

Russo-German Trade Treaty Is Seen As Potent War Factor

New British-Turkish Trade Pact To Go Into Effect Feb. 19 For One Year

Dominion Troops Arrive In Suez

Russian Offensive Against Mannerheim Line Weakens

A new Russian-German trade treaty was projected into the European scene today as possibly a potent factor in the continent's two wars.

Britain also announced a new British-Turkish trade treaty would go into effect Feb. 19 to remain in force for one year and successive annual periods unless abrogated.

Actual conflicts were highlighted by arrival of Australian and New Zealand troops at Suez, to augment Allied forces in the near East, and a Russian announcement that Finnish fortifications had been captured. An Associated Press correspondent who reported into the Mannerheim line reported there was no break as yet.

Authorities in Berlin sources told of the Nazi-Communist trade pact envisaging economic cooperation provided for in their first trade agreement last August.

The new treaty was described as synchronizing the needs of the two nations, each at war against a common foe.

In the Finnish-Russian conflict the Red army declared the Finns had been captured on the Karelian Isthmus and that "16 defensive fortifications," eight of them concrete and iron, were captured in the continuing campaign against the Mannerheim line. Apparently these were in addition to the 13 Mannerheim forts the Russians said they captured Thursday.

Dispatches from the Finnish side said there was no crack that was apparent in the defense line, which thus far has held off Russian attacks since Nov. 30, and that the 11-day Soviet offensive would end soon.

Use of steel shields and flame-throwers by the Red troops also was reported.

Cassandra Schultz Celebrates Her 75th Birthday

Happy birthday to Mrs. Cassandra Schultz who celebrated her 75th birthday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. F. Hamblender, yesterday.

Mrs. Schultz has been clerk in the office of the County Judge since November 1918, a record for years of continuous service for the county that is almost unexampled.

Indications Are Republicans To Hold Meet July 4

Chicago Or Philadelphia To Be Chosen For GOP Convention

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Strong sentiment developed among rank and file Republicans today to hold their nominating convention on July 4 and rededicate the party to a new spirit of independence.

Leaders said that choice of the convention city lies between Chicago, winner of the Democratic meeting, and Philadelphia, the runner-up. A \$200,000 bid from Houston, Tex., is not regarded seriously. Time and place of the convention will be selected when the national committee meets here on Friday.

Party chieftains have abandoned hopes of delaying their convention until the Democrats have selected a candidate and a platform. These plans were dismantled by action of the Democratic national committee, which took up the matter last Friday to set the date. He said he would do so immediately after Republicans act.

This bit of Democratic strategy was reported to have elicited agitation from some Republicans that the convention be held in early autumn instead of mid-summer so that public interest may be better maintained in the presidential campaign. The general feeling now is that since the Democrats are not expected to win, it is better to hold the convention in the fall, and we should do it without delay.

"We've got a job to do, and we should do it without delay," said House Minority Leader Martin, of Massachusetts. "Our candidate must have time to make a sound campaign."

Martin, who was eastern campaign manager for Alf Landon, in 1924, often has been mentioned as a potential vice presidential candidate if the GOP selects a mid-westerner to head its ticket in November. He does not want second place, preferring the House membership which would be awarded to him if Roosevelt were central of the chamber.

Martin was one of few Republican leaders left in the capital. The others were scattered about the nation making election year speeches or preparing their presidential candidates' speeches.

Yankee troops in St. Paul last night, containing the campaign, were making their way to the front. A Republican, however, was not seen.

Bagwell Urges Attendance At Canal Hearing

Seminole Proponents Asked To Appear In Behalf Of Project

"There is little more important to the residents of Sanford and Seminole County than the approval and construction of the proposed St. Johns-Indian River Canal," Ralph Bagwell, secretary of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, said today in urging as many local residents as possible to attend the second hearing on the project in Melbourne tomorrow morning at 10:00 o'clock.

The second hearing on the proposal to connect the inland waterway with the intracoastal canal has been called to permit the opposition to cite their arguments against the project, it was pointed out.

"At the hearing tomorrow this project will be on trial. It will be attacked from all sides, so it is up to us who realize the importance of this project to Sanford, Central Florida and the whole St. Johns River Valley to be present to urge to the district engineers that this project is one of merit." The Chamber secretary added.

"Those who are interested, should show their interest in this project by attending the hearing," Mr. Bagwell, who is also secretary of the St. Johns River Valley Association, said.

Several from this county have already indicated they will attend the hearing, including City and County officials. Mr. Bagwell said, urging that more persons plan to attend.

Engineer Fred T. Williams has prepared a brief to be presented at the hearing and several others in this county have written letters to the engineers citing the advantages of the proposal.

Gilbert A. Youngberg, consulting engineer of Jacksonville, will be the spokesman for the proponents of the project.

Operations Fail To Save Life Of Dominion Head

Governor-General Of Canada Since 1935 Dies One Week After Suffering Fall

MONTREAL, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Lord Tweedsmuir, 64, governor general of Canada since 1935 and a noted author who had held several important posts in the British empire, died here last night, less than a week after suffering a concussion at his official residence in Ottawa.

His death came at 7:15 o'clock, a short while after he was operated on for the third time.

Lord Tweedsmuir was the first representative of the king to die in office since formation of the Canadian confederacy.

After his fall last Tuesday at the governor's quarters in Ottawa, his condition grew steadily worse. He was operated on twice Friday and was rushed here by special train Friday afternoon.

Lord Tweedsmuir, whose last public appearance was at the brief session of the Canadian parliament last month, had been in ill health for some time and it was known he did not plan to complete his term as governor general.

In the speech from the throne at the Parliament session, he made the surprise announcement that Prime Minister Mackenzie King had decided upon a general election and the immediate end of that parliamentary session.

Lord Tweedsmuir and his son were at the dinner when he died. Lord Tweedsmuir was born John Buchan, son of a minister in the Scottish borderland county.

He studied at Glasgow university and then went on to Oxford and later was admitted to the English bar.

He was a member of a London publishing firm for years, when he wrote biographies, novels and histories.

In the World War, he was made director of information under the prime minister.

While governor general, Lord Tweedsmuir, backed by President Roosevelt during the President's visit to Quebec in 1938 and last summer he entertained King George VI and Queen Elizabeth on their trip to Quebec.

Lord Tweedsmuir was married in 1907 to Susan Charlton, daughter of the late Hon. Norman Greenway, a noted writer of charm. They had three sons and a daughter.

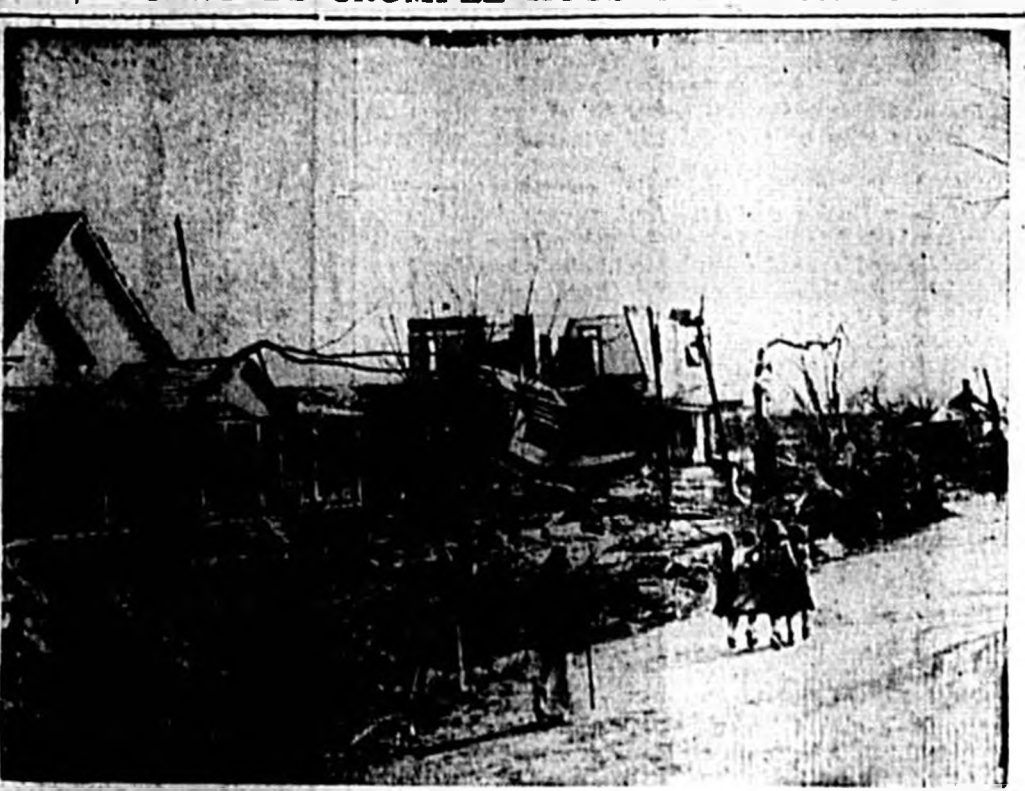

Charles Powers Of Orlando Is Rotary Speaker

Merchant Says State Must Make Effort To Get Industries

Charles P. Powers, Orlando merchant, was the principal speaker at the luncheon of the Rotary Club at the Valdes Hotel today. He was introduced by Clyde Parker, program chairman.

A graduate of the University of Florida, Mr. Powers, formerly connected with the Standard Chemical Co., now owner and operator of his own plant both in Orlando and Deltona, Fla.

Speaking on his subject "Revolution of Industry," Mr. Powers pointed out that when he first came to Orlando it was a city of 27,000, but now boasts a year-around population of over 60,000. As a result of this rapid growth, Orlando like other Florida cities, is confronted with the problem of providing jobs for its young people.

Declaring that "the brains are the devil's workshop," he said it was up to the "grayhairs" to find something for the younger generation to do. "Boys and girls have a right to look forward to a sturdy moral opportunity which life has to offer," he said.

"What Florida needs, he said, is year-around payroll. The tourist business, he added, takes care of the people very well a few months out of the year, but during the summer 'we become cannibals almost devouring each other. By November it is a wonder we still speak to each other'."

In developing new industries, he went on, it is important for us to think of the products we already have and their by-products. Citing the citrus industry, he suggested that lemons, lemons and grapefruit are high in citric acid, an ingredient important to the drug business. He suggested that the state should go in for the manufacture of citric acid, as well as for the use of fruit pulp for cattle feed.

He said that Florida has a big cattle industry, but there is only one tannery in the state and that is at Tallahassee. So far as he knows, he added, there are no leather manufacturing plants, no glue, soap or glycerine factories, all important by-products of the cattle industry.

Mentioning cotton, he said that 180 years ago the planters got a pound for their cotton, and they are still getting a pound for it, while the manufacture of cotton fabrics in the North has been making millionaires. We have been educating boys in the South who grow up and go North where they can make a living.

"We should provide industries for the South for them," he declared, "so they can make a living here."

Albany Begins Cleanup After Severe Storm

Promises Of Aid Encourage Residents Of Stricken Area

Albany, Ga., Feb. 12.—(AP)—Tornado-damaged Albany started its cleanup yesterday, revived its spirit and set about its rebuilding. Devastated property valued at from \$5,000,000 to \$9,000,000.

Red Cross Field Director James W. Gillies announced the revised death list for the last night resulted from duplication of reports. More than 200 persons were treated for injuries, he said.

Meanwhile national guardsmen with bayonets looked on as more than 500 workers started systematic checking of damaged buildings in the downtown area and undertook the task of removing tons of twisted steel and crumbling masonry. Sixty trucks were assigned to the cleanup job after factories parked down following walls.

The citizens were encouraged, however, by a telegram from President Roosevelt sent to trustees of the national emergency council.

"Please extend every assistance within your power to the stricken community of Albany, and ask Mayor Haley to convey to all sufferers from the tornado my heartfelt sympathy as their friend and neighbor," the telegram read.

William Pelley Charged With Violation Of North Carolina Conditional Pardon

Nabbed After His Testimony

Hearing Mar. 12 Will Determine Whether He Will Face Charge

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—(AP)—William Dudley Pelley, head of the Silver Shirt Legion, was placed under \$2,500 bond today pending a hearing March 12 to determine whether he should be sent back to North Carolina to face a charge of parole violations.

The leader of the Silver Shirts, which the House Committee on un-American Activities has called a Fascistic organization, was brought to police court in a patrol wagon from the precinct station where he spent the weekend behind bars.

He had been taken into custody for North Carolina authorities after completing testimony Saturday before the Dies committee.

Pelley was convicted in 1935 of violating the North Carolina blue sky securities law and was given a conditional release.

Night Driving

Most people probably believe that most accidents probably occur when there is the most traffic on the highways. Strangely enough the exact opposite is the truth.

Statistics show that although most of the automobile traffic is in the daytime, most of the fatalities occur at night. Six out of every ten deaths occur while three out of every four cars are safely garaged for the night.

During the period from 1930 through 1937, deaths due to automobile accidents during the hours of darkness increased 54.3%; while fatalities during daylight actually decreased 5.4%.

These facts, the booklet points out, are a challenge to traffic experts to devise physical safeguards which will eliminate some of this night-time slaughter. They are a challenge to public officials to put into force whatever legal restrictions may be necessary to curb these crashes.

Highway safety, in a last analysis, will never be achieved through the efforts of a few engineers, public officials and lawmakers. Only the combined efforts of 40,000,000 drivers and 100,000,000 pedestrians will accomplish it, the booklet concludes.

Norway To Receive Ten Million From U. S. Loan Group

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12 - A prospective \$10,000,000 credit to be extended Norway by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and the Export-Import Bank will be used to purchase American agricultural and manufactured products of a nonmilitary nature, according to Jesse Jones, Federal Loan Administrator.

In discussing prospective loans to the several Scandinavian countries, Mr. Jones declared that the Export-Import Bank would be "glad" to make loans to any and all of these countries.

The prospective credit to Norway follows a \$10,000,000 loan already extended to Finland by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and the Export-Import Bank. At the same time, it was revealed that Sweden had expressed interest in a possible loan. No part of the \$10,000,000 Finnish credit has yet been used.
