## Goal: End To Naval 'Incidents'

# U. S. Plans Moscow Mission

HOFFMAN Associated Press Writers WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is reported to send a top Pentagon official to Moscow to start negotiating an end to high-seas harassment and similar cold-war-type naval incidents. The October mission by Undersecretary of the Navy John Warner is believed the first in which a high-ranking U.S. defense official has traveled to the Russian capital for significant discussion with Soviet authorities. Normally, such chores are handled by diplomats. Warner, a lawyer, is director of the Pentagon's new Office of Ocean Affairs. Among his responsibilities is preparation of Defense Department positions on such issues as the law of the sea and the right of passage through various straits. Such administration sources indicate the United States took the initiative in arranging Warner's trip, picturing the mission in the context of gradual movement toward U.S.-Soviet agreement on such basic questions as strategic arms limitations and mutual force reductions in Europe. Officials suggest the United States and Russia share concern in the face of rapidly spreading claims by other countries to extended limits of national waters, sometimes up to 200 miles from shore. One Pentagon source called the Warner mission a breakthrough. The history of the cold war is peckmarked by complaints from the United States and Russia about high-seas harassment. American commanders have told of Soviet travelers in the Tonkin Gulf cutting in front of U.S. aircraft carriers to disrupt plane landings, of Russian destroyers grazing U.S. vessels during an exercise in the Sea of Japan, of Soviet ships steaming through American naval formations in the Mediterranean.

WASHINGTON (AP) — After two public performances to prolonged ovations, a third production of Leonard Bernstein's new "Mass" formally opens the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts today. ## Seminole Records 20th Auto Victim

By LARRY NEELY The death yesterday of an Oviedo man brought the death count to 20 for Seminole County, surpassing last year's tally of 19 for traffic fatalities. The year 1966 was the deadliest ever on Seminole highways since 1952, according to a report of state accidents. The second deadliest year was 1969 when 24 persons died, Seminole County's year could easily pass the 1969 total with the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays and the opening of Walt Disney World remaining before this year's end. Nearly 60 deaths have been recorded in neighboring Volusia County which brought concern from the Highway Patrol. In an effort to slow the pace of the highway massacre in Volusia, the Highway Patrol instituted "Operation Safe Space." Norman M. Brandt, 41, of Oviedo, was killed yesterday when, officers reported, the pickup truck he was driving strayed across the centerline of Geneva Drive (SR 426) in Oviedo and struck a garbage pucker driven by Richard Aaron Evans, 41, of Geneva, near the intersection of Geneva Drive and Lake Charm Drive. Oviedo Assistant Police Chief Wesley T. Place, who investigated the accident, said witnesses to the mishap stated Brandt was traveling at a high rate of speed and failed to negotiate a curve. Evans told police he saw the pickup and tried to get out of the way. When the garbage truck stopped only the left rear tires were on the roadway but the garbage truck was wedged under the left side of the garbage truck and... ejected the use of three workers from Atlanta and... to pull the two tangled masses of steel apart. The pickup was listed as a total loss and the garbage truck had \$3,000 damage to it. Evans received only minor injuries and was treated on the scene by Herndon Ambulance attendants. The two passengers in the garbage truck, Donald Siv, 20, of Chulotua, and Ronnie Kinnard, 25, of Geneva, were uninjured. The fatality is the city's first this year. Assisting Place in the investigation were Constable Chester Boyd and Trooper E. W. (Ernie) Jacobs.

## Other 'System' To Follow No Freeze Extension

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon told Congress today the current 90-day wage-price freeze will not be extended. But he said it will be followed by some other "system of wage and price stabilization" to be worked out after consultation with leaders of Congress, business, labor and agriculture. In an address prepared for an unusual joint session of Congress — and broadcast live via television and radio — Nixon said he would be meeting within the next few days with a cross section of leadership from in and out of government. "The chief executive, whose first session will be held Friday with AFL-CIO President George Meany and other union representatives, said those he has invited to confer with him already have agreed to do so. Nixon gave no hint as to the type of stabilization program he will favor once the current freeze expires Nov. 13. However, he did say: "Regimentation and government coercion must never become a way of life in the United States. Price and wage stabilization, if it must be only a way-station on the road to free markets and free collective bargaining in a new prosperity without war." Nixon said it was customary for a president to ask Congress for bipartisan support in time of war. "I ask bipartisan support in meeting the challenges of peace," he said. As for specific requests Congress, Nixon urged that three tax proposals be unveiled Aug. 15 as part of a blockbuster economic program should be given "first priority" — before all other business. These measures, now being considered by the House Ways and Means Committee, would remove the 7 per cent excise tax on auditing and write-off privileges to businessmen investing in new plants and machinery, and accelerate by one year income tax exemptions now scheduled to take effect Jan. 1, 1973.

Pods of the sixth, seventh and eighth levels are almost completed and the students were selected for the opening day. The construction is in a stage of operation under trying conditions with all of the work of building still going on. In one part of the school students move from class to class under the watchful eyes and directions of their teachers while workmen are busy in the adjacent portion of the complex. As the water chlorinator was not yet of school it was necessary to supply bottled water for drinking purposes.

# Trade Retaliation Seen A Japanese Possibility

WASHINGTON (AP) — The possibility of retaliation if President Nixon retains the 10-percent import surcharge too long clouded the opening day of a two-day economic meeting between the United States and Japan.

The possibility was raised by Japan's Foreign Minister, Takeo Fukuda, leader of a Japanese delegation of seven cabinet ministers and a strong candidate to succeed Prime Minister Eisaku Sato.

Secretary of State William P. Rogers arranged to open the ministerial conference with a statement calling for revulsion of the Japanese yen and cooperative measures between the two governments to restore health to the world monetary system.

At a news conference on the eve of the economic meeting, Fukuda said Nixon's economic actions, particularly the surcharge, have had a big impact on world trade.

"If it (the surcharge) continues a long time, it may well bring about retaliatory measures," the foreign minister said. "We hope that the surcharge will be discontinued at the earliest possible time."

Fukuda conceded the Nixon economic measures, preceded by the President's announcement of a visit to Peking, which caught Sato by surprise, produced a double shock in Japan.

He said he would discuss Sato's reaction to the United States in co-sponsoring a resolution at the U.N. General Assembly to give Peking a seat on the Security Council in place of Nationalist China.

# \$1 Million Grant Bid For Housing

Sanford City Commission, after meeting with Sanford Housing Authority board members Wednesday night, directed Mayor Lee P. Moore to head a contingent of city and housing officials to Atlanta's regional office of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to seek a \$1 million grant to bring the city's public housing units up to par.

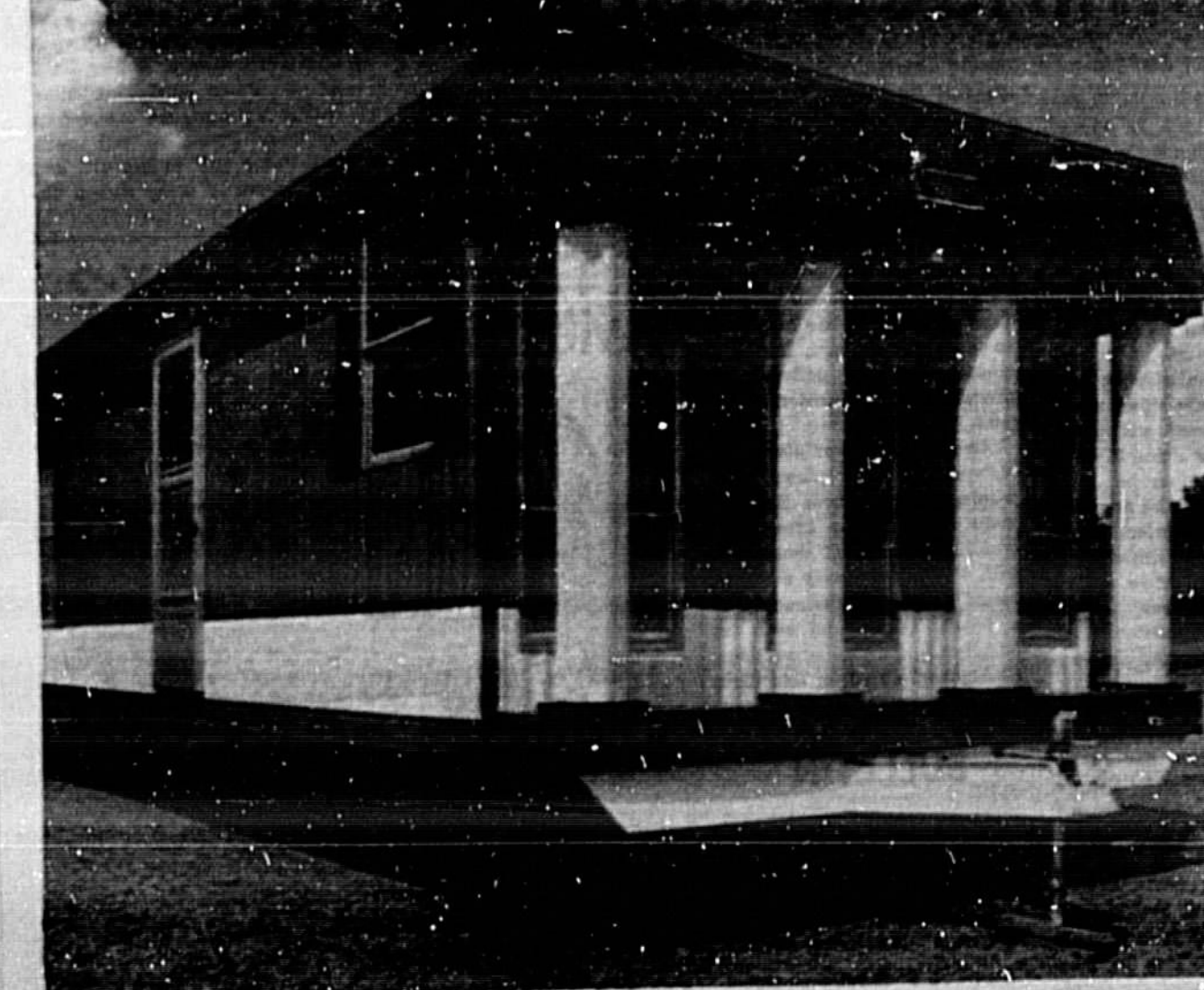
City Manager W. E. Knowles and Gordon Bradley, Sanford's housing director, were asked to contact the appropriate Atlanta officials to arrange a meeting as soon as possible to seek additional federal money in the form of grants to update the 280 units of Sanford public housing.

The session between the housing board and city commissioners resulted after tenante launched a campaign seeking improvements in a list of grievances brought on by what they called "poor conditions" at the federally funded units.

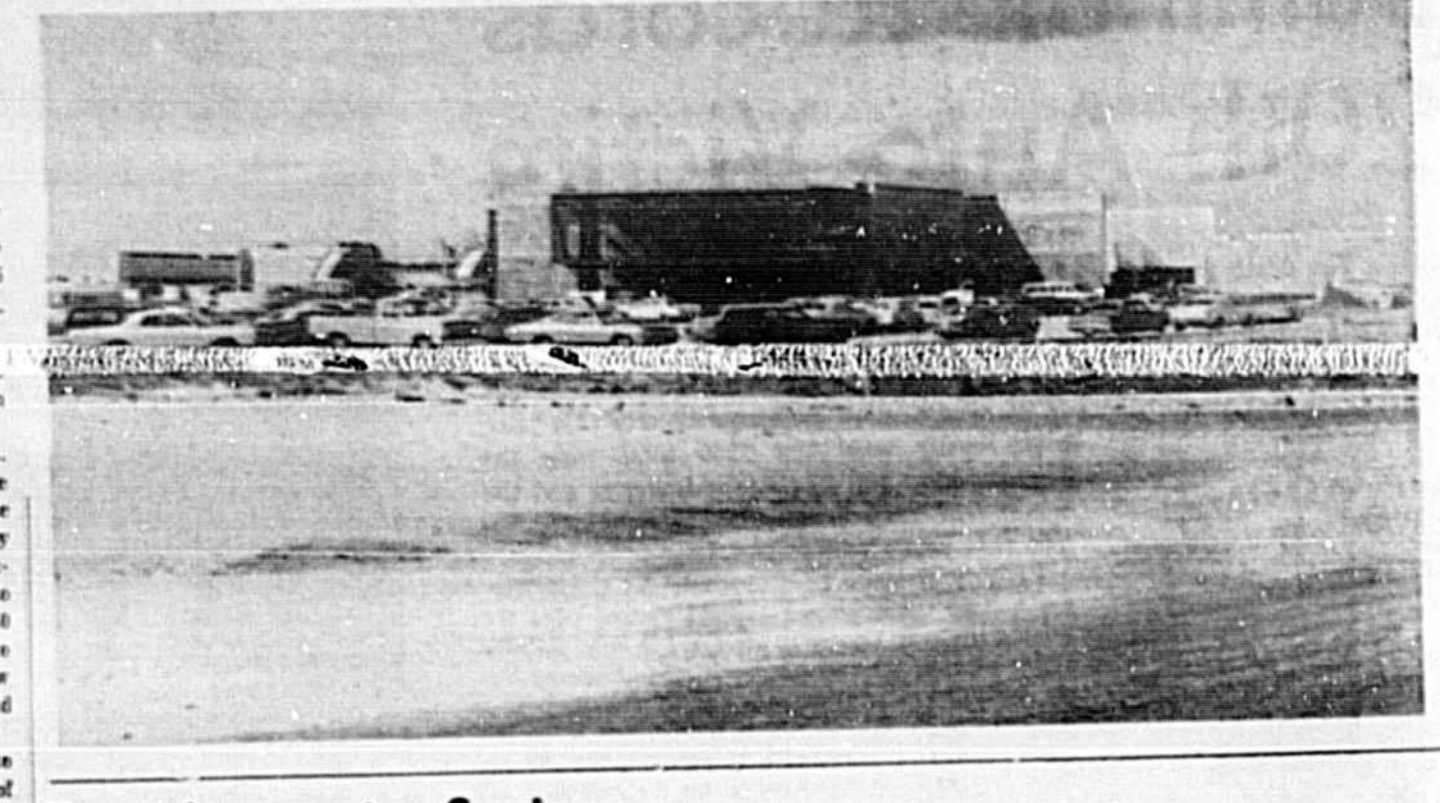
The city manager provided for Wednesday night's meeting, a copy of the findings made by a team of HUD officials and Florida Community Relations board headed by Athalie Range.

The HUD recommendations for operating the Sanford projects are:

1. Revise an organizational chart for administrative and maintenance departments.
2. Consider employment of an additional administrative clerk and a social services aide.
3. Revise personnel policies.
4. Give consideration to improvements of overall administrative practices such as but not limited to the following:
  - A. Preparation of a tenant handbook.
  - B. Establish a fixed amount as a security deposit.
  - C. Develop a personnel handbook for housing department employees.
  - D. Improvement of management tenant communications.
  - E. Improve rent collections.
5. Revise policy relative to charges for excess utility consumption.
6. In discussing the HUD findings, it was brought out by Andrew Speer, Housing Authority attorney, that efforts already have started toward implementing as many of the recommendations as available funds will allow.
7. A black administrative clerk for the housing office has been hired and as soon as funds are available a social services aide will be hired to help apartment dwellers with problems, Bradley said.
8. It appeared from the statements of Speer, Bradley and other housing authority members the situation that caused the unsettled conditions in the public housing projects were brought about by lack of funds generated by rentals from the 280 Sanford units in the appropriate manner.

# Altamonte Mayor Protests Hassle On Insurance Is Continued

By MARION BETHEA  
ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Following a statement last week by Mayor Lawrence Swedford that "I'm not going to talk insurance, I'm so down on insurance companies," he apparently experienced a mood change since insurance discussions consumed the bulk of the attention of City Council this week.

The first discussion centered around the rate for fire insurance in which the mayor told council that citizens are paying a premium of between \$20,000-\$30,000 yearly. Swedford went on to say that the fire department, in which considerable improvements had been expended, including a new \$40,000 diesel pump, is not saving any money. He added that if the city had no fire department the cost would not be any more excessive.

Swedford said that he is "going to get with the insurance people" to talk about the rates and as well as investigate the underwriters system. He said it is his hope the discussion will result in better rates, but if this does not occur, he will initiate a campaign for the lower rates.

Other areas, he continued, have lower rates and some do not have the improvements which Altamonte Springs affords. "We don't have to live this way," he said.

Group insurance occupied the other discussion. Councilman Keith Nixon told council that of the companies submitting proposals, four were almost equal in benefits.

City Attorney R. J. Davis Jr. told council the city is excluded from increasing benefits to the employees if there is an additional cost to the city which would, in effect, increase the employees' benefits, prohibited under the wage-price freeze.

Some controversy arose over the fact some city employees are not covered by the group insurance. Davis stated this could cause a problem with liability in the event of death if the family assumed the employees to be covered. Of the 70 employees, 33 are covered by the insurance.

Swafford said he would not vote for a plan which would reduce the employees' wages by \$12 yearly. The matter was resolved with Nixon being requested to prepare a spread sheet for council's study next week as well as his recommendations for the group insurance program in which the amount as present, obtaining the maximum benefits for the amount spent.

# Grid Cards Seeking Defensive Big Play

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The St. Louis Cardinals' Bob Holway has ideas on "big plays" in football, and a major percentage revolves around defense.

Thus the Cardinals' new head coach, installed in February, is more concerned about pass rush than rushing prior to the National Football League season but two weeks away.

Holway, four-season drill instructor for the Minnesota Vikings' famed Purple People-Eaters under Bud Grant, comes by his attitudes naturally.

"When the Vikings won the NFL title in 1969 we had just as many points resulting from the 'big play' on defense as we did the big play on offense," he says.

"On defense you're always got to be on the attack, forcing the other team to make mistakes. Offense is inconsistent. Defense, if it's secure, will keep you in every game."

In remodeling a basically stout Cardinals defense this only at inbacking, his early anxieties have been lack of pressure on opposing quarterbacks in three preseason games and dropped passes, both offensively and defensively.

"A lot of pass rush may be raw, natural ability and it seems that the only player we have with the ability to be a great rusher is Ron Yankowski," Holway remarks.

In referring to Yankowski, a 6-foot-5, 225-pound rookie defensive end, Holway hinted changes could occur in a front four last year consisting of Hal Knauer, Bob Rows, Fred Heron and Chuck Walker, all of whom are back.

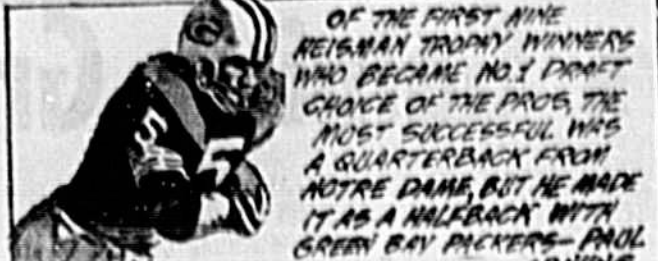
Holway inherited a club which he concedes "has championship potential" and "the potential to go all the way offensively on any play." The Cards, after a strong beginning in 1970, faltered and finished 8-1, third in the National Conference East.

Departments Holway considers strong and stable include the defensive secondary—which consists of cornerback Roger Whitt and Miller, Farr and safety Larry Wilson and Jerry Stovall—the receiving and running.

Task-like MacArthur Lane added through opponents' lines for 877 yards in 1970, third best in the NFL, and vets Johnny Roland and Cid Edwards added 392 and 350, respectively.

If the Cardinals are benefit of a top-schooled quarterback, Holway has shown no dismay. Jim Hart and Pete Beathard are neck-and-neck for the starting job. "Either can do the job, but it won't be both," Holway says.

# A Devine Headache: Starr Goes Packing

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — Dan Devine had the third best college football coaching record in the nation over the last 18 years at Arizona State and Missouri, but his first setback as head of the Green Bay Packers came four days into training camp this summer.

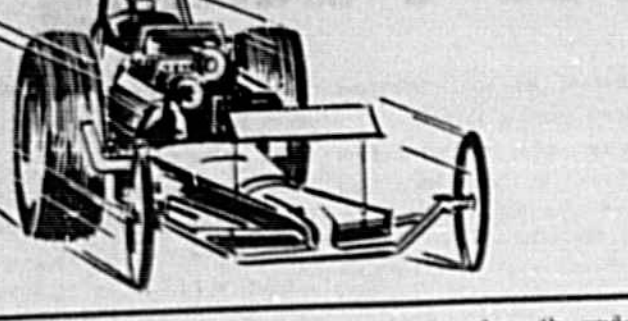

# U. S. Choppers Assist Viet Troops Drive To Laos

By GEORGE ESPER  
SAIGON (AP) — American helicopters ferried 1,000 fresh South Vietnamese troops to within two miles of the Laotian border today in a major drive to clear the demilitarized zone spearheaded by U.S. B52 bombing strikes.

No contact with the enemy was reported as 15 helicopters carried the South Vietnamese infantrymen in more than 60 lifts to landing zones south of Highway 9 and Khe Sanh.

About 25 B52s, making their heaviest strikes in more than three weeks, dropped 750 tons of bombs on North Vietnamese positions extending from the southern half of the DMZ 20

miles southward below Khe Sanh.

The raids inside the buffer zone were aimed at North Viet name troops who reportedly had pulled back in advance of the South Vietnamese offensive launched Monday, which has grown to 13,560 troops. The ob ject of the drive is to disrupt enemy supply routes and infil tration corridors leading into South Vietnam from Laos and the DMZ.

There has been no major fighting reported, and Maj. Gen. Pham Van Phu, directing the operation, said thousands of North Vietnamese had fled north across the DMZ during the preceding two weeks of one-way resistance.

U.S. 24th Corps artillery sup ports the South Vietnamese in the northern sector because they lack the long-range howitzers and 150mm guns.

In a smaller, parallel operation farther east toward the populous coastal lowlands, South Vietnamese infantry reported killing eight enemy troops and capturing one pris oner during the preceding two weeks of one-way resistance.

# Thieu Frets Over U. S. Assistance

SAIGON (AP) — President Nguyen Van Thieu is increasingly worried that the U.S. Congress might cut off or drastically reduce aid to South Vietnam if he runs unopposed in the Oct. 3 presidential election, in formed sources said today.

Thieu is reported concerned despite assurances made by U.S. Ambassador Ellsworth Bunker P. Rogers that the Nixon administration has no in tention of abandoning the Thieu government.

Sources said that in a series of recent meetings with ad visers, Thieu has mentioned the possibility of resigning to forestall a cutoff in U.S. economic and military aid by Congress.

"If the U.S. doesn't want me as president, if they just tell me that directly, I will resign rather than have aid to South Vietnam cut off," Thieu was reported to have said.

He added that a coup attempt would be absurd "because there would be no winners in a

# School Busing Gains In North And South

Court-ordered integration-by-busing plans appeared to be gaining headway today in many Northern and Southern schools despite scattered incidents and parent resistance in some cities.

In Pontiac, Mich., was an accomplished, if not yet ac cepted, fact after two days al though tensions continued high. Police arrested 11 persons, most for disorderly conduct, Wednesday.

Nine children were injured slightly in fighting between black and white students at one junior high school.

Some 9,000 of Pontiac's 24,000 public school pupils are being bused outside their neighbor hoods under a plan ordered by a federal court.

About 200 parents of Boston public school children continued to battle a busing and transfer program, taking their young sters to the schools they had at tended the previous year.

The Boston school depart ment had 124 of 206 white chil dren showed up at the Joseph Lae Elementary School where they were reassigned for racial balance. But only two arrived on the special bus for them. The department said 533 of 630 nonwhite pupils enrolled.

Officials refused to official register while children reas signed to Lee who showed up at their old schools and said they hoped the parents would accept the new plan in a few days.

Mobile, Ala., public schools opened without incident Wednesday despite cross-town busing of more than 6,300 stu dents to achieve racial balance. The system with 68,000 pupils is the largest in the state.

In Dallas, white student counts in predominantly black schools increased Wednesday, easing concern over first-day tallies that showed several high schools with largely one-race enrollments.

Florida school systems have been opening smoothly through out the week with few protests.

"But is it a great building?" architect Edward Durell Stone was asked.

"It is a great building," he replied slowly, after reluctant to give his approval to such an all-encompassing term or simply too modest at the moment for self praise.

Stone, a graceful, powerful man with a receding hairline, is the latest creation, the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, which opened officially today.

"It has power with dignity," he said.

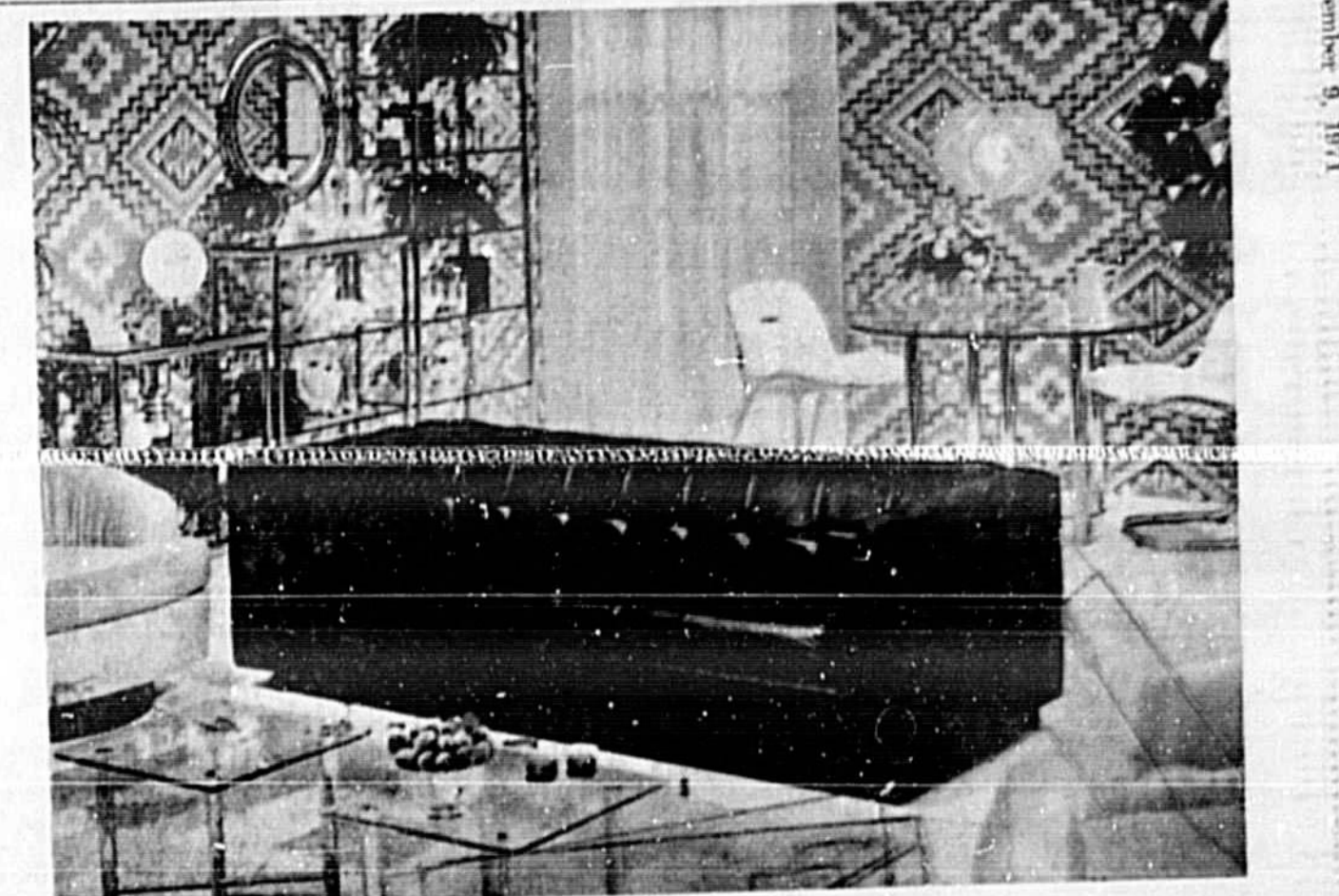
"The personification of archi tecture not only as an art and art but as a business too, Stone has blended the power of the mind and spirit with capital, planning, and a staff of more than 200 to make a huge, profitable enterprise.

From offices here and in Los Angeles and Palo Alto, Calif., he and his associates plan hospitals, hotels, museums, libraries, colleges, office buildings, atomic reactor centers, stadiums. And they build them anywhere in the world.

It is so big a business that one wonders how any one individual can impress his personality on it, but his associates claim he does.

The latest project involved Stone's efforts for 12 years, during the last 10 of which he donated rather than charged for his personal services. He attended to minute details, said an associate, and was involved in every square inch of the building.

"This was an opportunity," Stone said, "a unique opportu nity—a monument to a great president and a chance to build a building on a good site. You'atn't

SAN FRANCISCO — John Mikulski has been around the San Francisco waterfront since he was a kid delivering groceries to ships. The last eight of his 22 years of his department, the waterfront has been his beat.

He has noticed some changes in foreign sailors those last few years.

"When I first came on the department we'd come across all kinds of them drunk. But it seems they've got more control of themselves these days—like maybe they've been ordered not to raise hell.

"There aren't as many of them for one thing. Every ship now, automation has done to sea duty what it has done to farming."

The old image of sailors was built on pirate lore, war stories and wanderlust. The sea lured the troubled mind, sailors earned typhoons in rickety, greasy tankers and unleashed their fury and melancholy to ports. In time it became a sailor's job parts of himself and crew books for hands, peg legs, eye patches. Age only made him more surly.

Foreign sailors are mostly young men now, half perhaps under 25, some as young as 15. More often than not there are a couple of women on board, something which used to mean bad luck.

And nowadays ships are so modern, many are like apartment complexes. An elevator may whisk you up to your wood-paneled, carpeted cabin with comfortable furniture and pressed beds, built-in showers.

Forty-odd-hour workweeks are common. Food and wages are good and you can still see a piece of the world and save money, too.

That is because there's much time in which to spend it; the sea has become mastered by big fast ships on tight schedules.

"I read Russian I know what they're saying about me, the creep," he said. One story called him lucky in his last match. "Yeah, I picked up the right piece by accident."

Accident is now the word for the unheard-of wall-to-wall seven straight victories at the qualifying matches in Spain, Fischer went on to smash Russia's Mark Taimanov 4 to 0 and Denmark's Bent Larsen 6 to 0.

Fischer has brought excitement, drama and hope to America since he was a teenager from Brooklyn at age 14. Once considered the enfant terrible of chess, he has put aside temperament and quarrels with officials in his bid to win the title. He competes in a mind-twisting board game where tense competition has made men cry with disappointment or clutch their nervous stomachs.

Spirits are up. His supporters see his possible victory as a propaganda coup for the United States.

A golden gallery slave, looking like a September morn in the glare of August, wears a faying pan and calls out, "Bienvenue (welcome), Ile du Levant."

The huge sign at the ferry landing proclaims the island to be the Centre Mondial du Nudisme—world center of nudism—and lays down the law in four languages:

1. High moral standards are essential.
2. Filming and photography are strictly forbidden.
3. Noise is not allowed after 10 p.m.
4. The minimum is compulsory everywhere except along the seafloor.

The minimum, it becomes rapidly apparent, is a small triangle of cloth tied about the waist with a string. It is the uniform for strolling through the unpaved byways of Heliopolis, the only village on the island, for doing out in the cafes, for shopping in the marketplace.

A gendarme, one of four assigned to the island by the national police, was on duty at the dock to see that the rules were observed. One could tell he was a policeman by his kepi, his round flat-topped policeman's cap. ## 'Fern' Spills Over Galveston, Texas

Hurricane Fern drenched the Galveston (Tex.) area with heavy rains and flooding today while Hurricane Edith threatened widespread flooding in Honduras. Both storms hit land in sparsely populated areas and were losing strength as they moved inland.

Even spawned two tornadoes and lightning which set six houses ablaze in Texas, the storm struck the level of a tropical storm from 90 to 60 miles per hour.

Edith, still whistling at 160 miles an hour moved further inland than expected, lessening the danger to the northern Honduras industrial and banana coast ports. Her winds had been as high as 175 miles per hour.

Thousands evacuated the Galveston area Thursday as Fern dawdled over the Gulf of Mexico some 20 miles offshore.

At 4:10 a.m. the leading eye of the storm swept inland in a sparsely populated area some 25 miles southwest of Freeport and churned over the swamplands of the upper Matagorda Peninsula.

Two tornadoes spawned by the storm uprooted trees and tore shingles from homes at Texas City and destroyed six homes on Galveston Island. Four inches of rain fell at Galveston, flooding some streets and highways.

# \$20 Million Housing Plan Major Project Shown

A \$20 million housing development incorporating town houses, patio houses, apartments, shops, swimming pools and play areas on 106 acres now owned by H. L. Hunt and situated on Sanford Avenue at Onora Road, with main entrance on Sanford Avenue, was unveiled at Thursday night's Sanford Zoning and Planning Board meeting by Orlando builder Brailley Odham.

Odham, who has developed several housing projects, including Sunland Estates, south of Sanford on U.S. 1792, appeared before the zoning commission to obtain its reaction to the construction plan which includes curved streets, 150 town house units, tennis courts, a shopping center, swimming pool to be included in the first 50-acre phase.

Odham said he has an option to purchase the acreage and would proceed with the first 50 acres to be developed with town houses and patio houses in the future. The complete 106-acre development could be done over a three-to-five year period, Odham said.

The builder said engineering on the site would start as soon as the zoning board approved his concept, which is totally unique as far as Central Florida is concerned, since only in Miami has patio type housing with enclosed areas been constructed.

Odham said he hopes to begin actual work by December and added he had to exercise his option to purchase from Hunt by Oct. 15.

Since the Zoning Board approved the Sanford City Commission must give acceptance based on the zoning board's recommendation. Odham said the property would have to be annexed to the city, to receive Sanford's water and sewer services.

Gerald Dale, city planner, said the proposed development would have to be done under the city's Planned Unit Development (PUD) rules for zoning purposes.

Odham agreed to make minor changes including two tennis courts for parks instead of a four-acre site, after receiving approval. Two cut-de-ree areas (Continued on Page 1A, Col. 2)
