



RIGID DISCIPLINE PREVAILS AFTER PRISON RIOTING

2 Riots In Succession Cause Officials To Use "Iron Grip" Rule

AUBURN, N. Y., Dec. 23.—If there has been any "babying" of convicts at Auburn prison there isn't any more. Rigid discipline prevails.

Ever since the rioting by convicts on Dec. 11, which cost nine lives, including that of Principal Keeper George A. Durford, "iron rule" has been in force. This riot coming less than six months after the outbreak of July 28 in the same institution, has awakened the authorities to the realization that hardened criminals can't be permitted too much leeway.

"What they really need is a return to the old lock step and the striped uniforms," commented an old retired Auburn prison guard.

But that probably would be going too far in "tightening up" the reins on prison inmates. Enlightened public opinion dictates that some way must be found whereby a happy balance can be struck between over-lenient and repression.

Prison outbreaks in various parts of the country have been generally attributed to overcrowded jails.

That's one of the troubles at Auburn. At Auburn there are 1,556 prisoners and only 1,200 cells. One hundred and fifty of these convicts are "lifers."

"Overcrowding of prisons is a disgrace and will have to stop before the riots stop," say Senator Caleb H. Baumes, chairman of the State Crime Commission. "There should be a cell for every prisoner, sanitary beds and good food. Illness should be done away with."

There has been criticism of the entertainment features in prisons—the "good times" hardened criminals enjoy within the prison walls being permitted to play games and see "movies."

Yet many penal experts see a moderate amount of entertainment for convicts as a good thing, for it relieves tension and makes jail inmates more contented with their lot—consequently less likely to participate in a desperate brawl for liberty.

The recent outbreak at Auburn served to turn the spotlight on the Mutual Welfare League, long a sore spot among some prison officials. Sergeant George H. Sullivan, who was appointed Acting Warden when the warden went to the hospital after being gassed in the riot, scolded the league unmercifully and placed a goodly share of the blame for the riot on the league, a convict organization.

"This riot," said Sullivan, "was the result of treating long term, desperate men too leniently."

The Mutual Welfare League dates back 15 years to the "Tom Brown" days of Thomas Mott Osborne. A prominent resident of Auburn who died Oct. 29, 1929, Osborne became a voluntary prisoner in 1912 in Auburn prison, serving a short term in recognition of his findings, which were published in book form in 1914, under the title "Within Prison Walls," were the basis for demands for humanitarian prisoner reform.

Out of the thousands across the prison's self-government organization the Mutual Welfare League, comprising in its membership prisoners and discharged inmates of New York State prisons.

It has become quite a strong organization. It has carried on welfare work for discharged prisoners through outside agents. It also conducts entertainment within the prisons.

The public has turned out in large numbers on occasion to see the prison actors perform. Some of these actors showed remarkable talent and when they were released they obtained professional engagements.

It was through the efforts of the "M. W. L." that the "honor system" was substituted for the old method of close watch over prisoners in the mess hall. Officers of the league have, in some instances, been men from high places in the world who have fallen on to prison estate. Inside the prison walls they displayed the same qualities that caused their advancement in the world outside.

The "M. W. L." idea spread. The league has been active at the Sing Sing prison in Ossining, N. Y., and their policies have been followed in prisons in other states.



THREE KILLED AS BLIZZARD SWEEPS EAST

Entire Country Is Under Cover Of Snow Following Severe Christmas Storms

BOSTON, Dec. 21.—(INS)—Three lives were claimed in New England by a storm of snow and sleet, which raged for more than 12 hours and finally passed out to sea this afternoon.

James Gallagher, 14, fell 33 feet from an ivy roof in Boston; George Bagnall, 31, met death at Great Barrington when he looked outside the ice coated window of the automobile and his head struck a tree; Charles J. Hartley, 61, Gardner, Me., city worker, dropped dead while shoveling snow.

In Northern New England several trains were delayed by a heavy blanket of snow. Traffic in the vicinity was slowed up by snowdrifts. A sale of automobiles was held in Gardner, Me., but they were later released. Constable shipping was disrupted.

The entire country, excepting only the Gulf region and the Pacific states, was clothed for a "white Christmas" today. Mild temperatures prevailed in general but a continued and gentle snow fall was predicted for the central regions.

A northwest wind carried a Christmas mantle to the eastern states yesterday, enveloping New York and the northeast in a heavy snow mantle. Another six inches was forecast for Gotham and vicinity by tonight.

Chicago and the Midwest received an additional two inches of snow between yesterday and today, although the comfortable temperatures that prevailed this morning had started the snow melting.

The Southland, eager for the rarity of a white Christmas, seemed delighted to be disappointed today. Mild temperatures, predicted by weather experts for the southern belt will presumably dissipate the snow blanket which has whitened the region for the last few days.

R. B. Becker charged with speeding and operating a motor vehicle with no lights was sentenced to pay a fine of \$12 on the first charge and was dismissed on the latter.

James Miller, who was charged with reckless driving had his case continued to Friday, while James Eridson was sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 on a charge of larceny.

Charged with being the "keeper of a house of ill repute," Georgia Black negro was dismissed.

Funeral services took place at the Miller-Erickson Funeral Home, which had charge of the body, this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Interment was made in the Lake View cemetery by Dr. E. D. Brownlee, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, officiating.

MURDER CASE IS CHRISTMAS RUM SLUMPING AFTER IN NEW YORK TO SUDDEN FLAREUP

Information Given By Tightness Of Money Former Convict Is Found To Be Weak Market Will Force Price Lists Down

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 21.—(INS)—After reaching a low point last week, the William Desmond Taylor murder case was nearly slumping today, with indications that the recent flare-up was but a flash in the pan.

The general sentiment in the market is that the Taylor case is a dead end, although it is generally believed that he was killed by his valet, Edward F. Galt, who disappeared after the murder.

Interest in the case was revived when it was reported that Fred W. Richardson (alias) had led to a conviction by a former Federal Prison convict, leading to a motion picture actress. In connection with this, it was learned that Otto Nelson, alias Otto Heller, who has been paroled and was last seen in Mexico.

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4 Atlanta Federal Prisoners Go Home After Confinement

ATLANTA, Dec. 21.—(INS)—Four federal prisoners, including George F. Richmond, of Boston, and George Garibaldi, of Philadelphia, two get-rich-quick artists whose exploits were chronicled in a magazine, were found for their homes today.

Richmond, who is serving a 10-year sentence in the Atlanta Penitentiary for using the mails to defraud, left under a \$100,000 bond after having been in the state of the institution since 1924. Through a net of phony bucket shop racket he was said to have amassed a \$12,000,000 fortune from an original capital of \$10 within a few years time before he was caught in the coils of the law.

Garibaldi won his liberty on a habeas corpus writ approved by Judge Samuel Sizer of the Southern Georgia federal court. He is the second of a large group of prisoners to be released from the penitentiary where they are serving terms as a result of their conviction in Cincinnati in connection with a \$2,000,000 mail truck robbery.

Garibaldi, about 40 years old, is reputed to be wealthy from the profits the government contends he reaped in a series of stock-up jobs and more than 50 other members of a syndicate expelled from Chicago to Los Angeles.

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PLOT TO KILL ROYAL FAMILY IS DISCOVERED

All Belgium Stunned Over Disclosure Of Plan To Annihilate Reigning Household

BRUSSELS, Dec. 21.—(INS)—In the midst of preparations to celebrate the coming marriage of Princess Marie Jose to Crown Prince Umberto of Italy in fitting fashion, all Belgium was stunned today to learn of the discovery of a daring plot aimed at the annihilation of the entire Belgian royal family.

The startling disclosure follows the arrest of a young Italian anti-fascist named Bernini, an alleged associate of the Italian student who attempted to assassinate Umberto at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier here on Oct. 21.

According to the Belgian authorities, Bernini has made a complete confession stating that a complete group of Communist planned to bomb the Italian royal train leaving King Albert, Queen Elizabeth, Princess Marie Jose, Crown Prince Leopold and his wife, Princess Astrid, and other members of the Belgian royal family while it was passing through Milan streets to Rome, where the wedding is to take place.

The alleged confession declares that detailed plans had been laid to bomb the royal train from another train scheduled to pass the royal procession just outside Milan.

Coming on the heels of the attempted assassination of Prince Umberto and following a number of bitter anti-Fascist demonstrations in various parts of Belgium, revelation of the alleged plot caused widespread consternation here.

From the time the betrothal of Princess Marie Jose was first announced, there has been a pronounced feeling among Communists and anti-Fascists here. The object, it is believed, was the annihilation of the Belgian royal family and the help of the Italian throne.

The primary aim of the whole anti-Fascist movement was to prevent the forthcoming marriage. Although the entire royal family has been carefully guarded during the last few weeks since the anti-Fascist outbreaks, extreme precautionary measures will now be taken to insure the wedding and the inauguration of all suspected Communists.

From the information which has been obtained by the police, it appears that the plot was directed not only against the Belgian family, but against state officials who sanctioned the coming marriage.

Threatening letters, it is declared, were received by M. Henri Despretre, Belgian premier, Minister of Justice Pierre Janin and Minister of National Defense De Broqueville. They were informed, it is alleged, that unless they took active steps to prevent the marriage, they would suffer a fate similar to that planned for the royal family.

Belgian police are confident Bernini's alleged plot was engineered by the same forces that inspired the assassination of King Albert.

Mother Saves Child From Burning House

NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 21.—(INS)—Mrs. R. J. Morrell from returning her 14-year-old daughter, Juliette, who was burned to death here today.

Mrs. Morrell discovered her home in flames when she returned from a neighborhood grocery store. Running into the blazing building she managed to drag to safety her 14-year-old child, Elizabeth.

Bystanders, however, forcibly intervened in her attempt to return to the burning house, which body was recovered a few minutes later by firemen who had perished while playing with toys in a corner of her nursery. The fire was said to have been caused by an over-heated stove.

PANTAGIS SELKS FREEDOM

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 21.—(INS)—A petition to free Alexander Pantagis, a millionaire showman, on bond will be heard here Thursday. Eight physicians have signed affidavits on Pantagis' behalf saying he was suffering from heart trouble and that continued confinement would impair his health.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Dec. 21.—(INS)—Lester Percy, former U. S. senator from Mississippi and a leading political figure in that state, died here today. Percy, who was 69, had been ill for several weeks at a local hospital. His home was in Greenville, Miss. He was long an advocate of "hard control" in the delta, even before the inception of the J. Edgar Hoover.

"Mother Jones," Labor Agitator, Is Nearing End

(Continued From Page Three) months ago she went to visit Mrs. W. E. Burgess, at Hyattsville, where she still is.

Although she is bedridden, "Mother Jones" is fighting her last battle to the grim end. While recounting many of the various strikes in which she was a leading figure, she expressed the wish that she could leave her bed to help out the beleaguered North Carolina textile workers.

As Mary Harr's she was born in Cork, Ireland, May 1, 1829—the day on which most labor troubles start each year. When she was a year old her father, one of the Irish rebels against British domination, was captured and sentenced to be executed.

With seven others, he escaped and fled to an American ship at sea, later going to New York. She distinctly remembers the day the Redcoats broke into her home and even tore the chimney down looking for her father. British soldiers marched by her home with the heads of Irishmen stuck in their bayonets, she said.

A year later her father sent for his family and settled in Vermont where he worked as a railroad construction laborer. She was educated in a Montreal convent. In 1861 she married George Jones at Memphis, Tenn. Three children born of this union died in infancy. In 1867 Jones died.

The most noted strikes in which she participated were the Pennsylvanian anthracite and the Colorado and West Virginia mine strikes. She said the West Virginia strikes of 1916 and 1917 were the worst she ever saw. During the Pennsylvania troubles she donned men's clothes and worked in the mine to get first hand information on "cheating" by the operators in the weighing of coal dug by the miners.

During the Colorado strike she was deported by the state militia upon orders of the governor. She merely took the next train back, the eggs, and told the governor to "go to hell."

She has interviewed every president of the United States from McKinley to Coolidge and declared none of the six ever turned her down. Fifty-nine men have been pardoned as the result of her efforts, she declared.

She takes pride in the fact she has been in three military prisons but has never hired a lawyer and never handled a gun.

(By Marjorie Hove Hoan.) The habit of collecting begins early with stamps, or melon rinds, or a me other treasure. Memory rinds? Oh, yes; my sister collected them when she was small—in her pretty play box covered with crochets. A peculiar odor attracted her mother's attention. Alas, this collection went the way of other collectors—out! Pathetic, wasn't it?

The point is this, that we mortals never stop making collections. It grows on one. We collect more seriously, and more expensively as we go on. One individual goes in for Colonial antiques. Another, for old Dutch slip ware. Another, but this in passing, they are, collects bottles.

If you can afford to add a lovely piece to your friend's collection of ladder-back chairs, or 18th century Italian mirrors, that is wonderful. But suppose you want to do it, but cannot afford it! Then your ingenuity must find a way. It is our private opinion that this, after all, is the most fun.

Colonial Antique Ideas Suppose your friend is furnishing her home in Colonial antiques. She has the larger pieces, she wants There are so many good reproductions that you can surely find something to give. If you enjoy needle work, there are bits of embroidery that may be used in her home, bits you must make, that really would be most difficult to buy.

If you feel very ambitious you can make a lovely sampler in cross stitch and have it framed. Or you can apply your craftsmanship to a chair back and rest in the needle point that fits so well with Colonial pieces. Another large piece of work is a hooked rug.

A very beautiful rug was made by an enterprising young woman. She examined a fine old piece on sale in a store. Several times she went back to memorize the pattern. At home she cut her own design, a repeat, used herringbone on her frame and knicked the strip with old wool from clothes and odds and ends around the house. She had to buy some material to finish the second strip. These, sewed together, formed a square about eight by eight feet. It was a most fascinating thing when completed.

Foot Stool Covers Among the smaller pieces that would not take so much time, or material, are the foot stool covers. In needle point, or quilting. Cushion covers, in cross stitch, or with pieced tops quilted, would make lovely gifts. Small hourettes cross stitch on black are very effective, and should be framed with narrow black borders.

Idea in Italian Manner Let us suppose that instead of using Colonial things your friend is furnishing his home in the Italian manner. There are beautiful pieces among the larger things that he will enjoy receiving. Chaises and tables, hand-mirrors and covers of terra cotta, portrait heads of ladies and standing figures of angels.

You are sure to find very lovely gifts for a home among the variety of pieces of Italian pottery. There are charming and quaint tea sets, there are fruit bowls of many kinds and candlesticks and vases besides. A handsome fruit bowl was divided into three sections, such a shell shape. At the center a winsome Cupid sat amongst light blossoms, all daintily executed.

Lamp bases made of bowls and bottles and even pitchers of Italian pottery are very fine-looking and full of color. The ceramic ware with the designs incised in the pottery, are sure to be appreciated. In fact, a lamp of the pottery with its shade painted to match has a happy faculty of fitting in almost anywhere.

Appeal Is Made To Soviets To Help In Finding Lost Flier

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—(INS)—The unusual expedient of one branch of the government, other than that of the department, in making an informal appeal to a foreign government was adopted by the Interior department in seeking aid for Lieut. Ben Eielson, missing American aviator, missing six weeks in the far North.

Secretary of the Interior, Wilbur, acting without the formal consent of the state department, sent messages direct to the Soviet government at Moscow and to two Soviet vessels in Alaskan and Siberian waters. The messages went through Tass Agency, the official Soviet telegraphic news organization throughout the world.

Wilbur's action was taken at the urgent behest of Vilhjalmy Stefansson, Arctic explorer. "In a situation of life and death, I appeal to you as the man I know best in the cabinet," the explorer said. "Eielson and Dorland are down in the Siberian Arctic. Eielson is the pilot with Wilkins on the first airplane that crossed the Arctic in what Amundsen called the most important flight in history."

NEW COMET SEEN HAMBURG, Dec. 21.—(INS)—The discovery of a new comet, visible with the aid of opera glasses, was announced by the Hamburg Astronomical Observatory here today.

Graf Zeppelin Won't Make North Pole Hop BERLIN, Dec. 21.—(INS)—Cancellation of the Graf Zeppelin's projected flight to the North Pole was confirmed by the International News Service today by Herr Stegerwald, in today's communication.






