Caribbean services increase from Sanford

SANFORD - Officials with the Orlando Sanford International Airport celebrated Friday the inaugural flights to three destina-tions in the Caribbean.

The destinations - Aguadilla, Puerto Rico; Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic; and Punta Cana, Dominican Republic are part of the airport's fast growing Caribbean market. By mid-summer, there will be 22 flights a week to Puerto Rico, said Ray Wise, vice president of aviation marketAirport will offer 22 flights per week to Puerto Rico by mid summer

ing at OSIA.

"Pan Am is ramping up the San Juan service, and we expect to them to have 12 flights a week to that city," Wise said. They'll have another four flights to Aguadilla."

In addition, Wise noted that TransMeridian Airlines will provide six flights a week to San Juan beginning June 27. "People are back flying again," Wise said.
"We think this is going to be a good sum-

Pan Am began flying to Puerto Rico two years ago, and company officials say the route is one of the airline's most successful destinations. After a five-week hiatus in January and February during which Pan Am operated no flights because of a sub-

stantial drop in customer demand, the air-line has focused its expansion plans on the Caribbean and Latin America. Was said Pan Am is exploring the possibility of a Sanford-Costa Rica route in the near future.


While the Caribbean routes have drawn most of the attention, Wise said the airport continues to serve a substantial British mar-ket and add more domestic destinations.

Just this month, the airport signed a 5-year contract extension with the United Kingdom's fourth largest leisure airline, Air

1,000 people expected to attend memorial dedication for Sanford Naval Air Station


SANFORD — The historical marker has been placed in the ground; and, now more than 1,000 people are expected to attend Friday's dedication of the Naval Air Station Sanford Memorial Park.

After more than three years, the Sanford Airport Memorial Committee has reached its objective — renovating an old RA-5C Vigilante aircraft and using it as the focal point in a park dedicated to the city's former and states. to the city's former naval station. On Friday, the new landmark will officially be unveiled to the community during a dedication ceremony featuring local politicians and officials, as well as Capt. Jerry Coffee, a Vietnam-era POW once stationed in Sanford. A flyover by

F-18 Navy jets is also expected. "What we have right now is 25 to 30 people who have put in a lot of time and work for this airplane and memorial," said Jack Dow, president of the Sanford Airport Memorial Committee. "This is a gift to the community to commemorate the relationship between the area, the naval station and now the airport."

Earlier this month, the Seminole County Historical Commission unveiled the historical marker,

SANFORD - Sanford City Commissioner Velma H. Williams recently became the first African-American in the city's history to be appointed as vice mayor.

Williams, who was appointed to this office last month by Mayor Brady Lessard, replaces Commissioner Whitey Eckstein, who retired earlier this year. She's got the experience need-

ed and understands the community," said Lessard. "She will be a fine vice mayor."

Williams is also the only female member of the City Commission but says her fellow commissioners treat her in the highest regard and

respect her opinion and her right to differ.

"It's an honor to get this type of vote of confidence," said Williams, a Sanford native. "I think it's a sign we are moving in the right direction and anything is possible. It really would have made a difference if it had been an election - it would have spoke volumes.

Computer program helps find missing children

SANFORD — New computer

software is helping the city's police department track missing children. LOCATER is a program to has-ten the recovery of missing and abducted children by providing law enforcement agencies the tech-nology to rapidly disseminate images and information, said Sanford Police Spokesperson Cleo Cohen. The software and computer equipment, including a color printer, scanner and three-years of

technical service support and Internet service, was provided to the department by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children through a Department of Justice grant.

The program allows us to get the information to our officers and to other agencies in a timely manner," Cohen said. "We are now capable of making flyers if we need to, and we can scan pictures into the system and send them out to other agencies over the net-


The LOCATER system is rela-

tively simple to use, said Investigative Aide Ron Nickolson. It's a matter of scanning a photograph, organizing and sending information via the Internet to other agencies and printing flyers to disperse within the department and community.

After the department receives a missing child report and obtains a photograph from a parent or legal guardian, information is entered into the National Crime Information Center's (NCIC) com-

Lake Mary executive works to level playing field in technology industry

LAKE MARY -- Billions of dollars worth of U.S. information technology work is flowing from American firms — and American consumers — to foreign IT firms at a cost to the U.S. economy of thousands of jobs and millions of dollars in tax revenues.

That's a triple-whammy for the U.S. economy, says Matt Moore, founder and chief executive officer of TEAM Information Services, one of Florida's largest and most active information technology firms.

"If an American firm sends a billion dollars worth of IT work to an Indian company, that takes a billion dollars out of the U.S. job market," sald Moore, who serves as president of the National Association of Computer Consulting Businesses (NACCB) the nation's leading information technology trade association. "That's a billion dollars worth of jobs, a billion dollars worth of income taxes the corporation would pay and a billion dollars worth of income taxes all those working American would have paid."

Moore said NACCB has formed an executive task force to lobby for changes. He has already met with congressmen and senators.

"Free trade is good, but we have to have a level playing field," said Moore. "An Indian company can own an American company, but an American company can't buy an Indian company. If it were just a matter of capitalist principles, that would be one thing, but when you count the business taxes American firms pay, personal income taxes their workers pay and the sorry shape of the U.S. economy today it,s a sacrifice no one should be asked to make, yet we are making it every day."

National and personal security are two other important issues, Moore noted. "Data is being sent to offshore firms with no privacy safeguards whatsoever. Health care companies outsource information about patients and doctors, banks outsource financial information including your social security number, and we have entrusted important information networks to countries where anti-American, is a prevalent attitude. These concerns are vitally important to all of us," he said.

Moore said he hopes to reach thousands of U.S. computer workers who have lost their jobs in recent years.

Moore said the NACCB task force will study American academic institutions and American

corporations to learn how better to fulfill the need for IT work

here in this country. "As a nation, we'd be better children," Moore said.



USDA alters citrus estimate for 2002-2003 season.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture revised the orange crop forecast for the 2002-2003 season, increasing the orange estimate by 2 million boxes to 200 million boxes while reducing the grapefruit estimate by 1 million boxes.

Valencias increased by 2 million boxes to 88 million boxes, while Early and Midseason varieties stay at 112 million boxes. The increase in Valencias is largely attributed to larger-thanexpected fruit sizes. This is the second increase in Valencias this season due to the size of fruit.

Tangelos and Temples remain the same at 2.35 million boxes and

1.3 million boxes respectively. However, Tangerines increased slightly by 200,000 boxes to total 5.4 million boxes. The increase reflects the fact that officials are continuing to see more fruit than originally predicted,

The grapefruit estimate was reduced by 1 million boxes to 39 million. Colored grapefrult were reduced 1.5 million boxes to 22.5 million boxes, while white grapefruit Increased by 500,000 boxes to 16.5 million boxes.

The yield for frozen concentrated orange juice (FCOJ), was reduced to 1.53 gallons per 90pound box of oranges. Lowerthan-expected juice content for Valencia oranges accounts for the decrease in overall yield.



which is located in front of the renovated Vigilante. It tells park's visitors the story of the naval base and its ever-changing relationship with the community

In November 1942, Naval Air Station Sanford was commissioned to meet the country's need for additional naval aviation training facilities. Originally planned for bomber training, within a year it converted to fighter plane train-

By the end of World War II, the U.S. Navy no longer needed the additional training facility. The airfield was decommissioned and turned over to the city. In 1947, the New York Glants constructed eight baseball fields at the station to use for their spring farm teams. Apartments, motels, a seminary and a Bible College were also located at the site.

At the start of the Korean War in the early 1950s, the air station was reactivated. In 1957, the Sanford station was one of the first to receive a squadron of A3D Skywarriors, a long-range jet bomber, which was replaced by the Vigilante in the 1960s.

Originally designed as a nuclear bomber, the Vigilante later was used for photographic reconnais-sance missions. During the Vietnam War, Sanford was home to the families of many POWs and MIAs from Vigilante squadrons.

In 1968, Congress closed the Sanford base for the final time and returned the airport back to the city. The site eventually evolved into today's international airport, which serves about 1.5 million passengers each year.

Although it has been more than three decades since the last fighter pilot trained at the station, members of the community didn't forget about the long, and economically important, history the station maintained in the area. Three years ago, the Sanford Airport Memorial Committee formed with the objective of obtaining a historic U.S. Navy aircraft and erecting a monument that would serve as a reminder to the community of the alrport's military history.

In 2001, the committee acquired the Vigilante from the National Museum of Naval Aviation in Pensecola. Since then, the committee has received more than \$265,000 from the state and private donations to construct the park and refurbish the aircraft.

"At times, it has been a struggle," Dow said. "We've struggled with finding a location, we've struggled with the acquisition, we even struggled with the installation. But, now we are ready to commemorate the relationship between the community and the air station. And, I think we've commemorated it in a really neal

puter. Using the LOCATER program, the poster-creation software and templates guide Nickolson or any of the department's investigators through the process of generating a poster.

The posters can be printed on paper and used within the department, dispersed to the community or sent through the Internet to other agencies, Nickolson said. In addition to

alerting law-enforcement agencies, users can quickly e-mail or fax posters to the media, as

deemed appropriate.

The Sanford department also receives posters and information concerning missing children reported by other agencies. Nickolson updates the department's missing persons file daily with reports received from other cities, counties and states.

The LOCATER software appli-

cation is not limited to missing children posters, Nickolson said. The program also includes templates for more than 100 different types of posters, including missing adults, wanted persons and crime alerts.

"We can even use it for line-ups in a crime scene investigation, and for stolen property investigations," Cohen said. "It allows us to get the information out there as quickly as possible."

"I have elgarette burns from those sit-ins," she said. "I've been in the struggle. If I could endure what I did, this [being an African-American commissioner and vice mayor is a piece of cake. Whatever happens to me here, I can handle it."

Williams was first elected as District 2 commissioner in 1996. Since that time, she has worked diligently to make Sanford a model city. Williams says, one step toward the city developing its full potential is the realization of the proposed conference center in downtown Sanford.

As a commissioner, Williams feels strongly about involving the community in the decision making process. Several items top her agenda, including designing a five-year plan for the city, finding the right person for the vacant city manager position and the city's employee morale.

Through the years, she has become known as the outspoken

commissioner, but Williams says she has mellowed considerably since being elected in 1996.

"Some people see me as being outspoken," said Williams, who earned a doctoral degree in counseling and human systems from Florida State University. "I'm a Christian and I try to do the right thing. Through wisdom and experience, I have mellowed.

"I'm still the same commissioner, I just have mellower strategies," she added.

One issue that faces Williams is criticism from residents in her district regarding ethnic issues.

"Sometimes people question the decisions I make because they don't think about the fact that you have to negotiate," she said. "It's give and take. You have to know when to hold 'em and when to fold 'em

"I feel like I've accomplished a lot," she added. "But, sometimes I have to go with the majority -if I can't get a majority — because while I'm elected by the district, I

make decisions that represent the entire city. A lot of people think that I represent a black community, but it goes far beyond that. I must make decisions that have city-wide effects."

As vice mayor, Williams will be responsible for organizing agendas and facilitating meetings in the absence of the mayor.

She is a stickler for details when it comes to how meetings run," said Lessard. "She has an understanding that will serve her well as a commissioner and a vice mayor."

Álthough there has been speculation as to whether Williams will run for mayor in 2004, she says she doesn't believe so, but anything is possible.

'Right now I don't have aspirations to do that," said Williams, a retired educator who worked more than 18 years at Seminole Community College in Sanford. "I love what I'm doing, the people of Sanford and the city of Sanford."



Bono turned in one of the finest freshman pitching performances in school history. In 23 appearances, Bono was 4-2 with a 0.83 ERA in 32.2 innings of work. He struck out 43 batters and walked just 10 while opponents hit .179 against him. The UCF closer also saved two games for the Golden Knights.

Lambert finished the season as perhaps the hottest hitter in the Atlantic Sun Conference, Injust 33 games including 21 starts, the Indiana native hit .403 with two home runs and 20 RBI. In A-Sun games, Lambert hit a blistering .500 (18-for-36) with two homers, 14 RBI and a .833 slugging percentage.

Snyder, a second-time first team all-conference selection, is batting .394 with nine home runs and 46 RBI so far this season. He ranks among the conference leaders in 11 offensive categories, including first in onbase percentage (.500), doubles (22), total bases (133) and walks (41). He also ranks second in batting average, slugging per-centage (.672), runs scored (58), and hits (78). Snyder has reached base safely via a hit or walk in 53 of 56 games this year, including a recent stretch of 37 games in a row.

Church, a four-year letterwinner but a first-time all-conference selection, is having his finest season with the Hatters. To date he is batting .362 with eight home runs and 33 RBI while starting 51 games in the outfield. On April 26, Church fied a school record and broke a Melching Field record by hitting three home runs in a game as Stetson defeated Samford 20-7. He was later named the league's Player of the Week.

Lincoln, meanwhile, was named second team all-conference for the second consecutive year. A workhorse out of the Stetson bullpen, Lincoln has made 32 appearances this year; he is 5-7 with a 4.61 ERA and seven saves. The Hatter southpaw currently ranks second among the league leaders in saves and seventh in strikeouts (67). In his last 13 appearances: he is 340 with a 3.10 ERA and five saves.

McCuen, a junior transfer, earned a second team all-conference selection in his first season. with the Hatters. A right-handed pitcher, McCuen is 8-3 with a 3.71 ERA entering the conference tournament. He has started a team-high 13 games and completed three, all three coming against conference opponents.

Hall, Stetson's lone all-freshmen team selection, has played in 41 games this season, making 23 starts at second base. He is: batting .341 with one home runand nine RBI. His lone home run came in the final inning against #11 Florida Atlantic, helping Stetson complete a 6-5 come-from-behind victory.

But he was not the only one to get hit hard by Grayson County, as the Texans scored seven runs on eight more hits in two innings against Trent Stokes.


Brent Morse was the lone Raider to come through relatively unscathed, allowing one run on two hits in his one inning of work.
