### Bradley Sees No Change In Red Threat

#### General Is Mum On Korean Situation

WASHINGTON — Gen Omar N. Bradley, who will soon step out as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said today he saw "no change" in the long range Soviet threat to the United States. He also said he saw no change in the Korean situation or in the chances of an armistice in the Far East.

Bradley made this comment at a news conference at which he announced he would be chairman of the Bulova research and development laboratories when he leaves the Pentagon Aug. 18.

The veteran soldier declined comment on the Korean situation or on the chances of an armistice in the Far East.

But in reply to questions Bradley cautioned against over optimism as a result of the reported troubles behind the Iron Curtain. He said it was possible that such disturbances in Soviet satellite countries could actually contribute to a united Communist effort if the Reds could make it appear the outside world was trying to interfere in their family quarrels.

# Frances 'Boots' Moore Wins Third Place

Sanford's Frances "Boots" Moore shared another third in a major beauty contest within the last three months when she gained the third ranking distinction at Daytona Beach on Saturday afternoon in the Dixie Follies before an over-flowing crowd of 15,000 spectators.

The Dixie Follies followed hard on the footsteps of her recent first place win at the Fiesta of Five Flags and the winning of the title "Miss High Voltage of 1953."

Last May, Miss Moore ranked third in the highly coveted Miss Florida Pageant at Daytona. She took a second in the Watermelon Festival at Leesburg and topped honora in the Fiesta of Five Flags.

## Building Work Is Stopped In Jax By Strike

JACKSONVILLE — A general work stoppage by union carpenters halted construction work today on virtually every building project under way.

A long-simmering disagreement between contractors and the carpenters' union over a new wage agreement came to a head between 7 and 8 a. m. when carpenters refused to go on jobs that did not pay their demands for \$2.45 an hour.

Contractors, through the Jacksonville chapter of American General Contractors, had made a tentative offer of \$2.35 an hour. The existing scale is \$2.20.

C. C. Howell, chairman of the wage negotiating committee for the Carpenters' District Council, said the union's demand for \$2.45 an hour not only affected Jacksonville, but included St. Augustine, Palatka, Fernandina Beach, Gainesville and St. Marys, Fla.

Howell said "about 250 carpenters" did not go on jobs in Jacksonville today and that at a total of most of the major construction jobs in city and county which employ carpenters "are at a standstill."

Bookmen for the contractors said there may be some "isolated cases" of contractors paying \$2.45 an hour, but there is "a general work stoppage."

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## Gardner Mulloy Is Suing British Press For Libel

MIAMI — Gardner Mulloy, top-ranked U. S. tennis player, reported from London today that he was "suing several English news papers for defamation of character, slander and libel."

The action, Mulloy wrote in the Miami Daily News, grew out of news coverage of his defeat in the Queen's Club championships in London on June 18.

Mulloy threw a racquet in the general direction of a linesman after he was defeated by George Worthington, a New Zealander.

In the by-lined story he mailed to the Miami News from London, Mulloy said "I am sure that you couldn't be further from the truth."

He claimed that he was "abused by the press" that he received "several hundred anonymous letters threatening me bodily harm, name-calling, inviting me to leave the country and generally telling me what a stinker I am."

He accused the British press with one exception of lack of sportsmanship.

## New Government Of France Seeks Fiscal Solution

PARIS — The new government of Premier Joseph Laniel outlined today a series of new taxes, reductions of expenditures, and means for paying back advances from the Bank of France through which it hopes to get the nation's teetering economy back on a stable basis.

Roughly, the measures which the Laniel cabinet is proposing are those which caused the downfall of the Rene Mayer government on May 21. Each of the four candidates for premier who were rejected by the National Assembly during the 37 day crisis which followed Mayer's ouster also said the measures would be needed.

Laniel was reported to have decided to pose the question of confidence on his measures, the ranking his week-old cabinet. The debate in the National Assembly will take up most of this week, starting with committee hearings tomorrow.



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# Former Navy Engineer Reveals Spy Ring

CHICAGO (AP)—A former Navy Bureau of Ordnance engineer disclosed Monday the existence of a "background network" of Communist saboteurs operating in government departments from 1938 to 1946, the Chicago Tribune reported today.

The Tribune reported that Max Elitcher, 33, identified as a former friend of executed atomic spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, testified in secret before the House Committee on Un-American Activities in New York.

The paper said Elitcher's testimony was heard in secret session at the demand of the Justice Department which asserted national security was involved.

In New York Monday, committee members declined to identify the witness specifically to newsmen but it was learned he apparently was Elitcher. A committee spokesman would identify the witness only as "a very, very important" one.

The Tribune said Elitcher described how Communist cells infiltrated the Navy, Commerce and Agriculture departments and identified the members. Most of those named are still in Washington, the paper said, but it is understood all have left the government since 1946.

Elitcher testified the Rosenbergs sought to enlist him in espionage in 1944. Particularly, he testified, Rosenberg asked for plans of Navy fire control and gun aiming devices on which Elitcher was then working. The witness said he evaded Rosenberg's request.

## Red Executions Of Peoples' Police Reported By Paper

BERLIN (AP)—The West Berlin newspaper Telegram said today that 46 Communist German "people's police" have been executed by Russian firing squads for "disobeying orders and joining the Red army" during the June 17 workers' revolt in East Germany.

No source was given for the report, which is considerably higher than any previous estimate of the number of police executions. Telegram reports have confirmed, however, that the Red German police proved in the uprising that the Russians could not rely upon them against their own people. The "people's police" often refused to fire on rioters and sometimes even joined the rebels. Nearly 500 have fled to West Berlin in the last month.

## Authorities Hope Polio Threat Broken

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—Health authorities here today said they were hopeful that last week's mass immunization program may have broken the back of a threatened polio epidemic here.

No new cases had been reported in two days when they made their final check last night. So far 80 cases have been counted.

Dr. A. H. Graham, county health director, hastened to point out, however, that it is too early to say whether the gamma globulin shot given more than 32,000 children last week turned the trick.

## Sidewalk Defender Of Spies Is Freed

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Irwin Edelman, the sidewalk orator whose name was used in obtaining the last stay of execution for the Rosenberg atom spies, is free today, but must register as a vagrant within 48 hours or go to jail for 90 days.

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# Ex-VA Employee Files Libel Suit Over Charges Of Loafing On Job

TAMPA (AP)—A Veterans Administration employe sued a real estate man for libel Monday, charging a false statement was made about the working habits of himself and 159 others in the VA building at Pass-A-Grille Beach.

Henry Wilkinson's complaint, filed in federal court, said Col. Rex Dunlap, the defendant, wrote Gen Carl R. Gray Jr., former VA administrator, "that employes were spending too much time on the beach in front of the building."

The letter recently was published in the St. Petersburg Times, along with several others between Gray and Dunlap.

Wilkinson charged that Dunlap was trying to "influence the sale" of the VA building, the former plush Doncegar Hotel, "in private hotel groups of certain friends to his advantage as a real estate broker."

But the judge, while declining to stop enforcement of the law with a temporary injunction, ordered the state treasurer to keep all revenue collected under "a special fund for distribution after he gives a final ruling."

He set July 22 for a final hearing on a joint attack on the statute by the Volusia Keenel Club, Daytona Beach, and the Skisway Kenel Club, Miami.

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# New Mansion For Governor Is Given First Priority

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—The cabinet put construction of a new governor's mansion among first priority building projects today.

The old mansion has been described as in poor condition. The Legislature appropriated \$25,000 for replacing it. Advertisements also were given for purchasing a new site for the executive dwelling but Gov. McCarty has indicated he would like to have it in the same spot as the present mansion.

Secretary of State H. A. Gray, presiding at the meeting at McCarty's absence, told the cabinet the governor has asked "prompt consideration" of plans for rebuilding the mansion.

# Shreveport Editor Dies Following Heart Attack

SHREVEPORT, La. (AP)—Dolph G. Frantz, veteran Shreveport Journal editor, died today after suffering a heart attack.

The 67-year-old editor entered a Shreveport hospital for a checkup and rest last Saturday. His condition was not considered serious. Late last night Frantz suffered the attack.

He was a bitter foe of the late Huey P. Long when Long was governor of Louisiana and when Long served in the U. S. Senate. Later the rift between Frantz and the Long family healed.

Gov. Earl K. Long, Huey's brother, appointed Frantz chairman of a committee investigating conditions at the state penitentiary at Angola.

# Reds Ease Up On Underfed Masses In Czechoslovakia In New Move

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—Soviet communism's new policy of leniency to its subject millions in East Europe moved today into Czechoslovakia, the fifth Russian satellite to ease up on underfed, rebellious masses.

Prague radio announced the Red Czech government is abolishing a decree ordering terms in forced labor camps for workers who stayed away from their jobs without good reason.

The law had been enacted a week ago, apparently to counter widespread absenteeism which followed repressive measures taken after riots and disturbances against the Communist government in June.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Cleveland (R-Ohio) said today the Eisenhower administration is asking Republicans in vote for too many bills they opposed when the Democrats sponsored them.

"We're working on too much legislation that has been carried over from the Truman administration," he said.

# Ike Planning To Send Nixon Abroad On Goodwill Visit

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower is contemplating sending Vice President Nixon on a trip to Asia as a goodwill ambassador after Congress adjourns.

Although plans still are in the tentative stage, those who reported the President's intention said the State Department is working on an itinerary which would take the vice president to most of the non-Communist countries in the Far East in what might wind up eventually as a trip around the world.

Eisenhower was said to be well pleased by results obtained by Secretary of State Dulles and Mutual Security Director Harold Riesel on a recent trip to the Near East. The President apparently believes Nixon could help iron out some rough spots in U. S. relations with Asiatic countries.

Buffalo, N. Y. (AP)—Thousands of commuters in this heavily populated industrial center rode buses to work today after AFL transit workers accepted a pay increase to end a three-day strike.

The strike which began Friday, had tied up Niagara Frontier Transit System service here, in Niagara Falls and several suburbs.

Under the new contract, drivers get a 14-cent hourly increase now and three cents more next Jan. 1. Mechanics get an increase of 3.3 per cent now and three cents more next January. The new rates will increase drivers' pay now to \$1.83 while mechanics will be on a scale of from \$1.61 to \$2.02 an hour.

His forecast was an early round in the Senate's version of the congressional battle already fought in the House over Air Force cutbacks in particular and defense reductions in general.

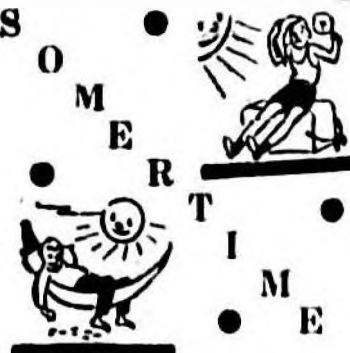
