

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History's Worst Air . Disaster Near Tokyo Claims 129 US Lives

Plane Was Carrying Military Personnel

TOKYO & A giant C-124 Globematter pinwheeled out of the
murky sky near Tokyo today and
crashed in flames carrying 129
Americans to their death in history's worst air disaster

The Air Force said 60 bodies had been identified. The huge doubledeck transport was carrying back to battle stations in Korea. he plane had a crew of seven. There were no survivors.

The Globemaster crashed seconds after taking off from the U. S. sir base at Tachikawa, 25 miles west of Tokyo.

An eyewitness said the giant plane "somersaulted like a bird and plummeded to the ground."

The plane was a special flight for soldiers.

The worst previous air disaster was the crash of another Globe master near Larson Air Force Base at Mosas Lake, Wash, which killed 86 last Dec 20.
