Reds Complete Envelopment Of City Of Shanghai

Occupation Is Completed Three Days After Fight Opened

SHANGHAI, May 27 (AP)—The Red blanket of Communism quietly enveloped all of Shanghai today.

The gunfire ceased. The last Nationalist holdouts surrendered. Veteran troops peacefully carried red flags into the northern part of the world's fourth largest city.

The Communist occupation was complete three days after it began. Red political officers began taking over the government of the greatest Asian commercial center and its 6,000,000 people.

The Nationalist garrison of Woosung fortress folded up. The government evacuation fleet pulled out down the Yangtze and into East China Sea.

The ships left behind the Nationalist troops who had failed to make the ultimate northward march down the Whangpoo River escape corridor from Shanghai to Woosung. How many only the Reds would know after they had rounded them up.

The sharp—but minor—fighting for Shanghai really was over last night. But not until today did the handful of Nationalist stragglers who made the final stand in the heart of the city make up their minds to quit.

(Continued From Page One) dispute, it was not immediately apparent. The Americans stopped all Berlin-bound trains at the Soviet zone border in Heilmstedt. The Americans and British stopped all passenger runs. The 110-mile air-track stretch from Heilmstedt through the Soviet occupation zone to Berlin is a solid line of stalled trains.

The Reichsbahn—the Soviet-controlled elevated rail management— notified the Allies of the West it was sending in repair crews implying it wanted protection for such crews.

This raised fear of a revival of the riotous battles which raged between strikers and Communist strikebreakers early in the week, taking two lives. Strikers looted and stoned clubs, hurl rocks and swung fists in one case a pistol fire from the east sector German police. Now the strikers are pulling areas where the tracks are ripped up, the switches are locked and the signals disconnected.

An American official said this was a matter for the West German police now. The west sector police have taken over, on the orders of the Allied commandants, after sending away the Russian-controlled east German police who had guarded the stations and installations. (Continued From Page One) The House also passed 62-61 an amendment to the Governor's new version of the so-called Fair Trade Act recently declared unconstitutional by the State Supreme Court.

Wilson's remarks came as the Senate began an item-by-item review of the bill. The bill would require \$32,000,000 a year in new taxes.

My New York

NEW YORK—There is an intangible something about a tennis town that makes it like no other town in creation. Maybe it is the smell of grass, maybe it is the sunburned young girls wandering around the streets; whatever it is, if you have been in one once, you never miss knowing when you are in one again.

It is like that in Chestnut Hill, Mass., and Haverford, Pa.; it is like that over in Montclair, N. J., and up in Newport, R. I.

They are on the fringes of the big cities, many of them, and yet they are quiet little tree-shaded towns whose very core of existence is enveloped in the strange and wonderful sport that has so many strange and awful participants.

A Cultural Voice The tennis town in and around New York is in the night Forest Hills, a section that yet is not a town, since it is a part of the borough of Queens, last outpost of civilization on Long Island. Indeed, Forest Hills is the tennis town of America, the Wimbledon of this fair land.

Late every August, all roads for tennis players lead to this combination upper and middle-class suburb, for it is here that the national championships are played, on the—by then—slightly worn grass courts of the West Side Tennis club.

For a week or 10 days, the streets are full of autos with multi-colored license plates, and there are more lean and tan young whippersnappers in the streets than in any other community outside of Los Angeles.

There is another side in Forest Hills, however: a side of three rooms and kitchenette for \$87.50 a month, every Saturday and bridge every Wednesday night. New York is a slick and urban city, but it has a vast sprawling suburban area within its very boundaries, and Forest Hills is the ne plus ultra of this suburb.

Perhaps because of the pseudo-social aspects of its tennis connections, or perhaps just because it is closer to Manhattan than the other suburbs—whatever it is, Forest Hills is generally the goal of the middle-class commuter with a reasonably good job and three children.

There are times when one might walk along its tree-dotted, leaf-carpeted streets at night, breathing in the fresh air and easing the blood pressure that has boiled in the city by day, when one thinks that the middle-class commuter may have a point there.

AS AN EARNEST BUT NOT OVER-SKILLFUL practitioner of the dark art, I have been making tennis pilgrimages to Forest Hills for 15 years or so. I have stumbled feebly around on the grass courts, waving at passing forehands and wondering if Tilden looked this bad on these same courts, and I have baked under the sun in the horseshoe stadium and seen all the greats in those 15 years.

There was debonair Fred Perry, swooping into the net behind his running forehand, and the painfully polite German baron, Gottfried von Cramm, tossing courtesy points so cleverly that hardly a soul was aware.

There was the Junoesque Alice Marble, getting a grip on her shaky game in an autumn drizzle and routing the stolid and unimaginative Helen Jacobs, and there was greatest pound-for-pound player of them all, Robert Larrimore Riggas, with his duck feet seemingly not coordinating but his mind operating like a steel trap.

There were great matches—Budge fighting down to a fifth set with von Cramm; Frank Shields, rusty and out of shape, recapturing for a moment the glory that was Rome and blowing Jack Brumwich off the court for nine games in a row before slowly collapsing. There are memories on the center court at Forest Hills, mine and good memories.

When I think of Forest Hills, however, I think of an evening spent with Joe the radio man. It was during a breakfast dinner in the West Side's Japanese gardens, just on the eve of a national championship in the late thirties.

Having drunk my fill of cold beer and stuffed as much sirlin into me as possible, I wandered reverently out onto the center court, quiet and dark in the moonlight, when I heard a voice say, "Hey—how about bringing me up a Scotch and soda?"

I looked up and there in the radio booth where Ted Husung ordinarily broadcast the important matches was an amiable young man and a lot of radio equipment.

I BROUGHT HIM HIS SCOTCH, and spent the next couple of hours listening to him tell about his job, which consisted of tuning in foreign short-wave broadcasts for a big American radio chain. His man-from-Mars equipment gave out with French, Spanish, Greek and everything else.

Finally, I remember, the language became German and the tone louder. I looked at Joe. "That's him?" I asked. He nodded. "That's him," he said.

We sat there for a while and listened to the harsh, guttural sounds in the soft, chicky night in Forest Hills. After a while I had to go, and I left Joe sitting forlornly up in the booth.

I went home in the subway that night and I remember sitting on the straw seats and shivering, although it was summer, as I remembered the hysterical voice on Joe's wireless.

After that, the voice spoke louder and more often and cutesy-bunneled and crumbled, until the years of the locust were over.
