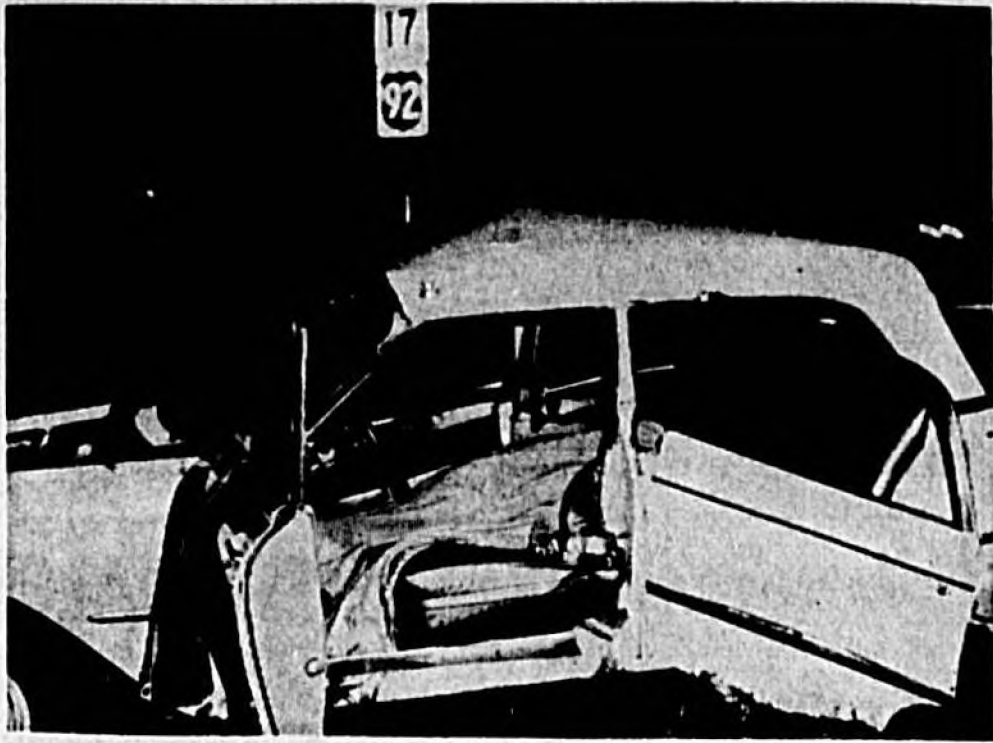


Four Die In Weekend Traffic Accidents Here

State Mishaps Take 18 Lives

Traffic accidents claimed four lives in Seminole County over the weekend, bringing the total in the county to six for the last eight days and to 11 for the year. At least 18 persons died in accidents in the state over the weekend.

Melbert Gene Bay, 28, a volunteer policeman of 802 Triplet Drive, Casselberry, was crushed to death early Sunday when a tractor-trailer overturned on his car at Highway 17-92 and Seminole Boulevard.

Trooper J. L. Sikes said Bay apparently turned in front of a produce-laden tractor-trailer driven by George D. Skipper, 27, of Savannah, Ga. Skipper reported to Sikes that his truck struck and knocked the car ahead, then the trailer overturned on the automobile.

Wrecking crews required four hours to clean up the debris and unload the produce truck. Sikes estimated damage to the tractor-trailer at \$25,000 and \$800 to Bay's car.

Three persons died as a result of a two-car crash early Saturday at Highway 17-92 and State Road 410. They were:

William Hamm Vann, 44, of 2200 Magnolia Avenue, Sanford.

Daisy (Perdue) Vann, 44, his wife.

Charles A. Hall, 31, of 210 Nannette Drive, Orlando.

Mrs. Vann and Hall were killed instantly at 1:20 a. m. Saturday, Vann died at 11 a. m. Saturday at Orange Memorial Hospital, Orlando.

Hall was riding with Perry W. Nichols, 24, McCoy AFD, who was charged with driving without a valid license.

Deputy William Chandler, who witnessed the crash, reported to Sikes that the Vann car crossed in front of Nichols.

Mr. and Mrs. Vann came to Sanford 3 1/2 years ago from Salem, N. C. Their bodies were sent to Salem by the Brisson Funeral Home.

Vann is survived by his mother, Mrs. Betty Wilson, Salem, and four brothers and sisters, including James W. Vann, of Pahokee.

Mrs. Vann is survived by seven children, Mrs. Martha Tackett, John H. Tommy, a Sanford Herald carrier, and Paul Caudle, of Sanford, and Mrs. Eugene Marshall, Mrs. Betty Walker and Mrs. Naomi Carroll, of Greenboro, N. C.; her mother, Mrs. Annie Walker, Greenboro, and eight brothers and sisters.

Hall is survived by his wife, Mrs. Rose L. Hall; a son, Mark; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Hall, Louisville, Ky.; and a brother, Joseph Hall, Louisville.

Funeral services will be conducted at 8:30 a. m. Tuesday by Rev. Smith at the Fairchild Chapel, Orlando. Burial will be in Woodlawn Memorial Park, Orlando. Fairchild Funeral Home is in charge.

Surviving Bay are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Milton J. Bay, of New Plymouth, Ohio, and a sister, Mrs. Stanley Miller, Winter Park. He came to Casselberry three years ago after a tour of duty in the Armed Forces.

The body was forwarded by the Grankow Funeral Home to the Heinlein Funeral Home at Logan, Ohio.

St. Johns Canal District Bill Okay Seen This Week

The bill creating the St. Johns-Indian River Canal District will be introduced in the Legislature this week and pushed through to early passage by the delegations from Brevard, Orange, Seminole and Volusia Counties.

As outlined at a joint session of the commissions of the four counties Friday noon at the Mayfair Inn, the legislation is designed only for the district officers to obtain the necessary right-of-way for the proposed canal connecting the two rivers from Lake Harney to Maytown.

State officers emphasized to the county commissioners they will not be asked for funds or will ad valorem taxes be requested.

John Krider, chairman of the St. Johns-Indian River Navigating Committee, stated he had been informed by Sen. Bernard Parrish, Brevard County, who has been spearheading the bill in the canal, that he (Parrish) holds commitments from three property owners contributing gratis the necessary right-of-way for all except about 200 yards at the east-end of the lake. Krider indicated that with the creation of the canal district his navigating committee will dissolve and pass out of existence.

Tom Adams, secretary of state; Randolph Hodges, chairman of the State Board of Conservation, and William McCree, chairman of the State Canal Authority, emphasized to the county commissioners that the only function of the canal district will be to obtain the necessary right-of-way.

Thereafter, the project will pass to the control of the State Canal Authority.

Harold Scott, Jacksonville engineer, informed the meeting that he recommends the Harney-Maytown route and that a feasibility study would cost an estimated \$24,000.

McCree stated it would be the function of his Canal Authority to finance this study.

The state officers indicated actual financing of canal construction would be done with matching funds by the state and federal governments.

All four county commissioners approved the canal project.

Scott emphasized . . . and he was supported by the state officers . . . that the canal construction will bypass the shad spawning and fishing grounds of the St. Johns River. Only opposition expressed to the canal was from commercial fishermen and fishing camp operators who expressed fear the construction would damage or kill shad fishing.

The engineer explained preliminary planning calls for a canal 100 feet wide and eight feet deep, with locks at either end to maintain a mean water level 15 feet above sea level and to prevent infiltration of salt water into the fresh water areas and vice versa.

The locks would be 250 x 36 feet, allowing for two barges and a tug to pass through at one time. Pleasure craft would bypass the locks.

Gov. Farris Bryant will name the five commissioners of the canal district, two from Seminole County and one each from the other three counties.

4th Man Surrenders In 'Repair' Probe

GAINESVILLE — Glynn Calvin Jones Jr., 32, the last of four home repair men sought for the "theft of a mortgage," surrendered Friday night to authorities here.

He posted a \$3,000 bond an hour after his surrender.

He reportedly had been living in Ormond Beach and working in a home repair business in that area.

The Herald Tuesday will publish a detailed report of legislation designed as "the ubiquity of wholesale home repair racketeering" in Florida.

Jones was an officer of the now defunct Nova Builders of Sanford. He's accused along with two other officers and a salesman of "stealing" the mortgage to property owned by Mrs. Romie Reed West of Gainesville.

The firm agreed to an improvement on Mrs. Reed's shell house. Sheriff Joe Cravasse said the work never was completed.

A mortgage for the job was taken and sold.

The four men charged will go to trial June 4 in Circuit Court here.

They are, besides Jones, Horace Richard Bernard, William Cletus Braden and William A. DeBross. Their arrests came as a result of an extensive investigation of home repair racketeering begun by Sheriff Joe Cravasse.

FEC Walkout Nearing End?

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — A leader of the operating unions' strike against the Florida East Coast Railway said the walkout probably will be called off today.

Labor leader T. C. Bolin said a Federal District Court order probably would be filed in Washington today directing the FEC to rescind its anti-feather-bodding work laws which sparked the strike April 5.

"As soon as the order is entered and served on our executives, we will be informed and the strike notice will be withdrawn," Bolin said.

District Judge Luther W. Youngdahl said he would issue an order today. He listened to arguments from both sides on Thursday.

The end of the operating on train unions' strikes against the FEC will not have much practical effect on the railway. It has been crippled by a strike by 11 non-operating unions since Jan. 23.

The "non-ops" strike, now in its 104th day, will not be affected by the court order. Labor and management meet here Friday to discuss a settlement to the non-ops wage dispute.

Dominicans Set 'Attack' Plans

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (UPI) — President Juan Bosch convoked his cabinet today for a report from military chiefs, strengthening belief the hour for a Dominican strike against Haiti may be imminent.

An Army spokesman said Dominican infantry now were in attack positions the length of the border separating the two countries on the Caribbean island of Hispaniola, only 55 miles from Cuba.

President Duvalier vowed in Port Au Prince he never would step down under pressure, he told his people: "I am a revolutionary in every sense—not a sentimental type but one of the 'hard' kind . . . I have for my companion my rifle."

In Washington, the OAS scheduled an emergency meeting to hear a report from three members of the fact-finding mission it sent to Haiti and the Dominican Republic. The mission members expressed doubt that Bosch would move against Haiti while the OAS was trying to solve the crisis.

Negroes Plan More Protests

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI) — Negro leaders, encouraged by the first march on city jail in a 31-day campaign that did not result in mass arrests, planned more protests for today while federal officials sought to ease the explosive racial situation here.

More than 2,000 singing, chanting Negroes Sunday marched six blocks from a Negro church to a park across from the city jail. They were permitted by police to hold a 15-minute demonstration aimed at bolstering the spirits of more than 1,200 Negroes who remain in jail for previous demonstrations.

Burke Marshall, head of the Justice Department's civil rights division and considered the chief racial trouble-shooter of the Kennedy administration, met with local officials during the weekend in efforts to ease racial pressures.

Yanks Ask Red Asylum

BERLIN (UPI) — The East German news agency ADN said today two American soldiers—a captain and a sergeant—had entered East Germany and asked for asylum.

ADN identified them as Capt. Alfred Svenson, deputy commander of the Red Tank Battalion of the 1st Cavalry Regiment, 3rd Armored Division, in West Germany, and Sgt. Benjamin Cain of West Berlin's 6th Infantry Regiment.

said. "Do we consider the United States a nation under religions?"

Cubs Talking Pennant

Think you've heard everything?
Then just listen to those incredible Chicago Cubs talking pennant.

Ernie Banks started the ball rolling this spring when he first planted the idea that the Cubs could win and now the notion is starting to take root among some of the other Chicago players.

Naturally, the Cubs aren't claiming any pennant yet but they are saying it's possible. And you know something? It is—the way they're playing now.

They climbed to within 1 1/2 games of the National League lead Sunday by completing a three-game sweep against the Milwaukee Braves, 3-2, for their sixth victory in the last seven starts.

Sudden thought: Wouldn't that be a gasser if they did win? They'd become the first major league club ever to win the pennant without a manager. Bob Kennedy officially is still listed as "head coach" although he's carrying out all managerial duties.

Anyway, Ken Hubbs supplied what proved to be the winning run Sunday with a fifth inning sacrifice fly that scored Lou Brock. Merritt Raney's first homer of the year gave the Cubs their first run off loser Tony Cloninger in the third inning and Raney

then singled home another run in the fourth. Cal Koonce was the winner although Jim Brewer and Lindy McDaniel both were summoned in from the bullpen in the ninth.

Elsewhere in the NL, the Los Angeles Dodgers dished the first-place Pittsburgh Pirates, 7-3; the San Francisco Giants split a doubleheader with the New York Mets, winning the opener, 6-3, and losing the nightcap, 4-2; Philadelphia beat Houston, 6-5, in the first game but dropped the second one, 6-2, and Cincinnati took the opener from St. Louis, 3-3, then lost the 10-inning nightcap, 7-4.

Pinch-hitter Lee Walls' three-run homer in the ninth powered the Dodgers to victory over the Pirates. Walls connected off reliever Harvey Haddix, who took over for loser Vern Law, making his first start of the season after being recalled from the minors. Reliever Ron Perranoski was credited with his fourth victory.

Willie Mays' three-run homer in the first inning and Felipe Alou's two-run poke in the fourth helped the Giants

stretch their winning streak to six games in the opener before Carl Willey of the Mets ended the string with a seven-hit effort in the nightcap. A Polo Grounds' crowd of 53,334—the majors' largest of the season—saw Jack Sanford strike out 10 for his fifth victory in the first game. Cliff Cook hit a two-run homer in the nightcap.

The Colts blew a 5-0 lead to the Phillies in the opener but won the second game on Dick Farrell's seven-hit pitching. Bob Lillis and Bob Aspromonte each drove in two runs in the nightcap for the Colts, who had dropped three games in a row to the Phils this year and 17 out of 18 to them last year.

Southpaw Jim O'Toole won his sixth game for the Reds in their opener with the Cardinals although Al Worthington helped him out with three scoreless innings in relief. Worthington, however, was tagged for a two-run homer by Gene Oliver in the 10th inning of the nightcap.

The blow climaxed a four-run rally and earned Bobby Shantz his first victory.

Cluck Hinton's three-run homer with two out in the ninth inning of the nightcap earned the Senators a split. Hinton's homer was his fifth of the season and capped a five-run rally off Mike Joyce and loser Hoyt Wilhelm. Reliever Jim Hannan was the winning pitcher.

Home runs by Frank Malzone and Chuck Schilling carried the Boston Red Sox to their victory over the A's. Malzone connected off loser Orlando Pena (4-1) and Schilling off reliever John Wyatt. Rookie Dave Morehead won his second game without a defeat although he needed help from Dick Hudatz in the eighth.

Dick Donovan scored his second victory for the Indians but Harry Latman had to bail him out when the Angels rallied for two runs in the ninth. Joe Adcock homered for the Tribe off loser Bo Belinsky (1-4) in the second and rookie Max Alvis drove in what proved to be the winning run with a double in the seventh.

Bill Freehan, the Tigers' \$100,000 bonus catcher, enjoyed a perfect day against the Orioles by driving in five runs with his first two major league homers and a double. The Tigers routed Dick Hall during a six-run burst in the fifth. Tom Sturdivant, obtained from Pittsburgh only 24 hours earlier, relieved Detroit starter Phil Regan in the fifth and held the Orioles scoreless on three hits the rest of the way to gain the victory.

Chicago White Sox blanked the Washington Senators, 8-0, in the opener of a doubleheader but dropped the nightcap, 8-7; the Boston Red Sox nipped the first-place Kansas City A's, 3-2; the Cleveland Indians shaded the Los Angeles Angels, 4-3, and the Detroit Tigers bombed the Baltimore Orioles, 12-4.

Tom Cheney of the Senators lost his first game of the season after four straight victories when the White Sox rapped him for six of their eight runs during the four innings he worked in the opener. Dave Nicholson tagged him for a two-run homer as Ray Herbert (3-1) stopped Washington on three hits.

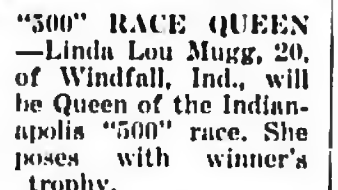

Progress Work

A bill giving tax relief to the harness horse track in Seminole County sailed out of one Senate committee today but landed in another. The bill, if passed, is similar to other bills adding tracks of comparative size throughout the state. The local raceway suffered severely this past season due to bad weather. The Senate Miscellaneous Legislation Committee approved the bill, by Sen. Mack Cleveland Jr., Sanford, setting up a fixed daily license fee for the little track. But now it must go to finance and taxation to determine its effect on state finances. The bill fixes a flat daily fee in lieu of percentage taxation for harness tracks with an average daily parimutuel pool of less than \$100,000. The rate is \$1,000 a day for a pool of up to \$50,000, \$3,000 a day for a pool between \$50,000 and \$75,000 and \$5,000 a day for a pool between \$75,000 and \$100,000. Spokesmen said the track has been having a hard time making ends meet.

Senate Okays School Head Appointment

A constitutional amendment providing for the appointment rather than the election of a superintendent of schools for Seminole County was approved today by the Senate and sent to the House. Sen. Mack Cleveland Jr. telephoned The Herald at noon that the measure had passed the Senate. "I approved by the House, it will then go to the governor for his signature. It also will be subject to a referendum by county voters in November 1961.

Sen. R. T. Milwee, when apprised of the Senate's action, said: "I am happy that the Senate approved this measure. . . and I sincerely hope the House will do likewise."

The legislative action was requested by the Seminole School Board several weeks ago, when Milwee expressed approval, saying that "it will divorce politics from education."

In other legislative action today, the House chaffed its mind and passed a bill authorizing use of the state's \$16 million public school fund for higher education construction. The measure passed the House by the necessary three-fifths vote after the lawmakers tacked on an amendment tacking the funds available for public school construction as well as buildings for universities and junior colleges.

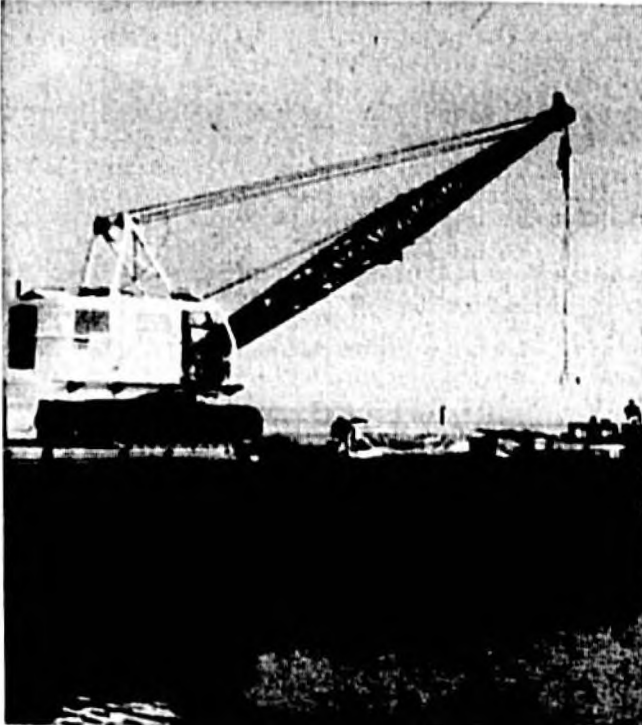

General Strike Hits Dominican

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (UPI) — Government workers called a general strike today as the immediate threat of war with Haiti dissipated. The country remained on a war footing but appeared satisfied to let the Organization of American States mediate the dispute.

The Government Workers Federation took advantage of the lull in war talk to call their long-threatened strike in protest against massive firings which the government of President Juan Bosch claims are necessary to restore the country's faltering economic health.

The government sought to brand the strike illegal, but union leaders predicted it would be at least 70 per cent successful. The strike date was moved ahead 16 hours to today because of union attacks on Bosch's angry attacks on the projected walkout.

As the war threat eased Haiti allowed five political refugees who had been harbored in the Chilean embassy to leave the country aboard a plane for New York.

Also on the plane was Haitian Foreign Minister Rene Chalmers who was flying to New York to press his country's demand for a United Nations Security Council hearing on complaints of aggression against the Dominican Republic.

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI) — A Mississippi legislative committee today charged that Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy illegally precipitated the racial integration crisis at the University of Mississippi. The General Legislative Investigative Committee said the President's brother had no legal right to send marshals or troops to the campus and that his doing so may have been a political move to aid Democrats in last November's election.

The committee, which spent six months investigating the Sept. 30 riot which resulted from the admission of Negro James H. Meredith to "Ole Miss," made the charge in what it called a "complete and factual" final report. The committee said that conscientious efforts by state officials to prevent violence were overruled by Kennedy and a brutal, blundering group of U. S. deputy marshals.

Yanks Orbit New Telstar

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) — The United States today apparently orbited a new Telstar communications satellite that may flash to Europe "live" television pictures of astronaut L. Gordon Cooper's flight into space next week.

If everything goes according to plan, the 175-pound Telstar 2 will pick up television pictures from the United States and beam them to Europe at the speed of light. The new satellite rode into space at 7:38 a. m. EDT today in the nose of a 30-foot Delta rocket.

Scientists and early indications were that "it appeared to be a perfect flight" — the 17th success in a row for the three-stage Delta. However, officials declined to say flatly that the satellite had reached its planned orbit. "We would like to see it go around once before we say that," said one scientist. But the Federal Space Agency said there was "nothing that would indicate Telstar 2 has gone in any direction except the one it should have gone. Everything looked fine."

Grease Job Proves Too Expensive
