Jap Predicts Nanking Fall In 24 Hours

Continued From Page One The southeast city gate, Domei also said the Japanese had entered Wahn, a Yantze River port, 60 miles upstream from Nanking. Chinese artillery, firing from the strongly fortified Purple Mountain which overlooks Nanking, kept the Japanese from a frontal attack on the eastern wall of the city where latest reports were that 14 Americans remained. Authoritative quarters expressed the belief that the departure of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek from Nanking might cause his subordinates to seek a settlement.

Because Chiang is the driving force of Chinese resistance, these sources reasoned, his followers even might form a new government, with Japanese recognition and direction, themselves from Chiang's leadership.

Tax Collector Asks Payment Of License Tax

Continued From Page One He reported that during the months of October and November, he had sold 1,276 licenses and that total collections amounted to \$4,594.70, an amount considerably in excess of the total for a similar period last year. The State's share of this amount is \$2,862.12 while the County retains \$1,732.58. Although this amount is considerably less than reported by other counties the percent of increase is one of the largest in the State. Should there be any doubt in the minds of Seminole County residents as to whether or not they are required to pay a license tax, Mr. Jenkins pointed to a portion of the New License Tax Law which provides that the Tax Collector, or other official to whom such tax is payable, shall issue a warrant directed to the Sheriff of the State commanding them to levy upon and sell any real or personal property of the person liable for the tax within his respective jurisdiction, for the amount and costs of executing the warrant. The Sheriff shall proceed in all respects and in the same manner prescribed by law in regard to executions, upon judgments of a Circuit Court.

The law further provides that any person who shall carry on conduct any business, profession or occupation for which a license is required, without first obtaining such license, shall, except in such cases as are otherwise provided by law, be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than double the amount required for such license, or imprisonment not exceeding six months.

Helps For Housewives

Fruit Cakes in Crystallized Grape Fruit Shells: Select large grapefruit of good shape and color. Wash carefully; break the oil rolls by grating lightly on a fine grater. Cut a slice from the stem end of grapefruit; remove the inside, being careful to leave all of the thick part of peel, and being careful not to break the shell. Cover with cold water; bring to a boil; cook about 10 minutes. Drain off water. Repeat the process until peel is tender and as much of the bitter flavor is removed as desired. Cool shell; place in a syrup made of equal parts of sugar and water. Be sure to use sufficient syrup to float the fruit. Cook to soft degrees F. or to a medium thick syrup; let fruit stand in the syrup at least 24 hours. Turn several times during this period. Then cool to 225 F. or to a very thick syrup. Remove from syrup and cool. If the shell is large, turn it over a glass to shape.

DARK FRUIT CAKE: 1/2 cup shortening, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 4 eggs, 1 cup flour, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, 1-4 teaspoon cloves, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 2 cups seedless raisins, 1/2 cup citron, chopped, 1-2 cup candied orange peel, chopped, 2/3 cup walnuts or pecans, chopped.

Light Fruit Cake: 1-2 Cup Shortening, 3-4 Cup Sugar, 3 Eggs, 1 Cup Flour, 1-4 Teaspoon Salt, 1 Teaspoon Baking Powder, 1 Cup Raisins, 1-2 Cup Candied Orange Peel Chopped, 1-2 Cup Mixed Candied Fruits Chopped. Cream shortening and sugar together; add eggs one at a time, beating vigorously after each addition. Mix and sift flour; salt and baking powder together; add to the first mixture. Add raisins, orange peel and mixed fruits. Fill candied grapefruit shells; continue according to direction given for "Dark Fruit Cake."

and nuts. Fill crystallized grapefruit shells with the fruit cake mixture. Steam 1 hour; bake in a slow oven (300 degrees F) about 20 minutes. Roll shell in granulated or powdered sugar. This amount will fill 2 to 3 grapefruit shells, depending upon size.

Three to five weeks is sufficient for aging these cakes. Wrap them in a cloth dampened with fruit juice. Wrap again in a dry cloth, and waxed paper. Then store in a dark, cool place. Change the damp cloth several times during the aging period. Orange shells instead of grapefruit shells, may be used to prepare individual fruit cakes. They are prepared in the same manner as the grapefruit.
