

NAVIGATION DISTRICT LAW FOR FLORIDA

HISTORY MADE HERE BY MEETING OF PROMINENT MEN

The legislature will be asked to pass a bill providing for a navigation district for the purpose of improving water routes from Jacksonville to Key West and the Gulf of Mexico by designated waterways.

The routes for these water highways will be in resolutions adopted by the legislature at the St. Johns Valley, Lake Okechobee and the East Coast and desirable tributaries.

The proposed navigation district will be composed of the counties of Duval, St. Johns, Clay, Marion, Putnam, Volusia, Brevard, Lake, Seminole, Orange, Polk, Osceola, St. Lucie, Palm Beach, Glades, De Soto, Broward and Lee for the construction of improvements of the following water highways:

From Jacksonville to Key West and the Gulf of Mexico via the following routes: The St. Johns Valley, Lake Okechobee, Caloosa, Hatchee Valley, the entire East Coast of Florida, with connections via Salt Lake and Titusville, via St. Johns and Oklawaha, and via Lake Okechobee and the East Coast and desirable tributaries.

That a committee of seven of whom the chairman shall be one appointed with full power to execute the will of this meeting and with power to add special members for technical consultation and to appoint representatives for each county in the district who shall act on the instructions of the committee as chairman of local committee.

To secure official endorsement and support of boards of trade and other organized civic bodies and of legislative representatives of the counties to be embraced within the district, for the furtherance of necessary legislative action and for securing the influence of public opinion favorable to the establishment of a navigation district.

To solicit and collect funds for necessary expenses.

To collect and obtain engineering data and financial and commercial statistics.

To engage such engineering and legal services as may be necessary.

To present a bill to the legislature at its next regular session providing for the creation under a special act of said navigation district.

LEGISLATION FOR ROADS IN FLORIDA

State Must Meet Appropriation of Federal Aid for Roads

Tallahassee, Feb. 2.—Recommendations for legislation broadening the authority of the State Road Department, so as to conform to the requirements of the Federal Aid Road Act, and also to provide funds to meet the amount appropriated by Florida by the passage of the Act, are submitted to the recommendations submitted to the Governor of Florida by Hon. Ed. Scott, chairman of the State Road Department, accompanying the first annual report of the Department for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1916, which is now in the hands of the state printer.

The following is a copy of the letter delivered to Governor Sidney J. Catts, containing the Department's recommendations for proposed legislation:

To His Excellency, Honorable Sidney J. Catts, Governor of Florida, Tallahassee, Florida.

Dear Sir:—In order that the State Road Department may fulfill the purpose for which it was created and develop the highway system of the state with greatest efficiency and economy, the following recommendations for proposed legislation are respectfully submitted, in compliance with the requirements of Section 8, Chapter 6887, Laws of Florida, said Chapter being the Act creating this Department.

It is provided in said Section 8 that "The Department shall report to the Governor not later than sixty days before the meeting of the legislature such changes in the law as they find expedient to secure the best results in road construction and repair work."

Therefore, this Department recommends:

First (a) That Section 4 of the Act creating the Department be revised and amended so as to give this Department power and authority to construct and maintain with convicts or free labor or to enter into contracts for the construction and maintenance of such roads and bridges as may come under its supervision.

(b) That Section 5 of the Act creating this Department be revised and amended by striking out the provision requiring the county commissioners of the several counties of the state to "make and file with the Department quarterly reports of and a detailed statement of all moneys expended on such work."

(c) That Section 6 of the Act creating this Department be amended so as to provide that the State Road Department shall, at its discretion, designate certain roads as

state highways and construct and maintain same with funds derived entirely from the state or jointly from the state and federal government, as such funds may be available; and that this Department may also designate certain other roads as state aid roads, and shall be given authority to construct and maintain same with funds raised jointly from federal state and county sources.

That Section 9 of the act creating this Department be amended so as to insert the terms of the federal aid act, heretofore tentatively accepted by the Governor of Florida, and appropriating the sum of \$112,000 to meet the federal aid for the year 1917, and the sum of \$168,000 to meet the federal aid for the year 1918, these amounts being the apportionment to the state of Florida for the years mentioned.

That Sec. 10 of the act creating this Department be amended so as to provide that county officials making remittances to the state treasurer of moneys for the use and maintenance of this Department shall make a report, showing in detail the source of the revenue so remitted, and that one copy of such report be transmitted to the state road department and another copy of the same be kept on file in the office of the county official making the remittance and submitting the report.

Second That there be enacted a law creating a state convict road force, consisting of all able bodied state convicts, not required for the operation of the state prison farm, and all jail prisoners not actually worked on the roads in the counties where confined, and that the said state convict road force be used in the improvement of the state highways.

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Fourth That there be adopted a joint resolution submitting to the qualified electors of the state a proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Florida, providing that the state legislature should be authorized to provide for the issuance of state highway improvement bonds for such amounts as may be required to carry forward the construction of a system of state roads during the ensuing two years.

Fifth That there be enacted a law prohibiting the use of the public roads for traffic of an unusual or destructive character and forbidding any load of portion of a load on vehicles using such public roads from dragging on the surface of the road.

Sixth That the existing laws with reference to county bond issues and district bond issues be so amended as to provide that before any election for such county or district bonds is held, surveys, plans, approximate estimates and specifications for the construction of such roads and bridges as are provided for shall be prepared by a competent engineer and same approved by the state road commissioner, and that no bonds shall be voted on for a less amount than called for in such approximate estimates.

Your attention is respectfully called to the many conflicting and obsolete laws shown in the compilation of the road and bridge laws of Florida as compiled by the Attorney General, a copy of which accompanies this report, and it is hereby recommended that a systematic revision of these laws be made.

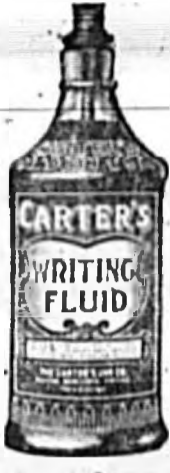

Use of Artificial Gas. That the use of artificial gas as a domestic and industrial fuel is increasing and that its utilization for illuminating purposes is decreasing is indicated by a report recently issued by the department of the interior, which covers the use of the product in 1915.

It is pointed out that 297,201,218 cubic feet of gas was sold during 1915, and that the value of this production amounted to \$173,832,132, according to statistics collected by C. E. Leshor of the United States geological survey, and 128,103,316,000 cubic feet of coal gas was consumed during the same period, valued at \$158,820,007.

The statistics show that 30 per cent of the gas was used for illuminating, 18 per cent for domestic fuel and 22 per cent for industrial fuel.

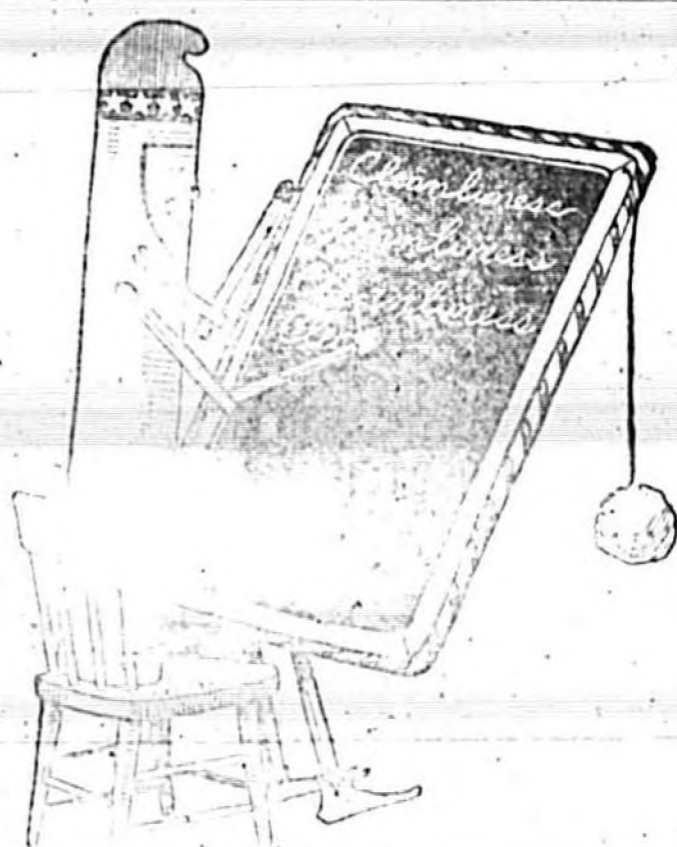
