## Defeated candidate asks probe of victorious county official

SANFORD - Art Davis, who was defeated by Seminole County Commissioner Jennifer Kelley in November, this morning filed a complaint with the State Attorney's Office accusing her of corrupt practices and filing false campaign

In the complaint, Davis, who ran as a Democrat, also accused Kelley, Republican, of helping her husband and campaign manager, Eoghan Kelley, to violate state elections laws.

Jennifer Kelley said this morning that she had heard Davis might file the complaint and said she wasn't surprised. She said she was concerned because she had not intentionally made any mistakes.

"Let the state take care of it,"
Kelley said. "I'm not going to worry
about it. If I'm guilty of anything,
it's trying to show the public
everything. I wanted to do what was right and report everything."

The state attorney is required by law to investigate the allegations and, if merit is found, to present a case to the Seminole County Grand Jury for it to determine what, if any,

charges should be brought.

## Sanford radio station owner has hope despite setbacks

SANFORD - New WNSI-AM (1400) radio station owner William Masi hopes to give Sanford residents a "cosmopolitan" radio station free of the problems plaguing the station in the past.

"We're the talk of the town," said Masi, refering to the station's new slogan. "Forgetting the past, we're looking to the future."

Masi, 83, assumed ownership on March 14 when he bought back the station in a foreclosure auction on the county courthouse steps. The auction was held to settle Masi's \$284,292 judgement awarded him by Seminole Circuit Judge Kenneth M. Leffler Feb. 13. The Federal Communications Commission granted Masi a license for the station that day.

Masi took the station off the air the day he took over for technical repairs. The station returned to the air Saturday.

Mast said WNSI will feature talk shows from the American Network, hourly NBC news broadcasts and news and other programs from the Black National Radio Network. Mast said the station will also feature religious and gospel programs on Sundays, including a "Pastor's Study" Sunday night, allowing local callers to talk about religious issues with local pastors.

Masi said the station will also feature interviews with local business and community leaders.

'It's a cosmopolitan approach," Masi said. "We want to make Sanford aware it is a big city in a small area.

Masi said he has not sought advertising yet. but said he has been visiting local businesses on "goodwill" visits.

## School board will review priorities list

SANFORD - The Seminole County School Board will meet Friday to discuss the third quarter progress on the annual priorities it had set for itself and its subcommittees.

The meeting is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. in the board headquarters, 1211 Mellonville Ave.

Of the 15 items on the agenda, 11 are progressing on schedule. Two will be completed by the June 30 flacal year end. The final two pleces have not yet been addressed. Five Items have been completed

and are off the agenda.

One committee will report to the board on improving the working relationship between the schools and county-wide child welfare agencies. A work group, headed by Dr. Hortense Evans, administrative assistant to the superintendent, reports that while this will be an on-going project, they have made great strides in creating a network that will facilitate the reporting of child abuse and

Another committee, headed by Myrna J. Walters, the consultant coordinator of elementary reading and language arts, will make several recommendations regarding the inclusion of critical thinking skills in the existing elementary school curriculum.

While Walters' report notes that no money currently is allocated to finance the curriculum additions, it was the consensus in a recent survey of district elementary school assistant principals that children need to synthesize, not merely repeat memorized facts."

A \$100,000 price tag was placed on the start-up package for the program.

The report recommends that critical thinking, which it defines as "one component of the overall thinking process which includes comprehension. classification, problem solving, decision making, critical thinking skills, skills of analysis, synthesis and evalutation," be taught from the earliest grades.

The report states that "there is a strong need for resources such as training, funds and materials...and a major committment of human, flecal and physical resources" to put the program into effect.
The committee's survey indicates that 98 percent

of the administrators agree that the program should be integrated into the current curriculum. Another committee has been working on im-

proving the quality of teachers in the Seminole County schools by identifying areas of critical need and actively recruiting teachers in these areas. The committee has also implemented a plan to

more strongly seek out minority applicants to fill existing and future job openings. However, no action has been taken on the

development of a new, research-based staffing formula for the schools and district-level operations.

## Lake Mary trash pickup rates increase

LAKE MARY - Customers of Western Waste Industries Inc. of Florida should expect a slight increase in their quarterly bills beginning May 1.

Garbage service rates will increase by 4.67 percent for both commercial and residential customers in Lake Mary, according to Robert J. Hyres, division manager of Western Waste. This amounts to about 1,643 residents and 58 commercial users.

The increase will come to the attention of the Lake Mary commissioners at tonight's meeting but does not need their approval because it is a contractual agreement between the city and Western Waste which went into effect May 1, 1986, Hyres said.

The rate is adjusted annually according to the consumer price index, Hyres said. Residential rates will increase from \$7.95 to \$8.25 and several different types of commercial customers will be affected according to the type of service they receive. Garbage collections are twice weekly for residents.

Also at tonight's meeting, commissioners will officially acknowledge the resignation of Former Senior Planner Randall J. Cohen who left city hall between Feb. 15 and March 6 for medical reasons.

Acting City Manager Charles Lauderdale determined that Cohen "voluntarily terminated" his position without notice effective Feb. 21, 1989 because Lauderdale said medical certification Cohen submitted on March 10 is "inadequate" to either authorize Cohen's absence or to provide for his return to work.

Cohen, who joined the city last July, had filed a grievance with Lauderdale about poor working consitions stemming from an accusation against Cohen of sexual harassment. Lauderdale did not take action on the grievance because he told Cohen the sexual harasament accusation was a personality conflict between Cohen and another city employee. On an application to the Florida Department of Labor and Employment Security, Cohen stated his reason for discharge as "forced, coerced resignation."

In another matter, the public works/safety complex on Rinehart Road is nearly completed and officials are already reviewing proposals for telephone equipment. According to a memorandum from Lauderdale, it is possible that the public works department may occupy their facility this June while public safety will move in

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### Bonanno crime family member arrested

HOLLYWOOD — Gerald "Gerry" Prancis Chilli, an alleged organized crime soldier, was arrested Wednesday on charges that he plotted to murder two men suspected of assassinating hisson, the FBI said.

Chilli, 54, was carrested without incident at the Diplomat Towers in Hollywood. A federal complaint filed in New York April 4 charges him with racketeering, including attempted murder, wire fraud and loansharking.

Chilli, who said he also has a residence in New York and works at the Fulton Fish Market there, is a "soldier" in the Bonanno organized crime family of La Cosa Nostra, said William A. Gavin, head of the FBI's Miami division.

Cavin said eight other members and associates of the Bonanno family have also been charged in separate complaints filed in New York.

led in New York. Included in those complaints are Chilli; his brother, Joseph Justor" John Chilli; and Junior's son, Joseph "Little Joe" John Chilli III.

The three men are changed with conspiring to murder Anthony O'Connor Jr., and Anthony "The Elf' Bonaventura, who were identified as associates of both the Bonanno and Genovess is Cosa Nostra families.

### Fishing license passes House hearing

TALLAHASSEE — Legislation requiring fishermen to have a naitwater license to fish Florida's coastal waters easily passed to first House hearing Wednesday.

tts first House hearing Wednesday.

The bill (CS-HBs 26, 32, 55, 137 & 225) would require Florida residents to have either a \$10 annual license or a \$180 lifetime license. Saltwater fishermen from out of state could buy a \$10 ten-day license or a \$25 annual license.

People fishing from chartered boats would not have to have a license, but the boat operator would. Annual vessel licenses, would be \$250 for boats scating six or fewer or \$500 for larger

boats.
Children under 16, disabled veterans and lower-income.

people would not have to have a license.

The licenses would raise an estimated \$16 million a year.

The money would go towards protecting and improving Florida's saltwater fisheries, which are under growing pressure from overfishing.

The license has the support of Gov. Bob Martinez, and is expected to pass without much opposition. It passed a House Natural Resources subcommittee by a vote of 4-2 Wednesday, and will go before the full committee on Friday.

### Pit bull owners challenge new law

MIAMI — Owners of pit buil terriers say they will go to court to challenge a new Dade County ordinance that eventually will ban the breed from the county.

The countywide ordinance will also require owners to show proof of \$300,000 in dog-attack liability insurance, and to pen

and mussle the dogs.

Candace Paller, a dog trainer, said responsible dog owners are being made to pay for the sins of those who train pit buils to fight and allow them to run loose.

The law goes into effect in 10 days and gives pit bull owners a 90-day grace period to register their animals. That would allow the dogs to live out their lives with their current owners.

When all the pit bulls living in the county now are gone, the When all the pit bulls living in the county now are gone, the breed will be banned.

In the meantime, the animals will have to be kept inside or in.

## Insurance consumer group approved

Committee okays new state office to represent insurance customers

TALLAHASSEE - The House Insurance committee voted Wednesday to create a new state office to represent consumers before the Department of Insurance when companies seek in-creases in automobile or health insurance rates.

The panel passed the bill (HB 855) despite complaints from the department and the insurance industry that the proposed Office of Public Insurance Counsel would duplicate duties already

carried out by the department, "It's going to mean unnecessary government, a new office," said industry spokesman Sam Miller. "The Legislature is already having a hard time balan-cing the budget, and here we are

creating a new state agency."

Miller said having a public counsel would mean one more round of procedures insurance companies have to go through to obtain needed rate hikes. The expense of that added paperwork, he said, will un-doubtedly be passed on to the

public.

But committee chairman and bill sponsor Peter Deutsch, D-Tamarac, said a public counsel is badly needed to ensure rate setting is done fairly. Deutsch compared the proposed insur-ance counsel to Public Counsel Jack Shreve, who represents consumers before the Public Service Commission when telephone companies, electrical companies and other utilities seek rate hikes.

Deutsch acknowleded that Insurance Commissioner Tom Gallagher is charged with conaidering consumer interests when ruling on rate hikes. But Gallagher's main duty, he said, is to act as arbitrator and administrator, not advocate.

"Only one side of the issue is paying someone to argue for it's case - and that's the industry,"

Deutsch said.

Deutach also noted that Gallagher and his predecessors have relied on heavy campaign contributions from the industry to help win election. While he said he believes Gallahagher is "well intentioned," Deutsch said consumers have lost confidence in insurance commissioners as advocates for their financial concerns.

The bill goes next to the House Appropriations committee.

## Cruse found guilty, jurors to decide fate in April

BARTOW - A Jury of seven women and five men rejected the insanity defense of shopping center sniper William Bryant Cruse Wednesday and found the former librarian guilty of six

counts of first-degree murder.

SEBRING - A man killed when a bomb shattered his truck was a witness in a federal-state drug investigation and a number of his relatives and acquaintances were placed in protective custody, a law enforcement of-ficial said Wednesday.

James Collina Sr., 60, died of massive burns and injuries two hours after the explosion and fire that gutted his truck. Authorities

said they fear the bombing was a "hit" ordered by targets of the drug investigation.

Sam Jones, special agent of the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, said Collins was a witness in a three-year drugemuggling investigation focus ing on Lee and Collier counties. ones said the investigation.

code-named Operation Overlook, was being conducted by the DLE, the U.S. Customs Service, the federal Drug Enforcement Administration and other agen-

Philip Ramer, head of the FDLE's Tampa office, said he believes the explosion was connected to Collina' cooperation in the drug investigation.

## Senate to open meetings

TALLAHASSEE - The Senate voted 39-1 Wednesday to ban the secret meetings through which key lawmakers have traditionally settled disputes over the state budget and other thorny Senate President Bob

Crawford, driving force behind the change, said the new openness will improve public confidence in the mate. That confidence was shattered by the secret deal that resulted in the ill-fated services taxin 1967

"To provide leadership in this state we have got to have the confidence of the people we represent. Senators, we don't have that confidence today," Crawford said during debate.



## Man leaves identification at scene

## Rhinehart Road needs widening despite loss of grant

LAKE MARY - Despite the take-back of a \$2 million grant by the State Department of Commerce, officials here say Rhinehart Road still needs to be

"The road is going to have to be widened whether there's a \$2 million grant or not." Lake Mary Building Director Stanley Welling said this morning. "The question is when and how we are going to pay for it. No sense talking about it until we cross that bridge."

On Aug. 26, 1988, the state Department of Commerce awarded Lake Mary a \$2 million

widening project. It was an economic development transportation grant used specifically to eliminate a transportation problem to encourage expansion at the Stromberg-Carlson Corp., 400 Rhinehart Rd., Lake Mary. The road-widening and expansion projects were to work hand-in-hand to promote business in Lake Mary. The roadway was the only access to the plant. and the two-lane roadway was

Last September, Stromberg-Carlson negotiated with its parent company in England about the design and financing of a 100-square-foot expansion at the Rhinehart Road plant to create 600 additional jobs within grant for the Rhinehart Road two years. It was an expansion

snarled with traffic.

that was never to happen.

A hostile \$4 million takeover of Stromberg-Carlson by the British General Electric Co. (GEC) and the West German Siemens AG company put a glitch in plans for the company's expansion. Instead, Stromberg-Carlson moved engineers into the Reflections Center at 500 Lake Mary Boulevard.

As a result, on March 2 the Department of Commerce asked that the city return the \$2

According to Alberta Simmons of the Department of Commerce, the city had until Jan. 31 to begin the widening construction of Rhinehart Road from two to four lanes on a two-mile stretch between Lake Mary Boulevard

and State Road 46A. On Jan. 11. the city requested an extension which the department considered until they learned about the delay in Stromberg-Carlson's construction plans.

"During the time when we were considering the extension. we were notified that Stromberg was going to be delayed in the expansion date and we had no date as to when they were going to proceed. Given the fact that Stromberg was delayed indefinitely, we had to request the funds back," Simmons said.

The city can resubmit an application for another grant when Stromberg-Carlson decides to proceed with expansion. Simmons said.



## NASA chief says agency back on track

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. In his final speech as NASA administrator, James Fletcher said Wednesday the civilian space agency has recovered from the Challenger disaster but must struggle to keep its budget intact.

"We have weathered severe setbacks," Fletcher, who retires Priday, said in his address the Fifth National Space Symposlum. "Chastened by the hard lessons of crisis, we have recovered and returned to the task ahead.

Fletcher, 69, returned to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration at the request of President Reagan after the Challenger shuttle disaster killed seven astronauts Jan. 28, 1986. He also led NASA in the 1970s when the shuttle program was born.

President Bush has yet to name a successor, but leading members of Congress have been advised by administration of-ficials that Rear. Adm Ricahrd Truly, NASA's associate administrator for space flight, is the leading candidate. Truly, a former astronaut, also

returned to NASA in the shadow of the Challenger accident and was charged with rebuilding the shuttle program.

Sounding a familiar line. Fletcher also warned that America's future in spice, as well as its high-profile space station project, would be in jeopardy if the agency's proposed \$13 billion budget is cut.

## A new form of steroid abuse

It has been disturbing enough for the truth to emerge slowly that some athletes take illegal and potentially harmful steroid drugs to build their strength or stamina. Now it

appears that some young people take the drugs to look better in a muscle shirt.

An article in the Journal of the American Medical Association said that as many as 500,000 adolescents may be using steroids: about a quarter of them use the drugs for cosmetic purposes. Steroids stimulate muscle growth but can also cause mood changes and physical effects ranging from baldness to

sterility to testicular cancer.
Dr. Morris Mellion, who works with the sports medicine program at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, defined the problem as "young guys who want to look attractive." Another way of putting it might

be "young guys whose narcissism overwhelms their good sense."

There ought to be tougher penalties for people who distribute steroids to teen-agers. Unfortunately, the most severe penalties are too often paid by the steroid-abuser: dangerous mood changes, ill health or mentually even death. eventually even death.

## On drugs and jocks

After Olympic gold medalist Ben Johnson disgraced himself and dismayed all of Canada when tests showed he had used anabolic steroids, the Canadian government saked a compalation to bold into the issue of drug abuse among its amateur athletes. Testimony taken'by this impressive inquiry is turning up evidence that the problem goes well beyond sprinter Johnson.

That should come as no surprise, nor

bould anyone be so naive as to think that the problem is confined to Canadian athletes. If anything, the Canadian situation is probably typical. Accordingly, nations throughout the world, including the United States, must not only discourage the practice among athletes but take the decisive action against coaches who recommend the drugs and sports physicians who prescribe them.

Mr. Johnson's coach, Charlie Francis, told

the panel that the Jamaican-born sprinter had been using steroids since 1981. The coach also admitted that he introduced Mr. Johnson to steroids and that nearly a dozen other Canadian athletes whom he had coached had taken the drugs. Finally, he named the physician from whom his athletes reportedly received the druga. Canada deserves credit for trying to get to

the heart of the matter instead of making Mr. Johnson the scapegoat for a pervasive practice. The message coming out of the inquiry seems to be that nothing short of a cooperative effort among nations to ban anabolic steroid use by their amateur athletes will wipe out the problem.

Already the United States and the Soviet Union have agreed to permit each side to begin testing the others' athletes for drug abuse well before the start of the next Olympics. A voluntary program of this kind in the past would have added integrity to amateur sports and might have spared Mr. Johnson his fall from public grace.

Americans were so hungry for order in the classroom and achievement on standardized tests that we willingly bought the sales pitch of this carnival barker.

A year ago, I rhapsodized about his accomplishments in a column, and after 30 years

## We are as barbaric as they

CHICAGO — The police cruiser crawls, like a cockraoch across worn linoleum, throght the concrete and glassless dirt of an urban unarscape called Cabrini Green. It is a public-housing project on the Near North Side, not far from the posh shops of Michigan Avenue's "Magnificent Mile" and cheek-by-jowl with some gentrified yuppydom.

This placeter of high-rise and helf-shandoned

This cluster of high-rise and half-abandoned buildings is a dispiriting beat for the two police officers who give their passenger a laconic lecture on their experiences as part of the half-hearted pretense of government in the project. They describe which gangs control which buildings, which weapons are used in the sporadic fire-fights tht crupt between building-fortresses, how many foolhardy peo-ple have been hit by snipers while trying to cross the free-fire zone between buildings.

Public housing, particularly in high-rise configurations, usually is a concentration of pathologies. During today's drug plague, public housing has become recrudescence of the worst of the American frontier — Dodge

City without a marshal. So, you modern-day Jeffersonians, you who think that government is best that governs least: Welcome to your world. It is Hobbes world, where life is always poor, nasty and brutish and often is short. Public housing here is anarchy tempered by Juvenocracy - power wielded by adolescents.

Cabrini Green will eventually be eradicated by the most powerful and revered social force. the real-estate market. Developers are salivating for these '70 or so acres near good shopping. The concentrated pathologies will be shuffled away, perhaps even dispersed. But they will be re-concentrated daily in the public

In a series of hammer-blow reports, the Chicago Tribune has documented its characterization of this city's school system as "instututionalized child neglect." The bureaucracy and teachers' union are culprits. However, the reports rightly stress that two-thirds of the students live in poverty and come to school from environments of deprivation that would defeat the best intentions of even the best

One high school provides day care for the children of its students. 90 percent of whom come from public housing. At another school, a 14-year-old girl is in her third pregnancy. "Another student," the Tribune reports, "sleeps with five other children on three piled-up mattresses in an unheated apartment. During the winter the boy often came to school smelling of urine because it was too cold for the smaller kids to get up go to the bathroom at night." A teacher asks, "How can you learn when people tell you you smell of piss, and you

Some sixth graders, never having used

rulers, do not know how many inches are in a foot. Some eight-year-olds from homes without books tear pages from school books to use as toilet paper. Some children come to kin-

dergarten still not tollet trained. There are first graders who have not learned numbers or colors. "A teacher," says a teacher, 'cannot take mom and dad's place. What am I going to accomplish when mom doesn't take the time to pick up a can of peas and say, 'Green! Round! Peasl'?"

This panorama of pain, waste and perpetuation of squalor and violence is a chilling example of rebarbarization. It is the cruption of primitivism in the midst of urbanity. Let us have no more abstract arguments about the relative

life is poor, nasty and brutish and is often short

importance of nature and nurture in the formation of individuals. Look around here, and in all other cities, and you will see the consequences of the abandonment of nurtur-

In Anne Tyler's novel "Breathing Lessons," a woman attending classes to prepare for natural childbirth exclaims. Breathing lessons - really. Don't they reckon I must know how to breathe by now?" To which a wise woman responds, "I remember leaving the hospital with Jesse and thinking. 'Walt. Are they going to let me just walk off with him? I don't know beans about bables."

She continues: "You're given all those lessons for the unimportant things — pianoplaying, typing...But how about parent-hood?...Before you can drive a car you need a state-approved course of instruction, but driving a car is nothing, nothing, compared to...raising up a new human being.

In any city in any age, a walk among the underclass is apt to be a walk on the wild side. with glimpses of deeply moving bravery, tenacity and heroism in nurturing. However, the drug epidemic and the disintegration of families under the pounding of today's urban poverty is giving us a glimpse of how much social regression can occur in a modern

## Chemicals fill the air at Navy shipyard

WASHINGTON — The graveyard shift runs round the clock at the Puget Sound Navy Shipyard north of Seattle. Employees there are exposed to deadly chemicals without proper protection while they work feverishly to refurbish Navy warships.

Jim Denny knows the dangers firsthand. The 33-year-old painter has worked for 12 years at the shipyard and recently learned he has asbestoels, a lung condition that comes from breathing asbestoe dust. Denny's father died with asbestoels in 1982 after work-

in 1982 after working for 26 years at the same shippard. Denny's father put

in his time at Puget Sound before the shipping cannounced tough new controls for handling hazard-ous materials such as asbestos. But documents smuggled out of the shippard and our interviews with the tough controls may be only lip

Workers still use compressed air to blow dirt and paint off of ships before repainting them. These "blowdowns" are supposed to be conducted under

strict federal guidelines because they fill the air with dangerous paint particles — and sometimes asbestos dust. Paint shop workers often wear respirators, but other workers around them breathe the dust kicked up during a blowdown.

they are under pressure to sacrifice safety for production

Last November, two painters were instructed to "pretend stupidity" if anyone asked them what they were doing while they blew down the engine room of the fast-attack submarine, Scahorse. The note to act stupid was in the shift turnover instructions obtained by our associate Stewart Harris. In contrast, those instructions say nothing about how to isolate the dust kicked up by the workers.

Sources at the shipyard told us they are under pressure to sacrifice safety for higher production. The government-owned shippard competes with private contractors for the Navy's business. Workers have been told that if production falls off, they could lose their

Iri what appears to be a recognition of a race against the clock, the shift supervisor who instructed his people to "pretend stupidity" also reminded them on the same record that the Scahorse already had been in dry dock for more than two years

Two other painters told us that blowdowns were often conducted on the Seahorse without proper controls. Several others said they witnessed or were involved in un-controlled blowdowns on the submarine Tunney, which is still in the shipyard.

Last year, workers sandblasted and chipped paint from the guided missile cruiser USS Texas. Several weeks later tests revealed that the paint contained asbestos fibers. Two workers, who talked to us only on the condition that they not be identified, said their personnel medical records still do not include a notation that they have been exposed to asbestos. Jenniser Kelley's campaign loan was not listed in the itemized contribution and loan listing in the report, although it was listed in the wrong column on the summary page. A sub-sequent corrected report, filed March 1 at the request of Supervisor of Elections Sandra Goard, showed the loan was made Feb. 6.

Davis's complaint states the loan violates Florida election laws that prevent campaign contributions from being made after elections. The complaint further asserts Jennifer Kelley knew Eoghan Kelley was pro-

viding campaign services paid by himself throughout her election bid, but not billing her campaign account, which Davis alleged is another elections law violation.

Davis further alleged that by making the loan, Jennifer Kelley showed she didn't have enough money in her campaign account to pay her husband at the end of her campaign. State laws pre-hibit candidates from acquiring materials and services unless they have enough money to pay for them.

Kelley said she was not knowingly violating the laws. She said she had tried to check with Goard to see if the loan was proper, but Goard was unavailable the week she submitted her report. "I just de-cided, the heck with it," Keiley said. "Let's go ahead and file it and if there's a problem, we'll take care of it."

Many of the allegations in the eight-count complaint could constitute felonies under state law and Kelley and her husband could face fines and prison sentences if criminal charges were brought and they were convicted. Jennifer Kelley also could face removal from office.

problem by 19.7 percent. The random telephone survey included the responses of 1,084 Florida residents 18 years or older, said Edward DeClair of the FSU policy sciences survey research department. The poll, which was conducted between Jan. 23 and March 1 has a margin for error of four percent.

Drugs and drug-related crimes were mentioned by 18.7 percent of respondents.

Some 48.5 percent said crime in their neighborhoods is increasing. Crime concerns ranked higher among respon-dents from north and southeast Florida. Growth problems narrowly edged crime as the top concern listed by central Flori-

Although growth was no longer considered the most pressing concern, 67 percent said it remains a problem in their communities, the highest percentage since the question was first posed in 1986.

The greatest support for limiting growth came from southeast Florida, at 67.7 percent. In north Florida, the figure was 43.6 percent.

Environmental concerns ranked third overall, at 10.1 percent. The figure was 3.1 percent in 1988. Central Flori-

dians gave the environment the most mentions, at 12.6 percent.

The telephone survey of 1,064 Florida residents aged 18 or older was conducted between Jan. 23 and March 1. The margin for error was plus or minus 4 percent.

In other findings, economic problems were deemed most pressing by 9.6 percent; social problems including immigration by 9.6 percent; and education by 6.8 percent.

Government was listed as the state's main problem by 4.4 percent of the respondents. Taxes were most frequently cited in that area, at 1.7 per-

## Imported semiautomatics banned

WASHINGTON - The Bush administration, steadily moving toward a public opinion that favors tougher gun control, is prohibiting the import of all semiautomatic weapons.

The administration Wednesday expanded its March 14 temporary ban on the import of 25 types of semiautomatics to cover the remaining 24 foreign-made versions. .

White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said the prohibition would remain in effect until the completion of a review to determine if the rapid-fire guns, as required by law, have a legitimate sporting use.

Lawmen, ranging from police on the street in Los Angeles to federal drug agents in New York, complain that a growing number of criminals, particularly drug lords, arm themselves with so-called semiautomatic "assault weapons."

## Migrant farm workers mainourished

WASHINGTON — Migrant farmworkers, although laboring amid an abundance of food, commonly suffer mainutrition and hunger accentuated by parasitic infections, a consumer group said Thursday, calling for better government food programs.

Public Voice for Food and Health Policy released the findings

of a year-long study on the nutritional and health status of the 1 million to 3.5 million migrants and their families, and made several recommendations.

"While we have known for some time that migrant farmworkers endure extremely difficult living and working conditions, this report brings to light the cruel frony that this population derives little benefit from the agricultural bounty that surrounds them," said Ellen Haas, executive director of Public Voice.

## Valdez captain remains

HAUPPAUGE, N.Y. - A judge who is an avid environmentalist lashed out at the captain of the Exxon Valdez, angrily setting ball for the surrendered scafarer at \$1 million while accusing him of causing the "worst man-made disaster since Hiroshina."

Justice Kenneth Rohl's de-cision Wednesday to establish bail at \$1 million bond or \$500,000 cash stunned both Captain Joseph Hazelwood and prosecutors, who had asked it be set at only \$25,000.

This is the worst man made disaster since Hiroshima," the judge declared at Hazelwood's arraignment in state Supreme Court. "This stamp of destruction will be on his mind as long as he breathes."

The judge, an environmentalist who lives on Long Island's Great South Bay and whose court chambers are decorated with duck decoys he carved, said he even considered refusing ball because of threats against Hazelwood's life.

"If there were preventive custody in this state, I would

hold him in no ball." Rohl said. Hazelwood's lawyer said the family could not make bail and Hazelwood was taken to the Suffolk County jail in Riverhead,

Hazelwood, 42, emerged from hiding Wednesday for the first time since the accident to surrender to Sulfolk County District Attorney Patrick Henry.

Wearing a black leather jacket. khaki pants, white shirt and red tle, Hazelwood - who lives with his wife and daughter in Huntington, N.Y. - ignored crowds of reporters and photographers

and nervously bit his lip as he was led into the courthouse.

His heavy beard shaved clean, he stood silently with his head bowed as he was arraigned on a New York fugitive warrant stemming from three misdemeanor charges issued Friday in Valdez, Alaska.

Hazelwood, who has a history of alcohol-related legal troubles, is accused of piloting the Exxon Valdez while intoxicated, reckless endangerment and criminal negligence. The charges carry a maximum penalty of 27 months in jail and \$11,000 in fines.

Patrick - head of the panel since April 20, 1987, and a FCC commissioner since 1963 — led the Reagan administration's efforts to reduce federal regulation of American Telephone & Telegraph Co. following the courtordered breakup of the

telecommunications giant. In addition, Patrick fought an extended; high-profile and victorious battle with congressional Democrate over abolishing the Fairness Doctrine, a long-standing FCC policy that required broadcasters to air opposing viewpoints on con-

troversial issues. In an ironic coincidence Patrick announced his resignation Wednesday at the same time a House subcommittee approved legislation resurrecting

the Fairness Doctrine. Patrick, 37, told reporters he was resigning because he felt he had achieved most of his key policy goals and it was time for him to return to the private

"We have accomplished most of the agenda we set for ourselves," Patrick said. "The regulatory process should not stand in the way of benefits flowing from the radical restructuring of the market now

going on.' Patrick, appointed by President Reagan, denied he was nudged out by the new Bush administration, saying his resignation was "absolutely volun-

tary. "The White House has been supportive of me from Day 1," he said.

Patrick said he had no imnediate plans, had conducted no ob negotiations and would renain FCC chairman until the enate confirmed his successor. The National Association of

speech was never printed.
Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev has said the Soviet people must learn the truth about Stalin, not because of the millions he killed but because he initiated the non-market, collectivized agricultural system that persists to this day and retards development.

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



## Prevent too many pets, **Humane Society urges**

With the onset of spring, a responsible pet owner will spay or neuter his pet, according to the Humane Society of the United States.

They will be healthier, happier and won't contribute to the pet overpopulation center." says Phyllis Wright, HSUS vice president for companion animals. She notes that more than 7.6 million 'excess' dogs and cats are killed annually in shelters around the country.

Other spring pet care tips from the HSUS include:

 Dogs should have blood tests performed by a veterinarian to check for heartworm, a growing and usually fatal disease transmitted by mosquitoes. Following the test, dogs should be put on a program of daily preventative medicine.

• Pet owners should resist the urge to let peta run free in warm weather. Animals may get injured, get lost or become the source of unwanted litters.

• Pet owners should take steps in the spring to prevent flea infestations. That may involve flea-bombing the house and treating all pets, as well as outside areas where the pets spend time.

•Runners who want their dogs to accompany them should take care to condition animals slowly. Some dogs, particularly short-nosed breeds, are best left



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# Gynecological exam shouldn't be painful

referred to a gynecologist for a Pap amear. It was very painful. I'm 70, a widow and have not had a pelvic exam for 30 years. Is this the reason for my discomfort or would it be due to the inflammation the doctor found?

DEAR READER: Because of tissue shrinkage, a pelvic exam-ination can be painful for an elderly, sexually inactive woman. The situation is made worse by the normal vaginal inflammation, called atrophic vaginitis, experienced by many post-menopausal women.

I believe that there is no

excuse for a doctor to continue an examination that is painful for a patient. Most responsible gynecologists I know would, under this circumstance, opt for an examination under anesthesia. Such a procedure is safe and infinitely preferable to a painful

I assume you were referred to a gynecologist because your physician suspected that you had a problem. This is all the more reason why the gynecologist should have examined you meticulously, a goal impossible to achieve if you were tense and in pain. I think that your discomfort was due to poor judgment on the part of the gynecologist, not to vaginal in-flammation. If you require further gynecological evaluation. I urge you to insist that your doctor refer you to a specialist who is more sensitive to your feelings.



Willy Nilly chuckled as he surveyed the dummy. "Nice stop, partner, but with luck it might just make 10 tricks." So he won the diamond ace and played a heart. West took the ace and continued diamonds. Willy ruffed, played a second heart to dummy and then led a spade. finessing with the jack. West gratefully won the singleton king. Later the opponents took the A-K of clubs and another trump trick, so as usual Willy Nilly was set in a contract that he should have made.

There are some distributions that would necessitate taking the trump finesse to make nine tricks. East might have five clubs to the ace or king, with the K-x of spades. In that case, should declarer just bang down

ace and queen of spades, East could take the king, underlead his club honor, and on a club return and continuation; West would promote the setting trick. All of that requires the defenders to come up with just the right

plays.
Willy's play would be right if he were in four spades, since then his only chance would be for East to hold K-x of spades. In three spades, Willy made a greedy play, risking losing to a singleton king with West. Note that defeat is certain if East holds four to the K-10. A further postscript is that West, without the spade king, might have been tempted to lead a trump after winning the ace of hearts. After all, West might think declarer had three little hearts and needed to ruff the third round.





The department has assigned File Number 161052 to the project.

A person whose substantial interests are affected by the department's proposed permitting decision may petition for an administrative proceeding (hearing) in accordance with Section 120.57, Florida Statutes (F.S.). 
