said she currently has 27 more recipes out in a variety of contests. She said she doesn't take part in the big-money contests such as Betty Crocker. She prefers to work from scratch without using prepackaged food in cans and boxes, she explained.

The prizes Norman garners are often given to charitable organizations.

"I'm very gourmet," Norman said. "I study the culinary arts constantly. I will not open a box or can and pray that it's edible."

She has always enjoyed cooking.

"At age 4, I remember wanting to learn to read so I could read cookbooks," Norman recalled. She entered her first county fair at 14 and won six blue ribbons. Her

Mulled Pomegranate Warmer

- 4 lemons, sliced
- 2 oranges, sliced
- 1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg
- 12 whole cloves
- 4 cinnamon sticks
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 1/4 cups water
- 1 cup Torani Pomegranate syrup (or Torani Raspberry syrup)
- 2 bottles red wine

Restaurant robbed at gunpoint

LONGWOOD — The Seminole County Sheriff's Office released a photo taken from an in-store video of an armed robbery at a Subway restaurant Sunday night, Dec. 18 at 2632 State Road 434, Suite 116, at Montgomery Road.

The suspect is identified as a black male, in his early 20s. He entered the store about 6:40 p.m. Sunday, pointed a silver handgun at an employee and demanded money from the register, according to Steve Olson of the Sheriff's Office. Investigators also said they were able to obtain a number of fingerprints from the scene.

The man took an undisclosed amount of cash and a bag of chips, and then left the store. Nobody was hurt in the incident, Olson said.

The suspect wore a white T-shirt, jean shorts, and had a do-rag on his head. An older model, white, BMW automobile was seen in the area before the robbery, but not afterward, Olson said. It may be involved in some

after insects. The only other sound is construction at the gas station.

"Right now, we don't see any pollution in these lakes, but I don't think it's going to stay that way much longer," Roy said.

A cormorant dives for fish in the next lake. As Roy squeezes through a channel to the last lake, a kingfisher sounds an alarm of human presence from a tree high overhead.

Some have talked about widening Seminola Boulevard, but the DePews don't see how that is possible since the lakes are already very close to the road at some points.

Together with county plans for improving Lake Drive all the way to Tuscawilla, Seminola could become an important thoroughfare.

The DePews are also concerned who might have access to the lakes. All it would take is for one careless boater to bring in hyacinth or some other type of plant to choke the lakes, they argue.

The city held two public input sessions in the fall, but no others are planned and not minutes were recorded.

The city also maintains a blog on its Web site where people can write concerns, but it hasn't seen much use from residents as yet, according to Matt Dorsten, planner for the city of Casselberry.

Dorsten said the small area study is a compilation of a traffic study, market-based studies and land-use analysis of the area.

"We're keeping this in house, really in conjunction with the citizens," Dorsten said. He emphasized that no development plans have been produced.

"The only thing approved so far is to do this study," he said. From the input, he will put together a conceptual plan for future land use and zoning for the city commission to consider.

"As far as going vertical with buildings, no," he said.

Casselberry named lakes after first surviving quint

The Quintuplet Lakes at Sportman's Park in Casselberry were named for the famous Dionne quintuplets born in Ontario, Canada, May 28, 1934.

The first surviving quintuplets were born two months prematurely and were named Annette, Cecile, Emilie, Marie and Yvonne. Emilie, Marie and Yvonne have all passed away.

The lakes in Casselberry have been treated well by those living near them, but the human Dionne quintuplets were not treated as

well. They were taken away from their parents Elzire and Oliva Dionne by the Ontario government and placed in a theme-park area across the street. Nearly 6,000 people per day visited to watch the sisters through a one-way mirror.

The girls were also used in commercials and several movies and stage acts.

The girls were returned to their family 1943, but later alleged that their father sexually abused them. The Ontario government awarded the surviving girls \$4 million in 1998.

Joe Howell is a city of Casselberry stormwater engineer. He is also on the city's Lakes Advisory Committee, made up primarily of residents with an objective of protecting the city's lakes.

Howell said the city has taken water quality samples from at least one of the Quintuplet Lakes on a quarterly basis.

He explained that the city tests to ensure that the lakes meet the Department of Environmental Protection Class 3 requirements. Class 1, he said for example, would be drinking quality water. Class 3 is recreational use quality, he said.

The lakes are not privately owned, he said, but there is no public access. Homeowners

on the lakes do not own out to the center of the lakes, he said.

In general, the five lakes are about five to eight feet deep, he said, with some pockets, probably dredge holes, much deeper.

He understands the concerns homeowners have for what he called, "very nice lakes". He didn't think there would be a repeat of the ground contamination at the gas station because so many new guidelines are in place since the earlier problems on Seminola Boulevard at Winter Park Drive, which borders the western end of the lakes.

Quintuplet Drive is on the southern end of the lakes and Lake Drive lies adjacent to the east.

"I couldn't tell you that

there would be no impact," Howell said, adding that stormwater treatment rules protect all the city's lakes.

"I don't see the [Quintuplet] lakes as more fragile than others, but smaller lakes can't take as much stress," he said.

Dorsten said the city has its own requirements to protect the lakes.

"We have our own stormwater requirements that go above and over what the state and [St. Johns River Water] management district require," he said.

Dorsten said public input right now includes zoning and land use concerns primarily along Winter Park Drive, Lake Drive and the south side of Seminola Boulevard. Throughout the entire study area, there is a concern for aesthetics.

Dorsten also explained that Seminola Boulevard already extends out to the end of the right of way. No widening could take place, he said, except to reduce or remove the median to add lanes.

"There wouldn't be any more taking of the land," he said. "It is what it is now."

Centex Homes and Northland Church own property that was once the Seminole Greyhound Park down Seminola Boulevard, east of the lakes. A subdivision is planned, but nothing more than dirt has been pushed around so far. Plans there may wait on improvements to Seminola and Lake Drive.

"My next step is to formulate a future land use and zoning plan," Dorsten said. He wants to identify some of the public improvements that have been discussed, and identify them on the same map.

He figures the plan will be ready for discussion by the end of January or early February.

The DePews lost 45 trees, including some large pine and cypress trees, during the hurricanes last year. They don't want to lose their special lakes.

able cause for his arrest. He had been charged with two felony counts and a misdemeanor charge.

According to Conway, on the day of the arrest the officers drove up to Conway's car and Vazquez had his gun drawn and ordered Conway exited his vehicle.

The plaintiff then alleges that Vazquez threw him to the ground, handcuffed him and searched him.

According to the lawsuit, neither Vazquez or Taylor observed, or knew of, Conway

being involved in any criminal activity, prior to his arrest.

In both of the officers' depositions, they eluded to the incident from March 15, in which a complaint had been made that he was in the Bank of America with a handgun, which is a felony.

The lawsuit claims that the officers had a duty to determine whether a warrant was there to arrest him, and they did not, according to the lawsuit.

City officials said last week that they could not comment on current litigation.

In this year's gatherings and celebrations, I hope you managed to take time to talk about what you considered your blessings. We had Thanksgiving last month, but Christmas is also a time to give thanks, possibly even more so than before.

Have you explained the symbol of some of your holiday decorations to your offspring? Have you shared experiences with them? And most of all, have you thought about and openly discussed the true meaning of Christmas with your family and friends?

A former publisher of the Sanford Herald told me it was improper to end a column with questions, but I believe the above paragraph is an exception. I hope you will think about all of these points and, on behalf of all of us at *The Herald*, have a very Merry Christmas.

of her own health by having minor surgery.

"The Chamber just can't afford that time for me," Gordon said.

According to Gordon, she had the personal time racked up to take some leave, but she didn't want to leave the Chamber in the lurch.

"I'm just looking forward to enjoying me, and my family, and feeling better," Gordon said.

Mike Fitzpatrick, a newly appointed executive board member, said Gordon had been with the Chamber for about four years, just as long as he had.

"She did an outstanding job," Fitzpatrick said in a phone interview. "She brought the chamber a long way and she will be sorely missed."

But one former board member, who would speak only on terms of anonymity, said after Gordon's resignation he's anxiously awaiting the new board.

"I view the change as the potential to bring organization, budget control and local business support back into the Chamber," he said.

The source said the purpose of the Chamber was to promote the members' businesses, not to put on events that broke even.

"The way it's been run has been utter pandemonium and chaos," he said.

Just shy of a month after City Commissioners voted 3-2 to execute an agreement with the Chamber that would give them funding for a total of \$60,000, the Chamber is continuing to get its financial statements in order on the request of Sanford Mayor Linda Kuhn.

Commissioners voted to give the Chamber half of the money up front, instead of all of it as Gordon requested, and the other half after a financial audit was provided so that city officials could review where tax payer dollars are going.

Kuhn said in the November meeting that she was concerned about giving the Chamber a lump sum because of the uncertain financial status of the group, who recently announced they would not be able to afford to put on February's Mardi Gras parade.

"We're the keepers of the taxpayers dollars and I have a real problem with giving them any money if this is the type of financial statement they provided," Kuhn said in November.

In an e-mail correspondence between Gordon and current Board Chairman David Taylor, Gordon offered to meet with some of the board members early next week to review all the issues of the Chamber and to transfer all the books and records.

Gordon said in the e-mail that her secretary, Kim Tupper, who also submitted her resignation on Dec. 22, citing "an opportunity that I would regret if I didn't accept", will stay on to assist Gordon in finishing up the Chamber audit.

Gordon said Friday that she is enjoying Christmas shopping with her daughter right now, but she would help the Chamber with anything they need.

"I'll be around," she said. The new members of the executive board are Bart Peterson, Paul Osborne, David Minton, Bill Elliott and Mike Fitzpatrick.

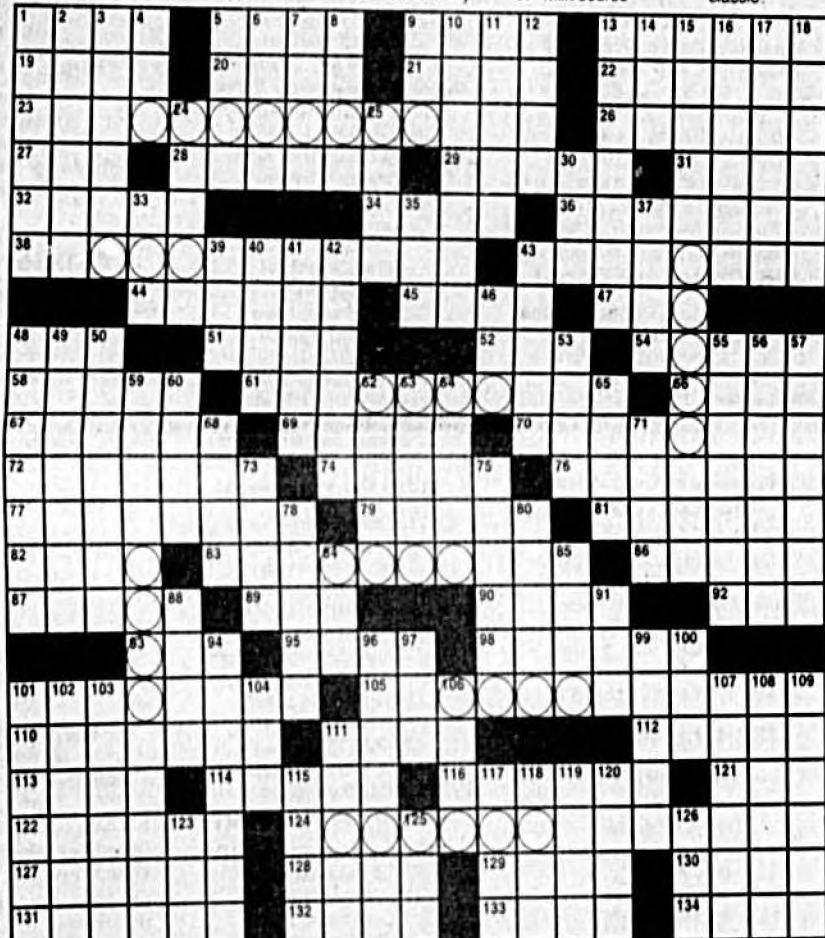

The Way We Were:

Travel back circa 1880s

The following is again edited from the *Florida Times Union*. These transcripts can be found and purchased at the Seminole County Museum of History.

October 25, 1882.

Our citizens will remember the occasion of the burning of the steamer "City of Sanford" which took place last spring. Among the passengers on that ill fated steamer were Mr. L.G. Ireland, his wife, and two daughters of Welaka, who were on their way north to visit relatives and friends. Mrs. Ireland and her young daughter were among those who perished in the flames while her devoted husband, after bravely struggling to save the lives of those dear to him, barely escaped with his life. He received several severe bruises in jumping from the steamer after it was almost entirely enveloped in flames. Miss Ireland, his eldest daughter, in jumping from the vessel, was caught in the machinery and had her hip terribly mangled.

They were brought to the city and kindly cared for. After several weeks they were able to proceed on their way north. After spending several months in the north, Mr. Ireland and his daughter returned to Florida. They visited their home in Welaka, but returned to the city and were put up at the Elwood House. There, he was seized with a fever yesterday morning and died. He leaves his crippled daughter alone.

Mr. Ireland was 56. His body was forwarded to Welaka where it will be buried beside the remains of his charred wife and daughter. His remains were accompanied up the river by his daughter.

November 18, 1882.

Dr. J.J. Harris of Orange County has just bought the South Florida Journal at Sanford and will put numerous improvements in that sterling newspaper.

November 21, 1882

General Henry S. Sanford arrived in New York last week on his return from Europe.

November 23, 1882.

Three years ago there were not enough school children in Sanford to justify a school building. Now we learn that Miss Angle Taylor has enrolled 64 pupils. Certainly this speaks well of the rapid growth of our town.

December 24, 1882

General and Mrs. Sanford arrived on Tuesday via steamer DeBary. Salvos of artillery greeted them. Many of our citizens assembled to welcome them, but owing to the long delay of the steamer to the railroad wharf, some had to leave. As it was, the distinguished guest should be grateful for the cordiality of their greeting. We do not know the length of their stay.

January 23, 1883.

(The following items were taken from a letter printed on this date, which is signed, "Yours truly, V.")

We now have 46 stores and shops and 21 hotels and restaurants. We have added to our Swedish population and more are coming. Enjoying the Christmas Party given by Mrs. Sanford were 59 Swedish children.

The Sanford Brass Band gave General and Mrs. Sanford a serenade last night to which they responded by inviting them in for a drink.

General Sanford is planning to erect a bath house over our warm sulphur springs at S. Gertrude. It will be a swimming bath and should be as great an attraction as Green Cove Springs.

Mrs. Sanford is busy getting ready a reading room for the young men's idle evenings.

The famous steeple from the Low Country which is to go on the Episcopal Church awaits rebuilding before taking its place.

Our school is already full and a new school will soon be needed. The colored suburb called Georgetown is also building a school in addition to their three churches. There are also some 50 neat houses there. The new bank opens next week in the Fort Reed Block awaiting the erection of its brick building at the corner of Back Avenue and Commercial Street.

April 5, 1883.

Mr. William Thompson has been compelled to abbreviate his stay in Sanford. In his haste of leaving home at 3 a.m., when gathering up the unmentionable wear for the trip, he got a lot of the baby's clothing and stuffed them in his valise. The mistake was not discovered until "a change" became necessary and he found that his stock on hand was entirely unsuited.

April 18, 1883.

On the previous Monday morning a large number of passengers came on the train from down the river. Because of the large crowd, a couple of ladies got off at the rear, and in doing so, one of them, Mrs. Mary McCaully, fell. The gallant Mr. Sawyer, the efficient agent of the DeBary Line, rescued her from her perilous position.

In the fall, the lady's money satchel fell into the lake. Mr. Sawyer assured her that he would secure it and send it on so she proceeded down the river in the steamer.

While Mr. Sawyer was indicating to the diver where the satchel had fallen, his rake touched the article. By dexterous use of the rake, he drew up the lost property.

The contents of the satchel, though wet, were all in good condition. Mrs. Sawyer carefully tried them and they were forwarded to the owner. The satchel contained about \$2,000 in cash and valuables.

It's all about the mistletoe

Traditionally mistletoe is collected and used as a Christmas ornament because it stays green in winter and produces beautiful white berries at this time of the year. Mistletoe is also considered sacred by virtue of its connection with the oak tree, a tree considered sacred and symbolic for strength and immortality.

When hung in the home, mistletoe symbolizes purity and strength and promotes happiness, romance and peace. In fact, custom called for enemies meeting beneath the mistletoe to throw down their weapons and embrace. But probably the best known practice connected with mistletoe involves the act of kissing beneath it, a common tradition that has survived through the ages because of the belief that mistletoe's curative powers would cure a broken heart and soothe the differences between quarreling lovers.

Plant parasites? Mistletoes are parasitic plants that feed mostly from trees taking water, mineral nutrients, and probably some organic compounds from their water conducting vessels. The true mistletoes are only partially parasitic since they contain chlorophyll, and through photosynthesis they can produce their own organic compounds. The type of mistletoe found in Florida is the eastern mistletoe that occurs in about 110 host species in 50 genera of trees. Many hardwood trees are infected by this plant parasite, but oak, hickory and pecan are most frequently affected.

The plant: The eastern mistletoe has smooth-edged, leathery, green, paired opposite leaves. The stems are round and jointed. The stems and leaves sometimes have a yellowish-green or golden cast. The small flowers appear from October to late

November and into January in Florida. Male and female flowers occur in different plants. The flowers are pollinated by insects, and the fruits develop about one year after pollination. The fruits are rounded and whitish- or pinkish-colored. The seeds are spread by birds which eat the fruits and digest the pulp, but the seeds retain the sticky covering that help them to remain attached to the stems of the trees. Seeds germinate in bright light but are inhibited by darkness. Once a seed germinates, it can penetrate the host plant and produce a feeding organ that grows into the bark to the water conducting tissues from where takes water and nutrients. The mistletoe seedling can only penetrate thin bark of twigs or small branches. Mistletoes grow well in full sunlight, especially when growing high in the crowns of large trees.

Damage: Mistletoes are not considered a serious forest problem in Florida, but the plant is reported to kill water oaks in Texas and Mississippi. Trees growing in the open are infected more frequently than under forest conditions. Signs of infection by parasitic plants are more noticeable during the winter months when the deciduous

trees shed their leaves and the dark green mistletoes can be easily seen on the trees. Multiple infections can be promoted by constant bird feeding on mistletoe seeds, producing loss of vigor, dieback and often death of the trees. The parasitic association may last many years, but they usually survive only a few years before being broken off or killed by freezing. When a mistletoe stem dies, new shoots may develop from the parasite tissues inside the host.

Toxicity: All the plant parts contain toxic substances that inhibit protein synthesis in the intestines of humans, but the toxicity is rarely fatal. Eating small quantities of berries from this plant will produce abdominal pains and diarrhea, but eating large quantities of berries or drinking tea made from the leaves of this plant will produce a severe irritation of the intestines, followed by vomiting, diarrhea and cramps.

Control: Mistletoe infections can be controlled by pruning infected branches. Branches must be cut one to two feet back of the visible infection area. Cutting only the aerial portions of the plant can induce the development of many shoots in other parts of the tree.

Part 2: More about Station No. 42, including community programs for kids and adults, and the daily life of a fire rescue responder.

The men and women of station No. 42 have helped in many of the natural disasters over the past few years. We remember the wildfires of 1998 that spread through Geneva and surrounding areas. All the local stations were called at that time.

Lt. Muse recalls, "If we were working anywhere in central Florida, we worked those fires."

Some of them also worked the Midway tornadoes. And of course many were deployed throughout Florida and surrounding states last year and this year for search and rescue and additional assistance during the hurricanes.

Post 9/11 the fire department received additional equipment and training, as well as extra medication against possible bio terrorism attacks - all paid for through grants from the federal government. Unfortunately the citizen ride along program was a casualty discontinued after the 9/11 attacks.

Training is an integral and ongoing part of the firefighter's life. "We do medical training almost every day; also we practice live burns out in Heathrow at our training houses," said Lt. Muse.

Health has become a national focus in light of so many firemen having heart attacks while on call. A wellness program was implemented across the country to improve strength and cardiovascular fitness with emphasis on diet, body, cholesterol etc. As Gary Muse says, "You want to live a long time after you retire."

Firefighters sometimes come up through the ranks via the

explorer program that has an entry age of 16 years. The Explorers is an organization whose goal is to familiarize teenage boys and girls with the Emergency Medical and Fire Services. The youth organization is a stepping stone for those who wish to become an Emergency Medical Technicians, Paramedics, Fire Inspectors, or Firefighters. Locally these explorers meet each week at the Five Points complex and are enlightened about the life of real firefighters. If they want to seriously become a fireman they will take classes called minimum standards at the community colleges or the Florida State Fire College. It takes about a year to complete both these classes and the paramedic/emt training. Currently there are several second generation men serving at fire stations locally and a couple from the explorer program were just hired on with the department.

The county fire department is involved in many public safety programs for the community. Visit the public safety section of the Seminole County website where you will find several community programs such as fire-house tours, fire extinguisher training, CPR training, Seminole Safe Kids and the national Safe Kids program. Safe Kids designates certain buildings, businesses, and locations for kids in trouble to find safety. Kids that may be threatened by family or school situations, runaways etc can find safe haven in certain convenience stores, fire houses, libraries, and other community facilities.

EDITH, or exit drills in the home is another important page of tips for families to have an efficient and workable exit strategy in case of fire in the home. Check this out, it could save your family. Speaking of efficient, fire-house No. 42 has a very efficient computer system and communication area where the dispatch calls come through. All calls are printed out as well with all the critical information listed such as location and type of fire etc. All the medical training, certification

CD's are handily available as well.

Phone calls do come through the 911 dispatch operator to the station but given the location on Route 46, Lt. Muse says sometimes people stop by the station with information too. Recently a woman stopped and said that they were bringing someone in who had been camping and was bitten by a snake. In this case it was easier to bring the victim to the station rather than try to assess their location in the woods. By the time they arrived, the paramedic team had contacted the hospital about anti venom and were ready to treat the person right away. Commonly animal control takes the wildlife calls but the firefighters will go out to provide whatever assistance they can, be snake in the house, bear in the tree etc.

The fire station has everything you'd expect a home to have: kitchen, sitting room, dorm of Murphy beds, bath and showers, treadmill etc. "It's just like a big house, and we clean every day. It's like being at home, we spend a third of our lives here and with each other." Lt. Gary Muse and his team are proud of their house in a quiet way.

"You've got to have a strong stomach," he said. "We see a lot of blood and guts. We take it as lightly as you can, it can play on you. Especially when you see kids, being so helpless; it takes a toll on you. There's no middle of the road, you either really like it, or you don't stay in it long."

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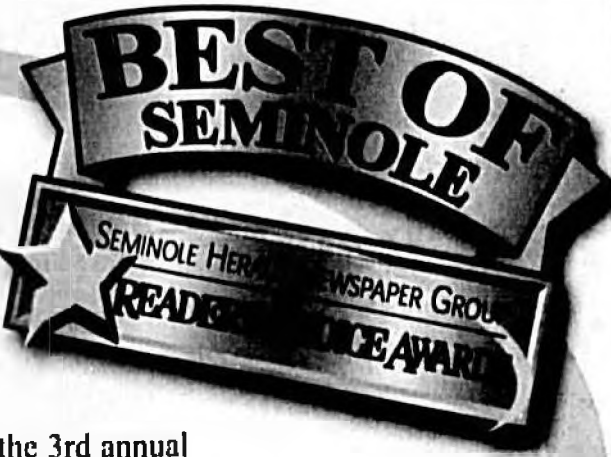

Two other sophomores, DJ Williams and Woody Taylor, helped out Lake Mary with eight and seven points, respectively.

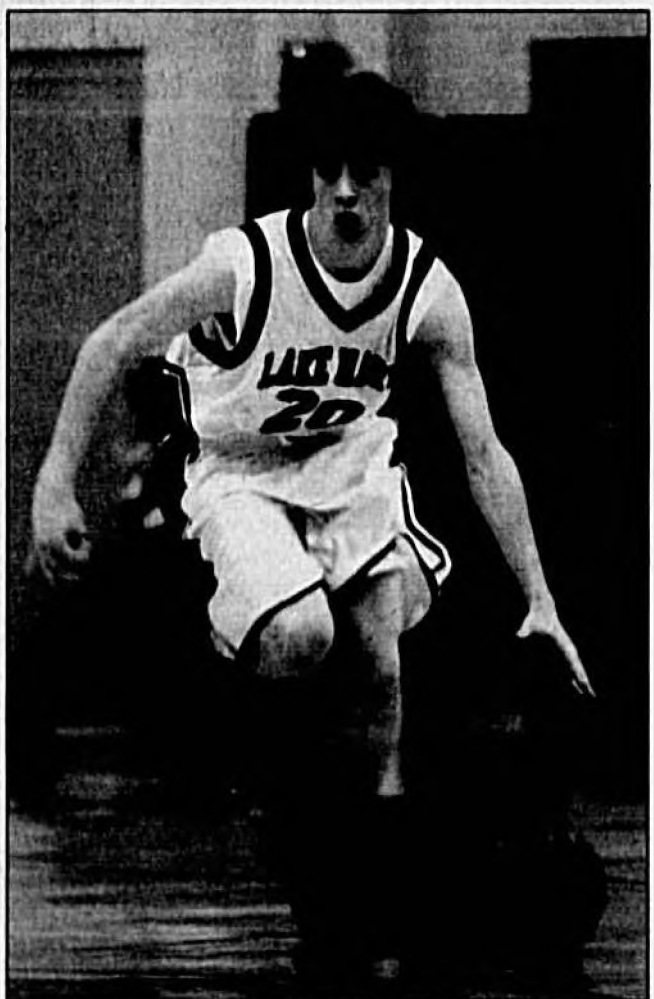

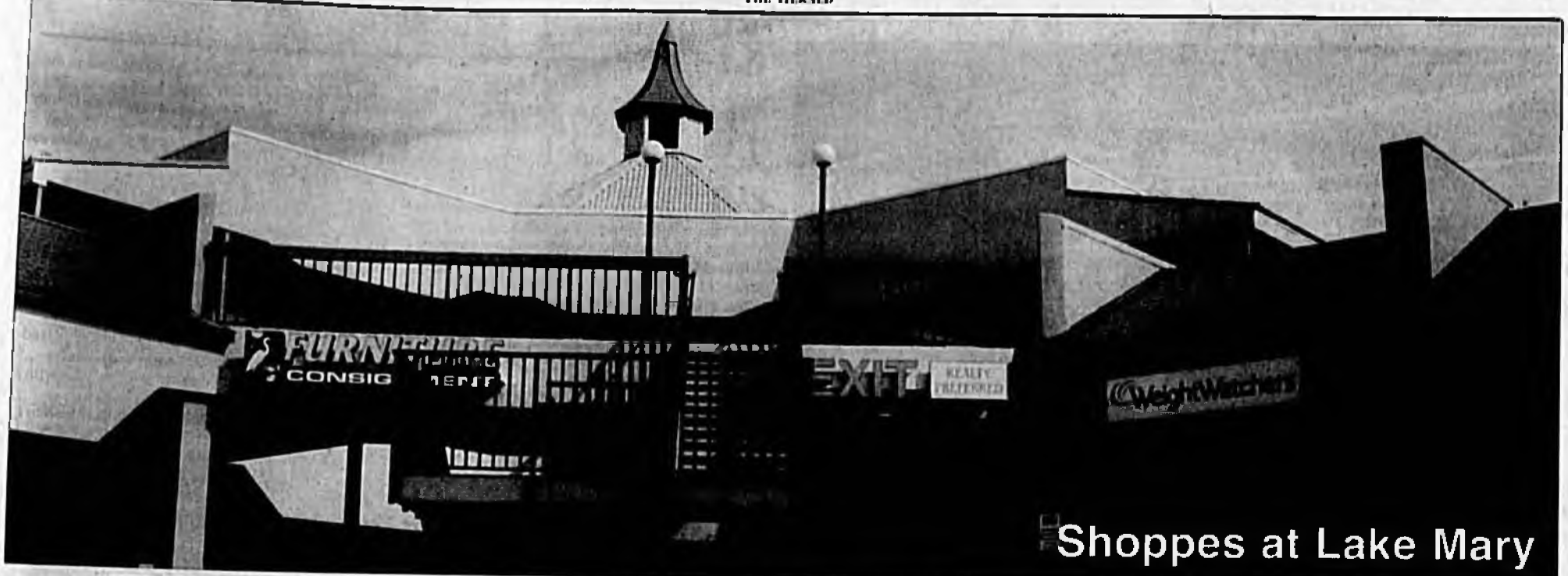
