England Protests Churchill Statue; Called Gorilla-Like

LONDON (UPI)—critics assailed a new statue of Sir Winston Churchill today as gorilla-like caricature. They said it like hasn't been seen since his 60th birthday portrait that some people said made him look like a turtle. The new controversy over an artist's portrayal of Britain's great leader centered in a \$10,000 statue which has not yet been unveiled.

A picture of the \$100,000 statue published in the newspapers brought denunciations from all parts of Britain. "Gorilla-like," said some. "A caricature," said others. "It's a disgrace." "We don't want it here." "Fancy using our money for that?" ran five comments in Woodford.

**Gambler, Wife Die
Of Slashed Throats**

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI) Police investigating the double murder of gambler Gus Greenbaum and his wife have put out a tracer for a man who once served a prison term for stealing money from Greenbaum. The man being sought was not identified but it was learned Greenbaum signed the complaint which led to the man's arrest. The man, a former employee of Greenbaum, recently was released from Nevada state prison. Police emphasized the man was wanted only as a matter of routine and was not a suspect at the time.

Offer \$10,000 Reward
Authorities are investigating the possibility that the double killing was the work of the underworld but detectives appeared to favor the belief that Greenbaum and his wife died at the hands of a disgruntled former employee.

A \$10,000 reward was being offered for the killer.

Greenbaum, 65, president of the fabulous Riviera Hotel on Las Vegas strip, was found in his home Wednesday with his throat slashed.

Mrs. Greenbaum, 64, fully clothed, her hands tied behind her with her husband's bow ties, and her throat also cut, was discovered 75 yards away in a den.

Maid Discovers Bodies
The grisly discovery was made by the couple's maid, Mrs. Pearl Hay, who notified police and then collapsed from shock.

Henry Goffstein, vice president of the Riviera and a close friend of Greenbaum, offered the \$10,000 reward Wednesday night on the part of the hotel.

The killings were the second and third mysterious deaths in the Greenbaum family in less than four years. In 1954, Greenbaum's sister-in-law, Mrs. Charles Greenbaum, died of suffocation in her Phoenix home. A coroner's jury ruled the death murder but the case has never been solved.

Greenbaum, a former bookie here before heading a group that in 1948 bought the Flamingo Hotel in Las Vegas and made a reported 1 million dollar profit when selling it in 1954, was an associate of slain gangster Dugay Siegel.

**Officials To Seek
\$2,500 Pay Raise**

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The elected members of the powerful state Railroad and Public Utilities Commission will ask the next Legislature for a \$2,500 pay raise.

The budget filed by the commission asks salaries of \$15,000 each for Commissioners Jerry W. Carter, Alan S. Boyd and Wilbur C. King. They now make \$12,500 a year.

Carter and King were recently re-elected to new four-year terms. Boyd's seat comes up for election again in 1960 and he has indicated he will not run again.

It is reported to be considering making the race for governor in 1960.

The budget also asks a comparable pay raise to \$15,000 for General Counsel Lewis W. Petteway who now makes the same as the commissioners—\$12,500.

The total budget request of \$1,655,700 represents an increase of \$401,032 over its current appropriation.

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**Former Navy Chief
To Head Base Bank**

A retired Aviation Chief Storekeeper has been named manager of the Florida State Bank facility at the Sanford Naval Air Station.

Barney Wolford, who retired last summer after 20 years in the Navy, replaces Marvin Crandall, who has been transferred to Mulberry. Crandall will be in charge of the installment loan department in the Florida State Bank in Mulberry.

Wolford has lived in Sanford for two years. His service, which included 16 years of sea duty, ended in August when he was supervisor of the supply department with Faxon 51. He is a member of the Fleet Reserve.

The new manager has completed an extensive training course with the Florida State Bank. President Gene Tucker said this morning, "We were so pleased with Wolford's reaction to the training course that we felt he would be perfect for the job of facility manager."

Wolford is a native of Neptune, N. J. He and his wife, Eleanor, have two children, Michael 11, and Ellen 10. They reside in Pinecrest, at 3008 Park Ave.

**Khrushchev Called
'Well-Informed'**

MOSCOW (UPI)—Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.), who had an eight-hour talk with Premier Nikita Khrushchev Monday, said today the Soviet leader is a "very well-informed man" who "undoubtedly looks upon himself as a policy-maker and not an administrator."

Humphrey, who was summoned to Khrushchev's office on a few minutes' notice, said he found the Soviet premier to be "abreast of just about everything, including the situation in Geneva."

When he was asked how Khrushchev is able to run his country and at the same time keep up with a wide variety of foreign matters, including relatively minor U. S. domestic happenings, the senator said: "Khrushchev has about five buttons in his desk, which he probably uses often. He undoubtedly looks upon himself as a policy-maker and not an administrator."

During their talk, the two men sat at the end of a 25-foot desk in Khrushchev's roomy office. Decorations included a portrait of Lenin, a model plane and a large plastic container holding several ears of hybrid Iowa corn.

Humphrey said they were served a sumptuous meal at about 7:30 p.m., without vodka or wine.

Through an interpreter, the two men discussed the Berlin situation, foreign trade, religion, communism philosophy and other topics. Humphrey said Tuesday that Khrushchev expressed "enthusiastic approval" of a plan for expanded U. S.-Russian cooperation in medical research.

The senator declined comment on other matters discussed at the meeting, saying that he prefers to "begin with areas of agreement rather than discord."

He appeared pleased, however, when he emerged from the talks.

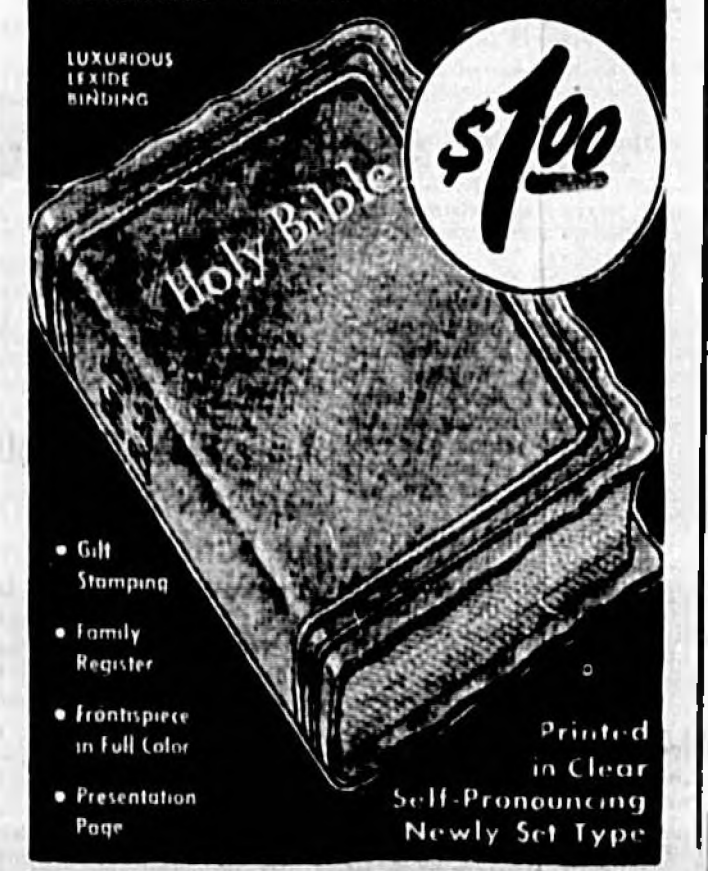
The Rev. John Thomas officiated at the services. Remains will be sent to Cleveland, O., for final disposition.

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Lauren Bacall Will End Movie Career

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Lauren Bacall is pulling up stakes, leaving movieland—perhaps forever—because "I have no life here anymore."

The lanky blonde widow of Humphrey Bogart says she is starting a new life, free of the grief and self-imposed solitude she has undergone during the two years since Bogey's death. She is going in London to make a movie and then will settle in New York.

"My entire life has changed in the past couple of months," she says.

"I'm not playing 'Portia Faces Life,' nor the stricken widow. I never have. Bogey always told me not to relive the past—that nothing good could come from it. And he was right. He was always right."

Lauren lounged in the living room of her rented home, smoking a cigarette in an elongated holder. She seemed irritated at having wasted two years of her life, and eager to start life afresh. Her blue eyes snapped with excitement.

There are no memories of the house to remind her of Bogart, not even a picture of the late actor. Nor does she wear the bracelet with a whistle that Bogart gave her following their first film together. "To have and have not."

"Of course I haven't forgotten my marriage," Lauren said. "How could I?"

"We had a wonderful life together. It was a fine, good life, and I am trying to maintain that standard for myself and the children."

"I didn't have a very healthy attitude for the past two years because of the enormous change in my life. I couldn't get my thinking straightened out. My judgment was clouded, and I became a nothing for a while."

"There is nothing less attractive than desperation and being too intense. Your charm leaves you, and so does your dignity."

"Now I'm relaxed and have direction for the rest of my life." What wrought the sudden about-face to the slender actress? Why has she decided to move away from her friends and familiar surroundings?

"It all happened on a seven-week tour I took to Europe," she explained. "I discovered there's a whole big world out there filled with people who have something to say, and who are willing to listen to what I think. Now I can live positively."

Oranges' Maturity Approval Expected

LAKELAND (UPI)—The Florida Citrus Commission is expected to approve next week proposals that the Legislature raise minimum maturity standards for oranges and that the Commission be empowered to set minimum grade standards for fruit sold in Florida.

The recommendations were made Tuesday by a special citrus industry committee on fruit quality. They will be presented to the Commission at its next meeting Dec. 10 and the Commission is expected to pass them to its legislative committee for presentation to the 1959 Legislature.

But the committee deferred action on a proposal that the Commission also be given the power to change fruit maturity standards, which now must be done by legislative act.

—Voted to ask the Legislature to give the Commission power to waive minimum sweetness requirements for grapefruit headed to processing plants annually from each April 1 to July 31.

—Voted to propose no change in maturity requirements for tangerines, lemons and tangelos, but decided to ask the U. S. Agriculture Department to change its color chart for testing tangerine maturity to "more approximate the tangerine color."

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Reds Tell Big Fish Tale, But It, Too, Backfires

SAIGON (UPI)—A fish that multiplies almost as fast as rabbits found itself caught in the midst of a cold war propaganda battle that backfired on the Communists recently.

The many other members of the aquatic world, the tilapia fish is now being and highly palatable when properly prepared.

In 1953, when rice crops fell far short of demand because of the war in Indochina, 200 tilapia fish were brought into South Viet Nam from Thailand under an American aid project.

Ten fishery stations were established and the tilapia, which spawns every six months and matures quickly, soon was being distributed to ponds on farms throughout South Viet Nam.

The fish proved to be an excellent source of food for the hungry populace.

Tilapia also turned into a good source of extra income for the farmers, who sold their extra fish in cities and towns.

Success of the project caught the attention of Communist propaganda agents and a whispering campaign, designed to make people believe tilapia caused illness and disease, spread over the country.

Sick persons were given tilapia to eat, then were persuaded by Communist sympathizers to tell their neighbors that the fish had caused their illness.

By the middle of 1954, a majority of South Viet Nam's population was refusing to eat tilapia or to allow the fish in ponds on their farms.

A program to tell the people the truth about tilapia fish by a word-of-mouth campaign was started to offset the Communist propaganda.

The counter-propaganda campaign gained momentum when poor people, who had continued to eat tilapia fish because there was no other food available, failed to become ill as the Communists had claimed they would.

However, it was not until last year, three years after the first rumors linking tilapia with disease, that the fish was widely accepted as a safe source of food.

Today, tilapia has regained its position as an important economic factor in Vietnamese life. Aid officials have distributed more than 1,700,000 of the fish to peasants throughout the country.

And persons once fooled temporarily by the propaganda about tilapia now refuse to believe other Communist-inspired rumors about the dangers of using fertilizers imported from America and other aid products designed to increase food production.

Republicans Hurt By 'Right To Work'

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Democratic and Republican Party chairman agreed today Republican candidates were badly hurt in the 1958 elections by campaigns for state "right-to-work" laws.

GOP National Chairman Meade Ahearn and Democratic Chairman Paul M. Butler agreed on this finding in otherwise differing interpretations of the Democratic victory in the Nov. 4 voting.

They discussed the elections in speeches prepared for the annual Congress of Industry of the National Association of Manufacturers, one of the principal business organizations backing right-to-work laws to outlaw union shop contracts.

Ahearn said the GOP had made much progress in winning rank-and-file labor support and shedding the "anti-labor" and "big business" label pinned on it by Democrats. But this year, he said, "the big business versus organized labor image" was revived for most wage-earners when the right-to-work proposition was placed on the ballot in six states and injected into legislative debates in others.

Butler said the right-to-work issue "proved the final undoing of the Republican Party in several large industrial states." From the Democratic viewpoint, he said, putting the proposition on the ballot appeared to guarantee Democratic success.

Otherwise he called the election "a ringing repudiation of the Eisenhower administration," a vote of confidence in Democrats and a mandate for "liberal and progressive" action.

Embargo Scheduled On Citrus At Yule

LAKELAND (UPI)—No citrus fruit will be shipped out of Florida from Dec. 23 through Dec. 30 under a shipping embargo ordered by the federal marketing agreement committee.

The committee, meeting Tuesday, voted to order the shipping holiday, a custom for some 10 years, to keep the market from being glutted in the post-Christmas period when demand for citrus is slight.

In other action, the committee voted to allow the current grade and size regulations for citrus in interstate shipments to remain for the period Dec. 8 - Jan. 3.

Raney Is Honored By Private School

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI)—Students of Wee Little Rock Private School Corp. high school today selected "Thomas J. Raney High School" as the name of their school.

The name honors the president of the private school board, Dr. Thomas J. Raney, a Little Rock physician.

The Woman's Angle

Everything about Mrs. James Ramage defies a choice of adjectives. She is an interesting person, vivacious and vital. She is tall and her black hair and eyes betray her foreign background.

Mrs. Ramage is the wife of Capt. James Ramage, commodore of Heavy Attack Wing One. The Ramages, including daughters Jamie and Jaileen, were transferred from Washington, D. C. to Sanford this year.

Once one has visited in the Ramage home it is hard to visualize all of the furniture and possessions and countless articles being moved anywhere at all. Mrs. Ramage is a collector and has accumulated many handsome belongings over the years, making moving a real headache.

One sees three rooms, all on different levels, upon entering the door. They are divided by low partitions, giving a spacious, airy effect. The first room is a living room, tastefully decorated with modern furniture and grey walls to wall carpeting. This room, in harmony with the rest of the rooms, is highlighted with Oriental furniture. A black teakwood table holds a piece of white moustache coral. The coral contained a lovely arrangement of yellow iris, pussy willows, and greenery.

Striking arrangements are placed throughout the home. Mrs. Ramage mixes artificial and fresh flowers in all of her arrangements. The black teakwood table was her great grandfather's card table, and was cut down to make a low square table. Mrs. Ramage's great grandfather was the Chinese ambassador to the Hawaiian Islands. Mrs. Ramage was born and reared in Honolulu. A great deal of her furniture was handed down to her from this grandfather and other members of the family.

The second room is a sort of exotic family room. One corner contains chairs and table. The other corner centers around a natural brick fireplace, elevated and extending from the wall. A large piece of driftwood sets upon the mantle. It is draped with a fish net which is fastened to the warm wood wall by shells and sea horses. Tiny bits of coral, shells and sea horses are entangled in the net. Huge clam shells from the South Sea Islands cover the mantle. The ceiling of this room and the third room is made of wormwood. A mulberry rug from China covers the floor. The low couches are complemented by low carved tables. These tables were hand carved by Capt. Ramage.

The third room is a Florida room and one corner is typically furnished. The other end of the room contains the family's treasure—two matched antique teakwood tables. The floor is covered with Oriental rugs. On one of the low tables is a Kava bowl from Samoa. It is carved from one piece of wood and was used as a container for liquids by the Samoans. Mrs. Ramage uses it for flower arrangements or salads, according to her needs. Tiny carved figures and other works of art family enjoys barbecuing. The back of the house overlooks Lake Katherine so water skiing and swimming are part of the plan also.

Mrs. Ramage loves to cook and arrest the eye in all of the rooms. Mud prints from 14th century China adorn the wall of one room. The guest room is decorated in shades of mauve. The handsome furniture was made by her father.

and hand carved by her mother. The children's bedroom is a bright sunshine yellow. The master bedroom is a toast color and furnished with black steel pieces. In a drawer in this room Mrs. Ramage keeps her earrings, which she has collected from all over the world. Some of them she has made herself, using coral and shells. The walls are hung with Japanese prints.

A patio in the back is lighted by Hawaiian torches. Here she prepares Lili'i a n, Hawaiian, French, and Japanese dishes. She has a large collection of cook books. The kitchen is small and modern. It is filled with pots and bowls of every description and the shelves are lined with spices. Immediately off this room is a small den. The windows are hung with tapa drapes made from the bark of trees.

The Ramages have a double garage. One side was filled with a pile of weeds which Mrs. Ramage will transform into artistic and lovely Christmas decorations. The door decoration thus far is a large ferns-covered branch from a Palmetto tree, donated by Bart Peterson. Weeds of every description were hanging from the ceiling. Behind the garage is a workshop. Dozens of drawers, large and small, hold felt, net, shells, glitter, mail, ribbon, paint, shells, pearls, and numerous other articles. Christmas decorations and presents are underway. Even the children participate, making plaster of paris Christmas figures to adorn their packages.

Mrs. Ramage covers coffee and lard cans with black felt. Silver braids and teardrop rhinestones make the can an attractive canister. Smaller cans are covered with red felt, bright yarn, shells and braids to make containers for pencils. A true work of art are her waste paper baskets. Arrangements of artificial flowers from the dime store are glued to the front. The entire basket is then sprayed white and the flowers are highlighted with silver paint, added by hand. The result is very lovely. Shell arrangements on baskets are sprayed bronze and touched with gold.

Mrs. Ramage sprays jack balls silver and sticks dozens of toothpicks into them. The toothpicks are sprayed, too, and then the entire ball is sprinkled liberally with red glitter. Miniature green artificial trees are decorated with brass pot cleaners and ornaments and glued to square boxes. Sugar cubes are decorated to resemble packages. Arranged across the box and under the tree are tiny symbols of the recipient's hobby. Washbones are saved and covered with glitter to tie on packages.

Another box in the room held large delicate butterflies, made of net in pastel colors of pink and lavender. They are trimmed in glitter. Mrs. Ramage loves to entertain and decorate. Last year she did the decorations for the luncheon and parties given by the National War College in Washington. A small sprayed tree this Christmas will be decorated with lighted Japanese lanterns and small painted, glittering umbrellas and fans. This, however, is a sideline, says Mrs. Ramage. Cooking is the favorite pastime.

Lacquered fans are used for paper mats and set with Canton china. Ornate carved camphor chests are placed in the dining room and living room. The treasures and Oriental pieces are placed at random among other furniture, but the effect is charming and pleases the owners.

When asked what she has done during her life that she enjoyed most, Mrs. Ramage replied: "Travel. I've just been a Navy wife and tried to stay as close as possible to my husband."

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Housework Auxiliary Has Meet Tips Given

Naturally, you'll want your home sparkling clean and shining for the holidays. While there's no single way to take the work out of housework, your tasks can be lightened by employing a few time-saving tricks.

Mirrors, glass table tops and windows can be cleaned and polished in a sparkling brilliance by adding a little starch to the washing water and then wiping dry with a Kleenex paper towel. No rinse water is necessary.

You can give your floors added luster by mixing in a little liquid floor polish with the washing water and moving the scrub brush or sponge mop with the grain of the wood. Use cold water for washing floors.

Incidentally, you can save considerable wear on knees and skirts when scrubbing floors by cutting away one side and the top of a grocery carton and kneeling in the carton.

Glasses will gleam if you add a few drops of lemon juice to the rinsing water. Porcelain can be cleaned by using salt on a flannel cloth. To wash dirt out of hard-to-reach corners or carved furniture, twist a piece of Kleenex tissue around an orange stick or toothpick.

If your candles are loose in their holders, melt some paraffin and pour it into the sockets. Place candles in sockets while paraffin still is hot.

For the lunchbox. Blend cream cheese or grated American cheese with grated carrots and a little grated onion. Moisturize with cream or milk.

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Braves Favor 10-Team Loop

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Milwaukee Braves are red-hot for a 10-team National League, Warren Giles is lukewarm and most other officials want some more cold facts before they say yes or no.

Joe Calzas, president of the Braves, made it plain today Milwaukee is "100 per cent in favor" of any plan to expand the National League as indicated with the approval of a resolution by league officials.

The National League announced Wednesday it will hire an independent research organization to explore the possibility of expansion among other things.

"We're very definitely for expansion," Calzas said. "We're for it whether it means a 10-club league, a 12-club league or even a third major league. Why stand in the way of progress?"

Giles, re-elected president of the league for a five-year term Wednesday, took something of an opposite stand.

"Right now I'm opposed to a 10-team league," he said. "I won't be for it until someone can show me that two new teams will get enough players of major league ability to present a good attraction."

"I don't want the clubs we have now to be diluted simply for the sake of expansion."

Middle-Of-Road Stand

The majority of other NL officials adopted a middle-of-the-road stand. Some were even more interested in what other facts the research organization might ferret out than they were in the question of expansion.

"This survey could do all of baseball tremendous amount of good," said owner Bob Carpenter of the Phillies.

"I will furnish you with a lot of other information. It will tell us about the minor league picture, perhaps even amateur baseball like the Pony League and the Little League as well as about the economy of certain cities, the facilities they offer and the population trends.

"As for a possible 10-team league, I can't see it at this time, it would be too cumbersome a thing to control. We have a tight, compact league now and with 10 teams, there might be too many weak slaters. Maybe it could be accomplished later, but I'd want to know more facts."

Gilbreath "Open-Ended"

Owner John Gilbreath of the Pirates declared he was "open-minded" on the prospect of a 10-club circuit, such as the American Association adopted with the recent addition of Houston, Dallas and Fort Worth.

"I certainly would not oppose a 10-club league if the findings of this research organization show it would prove advantageous," Gilbreath said.

The Cincinnati Redlegs want to wait and see before coming out for or against a 10-club circuit.

"We won't commit ourselves until we see what the findings are," said General Manager Gabe Paul. "Let's get some facts first before we decide."

Buzzy Baves, vice president and general manager of the Los Angeles Dodgers, said the league was taking a forward step.

"It looks like they're optimistic about a 10-club league, anyway," he said.

Phil Wrigley, president of the Cubs, and Walter O'Malley, president of the Dodgers, were named to hire the independent research organization which will make the survey.

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Surge Falls Short, Gators Bow, 66-63

GAINESVILLE (UPI)—The Georgia Bulldogs rolled off last-minute surge by the University of Florida Wednesday night to nip the Gators 66-63 in the opening Southeastern Conference game for both teams.

The Bulldogs had a 10-point lead with less than four minutes remaining when Florida began its rally. The Gators connected on five straight baskets to tie the game at 60-60.

Seconds later, Florida went ahead 63-62 on a pair of free throws by Paul Meyer. Then Georgia reserve center John Johnson bucketed two quick baskets to give the game to the Bulldogs. Johnson and Florida's Bobby Howard tied for high scoring honors with 14 points each.

Some 5,000 fans watched the game in the Florida gym.

Bob Pettit Grabs Pro Scoring Lead

Bob Pettit's accuracy has finally rewarded him with the National Basketball Association scoring lead.

Pettit poured in 34 points against Boston Wednesday night to help the St. Louis Hawks to a 118-110 verdict and elevate him to the top rung in scoring with 333 points. Elgin Baylor of Minneapolis has 303.

Cincinnati spoiled New York's bid to break a first place tie with Boston in the Eastern Division by edging the Knicks, 110-100, on a pair of baskets by Vern Hatton in the final minute.

Hurricanes Whip Rollins, 104-87

CORAL GABLES (UPI)—The University of Miami opened defense of its Florida Intercollegiate Basketball Conference crown with an impressive 104-87 victory over Rollins Wednesday night.

It was the most points ever scored by the Hurricanes in an opening game.

Rollins led briefly 23-22 in the first half, but Miami regained the lead and never gave it up.

Boyd Coffie of Rollins was the game's high scorer with 28 points. Joe Gardner was high for Miami with 28.

Wilson Inks Pact

DETROIT (UPI)—The Detroit Lions Wednesday gave Coach George Wilson a new one-year contract. Wilson won the National Football League championship last year, but his Lions are hard-pressed to finish above the .500 mark this season.

Joe Cronin Will Become American League Prexy

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Joe Cronin, a one-time weak-hitting rookie shortstop who landed in baseball's Hall of Fame, will officially be named American League president within the next two weeks.

Cronin is virtually "signed, sealed and delivered" to take over as successor to Will Harridge, the United Press International learned on excellent authority today.

When the 52-year-old general manager of the Boston Red Sox is named, he will become the fourth president in league history and the first former ball player to achieve that eminence.

According to the UPI informant,

Cronin was ticketed for the job even before Harridge formally announced his resignation Wednesday at the baseball meetings here. The 72-year-old Harridge said he felt the league was "entitled to a much younger man" as president and the handwagon for Cronin started almost immediately.

"Certainly, I'd consider the job if it was offered me," the popular Cronin said. "But I think all this talk is premature."

Premature or not, there was no doubt that the Boston executive would be selected. The only possible impediment would be if Red Sox owner Tom Yawkey should turn thumbs down on releasing Cronin. There was no virtual possibility of this.

Harridge in his farewell statement said his retirement was "all voluntary" and emphasized that he is "in perfect health."

"With the many problems faced by baseball, I feel they are entitled to a much younger man," he said in his own words.

Harridge publicly asserted there had been no criticism of his operations but it was known that he had told friends recently that he was going to quit "to beat the owners at their own game." He had headed the loop for 28 years.

Ex-Sanford Player Dies Of Injuries

Willie Skeen, who brought fame to Sanford as an outfielder for the pennant-winning baseball team of 1929, is dead at the age of 40.

Skeen died in a Denver, Colo. hospital Nov. 22 of injuries sustained Oct. 27 in an automobile accident.

He came to Sanford in 1939 to play on the team managed by Dale Alexander for wealthy Charlie Bradshaw, Central Florida grove owner and rancher. This team included Sid Hudson, who later hurled for Washington and the Boston Red Sox.

Skeen played for eight teams professionally before entering the Navy in 1944. He was a former teammate of Allie Reynolds. His career in pro ball ended with Denver in 1948. He has since been connected with semi-pro teams.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Vivian Skeen; two sons, John and Wilmer III, and one brother, George.

LOUISIANA STATE: There's no respite for the foes of the nation's top-ranked team. The Bengals have 20 of this year's top 33 players slated to return. That includes All-America halfback Billy Cannon, all-SEC center Max Fugler, quarterback Warren Rabb, fullback Johnny Robinson, fullback Tommy Davis and the entire "Chinese bandit" crew.

AUBURN: Look for the fourth-ranked Tigers to extend that streak of 24 games without a loss. Returnees include all-SEC guard Zeke Smith, center Jackie Burkett, hard-throwing Richard Wood and sophomore standout Ed Dyer.

MISSISSIPPI: There were only eight seniors on this year's Rebel team that posted an 8.2 mark and won a bid to the Gator Bowl. The starting backfield returns virtually intact. The major line losses will be center Milton Crain and tackle Rudolph Smith. Quarterback Bobby Franklin and fullback Charlie Flowers, 1-3 punch, have another season.

VANDERBILT: The Commodores will be hard-pressed to equal this season's record of only two losses.

es. All SEC halfback Tom Moore is the only starting back returning and Vanderbilt loses the heart of its interior defense with the graduation of guards George Deidre and Bill Grover plus center Ben Donnell.

GEORGIA TECH: A generally disappointing season for the Yellow Jackets with a 7-7 tie with Auburn the highlight. But look for Tech to be a serious contender in '50 with halfback Joe Delany, guard Foster Watkins, tackle Ted Thomas and ends Jerome Green and Tommy Rose the only graduates.

KENTUCKY: Halfback Bobby Craven and end Doug Shively will be the only major losses. Figure Kentucky to be vastly improved with the likes of halfback Calvin Bird, quarterback Lowell Hughes and end Ronnie Cain.

FLORIDA: Florida was regarded as the best three-time loser in the nation this fall and got a Gator Bowl bid, but will be hard-pressed next season. Halfback Don Deal and end Dan Edgington will be back.

GEORGIA: If the Bulldogs can find a fullback they will be one of the powers of the SEC. A stand-out backfield will include three seasoned quarterbacks and a host of halfbacks, including speedster Fred Brown and Bobby Walden.

TULANE: Look for a higher finish for Tulane next year. All-SEC quarterback Rickie Pettibone will be back as will all but three seniors.

MISSISSIPPI STATE: This was supposed to be the year for the Maroons with two-time all-SEC quarterback Billy Stacy heading a starting alignment. But State ended in the SEC basement. State will have to start pretty much from scratch in '50.

Celery Bowl To Be Best Show

The Celery Bowl will be inaugurated here tomorrow night between the OBC champion Seminoles and the Apopka Blue Darters.

These two highly-rated teams fought to a 0-0 tie last month in ankle-deep water. A dry field would give all a chance to see which is the better of the two. Tension has been building all week. It should reach its peak at kickoff time tomorrow night.

The largest crowd ever to attend a game in memorial stadium is predicted. This promises to be the outstanding grid game in Sanford history.

The Darters bring an 8-1-1 record here and are in top form. They have one of the outstanding defensive men in the state in Gerald Odum, a 230-pound linebacker capable of giving the Seminoles plenty of trouble. He is not much of a threat around the ends but up the middle he is probably one of the toughest runners the Seminoles have faced all year.

The Darters have a big line, great team spirit. The Seminoles will have their work cut out for the evening. Their only defeat was by Winter Park, 13-7. This gave the Seminoles the OBC championship.

The Seminoles go into the contest with a balance of good running and one of the best passing records in the state. Harold Stone and Dandridge are neck-and-neck in the ground-gaining department.

Vernon Kirk and Ray Lundquist are close behind. Kirk is the leading Seminole scorer with seven TDs, Dandridge and Lundquist are tied for second with four each.

Lundquist has the best per-carry average with 6.3. This is one of the best balanced running attacks the Seminoles have had in many years.

If the Darter defense makes the way of the ground game rough, Dandridge will take to the airways, where he has been so successful all season. With Gerald Jones and Alan Swalm on the receiving end, the Darter defense will be busy. Kirk and Cliff McKibbin are big threats in this department, too.

Although the Seminole line had its trouble early this season, it has come through in the last six games. With Stanley leading the charges up front, there is little doubt that the line will match the Darters play for play.

Immediately following the game, the athletic department will award trophies to both teams and gold footballs to each player. The Sanford Herald will present trophies to the outstanding player of each team.

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Giants Get Jack Sanford To Strengthen Pitching

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Manager Bill Rigney labelled Jack Sanford "the pitcher we wanted" today after the San Francisco Giants pulled off the biggest deal of the current baseball meetings by obtaining the strong-armed right-hander from the Philadelphia Phillies.

Rigney refused to claim a penny for San Francisco but National League rivals already were comparing the deal to the "reap" the Giants pulled in 1954 when they acquired Johnny Antonelli from the Braves. Antonelli went on to win 21 games that season and held the Giants to a world championship.

"We needed a strong-armed right-hander and we think this is the best in the league," Rigney said. "There's a good chance we'll make still another deal," Rigney declined to say.

UPI the Giants were pressing their bids for either Johnny Temple of the Cincinnati Reds or Don Blasingame of the St. Louis Cardinals.

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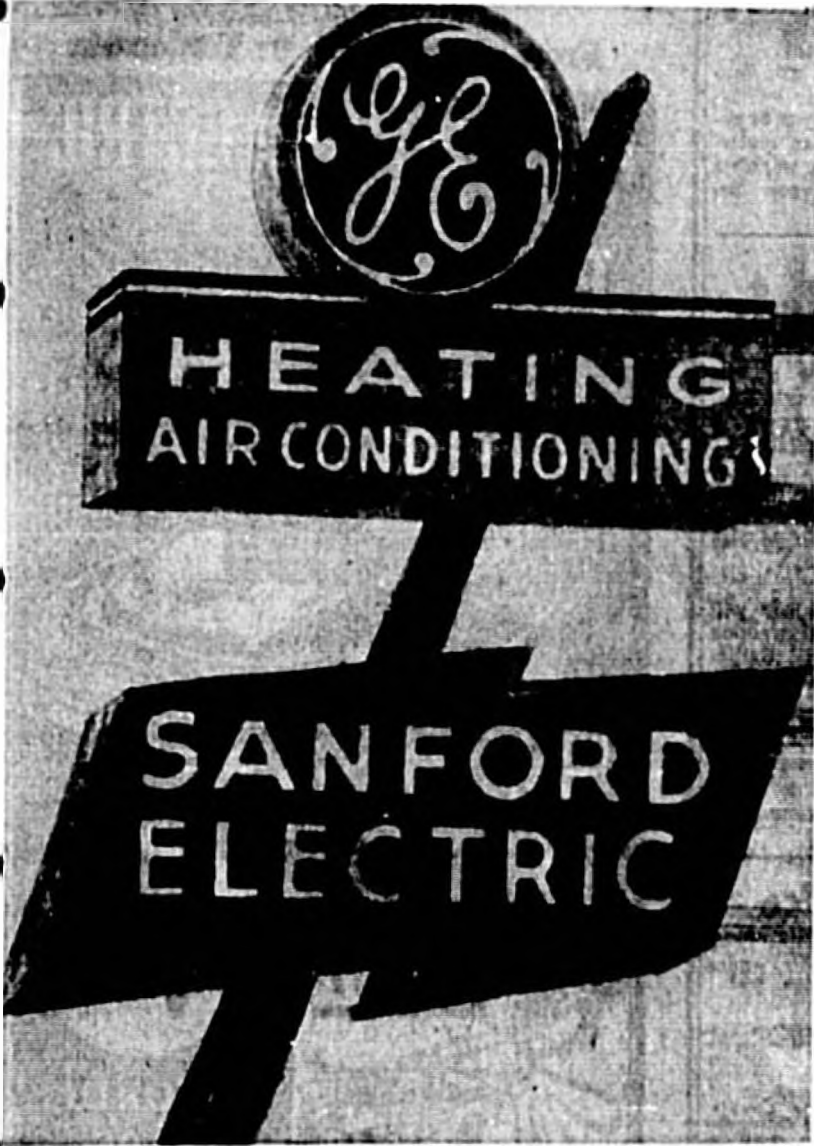
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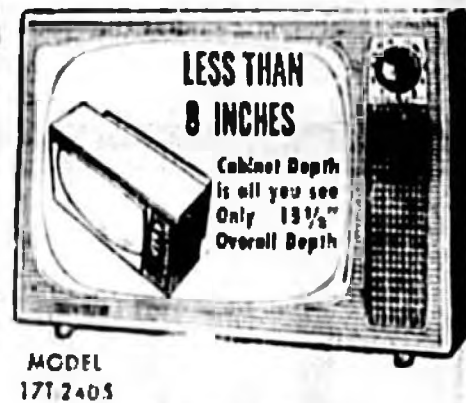
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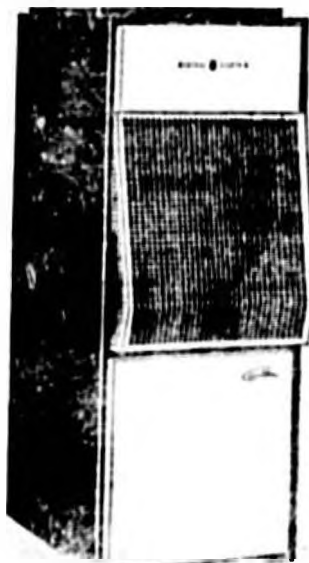

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Fighters Gain On Movie Colony Blaze

MALIBU, Calif. (UPI)—The huge Malibu brush fire which has destroyed 40 homes and blackened more than 20,000 acres was reported almost under control today but still extremely dangerous.

The disastrous conflagration at one time forced several thousand residents including a number of movie and television personalities to flee their homes in the Santa Monica Mountains.

"There is no expected time for complete control," the county Fire Department reported.

More than 2,000 men remained on hot spots of flame which endangered a populated section near Webster School and two other hot spots along a five-mile perimeter on the east and west lines.

"All men and equipment are being held. No one has been released except the injured," the Fire Department announced.

More than 1,000 servicemen from nearby Navy, Army and Marine camps were assisting in the fighting.

Star's Home Destroyed

Law Ayres' \$50,000 home was among those destroyed. Others lucky were actor Glenn Ford, Bob Hope and Ronald Reagan whose properties were spared but who managed to save their homes.

A fleet of airplanes dropping packs of a water-borate solution bombed the area, especially the hot spots and the inaccessible sections in the rugged canyons.

The fire by night looked like a million bonfires from a distance. But the stench of destruction could be smelled from miles away.

In the early morning light the fire scene was black.

A plume of dirty black smoke swirled 15,000 feet into the air and flattened out on the horizon darkening the western part of the sky for Los Angeles residents 35 miles away.

Hot, dry and windy weather has plagued firefighters since the fire broke out Tuesday at the 20th-Century Fox ranch.

Roaring along on winds up to 60 and 70 miles an hour, the blaze spread over 2,000 acres in less than two hours, literally exploding the squat scrub oak trees which spot the area.

The same dry and hot weather conditions prevailed Wednesday although winds were down around 35 miles an hour. Los Angeles Wednesday had a high temperature of 80, an all-time recorded high for Dec. 3.

Residents returning to sections which already have been wiped out and no longer offered anything for the blaze to feed on, were faced with a terrible scene of desolation.

The blackened hillsides which only two years ago fed the disastrous Malibu fire that claimed one life, 45,000 acres and 60 million dollars worth of property were once again littered with the carcasses of animals.

Many families will be homeless or Christmas.

County officials estimated that in addition to the millions of dollars damage caused by the blaze it cost more than \$80,000 a day to fight the fire.

The area has been declared a disaster area by the Small Business Administration in Washington, allowing homeowners to apply for low-interest, long-term federal loans.

City Officials Ask Labor Starts Big Drive To Hike Minimum Wage

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Organized labor and its allies launched a major drive today to obtain an increase in the federal minimum wage and extend it to include millions of workers not now covered.

New demands for Congress to revamp the Fair Labor Standards Act were expected to result from a two-day conference marking the 20th anniversary of the minimum wage law.

The AFL-CIO and the National Consumers League, joint sponsors of the meeting, lined up such new deal headlines as former Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins and economist Leon Keyserling to address their conference.

The Labor Federation was in record favor of a 25-cent boost in the minimum to \$1.25 and extension of coverage to nearly 10 million additional wage and salary workers.

Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell, scheduled to speak today did not commit himself on a higher minimum or broader coverage in his prepared remarks.

To Ask Amendment

Mitchell said he would ask Congress to amend the act to authorize him to sue an employer to recover back wages for an underpaid worker without the worker's written permission as now required.

He said many workers are reluctant to give their consent even though they have been paid wages below the legal minimum.

"Any man who cheats his employees will not be respected by wage-hour law," Mitchell said.

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City Officials Ask Millions For Aid

BOSTON (UPI)—About 1,200 mayors and other top city officials who attended the 35th annual meeting of the American Municipal Assn. have appealed for millions of dollars more in federal aid to local communities.

The convention ended Wednesday with a formulation of the organization's official policy for 1959. Speakers outlined the economic blight facing cities.

The delegates' most urgent appeal came for more federal aid for urban renewal—slum clearance, new highways and new housing—for which they requested a 10-year, six billion dollar federal program.

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Ex-Dictator Held In Overthrow Plot

BOGOTA, Colombia (UPI)—Former Dictator Gustavo Rojas Pinilla was held prisoner aboard the navy frigate Capitan Tono today to await trial as the alleged ring leader of a plot to overthrow the government.

President Alberto Lleras Camargo decreed modified martial law throughout Colombia Wednesday to thwart a possible coup against his government. Armored cars and troops surrounded Rojas Pinilla's residence and the former strongman was arrested.

He and his son, retired Lt. Carlos Rojas Gorrea, were flown to the big Caribbean naval base at Cartagena and placed aboard the Capitan Tono to await trial in Bogota.

Military officials said Rojas Pinilla would be returned to the capital Dec. 15.

The Interior Ministry announced "complete calm" in Bogota and the rest of the country.

Lleras Camargo said in a nationwide radio broadcast that a plot had been smashed and that a state of siege was placed in effect. It included censorship of radio newscasts and a ban against public meetings.

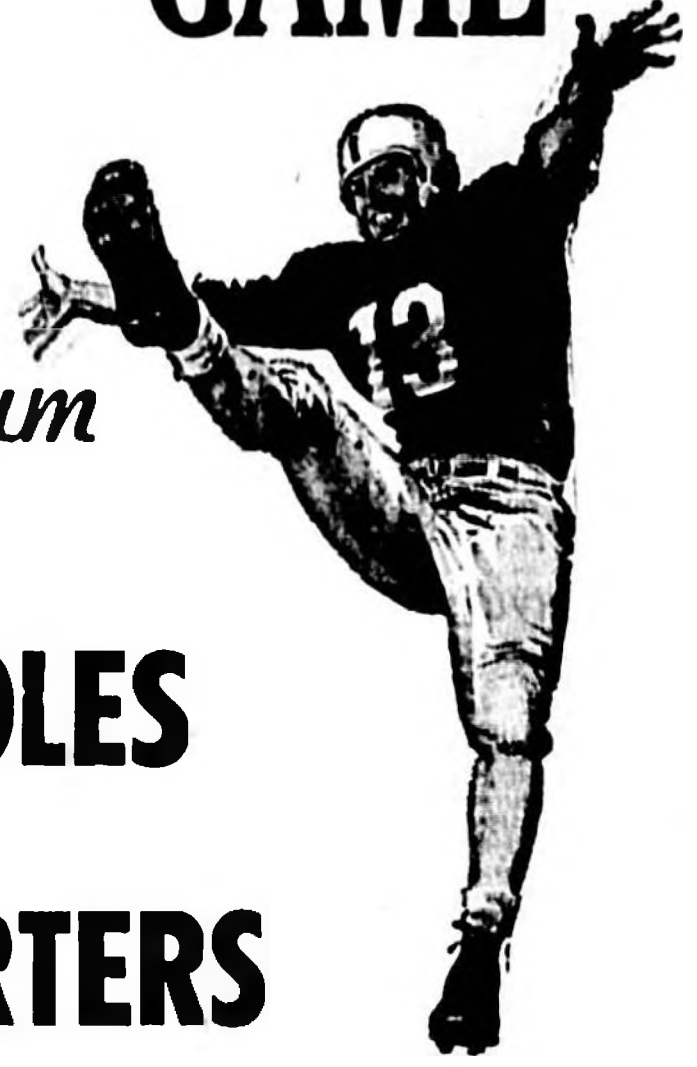

Yule Parade Tomorrow

Tomorrow is a long-awaited day for children of Seminole County. Second in enjoyment only to Christmas, the parade that opens the season away from the little ones, starts their parents to whistling and smiling.

Edgewater High School will lead off the long line of bands, floats, cars and marching units. Seminole High School has been selected to hold the honor position in the parade—just before the Jaycees' huge float bearing Santa Claus. The Seminole majorettes will wear their white reindeer costumes. The hometown band always has been the favorite of residents, and should leave the crowd with an impression that will last until next year.

Excitement is reaching a climax today, as entrants put the last-minute touches to their floats, hoping to win one of the awards for "best in the parade." There is

much fitting of costumes, painting and decorating in schools, churches and business firms all over Sanford and Seminole County.

Civic clubs already have accomplished most of their tasks in preparation for the longest entry list since the event was originated. All those participating must be at the starting point on First and Sanford Ave. by 1:45 p. m. When the whistle blows at 2:30 p. m. the annual Christmas parade will start down First St.

Santa Claus will arrive by jet

Sanford residents watched the skies in awe this morning as thundering jets from the Sanford Naval Air Station flew over the area in a practice "fly-by" for the Airman's Competition next Friday during the bombing derby.

About every plane attached to Heavy Attack Wing One took to the air for preliminary demonstration.

Four combat crews from each squadron will fly next week in the sixth bombing derby. Since the rules of the derby are designed to simulate "air-to-air" operations, crews will fly in all weather, and even land with the assistance of a landing signal mirror placed in a position similar to that of a ship's installation.

The parade has been scheduled Saturday to help merchants keep shopping at home, and give area residents an opportunity to see what local stores have to offer. The earlier hour (normally the parade is held at 1 p. m. on a week-day) is considered more convenient for shoppers, and for those who have to work on weekdays and usually miss the parade.

Each crew will take part in a special weapons operational mission Tuesday, conducted in the training facilities of VAFB. On Wednesday, the crews will fly a simulated combat mission, culminating with the dropping of a bomb "shape" aimed at a target area located off the South Carolina coast. The bomb will be dropped from a height of seven miles. Wednesday will close with a scored attack on a radar bomb site.

Thursday night, the crews will launch for an extended over-water mission, followed by a simulated attack on a radar bomb site. Another scored bombing run will complete the mission.

The derby ends Friday with the Carrier Airman's Competition. Trophies will be awarded to winning squadrons and crews at 11 a. m. until 4:30 p. m. at the Naval Air Station to permit the public a first-hand view at the installations and carrier aircraft.

Purpose of the bombing derby is to evaluate combat readiness of Heavy Attack squadrons, long killed as the "Sunday punch" of the Navy. The importance of the week-long evaluation has been emphasized by the number of disciplinary who will attend and the national interest shown in the competition.

Navy Appreciation Day plans seem well in hand, according to chairman Art Harris and Bill Brumley.

The celebration, which came as a surprise to Seminole County residents, will be held Dec. 13 in Fort Mellon Park. Entertainment will be offered by the Five Owls and the Rebel quartet.

All Naval personnel and their families will be admitted free to the giant luncheon from 12:30 to 3 p. m. Civilians will pay \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children.

Ten serving tables will be manned by members of local civic clubs as they dish out mountains of chicken plow. Cotton Brown will cook the chicken and rice for an estimated 5,000 people.

Committee chairman appointed yesterday at the Jaycee luncheon were Jim Brown, grounds, Ralph Wight II, serving; Jack Wilbur, child dev.; Others will be announced. Navy Appreciation Day is sponsored by the Sanford-Seminole County Jaycees and the Senior Chamber of Commerce.

Tonight's Celery Bowl football game ushers in the busiest 10-day period in Sanford history. Following the battle between Seminole and Apopka, here are some of the events scheduled:

Annual Christmas parade, sixth annual derby at the Naval Air Station, the Mayfair Inn Opening, annual \$15,000 Mayfair Inn Open golf tournament, Elks annual memorial services, Sanford's second Navy Appreciation Day and public open house at the Air Station.

Crewmen Survive Carrier Accident

The Navy's excellent survival gear, survival training and rescue equipment were put to a dramatic test yesterday and came through with flying colors.

At 3:37 p. m. an A-1H skywarrior of Heavy Attack Squadron 11, piloted by Lcdr. Dick Andrus of Sanford, was making a routine landing on the aircraft carrier U. S. S. Franklin D. Roosevelt, when an accident, described by a naval spokesman as "one in a million," occurred.

As the large nuclear lumber landed aboard the ship, the arresting cable which normally brings the aircraft to a halt, parted, and the plane continued up the angled flight deck and over the side of the ship. Despite the fact that the aircraft entered the water in an inverted manner, the strength of the skywarrior cockpit withstood the terrific force and the three-man crew emerged from the plane with only minor abrasions.

Their survival equipment functioned perfectly; the crew was picked up moments later, and returned aboard the carrier. Other members of the crew were A.M. Eugene E. Kronegger Jr., bombardier—navigator, and Clyde N. Savage, A-1H, third crewman.

'Object' Reported; Rocket Of Sputnik?

NASA, Okinawa (UPI)— Two U. S. Air Force men reported today that they sighted what may have been the dying rocket of Russian Sputnik III.

First Lt. Julian Miller, 21, Mount Sterling, Ky., and Airman Frank T. Waters, 22, Denver, Colo., said they saw a brilliant flash and an orange pink streak at very high altitude about 7:50 a. m.

Miller, a pilot, said "I looked up and saw the brightest light I have ever seen. It was over a moment and then I saw the fireball moving across the sky at a great speed and higher than anything I have ever flown."

"It was moving faster than an airplane and I watched until it disappeared," said Waters. "It didn't fall or go straight down. It was moving across the sky in an angle. As it moved, small parts seemed to fall behind, like it was breaking up."

The rocket was launched May 15 to boost the 2,925-pound Sputnik III into orbit. Scientists had earlier said the 52-foot rocket was plunging into the earth's atmosphere.
