# Discusses Suit

Controversy highlighted the Seminole County School Board meeting Wednesday evening when the chair refused to recognize a speaker on the agenda and the board debated the ethics of political flyers and the role of the superintendent in labor negotiations.

The meeting started amiably enough, with a discussion of the \$250,000 personal damage suit by the Seminole Education Association (SEA) against the board members. Board attorney Douglas Stenstrom said he had not had an opportunity to study the complaint, but he would make the appropriate legal replies within the next

With that, everyone but the few teacher organization officers thought the subject was closed. The SEA was listed on the agenda, but when its turn came to speak, Board Chairman Davie Sims refused to recognize the group. Outside the meeting room, several of the association officers suggested investigating the legal grounds for Sims' action.

Sims said after the meeting, he had checked with the board's counsel before acting. The reason for the refusal of recognition Sims told the audience was the absence on the agenda of the purpose of the SEA address to the board.

What he said after the meeting was that the board was not willing to allow the SEA to make points for their lawsuit, either by their comments or baiting the board to reply. He added, if the SEA has something new to tell the board, it would listen, but since the board was not informed of the subject of the SEA statement, it refused.

#### 'Not For The Public'

public," Sims explained. "We don't have to listen to anyone. (Other speakers) added at the last minute to the agenda are not suing the board. When they (SEA) filed suit that draws the line."

#### No License To Practice

Stenstrom countered by asking if the Ph.D. had a license to practice law or give legal opinions in Florida. Moses admitted he did not. Stenstrom added, the law is "very specific:" the superintendent or his designated representative will handle the negotiations. The board is powerless to hire someone, without the recommendation of the superintendent, except in an advisory capacity.

Moses was excused. Sims brought up the issue of political flyers being distributed by a school district official, William Layer, superintendent of schools. He questioned the legality of such action on the basis of Stenstrom's advice last week which forbids the board to distribute through the schools information on any political issue which encouraged a particular point of view.

Stenstrom explained Wednesday if Layer did this with his own funds, and did not distribute them through the schools, there was nothing illegal. Sims was dissatisfied with the remark, and said he thought the entire affair was

It was further explained by Stenstrom the Layer flyer, urging a vote against the appointed superintendent, was not a political advertisement, according to one section of the election law. Political advertising was defined as only that information which dealt with a candidate for office.

#### **Hasty Interpretation**

Dorothy Glisson, Florida State Secretary, conceded today Layer may be correct in his interpretation of the election law concerning the necessity of disclosing the publisher, printer and financier of political advertising. Glisson, whose interpretation Stenstrom said Wednesday evening may have been "too hasty," expressed reservation the legislature had intended to exclude publicity of ballot issues from the requirements of political advertising. Considering that groups supporting ballot issues are required to make financial disclosure, she was doubtful the legislature intended to exclude individuals who spend less than \$500 from this requirement

"Any campaign literature without financial disclosure is certainly not complying with the spirit of the

The prediction reflects the views of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. Dr. Joesph P. Kerwin, the first American physician to fly into space as a member of last year's Skylab I crew, and Dr. Robert Parker, scientist-astronaut for the Skylab program, made the forecast Wednesday at a conference here evaluating Skylab results.

#### **Arms Restrictions Softened**

WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S. arms salesmen are in their best competitive position in years in Latin America because of an easing of congressional restrictions on the transfer of military equipment to hemispheric nations. A number of congressionally imposed limitations have been either softened or eliminated altogether. And the House Foreign Affairs Committee recently voted to eliminate the \$150 million ceiling on U.S. military credit sales in Latin America, a move strongly supported by the State and Defense Departments.

#### **Priest Charged In Plot**

NEW YORK (AP) — A Roman Catholic priest who counseled scores of drug addicts has been indicted for allegedly using his chaplain's post to help seven narcotics racketeers escape from a federal jail. Rev. John J. Irella was named Wednesday in the 12-count federal indictment as a go-between in an alleged seven-month plot that ended in the Sept. 22 break-out from the House of Detention in Manhattan. Only one of the fugitives has been recaptured

#### Social Security Taxes Climb

WASHINGTON (AP) - Millions of Americans will pay higher Social Security taxes next year, with additional payroll withholding as high as \$52.65 for employes earning \$14,100 or more. The increase takes effect automatically under Social Security legislation enacted by Congress in 1972 and 1973.



# Tax Burden Heavy **But Not Oppressive**

One of the hazards of living through a political campaign is the subliminal feeling that you can no longer afford to live in a particular community The candidates are so preoccupied with taxes

that the average person soon becomes convinced that he is unwittingly and unwillingly working for

That is, of course, so much hogwash. Americans as a whole are taxed at a far lower rate than most western nations, but to hear candidates for public office tell it, governments at all levels are literally picking our pockets.

This feeling is encouraged by both the "ins" and the "outs." No politician worth his salt ever ran for even the lowliest public office without taking a solemn oath to reduce taxes, cut the "fat out of the budget" and, in effect, get "more bang for the buck."

Of course, it never happens but John Q. Citizen soon becomes convinced that it must, and becomes frustrated and angry when it doesn't. We've been listening to all the talk about "big

spenders" in the Florida campaign in recent weeks with a little amusement and some disgust. If we were to believe what we've been hearing Florida would be a vast wasteland rather than the

fastest growing state in the nation. If what the politicians are saying contained even a germ of truth no one could afford to live here. Fortunately, the facts are at variance with the charges. The Commerce Clearing House News

Bureau is an organization that keeps track of such things and according to their figures we have it pretty good, tax-wise, here in Florida.

Americans paid an average of \$577 in taxes to state and local governments in fiscal 1973 — a jump of \$55 per person from the previous period. (Floridians, on the other hand, paid an average of 191 — a jump of \$52 per person over the previous

Per capita state-local tax burdens - which grew heavier in every state — ranged from a low of \$342 in Arkansas to a high of \$894 in New York (the first time the \$800 level has been passed.) The fiscal period saw Arkansas replace Alabama with the lowest per capital burden while New York remained at the top for the eighth straight year. (We have yet to hear of any mass migration of Floridians to Arkansas, Alabama or New York, so the tax burden apparently isn't the only reason people move from one state to another).

The median tax burden — half of the 50 states were above the figure and half were below — is \$514 which represents an increase of \$53 over fiscal 1972. So the tax burden shouldered by Floridians is below both the average and the median rates in both the total and the size of the increase over fiscal 1972.

So the next time the question of the state and local tax burden carried by Floridians comes up in a political debate it might be well to keep in mind that residents of 29 states - including Alaska have it much rougher.

Despite the enviable combination of a winning record hometown talent and a basketball-hungry state, the Carolina Cougars couldn't find box office success in North Carolina last season and so during the summer, the franchise was shifted to St. Louis by four New York executives who purchased the team

St. Louis has been without pro basketball since 1968 when the NBA's St. Louis Hawks moved to Atlanta. That team built a winning tradition along with one of the better attendances in the NBA, and the new ABA team in St. Louis is hoping for similar success. Unlike Carolina, which was a regional franchise, playing its home games in Charlotte, Greensboro and Raleigh, the Spirits will play on only one home court, the 18,000-seat St Louis Arena. The new owners had to rebuild fast, because three of the starters on last season's team were let go by Munchak including All-Star guards Ted McClain and Mack Calvin, plus center Jim Chones. So were Coach Larry Brown and General

FORWARDS: This is where the Spirits have their only two remaining starters, Billy Cunningham and Joe Caldwell - and they couldn't do much better for openers. Cunningham, the ABA's Most Valuable Player during the 1972-73 season, missed the team's last 52 games of the regular season and the playoffs last season because of two kidney operations. When Cunningham went to the sidelines, the team was in first place. It wound up third. The veteran Caldwell, one of the game's great leapers, has said this would be his last season of pro ball. On the bench, the Spirits have veterans Ed Manning, Tom Owens and Dennis Wuycik plus rookie Gus Gerard. Rating: A-.

CENTERS: Marvin Barnes, the All-American from Providence, is the team's future, having signed a six- year contract for an estimated \$2.5 million. During his three varsity seasons, he was one of the nation's leading rebounders, winning the rebounding title last season. He also averaged over 20 points a game during his Providence career. His collegiate coach, Dave Gavitt, calls him an extremely unselfish player. Mike Lewis, who has missed virtually all of the last two seasons because of tendon operations, and rookie Mickey Johnson are the backups. Rating: A-. GUARDS: The losses of McClain and Calvin are serious blows

to the team's backcourt, and new Coach Bob MacKinnon will have difficulty finding a combination even closely resembling ast season's All-Stars. His choices will come mostly from newcomers, with Gene Littles the lone holdover. Included in the rookie contingent is James "Fly" Williams, the scoring sensation from Austin Peay. Williams, however, played up front in college and may have difficulty adjusting in the pros. Jimmy Foster is the other rookie. Rating: C.
