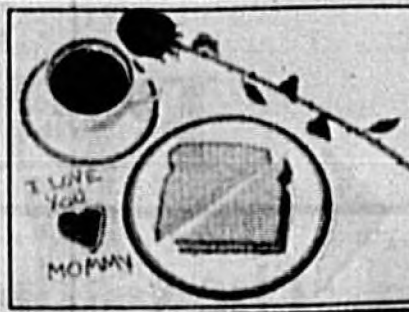

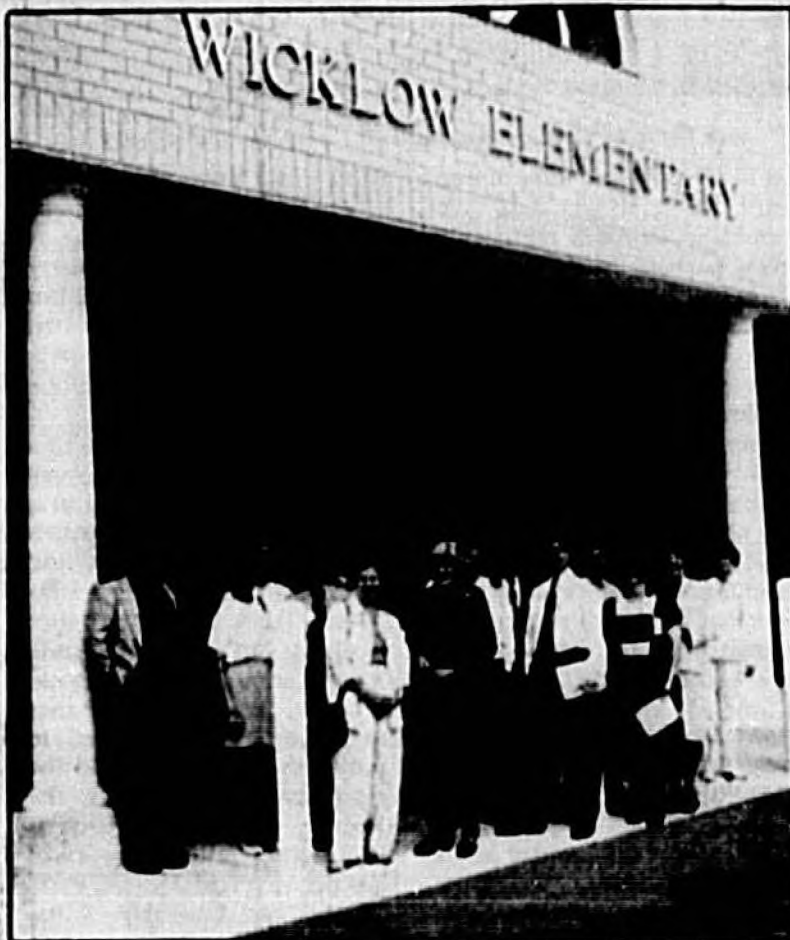

## Sanford chamber: 'See for yourself'

SANFORD - "See for yourself" is the correct response to criticisms of Sanford area schools according to the Sanford Chamber of Commerce. Realizing the importance of quality education to prospective home buyers, the chamber and Seminole County Public Schools jointly host a semi-annual Realtor Tour.

"It is the perception we are fighting, not the reality," explains Jane Lane, Business Partnership specialist for Seminole County Public Schools. ## Maloy: Adult club wars costing county big money

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The Sassy Merlot's saga is getting hotter and more expensive. Seminole County attorneys are meeting today to devise a strategy to counter a circuit court order by Judge Alan Dickey in favor of the nude dancing club.

They need approval from at least three of the county commissioners Tuesday before filing an appeal to the 5th District Court of Appeals.

"Judge Dickey is wrong once again," Deputy County Attorney Lonnie Groot said Thursday. "I've asked for recommendation that we go to the 5th District Court."

The county wants to close Sassy Merlot's, one of two strip clubs which opened in unincorporated Seminole County last year while the county was rewriting its adult entertainment code. The county insists Sassy Merlot's is operating unlawfully. Sassy Merlot's not only remains open but may stay permanently.

"We have no choice than to challenge the order," County Commissioner Grant Maloy said today. "But what bothers me is that all this shows is the poor legal strategy we have received."

"The first big mistake was challenging these clubs during last year's moratorium," Maloy said. "For some reason, three commissioners

thought this was the right thing to do. We've spent \$300,000 in attorney's fees and Tuesday we're being asked to put out \$300,000 more for legal services from Shutts & Bowen. I will not support that."

More than likely, Maloy will ask that No. 24 (the legal consultant agreement) be pulled from the list of 42 items on Tuesday's Consent Agenda and reviewed separately. Item No. 26 (a \$250,000 contract award to Shutts & Bowen for title search services) may need a second look, also.

Commission Chairman Randy Morris disagrees with Maloy's opinions about the adult entertainment process and says in the end the county will prevail. "We knew this was going to be a long and arduous struggle," Morris said. "Remember that one judge (Leonard Wood) ruled in our favor, and another against us. We've disagreed with Judge Dickey since Day 1 and we still disagree."

Wood made VIP Gold stop its adult entertainment activities, and that decision also is awaiting a call at the 5th District Court of Appeals.

Dickey's order stated that the county must treat Sassy Merlot's in the same manner as any legal clubs and that it was legally operating when the county passed its new adult codes. He wrote: "The court finds that River Capital, Inc. Please See Adult, Page 2A

In the citrus category, Gloria Dunmire, of Casaiberry, won first place and award of distinction for her Citrus Coolers. Jeanine Taylor was second with her Southern Ambrosia Punch. Jayne Morrison was third with her Tropical Citrus Salsa. Marianne S. Menzel was fourth for her Lemon Luah.

In the celery category, Dean Davenport, of Geneva, won first place with his Celery Cheese Focaccia. William Pizzo won second place for his Oviedo's Lite Delight. ## McDowell sentenced

ORLANDO - Former University of Central Florida football coach Gene McDowell will be spending much of his time doing community service and paying a \$2,000 fine for his part in a cellular telephone scandal last year.

McDowell, 58, who was also sentenced to 180 hours of home confinement, warned his players there was an FBI probe and then lied to federal agents and prosecutors investigating the use of stolen phone numbers by members of the UCF team. McDowell lost his job as coach. Federal Judge Anne Conway said McDowell's role in the incident was "unforgivable."

## Student environmentalists dig in to design nature trail

SANFORD - Idylwild Elementary School gifted program

students study concepts, guided by their teacher, Dr. Robert Speira, chosen through consultation and brainstorming.

Nature was one of the concepts selected by 4th graders this year. In January, students designed an environmental trail behind the Idylwild school yard. First, they located where the trail would be etched out. Next, they brainstormed on the tasks that would be required and identified groups for each task.

Dr. Speira explains: "Every student initially helped with clearing leaves, rocks and roots to unveil the path. Next, they broke into specific groups such as the beautification committee. This committee carved out the entry way to the trail. The entry is also a butterfly garden. When a major portion of the trail is completed, students will create a brochure complete with map."

## The Catholic Church: Helping those with AIDS

The Orlando Catholic Diocese is helping individuals with AIDS and their families. As Fr. Jack Flynn, Associate Pastor at St. Augustine Catholic Church in Casselberry says, "we are here to serve everyone, they don't have to be Catholic."

Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) is the destruction of the immune system resulting from infection with the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV). Those infected with HIV gradually lose immune functions along with certain immune cells.

With this loss, a clinical syndrome, a group of various illnesses that together characterize a disease, develops over time resulting in death from opportunistic infections. This causes the infected person to become open to pneumonia, infections and other ailments.

AIDS was first conclusively identified in the U.S. in 1981. At that time, 189 cases were reported to the Centers for Disease Control. Within a decade the disease had spread to virtually all of the populated areas of the world. In the U.S. alone there are over 65,000 new cases every year.

Ordained in 1971, Fr. Jack Flynn has been in Orlando since 1988. Around 1992, he took a class with Fr. Tim La Bo, St. Margaret Mary's Church, who was spearheading the Orlando AIDS Ministry with Theresa Simon. Fr. La Bo realized that the Diocese need-

ed to set up some kind of ministry. His goal was that there would be an AIDS ministry in every parish.

Fr. La Bo started the AIDS Ministries because he came into contact with AIDS patients at a local hospital. Sister Julie Sullivan is director of the AIDS Ministries. She is also involved with CENTAUR as a part time counselor that also helps people with AIDS.

The two facilitator's of the training for certification as a member of the diocesan AIDS ministry are Fr. Flynn, associate pastor at St. Augustine Catholic Church in Casselberry and Wayne Phelps, RN. Phelps is a member of Good Shepherd Parish and is a former Navy nurse as a Lieutenant Commander at the old Naval hospital.

Phelps is also a 3rd year pastoral ministry student, gradu-

ating in May under the Franciscan Order. Phelps says, "The most important thing is not so much that the ministry volunteers know medicine, but that they see this complicated subject from a physical, psycho-social and religious aspect."

After training, ministers in a "Buddy Program" either work alone or in groups of 3-5 in a Care Team. Most of the AIDS ministers are non-clergy, and represent their particular parish. There are 70 parishes involved in the Orlando Diocese area. "We do this," said Fr. Jack, "just to be sure that people are informed and to make sure that we are on the same page throughout the Diocese, so that no church is duplicating the efforts of another."

The first Saturday of the training which occurs about 3-

4 times a year, they present the medical aspects of AIDS and the AIDS ministries with Phelps leading the training. On the second Saturday the pastoral aspects with Fr. Jack leading the training. Part of the whole training process is for people to go back and minister to their own parish.

How did he get involved with the program? Fr. Jack said, "I wanted to become someone who would be there for people with AIDS. Because people with AIDS are treated as outcasts, or they are often times afraid to even speak about the disease that they have, there's so much of a judgment against them."

Part of this fear he explains, "is because AIDS deals with sexuality and intervenes drug use. Because of that we are unwilling to talk about those subjects." Also, it should be noted that AIDS affects everyone. "People," Fr. Jack continues, "feel that sometimes when someone is sick, it is a curse or punishment from God. It's not that at all."

What's looked for in someone to join the AIDS ministry? "Put the example of Jesus into practice by what we say and do, and be a compassionate listener and to be someone who wants to be a companion. In general, Fr. Jack said, "in ministry, it is to give them the gift of our presence, to be with them, to serve them and walk with them on their own journey."

service projects for the benefit of the environment. Students can be trail guides.

Working on the trail created a variety of learning opportunities, according to Dr. Speirs: "In addition to research, all students keep a journal where they reflect in writing how their actions can make a difference in the environment."

He went on to explain, "The pond committee is digging out a manmade pond while researching and studying the necessary components to make the pond. They are raising tadpoles in the classroom. Students are learning that frogs are sensitive to pollutants and chemicals, so the transition from the classroom to the trail must be a careful one."

Additional student commit-

tees include the bridge, insect, animal and bird committees. The bridge committee built a foot bridge. Signs are being made to identify plants and trees for those traversing the trail.

Dr. Speirs incorporated many ideas taken from the National Wildlife Federation. He teaches students about famous environmentalists such as Aldo Leopold (1887-1948). Because Leopold stressed each individual's responsibility to be a "steward of nature," a future goal is to have students join the National Wildlife Federation's "Steward of the Earth" program.

Fourth grade students Alex Graham, (Wicklow) age 9, Meagan Moore (Wilson), age 10, Dave Howcroft (Wilson), 10, and Jane Carter Gilmartin (Pine Crest), age 9, recently

discussed their time spent working on the trail. These students, along with others, are bussed to idylwild every Monday from their home schools.

Each has a favorite part: Alex, the bridge; Meagan, the flowers; Dave, the artifacts; and Jane, the entrances, "because they are so pretty."

They agree it has been a lot of hard work. Says Alex, "We've worked hard and it's pretty good so far." Meagan adds, "There's a lot of work involved, but I think it's very much worth it." For her part, Meagan hopes the trail will "draw people and will help people understand (nature)."

But for Jane the trail is not only about nature, but about accomplishment: "It shows people kids can do stuff, too."

The tour, sponsored by the chamber, PNC Mortgage and Chelsea Title, began at the Orlando Sanford Airport. TransWorld provided the transportation for the 38 real estate agents who took Tuesday's tour.

Each tour highlights one of the different area elementary schools, alternates between Sanford Middle School and Lakeview Middle School, and includes Seminole High School.

Sherry O'Leary, "Choices" Facilitator, spoke to the real estate agents who participated in the tour earlier this week. O'Leary gave an update on the Magnet and Cluster Programs that affect Sanford schools.

Elementary schools in the Sanford area, with the exception of Goldsboro, are grouped into 2 clusters containing 3 schools each. The Choices program was implemented to ensure racial balance within elementary schools in the Sanford area.

When a new student registers for school they are assigned, by computer, to one of the schools in their cluster. Prospective home buyers would not know in advance which of the 3 elementary schools their child would attend. Some established residents, unhappy with their child's school assignment, have already expressed disappointment, stating that they purchased their homes because of a specific school. School zoning has always been subject to change.

Goldsboro is a magnet school. Any elementary school age student in Seminole County may make special application to attend Goldsboro. Students are accepted on an availability basis based on race and grade.

The newest Sanford elementary school, Wicklow, was on the recent tour, along with Sanford Middle School and Seminole High School. Adam Lutringer, with Higgins & Heath Inc Realtors Lake Mary office, particularly enjoyed the chorus and band performances at Sanford Middle. Lutringer complimented the student's at SMS and Seminole High School on their excellent musical performances.

A tour of the Sanford Historic district completed the morning. Narrator for the tour, Jerry Mills, chairman of the chamber's Education Committee is an architect and gave the real estate agents interesting information about architectural styles in the historic district.

Mills was born in Sanford, attended Sanford public schools, and is a graduate of Seminole High School. The real estate agents enjoyed the per-

sonal touch added by the Sanford native.

Though Lutringer is familiar with the Sanford area, he appreciated the updated information about the plans for future building in the commercial district. Lutringer felt the tour

would help him to better represent the area to his clients.

Maureen Golmont, Watson Realty in Longwood, attended the previous tour and was very impressed. "Not having first hand knowledge (of the Sanford area), it was very informative."

that it has a substantial likelihood of success on the merits, that it would suffer irreparable injury if it were not granted this Temporary Injunction and

the harm to the general public in this matter is not outweighed by the harm to the moving party with respect to the Temporary Injunction."

"The county has the right to appeal - that's to be expected," said attorney Hugh Trees, who represents Sassy Merlot's and VP Gold. He said the county's problems stem from "embarrassingly sloppy" work the county did writing and re-writing its new adult codes. "They were offered help to do it the right way."

Trees said that Sassy Merlot's owner Doug Bangle has broken no laws and has the constitutional right to operate his business. "That's what this is all about. 'Sassy Merlot's' should not be treated any differently than the other legal clubs."

"Seminole county has rules and will do what is needed to protect those rules," said attorney Andy Brumby from Shutts & Bowen. "Judge Dickey's order needs to be addressed. I expect the commissioners will do just that on Tuesday."

# Putting medicine in perspective

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** A couple of hundred years ago, doctors routinely bled patients for a variety of ailments. I've read that such a savage ritual actually killed many patients. How did this practice eventually come to be recognized as false?

**DEAR READER:** Medical history books are certainly check-full of bizarre practices that make today's practitioners wince. Along with bleeding the patient, early doctors used purgation (enemas and laxatives), ice baths, and a host of unpleasant (and often dangerous) techniques that were supposed to cure — but rarely did. These strange treatments were embraced because our forebears had little or no knowledge about the causes of disease. Bacteria had yet to be discovered, effective drugs were nonexistent, and these doctors had only a vague appreciation of physiology.

With the advent of the scientific revolution, the bases for diseases and their treatments changed dramatically. Bleeding and purgation were discovered to be simply ineffective practices that did more harm than good.

Reflect on this: Are we in much the same position now? Will our great-grandchildren marvel at today's cruel and ineffective therapies? Will they be astounded to learn that something like cancer was treated with surgery ("What's surgery, Grandpa?") and chemotherapy? In the future, genetic diseases will probably be treated with conservative gene splicing; children will be vaccinated against cancer, and most diseases will be prevented using as-yet-undiscovered medicines. We're smug in our astonishing lack of knowledge and, in many ways, today's physicians aren't that far removed from their predecessors. We do things differently (and somewhat better), but we still have a lot to learn.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My son is prone to getting splinters. Is there an easy way to get them out?

**DEAR READER:** There's nothing easier or newer than the tried-and-true method our mother used. Clean the area in question with rubbing alcohol, soak a needle (to sterilize it), and get to work trying to tease the splinter out backward. Large splinters or those deeply embedded may be drawn out with fine-point tweezers — or they may require surgical attention.

pressure. Therefore, most hypertensives should avoid the candy. Not knowing the nature of your "heart condition," I cannot comment on whether the licorice is safe for you. Ask your doctor to advise you.

## Taking with the dummy

by Phillip Alder

A key aspect of no-trump play (and suit play) is communication. It is no good having the contract-fulfilling tricks sitting in, say, the dummy if you cannot get over there to cash them. You must be careful with your entries.

In this deal, how would you play in these no-trump after West has led the club queen?

North shouldn't waste his time showing that diamond suit. He should go for the nine-trick game, not get partner thinking about a contract of five or six diamonds.

First, count your top tricks. Here, there are five: two spades, one heart and two clubs. That means you need four more tricks, and they can easily come from the diamonds. However,

West's trumps potential entry depends on an untrump opponent holds up the diamond and cash the third round. You will need a dummy entry to the last two diamonds. So, you must win the first trick in hand with the club king. Then play on diamonds.

Let's assume, after taking the third diamond trick with his ace, East switches to the spade queen. Win in hand with the ace (or king), play a club to dummy's ace, and cash the two remaining diamond tricks. Finally, take your other winners to claim your contract.
