

75 Spectaculars Set For 1957-58 T. V. Schedule

NEW YORK — You're got a front row ticket next season for such shows as "Annie Get Your Gun," "Twelfth Night" and "Julius and Ethel."

Those are only three of the 75 spectaculars definitely set for the 1957-58 schedule. The specs prom-

ise to shoot some jules into a TV season that otherwise shapes up as pretty droopy.

ABC-TV is the only major network not planning any spectaculars—unless you count two special one hour Frank Sinatra shows. However, NBC-TV reports 31 special programs locked up and CBS-TV is touting 22 specs.

Among its special shows, NBC-TV will offer six Bob Hope, six by Jerry Lewis and two by Dean Martin. There are also half a dozen "Hallmark Hall of Fame" entries on the boards including Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night."

Cook Up One-Shots
NBC-TV also is cooking up some special one-shots like "Annie Get

Your Gun" with Mary Martin, "The Pied Piper of Hamelin" with Fanny Cassio and "Finocchio" with Mickey Rooney.

Along with these NBC-TV will offer a Groucho Marx number, "Time Out For Elizabeth," a "Hans Brinker" Christmas special, "All Baba and The 40 Thieves," and two special musicals for General Motors and Standard Oil of New Jersey.

NBC-TV also is planning a series of 14 fairy tales and according to the latest report, a Shirley

Temple package she'll host and act in back in the ratings as co-hostess for the spot.

The major items on the CBS-TV schedule are 10 color musicals for DuPont. CBS-TV will open up the series with a variety show called "Crescendo and it will follow up with "Junior Miss," "The Prince and The Pauper," "The Little Prince" and an S. J. Perelman version of "Aladdin."

Thomas In Series
CBS-TV also is counting its five special "I Love Lucy" one-hour shows next season as spectaculars. They'll be in black and white.

Lowell Thomas will front seven other special CBS shows called "High Adventure." They'll deal with such subjects as cave exploring and mountain climb and filmed visits to places like Nepal and New Guinea.

Completing the CBS-TV list are six Art Linkletter holiday spectaculars, "Persons and Places." Linkletter will herd the cameras through the nation as they explore such things as Thanksgiving dinners and Christmas shopping.

As an added bonus, CBS-TV may also repeat two past successes—Julia Garland's "Wizard of Oz" and Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Cinderella."

To a degree all show the same interest in their hobby as ham radio operators and that is to communicate with one another, through the medium of their hobby, from near and far.

It is this ability to communicate with one another that makes the radio "ham" a very valuable asset to any community."

In the event of disaster the radio amateurs with their home-built equipment have proven themselves "ready and willing" to offer their aid to their community.

Their message handling between red cross, police, civil and military authorities and other stations runs into thousands of

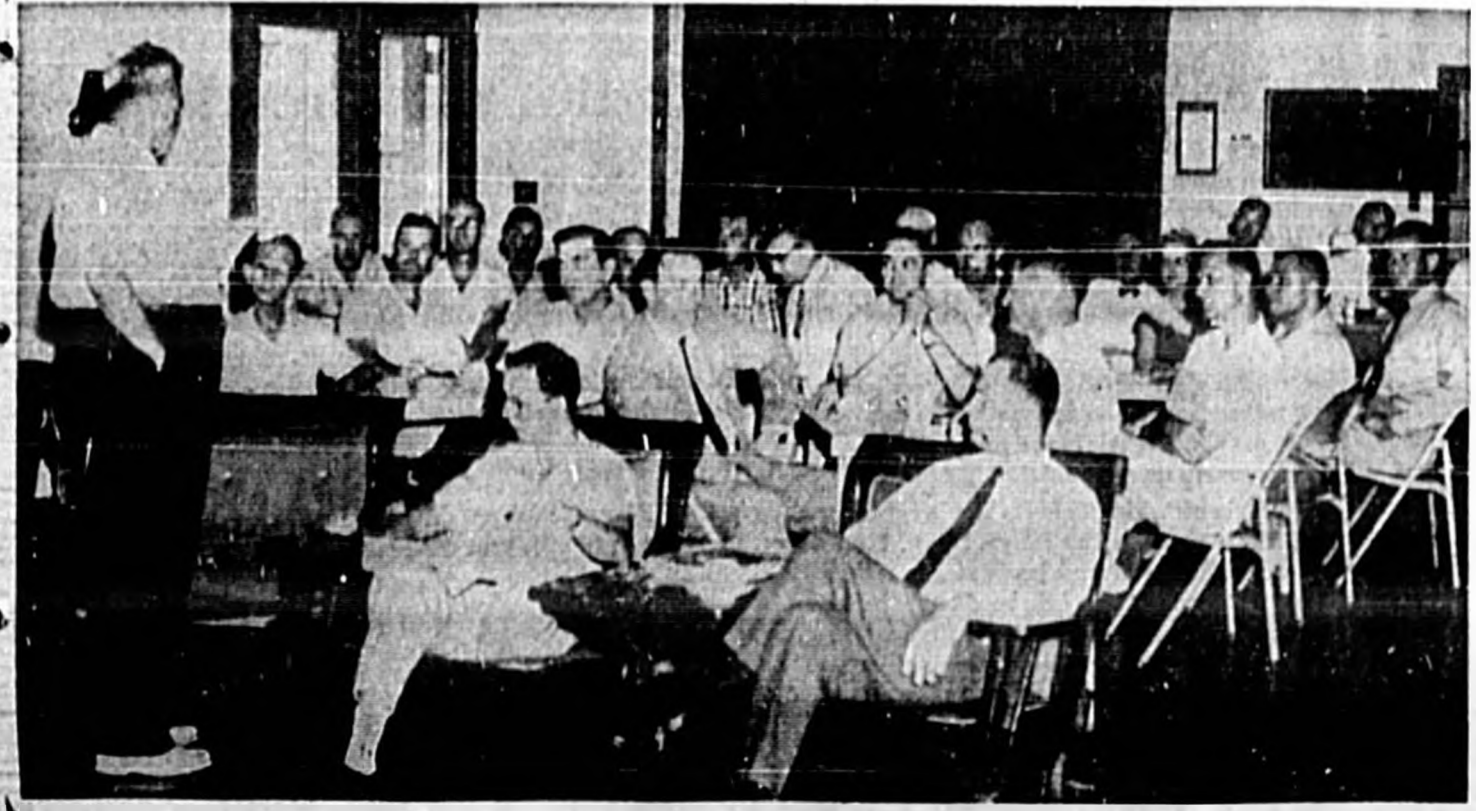

Guide For Storm Preparations

1. Get away and stay away from on-lying beaches or other locations which may be swept by high tides or storm waves. If your passage to high ground is over a road likely to be under water during a severe storm, then leave early. Don't run the risk of being marooned.
2. If your house is out of the danger of high tide and is well built (securely anchored to its foundation with a good roof which is securely fastened), then it is probably the best place to weather out the storm.
3. Board up windows or put storm shutters in place. When you board up use good lumber secured by strong nails. Make-shift boarding may do more damage than none at all. Have strong bracing for outside doors.
4. Get in extra food, things which can be eaten without cooking or with very little preparation. Remember that electric power may be off and you may be without refrigeration.
5. If emergency cooking facilities are necessary, be sure they are in working order.
6. Sterilize the bathtub and fill it with water. Also sterilize & fill all jugs, bottles, cooking utensils and other containers, as

Widows Can Get Higher Payments

Widows of many veterans stand to lose money unless they apply for increased compensation payments within the next two weeks, the Veteran Administration said today.

They are widows whose husbands died of service-connected causes before this year, and who may have the higher payments dated back to Jan. 1 if they apply by July 1. V.S. Parker, Manager of the Passaic VA Regional Office, added.

Parker said Florida widows eligible for the increased benefits have been notified, and that the majority already have made application.

With a few exceptions, those applying after July 1 will have payments increased only as of the day the VA gets the application.

Widows who have not made application for the higher payments are urged to contact the nearest VA office immediately for details.

Present Social Security Scheme Makes Difficult To Plan Retirement

About 14 million Americans are now 65 years of age or older. By 1975 there will be about 21 million of our citizens in that age bracket. To provide each one with a Social Security income of \$100 a month would cost over \$25,000,000.00 a year.

Furthermore, one does not have to be a citizen of the United States to be covered by Social Security. An Italian, Indian or Greek might come here and work for a year and a half and retire to his own country to draw regular Social Security payments from age 65 until his death.

Government now absorbs close to one-third of our national income. There is every reason to believe that this burden will increase rapidly if the Social Security scheme as now set up, is to be carried out. Moreover, it is now standard practice to "liberalize" it before each election. The tendency will be toward greater and greater expenditure.

Periodic Health Checkup Important

At present, in the United States, medical science cures about one out of every three persons who contract cancer. The American Cancer Society has the admirably simple goal of making the ratio one out of two. If this goal could be achieved, an additional 75,000 lives would be saved annually.

One of the biggest factors in the cure of cancer is early detection of the disease. The chances of early detection are greatly improved where there is general awareness of the danger signals. Another important factor in early detection is the periodic health checkup.

There is nothing difficult about these two things—learning the danger signals, and having a physical checkup at regular intervals. And taking these precautions may mean, quite literally, the difference between life and death. Yet it is apparent that great numbers of people have not troubled themselves to learn about the widely advertised danger signals and have not established a pattern of regular checkups.

This is one more illustration of a simple but potentially lethal fact. Although medicine has made tremendous strides in both the prevention and the cure of disease during recent decades, much of this is lost on the man who does not have his physical well-being checked at least once a year.

Those who do not go to a physician for such a checkup might almost as well have lived in the Middle Ages, for all the good recent medical advances do for them. Even if an absolutely sure cure were now known

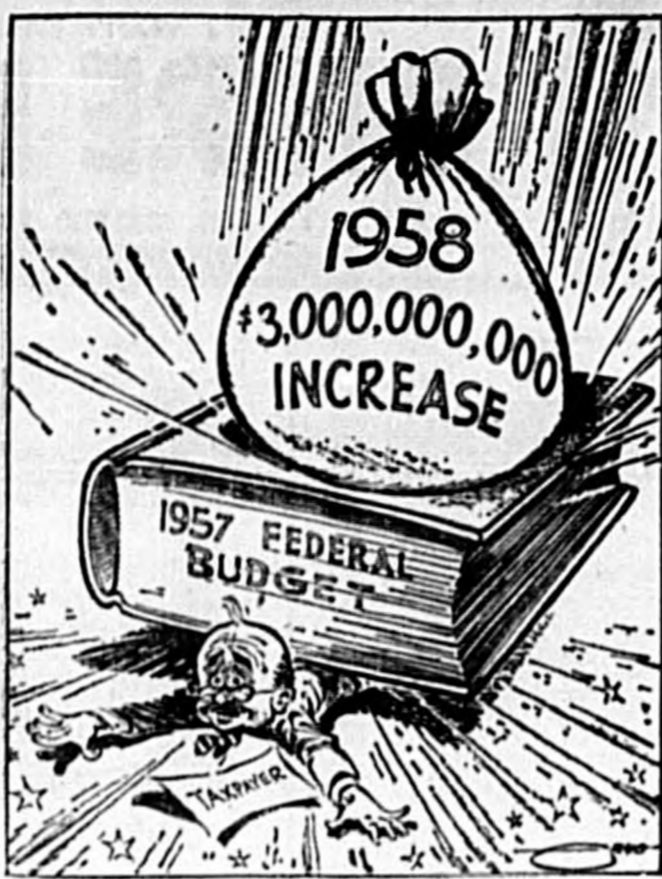

The proposal for a ban on the testing of nuclear weapons must be taken with a grain of salt until it is determined beyond a shadow of doubt that the Russians are serious about being participants.

Any agreement on such a ban must provide for a full and free inspection, and this includes going behind the Iron Curtain.

Disarmament talks always raise our hopes, for it would be a wonderful thing. It would be the means of a tax cut. But first and foremost we must think of our nation's security. Lowering the country's defenses at this critical time is too high a price to pay for tax relief.

It is well, however, to listen to the Russians. We will want to know about the proposal including whether there will be any halt in the stockpiling of the weapons.

Nuclear tests have aroused opposition because of the radioactive material going into the air. This to some degree is said to be harmful to all life, including the human race. And should this testing be accelerated the danger naturally would increase.

You may rest assured that we will look carefully at any disarmament suggestion. We don't want to take the risk of a surprise attack just to save a few dollars.

The long time coalition between the Southern Democrats and the conservative wing of the Republican party broke down in the House fight over the Civil Rights Bill, when the Republicans yielded to pressure from the White House to vote against the bill. It is common for government business enterprises to operate at a loss, which means they must be subsidized by all the taxpayers. Once they were sold to private enterprise, the subsidies would end and they would become major taxpayers. The gain to the nation over the years would run into tens of billions.

One big reason for the government's financial plight today is that it has gone far beyond Constitutional provisions, and into fields where it does not belong and where its presence is wasteful and destructive. This is not just a matter of economics—super-government is the greatest enemy of human freedom that exists. The proposed amendment would give us the kind of government envisaged by the founders.

Space scientists have released the encouraging news that it will not be difficult for rocket ships to avoid collision with meteors. Now if someone could give the same kind of assurance to motorists we would all feel better.

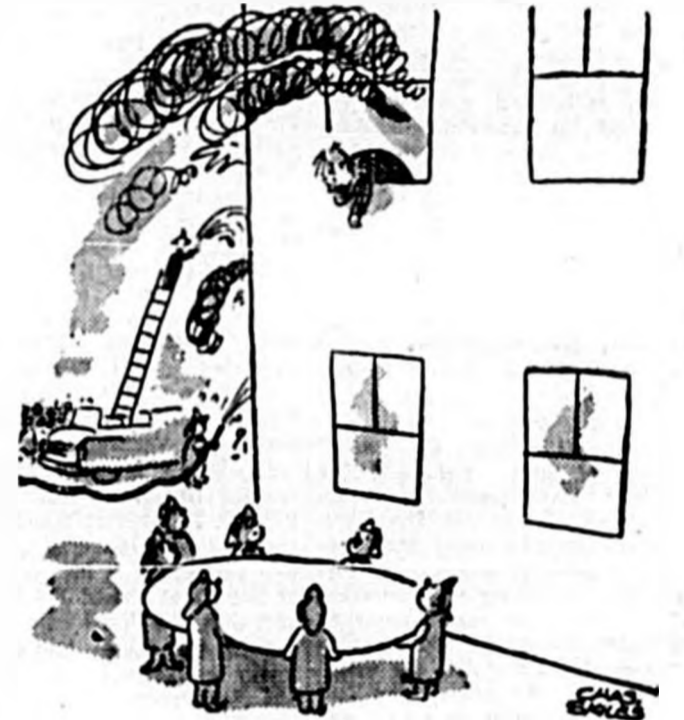

NEW YORK, (AP)—The memory of a sad day six years ago paid off for Mickey Mantle in a merciful memorial to his father. Mickey still thinks of that day in 1951 when, in the second game flying across the outfield grass of the World Series, he went in pursuit of a fly ball. His spikes caught in a drain grating and Mantle went down as if shot. His knee twisted and his embryo future in doubt.

Two months later the elder Mantle died of the dread disease and Mickey, remembered those days when they lay suffering together began thinking of how he could do something to eradicate the disease which killed his father.

Last spring he was jolted into action. Mickey received a letter advising him that St. Vincent's Hospital, which had been conducting research against Hodgkins disease, was about to give up its work because its funds were exhausted. His determination hardened when he visited a hospital and saw children afflicted with the disease.

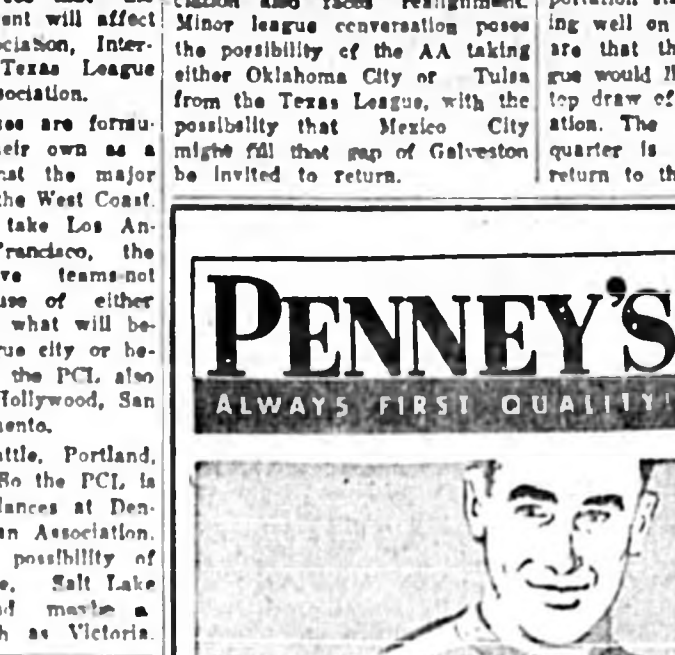

Five Coal Miners Rescued Last Night From Cave

BLOOMINGDALE, Ohio — Five coal miners entombed for 14 hours by a cave-in were rescued Wednesday night through a shaft bored by a tremendous mine-digging machine. It was believed the first time the machine, a giant auger developed to make coal mining more economical, ever was used in a rescue attempt. The bit of the auger, 34 1/2 feet thick, and capable of boring 120 feet an hour, pierced 240 feet into the side of a Powhatan Coal Co. strip mine near here and hit "dead center" in a low chamber where the miners were trapped. The men crawled to safety through the hole, the third bored, by the auger in the rescue effort, at 10:30 p. m. e.d.t. They had been trapped since 9 a. m. e.d.t. in a space 40 feet long, 4 1/2 feet high and 9 to 10 feet in width. About 300 persons, including wives and children of the trapped miners, rescue workers and two priests, shouted joyously at sight of the rescued men. "We never gave up hope, we knew that machine would get to us," said Kenneth Hamilton, 38, the first man out of the mine. Behind him came Joseph Ruppinski, 38, Martin Kovalicki, 40, Henry Horvath, 36, and Fred Sale, 38. None had suffered any injuries.

Audrey Leaves 100-Mile Trail Of Disaster

Coast Hardest Hit

LAKE CHARLES, La. — Hurricane Audrey's deadly sweep through the defenseless coastlands of Louisiana and Texas left a 100-mile trail of dead, injured and missing today.

Capt. Allen Marshall, whose tug was around at Cameron a town that was almost drowned on the Louisiana coast-said 87 persons were dead and 100 to 300 missing at Cameron.

A Lake Charles, La., weather bureau official told his superiors in Washington that 200 to 300 were dead around Cameron and Creole, La.

The Red Cross in Lake Charles, which is 30 miles north of Cameron, reported 35 dead or missing, but did not make clear exactly what area this figure covered.

It was known that 18 persons were killed and more than 100 injured in Texas and Louisiana before reports of a major tragedy began to filter in from the Louisiana coast.

Phone Lines Down As the hurricane crashed through the low-lying countryside along the Texas-Louisiana border, it tore down communications and power lines.

Seventeen AEC technicians and members of a Navy radiological team were forced to remain inside a steel-decked less than 1.2 miles from ground zero until the device was disarmed.

Harris has lived in Sanford for 43 years.

Market Commodity Report Revealed

Produce valued at nearly \$5 million was sold through the Sanford State Farmers' Market during the year 1956-57, according to the year-end commodity report of Sanford's "one stop loading center" for fresh fruits and vegetables.

The report, issued today, shows that 1,835,826 packages of Florida products at a valuation of \$4,711,377.50 were sold at the Sanford State Farmers' Market.

"Our out-of-state produce and fruit seasons ended April 3 due to the disastrous fire," said Sandy Anderson as he revealed the figures from this year's commodity report.

Total sales for the season, Florida and out-of-state came to 1,949,499 packages at a gross valuation of \$4,909,279.50.

"There are two reasons why we failed to exceed last season in volume and valuation," Anderson explained. They were: the extremely low market on potatoes and the disastrous fire which eliminated three of the large dealers on the market as of April 3.

Highest valuation on the market this season, it was revealed, was for oranges which was \$1,140,829.50.

Dealers at the Sanford State Farmers' Market sold cabbage in excess of \$800,000, with celery running second in volume at a valuation of \$444,794.05, and peppers brought dealers a total of \$330,395.85.

Out-of-state volume was big in tomatoes with \$199,143.10 and \$3,222 in lemons.

There was a total of 41 varieties of produce brought in to the Sanford State Farmers' Market and 53 varieties of Florida products moved from the local market platform.
