Young Vandals Hit Pinecrest

Boys Leave A Wake Of Destruction

Failure of an electrical contractor to fulfill a pact for installation of an electronic intruder warning system in Seminole County public schools may be given as partial cause for the extensive damage done by two young vandals to Pinecrest School Saturday and Sunday.

Jack Brantley Electric, Inc., of Orlando, did not complete installation of the warning system within the time allotted by the school board and the contract was ruled null and void.

Although signs proclaiming the schools to be protected by the warning device had been posted, the ultrasonic detectors had not been completely installed.

Because of this, the two boys, ages nine and seven, were able to smash their way into Pinecrest School and run amok through the 38 rooms of the building, leaving a wake of devastation behind.

Principal Fred Heckenbach admitted at least one window or door glass was broken in each room. No monetary estimate of damage was available immediately.

About 11:25 a.m. Sunday, a neighbor near the school called the police and reported seeing the two boys enter the school after hearing glass break.

Question: How Long Will Goddard Last?

WASHINGTON (HEA) — In five months as boss of the Food and Drug Administration, Dr. James Goddard has made more speeches than any Cabinet member, more decisions than any of his predecessors in a similar time span, and more enemies than he considered safe.

Amazingly, though, he has not yet begun to put the "Goddard Program" in operation. "We've just been cleaning up the problems we inherited," says an aide.

Goddard's basic objective is optimum consumer protection. Though FDA has some 4,000 employees and an annual budget of some \$60 million, it is not large enough to provide perfect consumer protection.

When Goddard took over last January, the agency was about to embark on a five-year program devised by his predecessor, George Larrick. Goddard promptly scratched it. His main objection: "Some of the things scheduled for 1970 should be done now."

Helped by a handful of FDA veterans, he devised a new five-year plan of long-range goals. The veterans were highly impressed with Goddard's grasp of sophisticated management techniques.

"This plan is no pipe dream," says one. "It's a realistic statement of where FDA is going and how it's going to get there. Sure, there will be plenty of problems in 1972 — but at least they won't be the same ones we're facing today."

At first glance, Goddard's public of advising doctors on all aspects of drugs, particularly any recently discovered adverse effects. As the former boss of the Public Health Service's Communicable Disease Center in Atlanta, Goddard is well acquainted with the new epidemiological practices for dealing with such food-borne illnesses as salmonellosis, trichinosis and botulism.

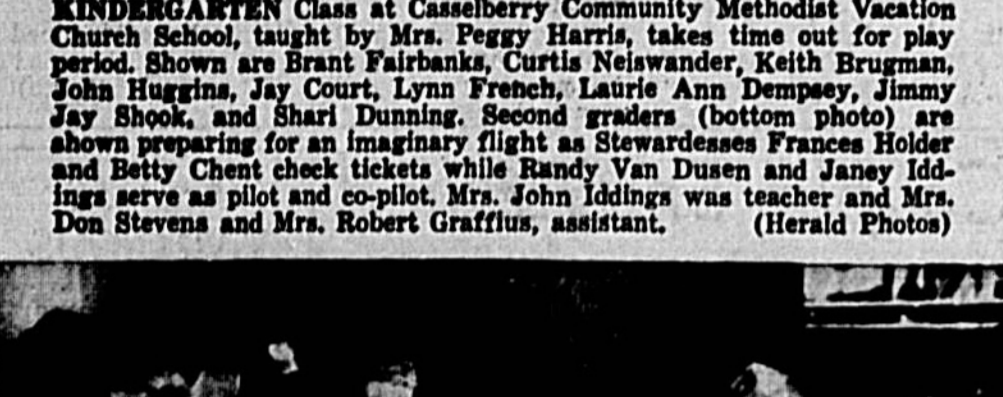

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Solons Question Costs Of Tires

ST. AUGUSTINE (UPI)—Among the first committees in the Democratic legislative caucus which opened here today was one to find out why Florida spends too much for its tires.

The actual caucus does not gather until Tuesday morning, but most of the legislators will register today.

All but 15 of the 124 House members and senators invited indicated they would attend. Forty-seven of the 48 senators and senators said they would attend.

Sen. Yarbrough of Duval called the meeting of a subcommittee on purchasing today to review a report on state tire buying. The study included an analysis of tire prices and practices in 10 states.

The study was ordered when news stories charged Florida paid vastly more for its tires than neighboring states.

Also scheduled today were meetings of the legislative committee on appropriate actions and auditing and the committee on personnel and retirement.

This is the first time the House and Senate caucused at

the same time in the same town. It is also the first time the affair followed so close on the heels of the spring primary elections.

The party gubernatorial nominee Robert King High, will make a brief speech to each group Tuesday. Several Cabinet members are also scheduled to attend meetings.

Airborne Broadcast Set For Central Florida ETV Program

A "first" in the history of public education will take place during the next school year when programs originating at Central Florida Educational Television Station WMFE-TV, Inc., will be simultaneously broadcast to more than half a million students in Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Kentucky and Wisconsin, from a plane.

A program of 22 lessons of Space Science to be aired morning at Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana and broadcast ETV programs from an altitude of 23,000 feet to the 2,000 schools in the immense coverage area.

At the same time that Midwest students are studying Space Science, high school students and Central Florida adults will be viewing 64 television lessons in American Literature, taught by Dr. Arthur Eastman, formerly of Yale University. 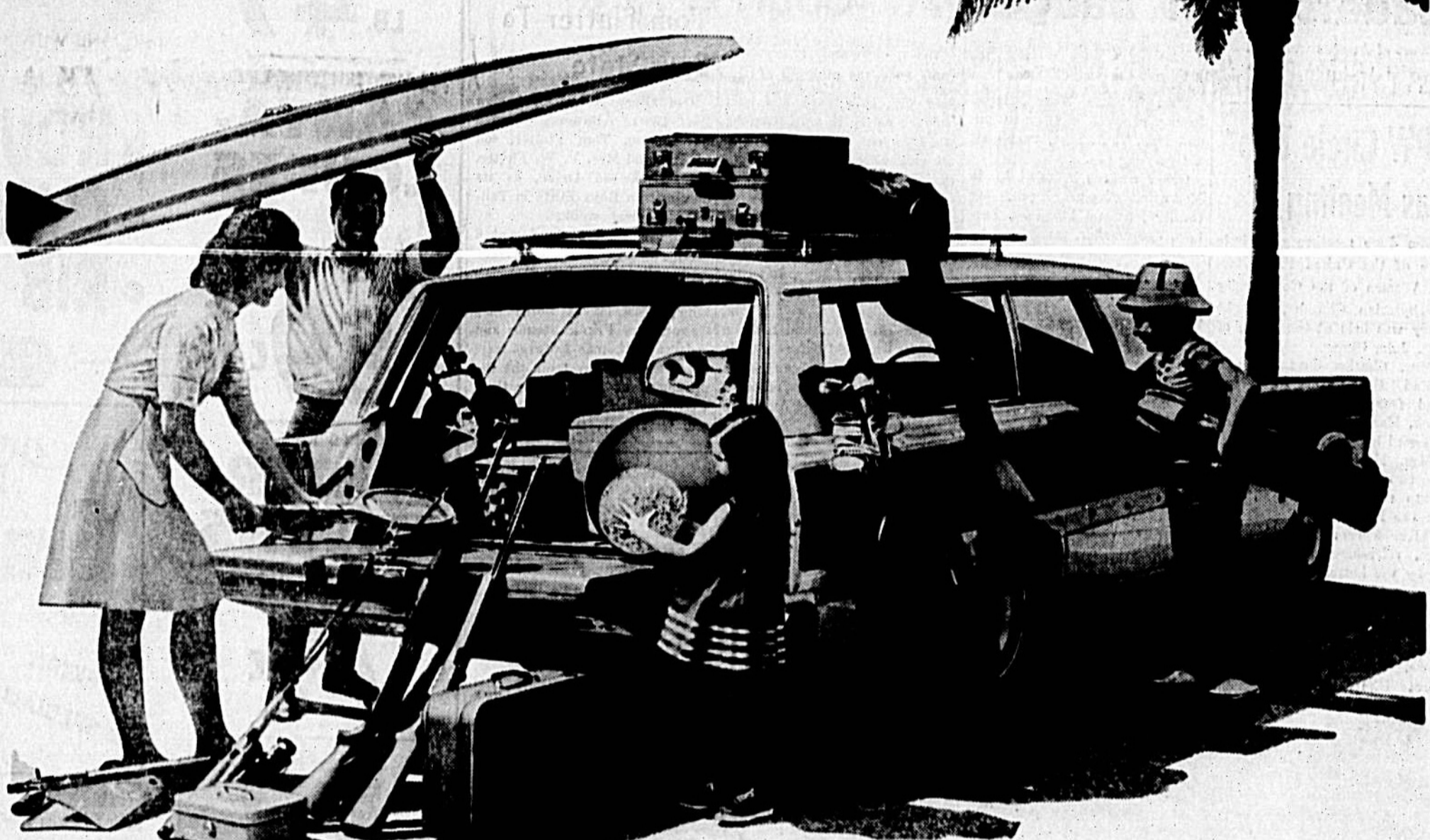

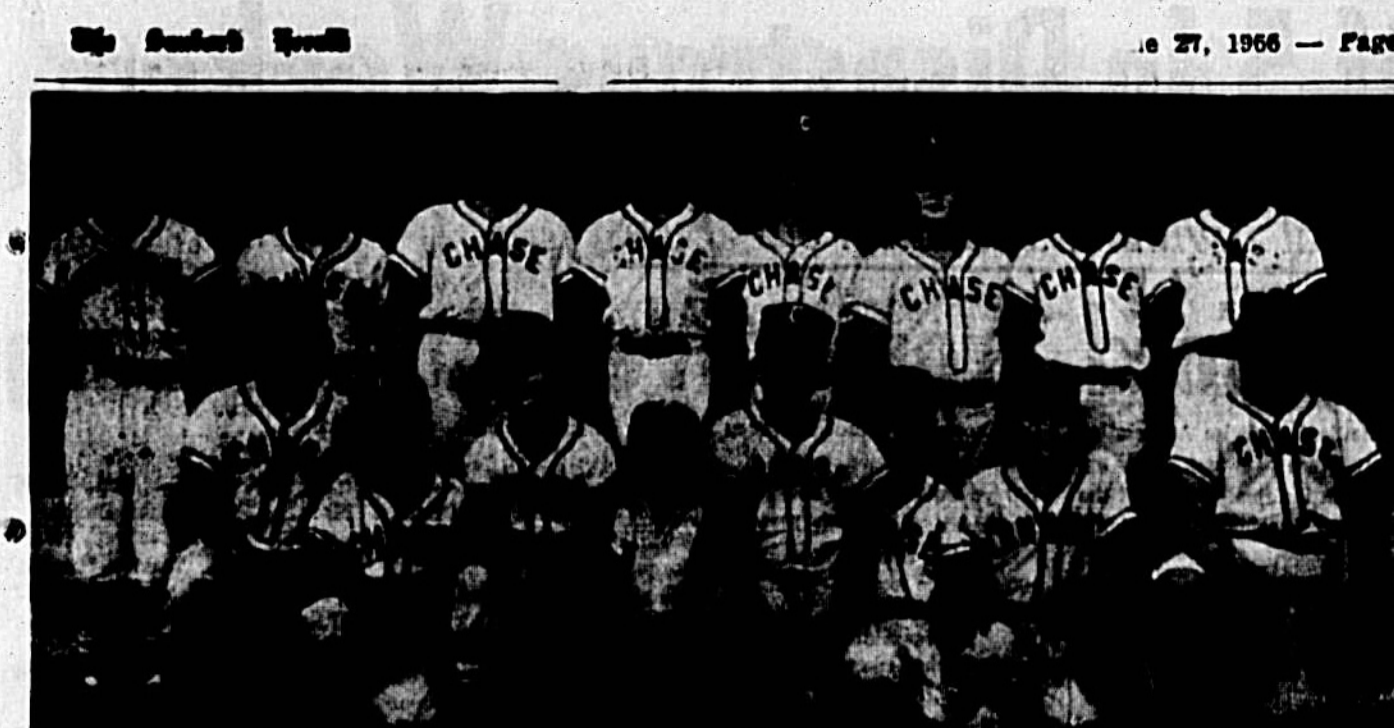

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DEFROSTING MEATS Frozen meats can be cooked starting while they are still frozen, but how long will it take to thaw them if you want to cook them after they have thawed or defrosted? Defrosting in the refrigerator will take a large roast four to seven hours per pound. A inch-thick steak will take 12 to 14 hours. Faster defrosting can be done at room temperature. It will take two to three hours per pound for the large roast. For the small roast, allow one to two hours a pound. That inch thick steak will thaw in two to four hours. Always defrost or thaw meat in the wrapping in which it was frozen.

One way to help banish the bathtub ring is to fill the tub with hot water to just above the ring line. Add a cup of all soda concentrated and let it stand for a few minutes before draining. Use a buttered ice cube tray when making fudge and you'll find the fudge hardens faster.

BASTING SAUCES High sugar or sweetening content in the barbecue sauce? Use it for basting the meat on the out-of-doors grill only during the last hour or the meat surface will turn dark. Sugar causes the sauce to burn easily giving the roast an unpalatable appearance.

Sanford C Of C Denied City Funds

Sanford City Commissioners Monday refused to turn over a quarterly appropriation of \$2500 to the Sanford Chamber of Commerce because James Foley, DVM, representing the Chamber, refused to divulge the names of officers or board members.

"Is this a secret organization? Why won't the members stand up and be counted?" asked Commissioner Earl Higginbotham.

Higginbotham said he had requested a list of names of paid members, a financial report, names of officers and the board of directors and "I have never found anyone, except three people, who will admit being members of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce."

"We are not going to continue to turn over taxpayers' money to a non-identifiable organization of non-identifiable members," Higginbotham declared.

"You are trying to embarrass me and start an argument and I'm not going to fall for it," he added.

"Where is the time and place? I've asked you in a cocktail lounge and on the street and never got any answer," Higginbotham shot back.

Foley steadfastly refused to divulge the names of officers or members, though other commissioners joined in asking the same questions as Higginbotham.

Commissioner Joe Baker said he was "astounded with the work of these men" and wished the funds be made available. The motion died for lack of a second.

Foley contended that the Sanford Chamber of Commerce is only interested in Sanford and "we are doing a damn good job of promoting this town."

He declared that "half the downtown merchants are paid members," but did not name them, saying the commission appeared to be in an arbitrary position" by demanding names and a financial report.

Foley listed as "projects" of the Chamber of Commerce a barbecue for movie star Chad Everett, model of the tropical gardens and promotion of a community litter clean-up. He also listed as a project to get Roy Rogers to settle in Sanford.

He noted a project is the sponsoring of the Silver Dollar boat race from the Sanford waterfront with a barbecue and dance to be staged for the boaters.

The sum of \$2,100 was appropriated in the 1965-66 budget for the Sanford Chamber of Commerce, of which \$1,050 has been paid to date.

In 1964 the city paid bills of \$2,002 for Conservation Week expenses, \$500 for a trip to California for a trip to Washington, D. C., to present conservation plaques to Walt Disney and Sen. Sparkman and land, respectively. These projects were sponsored by the Sanford Chamber of Commerce and "we are doing a damn good job of promoting the city."

Before leaving Foley told commissioners a full report would be furnished at the next meeting of the commission but added, "The \$25 is such a piddling amount, it's not worth my time. We'll probably pay it out of our own pockets."

Seminole Hospital Not OKd

With the federal Medicare program for the elderly becoming effective Friday, local participation still was a moot question today. Seminole Memorial Hospital—the only such facility in the county—was awaiting word whether we have been approved," Administrator Robert Bessner said.

Bessner added that of the 100 hospitals in Florida all but 87 have been approved. Seminole Hospital board of directors were in agreement on the Medicare program except they disagreed with one provision, holding that pay patients should be accorded the privilege of the choice of "room rates."

Meantime, Mrs. Mary L. Simpson, local supervisor of the adult unit, State Department of Public Welfare, announced the agency will pay the \$3 monthly amount for supplementary Medicare for elderly recipients (old age assistance) of state welfare, ages 65 and over. The payment will be made to the Social Security Administration, also, the first 90 of the hospital bill will be paid for these aged state welfare clients under the basic Medicare plan.

All state welfare recipients should ignore the statement for \$9 which the Social Security mailed for the first quarter of July through September for the supplementary Medicare payment and those state welfare clients who already have paid their money to Social Security for this supplemental Medicare coverage will receive a refund from Social Security.

Bessner added that until the Medicare question is resolved between the hospital and the federal government emergency care under Medicare will be given for six days, payable by Social Security. This was confirmed by the local Social Security office.

Next session of the Seminole Hospital board of directors is not scheduled until July 12.

James W. Murray, regional assistant commissioner of the Social Security Administration, told a regional conference at Atlanta, according to United Press International, that "the broadest possible presentation of the program) will be made to the American people as the final consideration of Medicare proceeds."

He said that only hospitals that agree to comply with provisions of the civil rights law will be eligible to participate.
