

The report, monitored by the BBC, did not eleborate on the announcement but said Mirsalim's name would be submitted to the Majlis, parliament, for approval. Debate on who would be named to the key governmental post in Iran has raged for weeks in Iran and was the subject of a fierce power struggle between Bani-Sadr and his fundamentalist Moslem clergy opponents, headed by Ayatollah Mohammad Beheshti, the leader of the majority Islamic Republican Party. Beheshti also is head of the Supreme Court.

Jet Hijackers Sürrender

KUWAIT (UPI) - Two disgruntled Jordanian brothers who tried to shoot down the pilot and co-pilot of the jetliner they hijacked surrendered peacefully and freed their remaining hostages unharmed.
Youssef and Ahmed Mifleh, a pair of convicted badcheck artists, quietly handed over their guns, grenades and explosives and ended a five-stop journey of terror on which they had taken a Kuwaiti Airways Boeing 737

across the Middle East. During the 27-hour ordeal that began with their hijacking of the plane shortly after it left Beirut for Kuwait Thursday, the two threatened to blow up the jetliner unless an unidentified Kuwaiti businessman paid them \$1 million they said he owed them. The odyssey, which started with 80 passengers and crew aboard, took the plane to Kuwait, then to a refueling stop in Bahrain, back to Kuwait, on to the



Show Goes On Without U.S.

The summer games of the 1980 Olympics opened in Moscow amid the odor of fresh paint. Up to the last minute the Russians were sprucing up their capital for the influx of visitors. But no amount of brushing over can hide what is wrong with these Olympics, and what is wrong with the government serving as the official host.

Moscow has been turned into a theater set, and those athletes, tourists and reporters showing up in spite of the U.S.-led boycott are part of the cast of the fantasy about to unfold. Even without the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, there were reasons for people from the non-Communist world not to go along with the pretentious phoniness of

Journalists arriving to cover the Olympics ran nto Soviet news-control even before the games started. The Soviets refused to transmit a West German television story saying the Olympics were being used for propaganda, which is so obvious it hardly needs saying. A French dispatch about Soviet censorship was, of course, censored

What else could the reporters expect? It has been evident for months that in trying to make the Olympics a showcase for the glories of a Communist society, the Kremlin was in fact putting on display the power of a state dictatorship to give its official lies an aura of reality.

Moscow itself is something of a lie, and not only because of the fresh paint on otherwise shoddy buildings. Dissidents have been rounded up and sent away. So have an estimated 300,000 drunks and drug addicts. Most school-age children have been sent to summer camp. Every Muscovite expected to come in contact with foreign visitors has been coached on what to say and what not to say. With about 35,000 extra police called in from the provinces, it's been estimated that one out of

before guests arrive, but the Kremlin has even decreed that cars with dented fenders may not appear on the streets. The heavy-handedness of the Moscow clean-up would be laughable except that it is an example of how the truth is methodically denied in the Soviet Union.

To this day, the Soviet people have not been told that President Carter called for an Olympic boycott because of the Afghan invasion. They have been told, variously, that Mr. Carter thinks the boycott will help him get re-elected, and that athletes from non-Communist countries are staying home because they fear they will do poorly against superior athletes from Communist

We can be sure the Russians will pronounce the Moscow Olympics a "success," even if the boycott is leaving them with only half as many visitors as they were prepared to entertain. There will be paeans to the Olympic spirit of peace and brotherhood, even as Soviet bombers and tanks lay waste villages in Afghanistan. Bands will Teddy "Big Stick" Roosevelt and the CIA.

begin meeting Monday to discuss the offers will first examine the Kladis, Brzozowski and Gould proposal and then review the Farley and DeBartolo offers. "The Brzozowski group will be the first in the batter's box," one Sox shareholder told the Sun-Times. "They know they're going to be coming in with the low bid but they don't

believe Farley has the money. "Since Farley and the Brzozowski and Kladis people are shareholders - and insiders - they would be privy to all the offers prior to the final vote. And once they have this knowledge, what's to prevent them from submitting a second and higher bid?"







Keep Detailed Records

For Lower Gas Mileage

By far the best way to save gas is to stay out of your car. Without becoming a recluse, you can cut down on your driving enough to save a bundle of money if you go about it

First, keep a driving record. It can be a detailed record that would pass an audit by a.CPA, or just a small notebook of mileage and gallons entries each time you buy gas. You'll get more benefit if you record the purpose of the longer trips and for a few weeks jot down every trip you make. With the record, you'll be able to tell how much of your

driving is essential. Then you can set a realistic target for

For many people, a 20 percent mileage reduction for the first three months makes sense. Until you have a month-bymonth record for a full year, you won't be able to make steady reductions because your pattern of driving varies too much

with the seasons. It may hope to divide your trips into categories such as: -home (shopping, school, errands)

Only you can tell whether it is essential that you drive alone to work every day. But before you decide it is impossible to carpool and is unreasonable to take the bus, bike, or walk, ask yourself: "If gasoline were \$10 a gallon, would I still drive?" Even one day a week of carpooling or riding the bus could cut your work driving by nearly 20 percent.

Household driving is easy to reduce, but only if you keep records. Without records, it is like trying to lose weight without save miles as well. ever stepping on the scales: You could spend a lot of time fooling yourself. If you chauffeur the kids to school or to little league, work out

a ride-sharing routine with a neighbor. Or, if it's safe, insist the kids Fide their bikes three days a week, or that they walk every If you run numerous errands for yourself or the children, set

some limits. Like: only one trip a day, or three days a week, or for a longer one, give yourself a miles-saved credit. And add up only between four and five p.m.

Divide your trips into categories such as work, home (shopping, school, errands) and recreation. Don't eliminate the recreation, but set a goal for reducing the amount of gas you burn.


When shopping for unusual items, call ahead to find a store that has them. Then jot down the miles you saved by not making a useless trip. And congratulate yourself. You also can save gas by combining errands into one trip. A car that has been warmed up gets better mileage than one that is cold. Even if you have to make six stops on a trip, you'll get better mileage with the warmed-up car, and you'll probably

Don't eliminate recreation. But do set a goal of reducing the amount of gas you burn. If you own a boat, reduce your use of it (and the drive to the lake) by one fourth. And reward yourself with a dinner out in a nearby restaurant or a visit with friends. Study your pattern of recreational driving. Then set a modest goal. Each time you substitute a short recreational trip

Many Travel Bargains

Offer Something Extra

Be they long weekends or full-blown vacation trips. American vacationers are shopping for travel bargains that: offer something "extra," concluded 30 travel industry specialists surveyed recently by the Travel Industry

Association of America. Officers of attractions, transportation and accommodations companies, travel associations and state and regional travel offices commented that they noticed travelers are "determined to take a trip this summer" and a return to normal business levels.

Although the family vacationers are back in their cars; and back in numbers that assist businesses hurt by last year's fuel shortage, Americans are preplanning their trips with mileage and destination goals.

"Because families are planning their vacation travel more diligently, there is little discretionary time in their schedules, and roadside welcome centers are drawing fewer people because the majority of travelers have already made their lodging reservations for the duration of their trip, allowing less flexibility in their travel schedules," said David Santillanes Jr., director of New Mexico's state travel office and chairman

of the National Council of State Travel Directors. Other state and regional travel executives concurred, noting that welcome centers' staffs are busy advising travelers by elephone instead of helping them in persons.

They also mentioned a surge in inquiries about vacation specials that offer something different.

"People want excitement, not just a chance to sit around a -pool," said Patrick Green, assistant vice president of tour and incentive sales for Hilton Hotels Corp. "People are more value conscious today and demand more than that."

One lodging industry response is the development of programs catering to travelers' interest in activity and the onstruction of more tennis and golf facilities. Luxury soaps, engraved stationery in guest rooms and

services like turned-down bedcovers with mints on the pillow in the evenings now woo the "extras" conscious vacationer. "People want to be pampered when they're away from home," said Joseph P. Kordsmeier, senior vice president of sales and marketing for Hyatt Hotels Corp. The trend is widely observed throughout the industry and backed up by sales figures that reflect an increasing call for top-dollar ac

"The traveling public is not going to tolerate mediocrity. People know how to shop and are sophisticated when travel buying," observed Rober Uguccioni, executive director of the Pocono Mountains Vacation Bureau in Pennsylvania. Othertravel experts agreed with his observation. A majority of the panel acknowledge that first-class and luxury accommodations are selling out first, followed by

The travel industry professionals agreed, however, that in spite of a demand for high-priced goods and services, the current recession is affecting business. Close-to-home trips are promoted by all state, regional and city travel offices, tapping the demand for long-weekend trips prompted by the unstable

budget-priced units, with moderately priced rooms filling up

economy and high gasoline prices. Sixty-four percent of American family vacations are taken luring the summer, and families are opting increasingly for common carrier transportation for trips of more than 500 miles, and they're taking them on bargain fares. According to a spokesman for the Air Transport Association of America, more than 50 percent of all commercial airline

tickets are discounted. The demand for budget tickets directly affects long-haul carriers currently reflected in a price-war over transcontinental air routes, heavy advance bookings for rail tickets, and the establishment of new bus roules by interstate

Attendance at U.S. attractions and reservations during the July 4 to Aug. 1 period was expected to be about the same as last year, although campgrounds, national parks and forests, are benefitting slightly from the currently plentiful gas supply.

Almost all of those surveyed agreed that foreign travelers are increasingly influencing the U.S. travel industry. Foreigners are coming to the U.S. in record numbers, lead by visitors from the United Kingdom, West Germany and Japan, and many have been here before.

Having seen many of America's cities and attractions during their first visit, second-time foreign travelers seek out other areas of the U.S. and are renting full-sized hazury curs. with big trunks and comfortable seats. They are ignoring auto miles-per-gallon ratings because U.S. gasoline prices seem cheap compared with \$2-plus a gallon prices in Europe and

Benefitting from exchange rates that favor foreign currency, travelers to the U.S. are taking long trips, spending freely and shopping excessively

"They are buying everything from mink coats to toasters, said a spokesman for the New York City Convention and Visitors Bureau, en observation echoed by travel industry officers who agreed they were making concerted efforts to attract travelers to their jurisdictions.



Eveyln Mattice was quite exicted when 6-year-old Li

For three weeks, under the direction of the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP), the 62-year-old volunteer has been teaching the bright-eyed Vietnamese youngster the language of his new country, along with his 10-year-old brother, Hepp, and 8-year-

Mrs. Mattice knew that Li had learned a lot, but she nearly melted when the little tyke looked at her, smiled, and declared in very clear English, "You are

Just as new to the RSVP program as the youngsters are to this country, Mrs. Mattice really didn't know what to expect when she was asked if she'd like to help teach the youngsters. Rushing through her mind were thoughts like, "I don't even know their language. . . how can I teach them?" and "I'm not a teacher. Can I do it?"

But when she learned that help the children would get through RSVP was extremely important to their future in this country, she didn't hesitate. The children, from a family sponsored by the Casselberry Rotary Club, were in the country for just one week, and they knew only two words-"Hello" and "Yes" - a propitious beginning.

Sister Aimee Was A Colorful Figure

evangelists of all time - Billy Sunday and Aimee Semple MacPherson. In the era before television, they had followings which rivaled those of the current Electronic Church. Whenever a situation called for a scene, Aimee provided one.

But the scene evangelist Aimee Semple MacPherson played George Plagenz best of all was her vanishing act in 1926. She was wading in the ocean off Ocean Park, Calif., one afternoon when she disappeared from sight. It was assumed she had drowned. A memorial service at Angelus Temple, the magnificent Foursquare Gospel edifice she had built in 1922, drew huge

throngs. A memorial collection netted \$40,000. Then, five weeks later, Aimee showed up in Douglas, Ariz. Her second husband, Harold MacPherson, a grocery clerk, She told an exciting tale of having been kidnapped and transported, blindfolded to a shack in the desert. She escaped from her abductors, she said, by using the ragged edge of a tin can to cut the ropes binding her hands and feet. Scoffers said it was all a publicity stunt. Others whispered

that Aimee had been off on a rendezvous with Ken Ormiston the engineer of her radio program. Witnesses reported seeing the two at a cottage at the seaside resort of Carmel. When authorities could find no evidence to support Aimee's


