### Prepare for the worst

Make sure to have a planned evacuation route. Have disaster supplies on hand. Teach family members when and how to turn off gas, electricity and water. Teach children how to call 911 for police or fire departments. Have materials on-hand to protect windows.

# Tallent: HR staff deserved raises

SANFORD — Nancy Tallent, former Human Resources Director for Seminole County, said Monday that although she made mistakes maintaining department's budget, the raises she gave to five members of her Human Resources staff were done in conjunction with a long-overdue salary study conducted in 1997.  
Tallent said that the Board of County Commissioners authorized the salary study conducted by Coopers & Lybrand because it was concerned with high staff turnover, which county officials attrib-

uted to salaries that had fallen "woefully behind" the competition.  
"It was the first salary study done for the county in 10 years," said Tallent, who left her county position in May to become Human Resources Director at HTE, Inc. in Lake Mary.  
Tallent said that appropriate pay raises were made for all deserving county employees not just the five in the Human Resources office.

"I acknowledge the mistake that I made maintaining the Human Resources Budget," Tallent said. "While the error of \$4,214 was 1 percent of the total salary budget of \$394,886, it was absolutely unintentional."  
According to the county Finance Department, Human Resources had more than \$4,000 available for discretionary raises and Tallent issued \$10,000 in raises, exceeding the Human

Resources Department's discretionary fund by 220 percent.  
Tallent said that the five HR individuals named in a Herald story on Sunday as receiving "exceptional" raises, are "top-notch professionals. Their work is of the highest caliber. Their salaries still fall short of what they could earn in private companies or even with other local county governments."  
Tallent said the HR raises, in part, reflected the fact white-collar office workers generally fare better than others. She insisted, however, the raises were well-deserved.

# Longwood voters to get say in charter

LONGWOOD — In a special meeting frequently punctuated with rancor and heated discussion about the fundamental role of municipal government and the founding principles of democracy, the Longwood city commission voted 3-1 to place 13 proposed changes to the city's Charter before voters this fall.

One amendment considered redundant was eliminated. Commissioner Steve Miller was absent from the meeting and did not vote while Mayor Paul Lovestrand

Under the proposed amendments, the hiring and firing of the city administrator would change from a simple 3-2 majority of commissioners to a super majority requiring four commissioners to approve the action. A second significant change would allow the city administrator to appoint department heads with-

## Sanford OKs Marina lease

SANFORD — The Sanford City Commission on Monday unanimously approved leasing the Marina Hotel to a Mount Dora manager of hotels, who plans to renovate the property for use as a Best Western Hotel.

James Barggren, who also owns Lakeside Inn of Mount Dora, said he is a lifetime Florida resident and that he intends to be active in the Sanford community.

"I believe in the Sanford area," Barggren said.

"Especially when I drive on (State Road) 417 from the (Orlando International) Airport and it takes 35 minutes. I think it's an opportunity."

However, Barggren told the City Commission he is disappointed with delays in approving the lease, and that he did not intend for information on plans to become affiliated with Best Western to be publicized.

"My enthusiasm has been diminished," Barggren said.

Barggren told City Manager Tony VanDerworp that he plans to renovate the property, located on

# Residents concerned about urban sprawl

SANFORD — A group of homeowners from the Seminole Estates, Seminole Farms, and

Disgusted Over Government (WATCH DOG), they vowed to defend their rural neighborhoods and way of life against urban sprawl.

The group says its immediate and specific concern involves development of the northwest quadrant of the county where County Commissioners have voted to allow a 345-unit housing development at Astor Farms, a parcel of land surrounded by rural



home-sites and environmentally sensitive land connected to the Wekiva River Protection Area. Members of WATCHDOG contend the commission is also giv-

ing the green light to another 390-unit proposed development in a nearby area of Sanford Farms, that conflicts with findings by the Department of Community Affairs (DCA) state agencies, environmental organizations and the overwhelming majority of area residents.

"Frankly, we're concerned," said WATCHDOG member Monte Shoemaker. "The commissioners are conducting decisions that don't seem to make sense to us. They are trying to turn an area of urban estates into a glorified subdivision. And this is not an isolated incident of their willingness to ignore the wishes of tax payers."

Shoemaker and other

From April, 1998 through April, 1999, the average raise for the employees in the Human Resources department was 15 percent. Only one HR employee received less than a 10 percent raise, and three receive 20 per-

# Police investigate jewelry scam

SANFORD — The Sanford Police department has joined other law enforcement agencies in a search for a couple running a jewelry scam at Central Florida Service Merchandise stores.

So far stores in Lakeland, Tampa, and Orlando have been victimized during the past month.

The couple attempted one of their latest scams at a Daytona outlet two weeks ago but were scared off when store personnel became suspicious. They struck again on June 29 at the Service Merchandise store at the Seminole Town Center.

Store officials and police are convinced the pair got away with a diamond ring valued at more than \$5,000.

According to Sanford detective Chris Ziegler, the suspects are described as a black couple in their mid 20s. The female is described as 5-foot-7-inches, weighing about 165-pounds. The male is described as 6-feet, weighing about 180-pounds.

"They enter the store with fake

jewelry with pre-printed price tags," explained Ziegler. "They act as if they are interested in trying on diamond engagement rings and other jewelry, several pieces at a time. They slip the valuable jewelry into their pockets and return the fake jewelry to store employees."

Store personnel don't know of the switch until inventory is

have an obligation to bring stability to Longwood. This does take the political swing out of things. There has been a tremendous amount of politics on this commission dais."

"It's not our job to blindly accept what they (charter review committee) give us," Lovstrand shot back.

Other amendments included that clarifies qualifications for a short-term acting administrator in the absence or departure of Drago, and sets parameters on a 60-day timeline for the appointment of an acting administrator.

If voters approve, Drago would select the acting administrator in his absence for 60 days or less. The position would be filled by a commission selectee if the absence extends beyond 60 days.

Still other amendment proposals would further delineate and clarify the duties of the city administrator in the areas of contract negotiation, and his/her ability to select department heads without political interference. Voters will also have the opportunity to decide how to replace a commissioner in the event of extended absence, illness, death, or resignation. Virtually every measure prompted a dialogue between Lovstrand and Miles.

Commissioners first voted 3-1 to alter some of the language in the proposed charter amendments to clear up ambiguity and redundancy in some of the proposed changes.

Commissioner Annamaria Vacca, who opened the special meeting with a motion to adopt all of the proposed changes for voter consideration, refused to budge when Lovstrand repeatedly called for a reconsideration of her motion, favoring to vote

on the proposed changes individually.

"This is an advisory committee, we need to also consider these changes. There's 14 of them and probably 13 will be rejected because the voters won't read them. We would be neglecting our duty if we didn't weed them out. There can be too much democracy," Lovstrand argued. "We can do a better job than the average Joe on the street."

That comment prompted Miles to accuse Lovstrand of hiding proposed changes from the public.

"That's censorship," shot back Miles. "I won't stand for it, I wash my hands of it, and I won't be part of it."

Miles further argued that the

commission nominated the committee to address inadequacies and conflicts in the charter and that the commission should not block a public vote on proposed changes.

"It's not in my purview to exclude a public vote. If we don't let voters have a chance to decide these issues then we are neglecting our obligation to 7,400 Longwood voters."

"What we are deciding is to allow a public vote, they'll tell us what's acceptable and what is not acceptable."

Lovstrand said for the commission to rubber stamp all proposed amendments was to abandon the charge of the commis-

sioners. He also stated he felt some of the recommendations removed a system of checks and balances between the city administrator and the board.

"This is why at the federal level the senate has to approve cabinet appointments by the president," he argued.

"I'm well aware of how the federal government works," retorted Miles. "I don't need you to give me a lesson on the federal government. One of the federal government's biggest problems is that it's strangled by bureaucracy. We're trying to get on with the job of effectively and efficiently running the city of Longwood."

City clerk Geraldine Zambri must now craft amendment language that explains each separate amendment in 75 words or less.

That task is expected to be completed by the commission's August 16 meeting, the first of two public hearings on the charter amendments prior to November's election when voters will decide the fate of the proposed changes.

In other commission action Monday evening, the board began preliminary work on the 1999-2000 city budget, and changed the start time of next week's regular meeting from 7 p.m. to 6 p.m. because of an anticipated heavy agenda.



expressed concerns that the commission is now adding insult to injury by considering an administrative amendment to the County's Future Land Use Designation Map that would change future land use designation of all the surrounding property in the area from Suburban Estates to Low Density Residential.

Sporting WATCHDOG t-shirts and a few with "Recall McLain" logos (commissioner Daryl McLain) Elise Hulme of nearby Seminole Estates called the planned developments a

"classic example of leap frog urban sprawl."

"In August of 1997 commissioner McLain led the way in denying these developments," said Hulme, who owns five acres and trains Special Olympic children in equestrian events. "In August of 1998 he gives his full support for 335 homes. We're told water and sewer improvements that come with the project will be at no expense to the taxpayers. When we bought our property we were told the land could not be subdivided. But what's to stop them from rezoning

my land.

"I'm concerned about them building housing units right up to the fence on my property. A lot of people are cruel and mean to animals, I'm worried about mine.

Other WATCHDOG members expressed concern about the impact of low-density residential on the Wekiva River System and how rezoning could increase density in the area. They also expressed worries about the lack of information on impact fees for the two proposed developments. "They told us there would be

no expense to tax payers because the developers would have to pay for impact fees," said Hulme. "But the costs (an estimated \$25-27 million) are listed as an expense in the county's capital improvement plan. Our question is, 'Who is footing the bill for water and sewer?'"

Shoemaker, who plans to personally attend the public hearing scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. today, reflected on a comment he says commissioner Randy Morris made a year ago when the first of the two planned developments was announced.

"Morris said we were paying for the development sins of our fathers. Who is going to pay for the sins of this commission."

Homeowner Leslie Puik, who also plans to be in attendance at today's public hearing said: "The DCA states these two planned developments are inconsistent with the state's Comprehensive Land Use Plan. So when the developers can't play by the rules, the Seminole County commissioners rewrite the rule book. They do it at the expense of current homeowners and an environmentally sensitive area."

# Lake Mary plans gateway ceremony

LAKE MARY — The dedication ceremony for the Lake Mary Gateway Plaza on Thursday will cap nearly 18 months of construction on the \$12 million Rinehart Road widening project.

The ceremony is scheduled for Thursday at 10 a.m. The Lake Mary Gateway Plaza is located at the northeast corner of Lake Mary Boulevard and Rinehart Road.

In June, the Lake Mary City Commission approved plans for enhancements to the city's Entrance Feature at the intersection of Rinehart Road and Lake Mary Boulevard for a total cost of \$46,000. The city raised the money through fund raising activities, such as a golf tournament, and private contributions.

Lake Mary Mayor David Meador called the efforts an example of what community and government partnerships can accomplish.

The project includes a secondary tiered brick wall with a six-foot city logo, landscaping, a fountain, irrigation, and an enhanced lighting system.

CPH Engineers is in charge of engineering work for the project.

Lake Mary contracted with Martin K. Eby Construction Co. for the Rinehart Road widening project in January. At a June Commission meeting, \$24,000 worth of changes to the project were approved.

Among the changes were drainage improvements at Strang Driveway to minimize drainage and flooding potential for \$12,000, a revision of landscape plans for \$5,800, and the

Installation of a drainage structure and storm sewer at the Wallace Court retention pond near Porter Point for \$3,000.

In addition to city funds, state, county and federal grants have paid for the \$12 million Rinehart Road widening project. The City has also received private donations.

A trail has been constructed along Rinehart Road from Lake Mary Boulevard to State Road 46A. The trail will cross Interstate-4, and enter the Heathrow Business Center.

David Gierach, vice president of CPH Engineers, said the trail is an integral part of the Seminole County trail system.

Two miles of trails on Rinehart Road are already in use, according to County staff.

Pizzuti Development is working with Seminole County toward constructing a trail along International Parkway from Lake Mary Boulevard to SR 46A. The trail would link with the Rinehart Road trail through the county's trail system.

The county is planning to have 55-miles of trails that connect to Volusia, Lake and Orange counties. There would be 35 miles of paved trails and 20 miles of unpaved trails.

The 20-year plan for the county's trail system has an estimated cost of \$40 million, including the trail heads and overpasses. All the schools and parks in the county will have a connection with the trail system.

Parking for the dedication ceremony will be available for the ceremony in the Trailhead Park directly behind the Plaza and in the shopping centers across Lake Mary Boulevard.

the shores of Lake Monroe, for use as a Best Western Hotel in a letter that was public record.

When the lease came before the City Commission on June 28, approval was postponed so Barggren could form the Marina Hotel Corporation of Sanford for tax purposes to handle the lease. The corporation is wholly owned by Barggren.

Mayor Larry Dale said on June 28 that it seemed unusual for Barggren to handle a lease in his own name, and Barggren said he intended to form the corporation. However, on Monday Barggren said he had not intended to spend the funds necessary to form the corporation while still performing "due diligence" on the deal.

Two weeks ago, Barggren said a brief postponement would not interfere with his time frame for renovating the property. On Monday, Barggren said the two week delay placed him in jeopardy of not agreeing to the lease.

"It has been a very negative

experience," Barggren said.

On July 9, Barggren said he made \$100,000 in non-refundable deposits toward the deal.

City commissioners said they were not aware of Barggren's time frame when the lease approval was postponed June 28.

Barggren also said he is upset the city requested private information on tax returns. He said he invoked his privacy rights to not provide the information, but he has been cooperative with the city's other requests for information and background.

"There were no issues that I didn't address specifically, up front, and with great detail," Barggren said. "I have tried to do everything I can do to work with the city government."

Barggren is the president and shareholder of Lakeside Inn and Highlander Inn of Mount Dora. He also manages the Chamberlin Hotel in Hampton,

Va.

In addition, Barggren owns and manages an office building, an apartment complex, condominiums, restaurants and resorts in Florida and South Carolina.

"Your record is impeccable," commissioner Whitey Eckstein said to Barggren. "We are very impressed with everything you've done."

The 30-year old Marina Hotel has had several lease holders, most recently Venture Thirty-Two, which is relinquishing the lease to Barggren. The Marina Hotel lost its affiliation with the Holiday Inn chain in 1994.

"Having 27 years of experience with the Marina and all its problems, this is a positive move for the city of Sanford," commissioner A.A. "Mac" McClanahan said.

In other action, the City Commission:

- Authorized a contract with

Bishop & Buttrey for Phase III of the Mill Creek retention pond project, subject to negotiations to a section of the Contract relating to default and payment.

- Presented state Rep. Tom Feeney with an plaque for his service during the State of Florida 1998-1999 Legislative Session.

- Approved an agreement with Infrastructure Management Services, Inc., for Professional Engineering Services for a Comprehensive Pavement Program and Concrete Sidewalk Inventory.

- Approved street closures and sale and consumption of beer for the Sanford Heritage Festival, which is scheduled for Nov. 11 through Nov. 15.

- Authorized a \$2,500 transfer from the city manager's Contingency Fund for travel, meals, and lodging for six police chief finalists participating in the selection process on July 22.

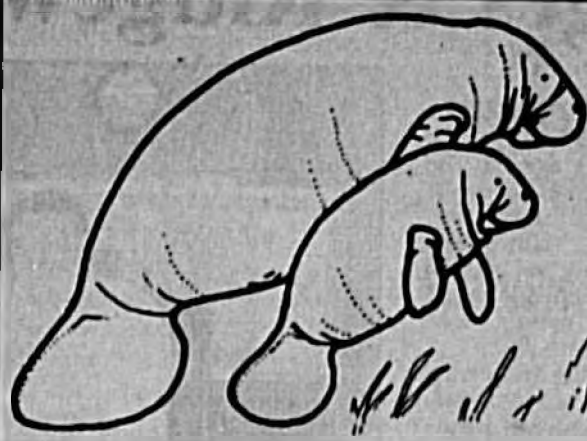

# Sanford lifts city water restrictions

SANFORD — The Sanford City Commission lifted water restrictions Monday, citing an increase in rainfall during June.

The rain in June eliminated the overload of the city's potable and reclaimed water pumping systems, according to the utilities department.

However, Seminole County's water restrictions remain in place. The county still prohibits lawn irrigation from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Even numbered houses can water only on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Odd numbered houses may water only on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Watering is not allowed on Sundays. The county also prohibits non-essential watering, such as car washing or lawn irrigation, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The county's water restrictions apply to Seminole County water customers.

Year-round water restrictions by the St. Johns River Water Management District are also still in place, prohibiting watering from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. The Water Management District has authority over all water users, regardless of the water supply that is used.

The city's water restrictions were similar to the Water Management District's restric-

tions and the county's restrictions.

Water Management officials recommend that lawns only need water every three to four days. A deep watering is more beneficial than daily watering. Deep watering develops a deeper root structure and makes the lawn more tolerant of drought.

Losses from water evaporation can be reduced by watering lawns during the early morning hours when temperatures and wind speeds are low, officials said.

Efficient methods of irrigation include micro and drip systems and soaker hoses. Sprinklers should be pointed toward the lawn and shrubs, not streets or sidewalks.

Anyone who purchases and installs an automatic lawn sprinkler system must, by law, install a rain sensor device or switch that overrides the irrigation cycle of the sprinkler system when adequate rainfall has occurred.

Officials recommend raising lawn mower blades should be raised to at least three inches. A lawn cut higher encourages grass roots to grow deeper, shades the root system and holds soil moisture better than a close-clipped lawn.

Mulch can retain moisture in the soil. Mulching also helps control weeds that compete with plants for water, officials said.

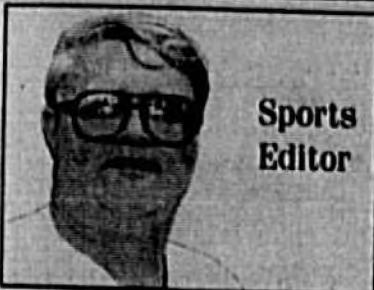

SANFORD - This past week I had the enjoyable job of watching the Sanford American Legion Campbell-Lossing Post 53 baseball team win its first ever Firecracker Tournament after 24 tries.

Most of the tournament was played in the beautiful new Melching Park at Conrad Park.

The playing field is gorgeous, the dugouts are spacious and the scoreboard is large and informative, including a message board; for the fans there is a lot of seating, you have a good view of the whole field no matter where you sit, the concession area is nice, and there are plenty of bathrooms; for the media the press box area is very nice, air-conditioned, good working areas, just an excellent facility.

But there was one very important thing missing.

There is no covered area in the stadium.

In Florida, the seating area needs to be covered.

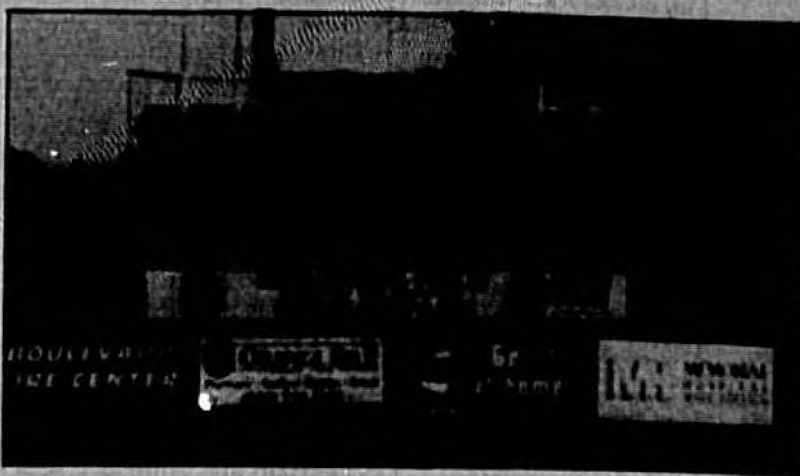

## Summer is a good time for physical exam for sports

HOUSTON - Kids shouldn't wait until the week before school for their sports physical exam.

"That doesn't allow time for a problem to be corrected or rehabilitated if it is detected during the exam," said Dr. Julie Jones of Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

A preparticipation physical exam (PPE) serves three purposes:

- To detect conditions that might predispose the student to injury or illness during competition;

- To detect conditions that might be life-threatening or disabling and might limit an athlete's safe participation;

- To meet legal and insurance requirements of the state or school.

A PPE should include a baseline medical history and a physical exam.

"Both of these should emphasize areas of greatest concern for sports participation, such as head or musculoskeletal injuries, cardiovascular problems and asthma," said Jones, Baylor assistant professor of family and community medicine and medical director of school-

based clinics for the Harris County Hospital District.

To allow time to treat problems identified during the physical, the PPE should be performed at least six weeks before pre-season practice.

"Some kids put off getting their physical exam until the coach tells them they can't play without it," Jones said. "If the procrastination is due to fear that a health problem will keep them off the team, that fear is usually unwarranted."

Research has shown that less than two percent of athletes are denied clearance to play sports because of the PPE, and less than 14 percent require further evaluation.

PPE's also enable the physician to determine the athlete's general health, counsel the athlete on health-related issues and assess the fitness level for specific sports.

"Summer is an ideal time for sport physicals," Jones said. "Besides being able to have problems treated without rushing the healing process, students who get their exam now don't run the risk of not being able to get an appointment when their doctor's office is flooded with calls from those who wait until the last minute."

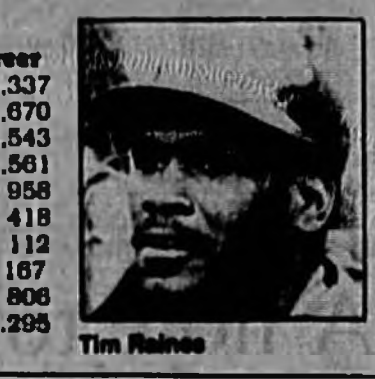

# Chinch Bugs in the lawn

no more than one third of the leaf blade is removed at each mowing. St. Augustinegrass should be mowed from about 5 to 6 inches to a height of 3 to 4 inches.

**Resistant Varieties:** The cultivars Floratam and Floratam have good tolerance to chinch bug feeding. Most chinch bugs cannot complete their development when feeding on these varieties. The cultivar Floratam is only tolerant to low populations of the insect.

**Biological control:** The most important predator of chinch bugs is the black big-eyed bug. Another predator, an earwig, is also frequently associated with natural chinch bug control. The presence of these predators is not easily recognized, and pesticides are usually applied even when the predators are maintaining the chinch bug population low and pesticides are not needed.

**Chemical control:** Chinch bug populations of more than 20 insects per square foot, should be treated with an insecticide to reduce the population to non-damaging levels. Diazinon, Dursban or Orthene are the insecticide suggested for their control.

When a spray is used, it is important to apply the insecticide in a large amount of water. The jar attachment to a garden hose is the suggested application device for homeowners. The recommended equipment should use 15 to 20 gallons of water passing through the hose to empty the quart-sized jar. The procedure is as follows: Put the amount of insecticides in the jar as directed on the label for 1,000 square feet, and fill the rest of the way with water.

Spray the contents over 1,000 square feet of lawn. Spray evenly with a back and forth motion until the treated area is completely covered. The treated grass should be irrigated lightly to flush the insecticide into the thatch layer where the chinch bugs are feeding.

Chinch bugs develop resistance to insecticides if only one type of product is used continuously. If the recommended insecticides do not control the problem, use a synthetic pyrethrin such as Tempo. Granular formulations of the recommended insecticides can also be used. Granules should be applied with a drop-type spreader rather than the cyclone type for a better distribution of the granules.

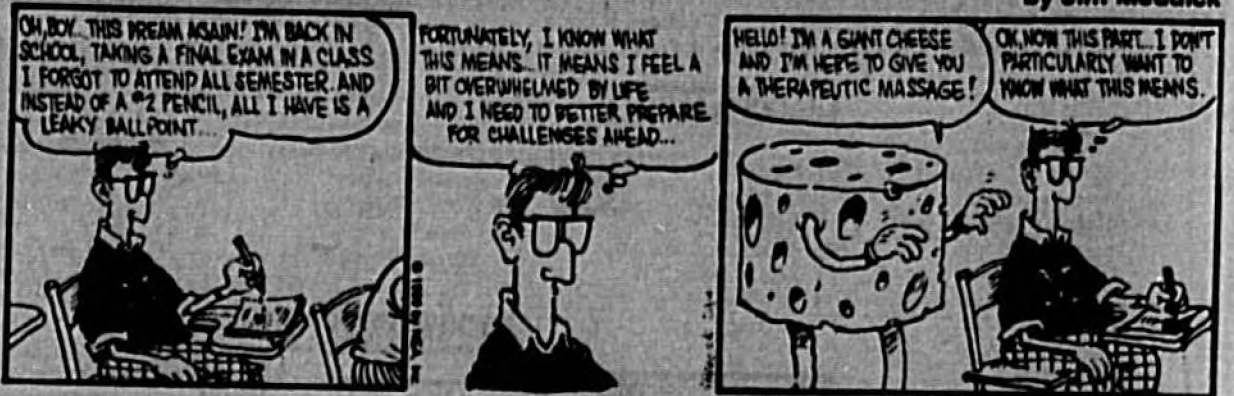

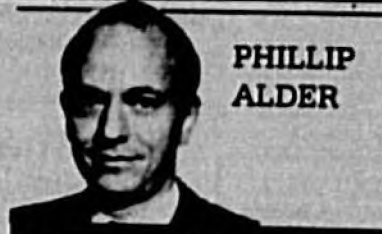

## ASK DR. GOTT

### Curiosity can kill the kid

DEAR DR. GOTT: Last month, I rushed my 5-year-old son to the Emergency Room to have his stomach pumped. He consumed a whole bottle of my thyroid pills that I stored in a top kitchen cabinet. The little devil climbed right up — I wouldn't have believed that he could do it. Fortunately, the child is fine now, but I wanted you to warn your readers of this kind of danger.

DEAR READER: Poisonings and accidents are the No. 1 killers of children. Any family with preschoolers must take meticulous care to protect their youngsters. Although medicine cabinets are a prime source of trouble — and should be locked — other areas in the house are dangerous, too. Cleaning agents, solvents — in fact, any hydrocarbon compounds — can be lethal. Chemicals of any sort, particularly lye and chlorine, can have tragic results when swallowed.

Go through your house like a child — on your hands and knees, if you must — to identify sources of poison. Use childproof latches on all cabinets. Store tightly sealed cleaning materials well out of reach, never at ground level. Use childproof caps on all medi-

cine, aspirin and vitamins (especially the chewable flavored types). Keep particularly poisonous compounds in a locked box. Don't leave available anything that could be harmful if swallowed by a toddler. Above all, never put chemicals or drugs into empty soda bottles.

Although your "question" is not a question at all, I endorse the plea that you expressed.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I was diagnosed with Paget's disease. My doctor put me on Fosamax for 6 months and my blood test showed things were OK. Since the Fosamax treatment, my ankle and the bottom of my foot hurt. I feel as if I am walking on stones. Is this because of the medicine, or do I have another problem?

DEAR READER: I do not believe that the Fosamax is causing your problem, nor do I blame the Paget's

disease — unless you have an exceedingly rare variant that is affecting the bones of your feet. As you know, Paget's disease, a disorder of unknown cause, leads to spotty degeneration of bone, ordinarily affecting the skull, ribs, pelvis and legs. The involved bone may or may not be painful. The risk is that such diseased bones are more susceptible to fractures. In most cases of Paget's disease, drugs such as Fosamax help stabilize the affected bones — or even reverse the disease itself. A patient's progress and response to therapy can be monitored by a blood test called the alkaline phosphatase.

Bring your symptoms to your doctor's attention. Perhaps something as universal as osteoarthritis may be causing your foot pain and could be easily treated.
