Exercise Can Help - Or Be Dangerous

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am a 67-year-old female. My doctor says I have curvature of the spine and considerable lateralization of the bones. I also have chronic asthma. I cannot walk outside in the cold weather.

I get no exercise. I have noticed I am getting a very large stomach lately. Is there any exercise you would suggest? Do you think an exercise bicycle is good for me?

I am sending you The Health Letter number 6-10 on osteoporosis and dislodging bones. Other readers who want this issue can send 75 cents in check or coin with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope. Send your request to me, in care of this newspaper, P.O. Box 1551, Radio City Station, New York, NY 10101.

I discussed in The Health Letter I'm sending you, certain kinds of exercise can cause weakened bones to fracture. That's why doctors suggest that women who have osteoporosis be careful about lifting heavy objects.

On the positive side, property done exercises can help to strengthen your muscles and provide back support. For that reason, I think you should have some individual help on what kinds of exercises are good for you with your particular medical problem.

If you are in a location where you can get some good advice from a physical medicine or physiotherapy department, it may be able to help you learn some exercises that can be useful without inducing any problems for you.

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'Early Out' Kindergarten Money Eliminated

School Board OKs \$75.8 Million Budget

The \$75.8 million school budget for 1979-80 squeaked past the Seminole County School Board on Monday by a vote of 3 to 2. School board members William Kroll and Roland Williams cast the dissenting votes.

On a home assessed for tax purposes at \$30,000 property taxes taxpayers for the past three weeks, the school board refused to reinstate the estimated \$90,000 to provide bus transportation for "early out" kindergarteners.

But the school board did let stand the allocated \$8,100 to the Performing Arts Company to provide demonstrations and ballet performances at 27 schools for some 19,000 elementary school children during the 1979-80 school year.

Parents and teachers alike earlier had testified that youngsters would grow irritable from the longer classroom day and their short attention spans would not allow them to take advantage of the additional 90 minutes of instruction and would be "unproductive."

Gene Grooms, executive director of the Seminole Education Association (SEA), told the school board he was disappointed with the school board member's approval of the longer school day.

This voluntary withdrawal practice is to be reviewed by board members at the end of the first eight weeks of school, the board agreed.

For the past several years, the school district has instituted a practice whereby kindergarteners leave school at 1:25 p.m., about 90 minutes before the older children, who leave the school grounds at 2:45 p.m.

In his recommended budget, Superintendent William Layer purposely eliminated the transportation funds to save the school district an estimated \$90,000 "for gas, oil and salaries."

City sidewalks along the north side of the Sanford city hall are to be removed by the city, said Sanford City Manager Warren Knowles today.

On sidewalks with "high pedestrian" use, the commission authorized repairs with a "concrete epoxy" mix or with asphalt, which Knowles described as a "flexible" mixture which will give rather than crack.

Knowles said the asphalt is black "and not pretty," but it is more practical. The new city policy is a result of a lawsuit filed against the city by Mrs. Bonnie Tucker, who claimed she fell and received injuries on a city sidewalk due to negligence in maintenance by the city.

After the sidewalk at the north side of city hall is removed, a walkway at the city's Ninth Street Park also will be removed.

Commissioners Monday night ordered that owners of property adjacent to portions of Cypress Avenue, Elm Avenue, Laurel and the southeast corner of Sixth and Laurel be notified that the city will remove the sidewalks there within 10 days.

During that period the commissioners decided the property owners may opt to pay cost of materials, with the city supplying labor and equipment to replace the sidewalks, if they wish.

Knowles, in showing the sidewalks, said the walkways really were not sidewalks "but rubble heaps." When the sidewalks are taken up, the area will be restored to a safe condition by adding fill dirt.

Sanford city commissioners Monday night passed on first reading an ordinance setting its budget for the 1979-1980 fiscal year at \$7.8 million, with a property tax rate of \$7.08 per \$1,000 assessed value.

On a house assessed for tax purposes at \$30,000, property taxes under the new rate would drop from \$207 to \$212.40, an increase of \$5.40.

Final passage is set for Sept. 10 after a third public hearing. The fiscal year begins Oct. 1.

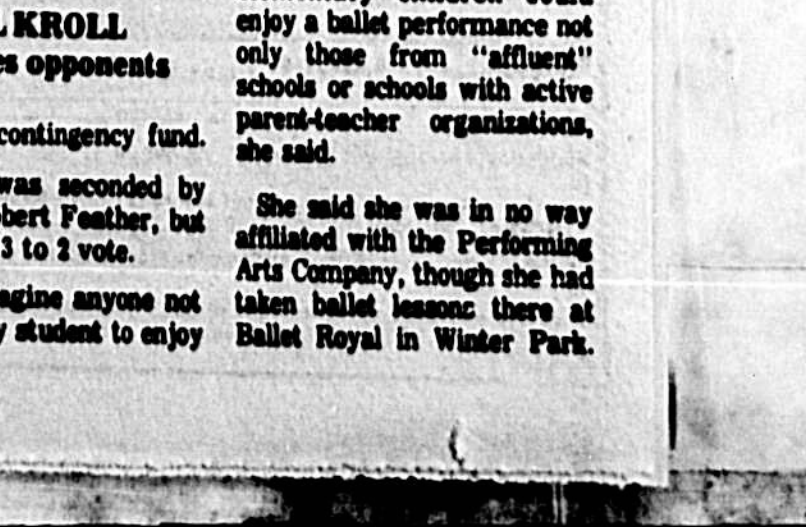

Borg Off In Pursuit Of Elusive U.S. Open

NEW YORK (UPI) — Bjorn Borg, winner of the last four Wimbledon championships, is generally acknowledged to be the best tennis player in the world today. His baseline play is impeccable, his first serve nearly uncatchable, and his topspin volleys are as confusing as knuckledrives thrown by Phil Niekro.

If I play the way I have been, I think I will do well. But the other players may give Borg something to worry about. Besides Jimmy Connors, with a load of his mind now on the U.S. Open, he is moving into the top echelon of tennis players.

After those top three seeds, there are the hard-hitting Vitas Gerulaitis, No. 4; No. 5 Roscoe Tanner, who saved his nearly unreturnable serve to reach the finals at Wimbledon this year; powerful Guillermo Vilas of Argentina, No. 6; surprising Victor Pecci of Paraguay, No. 8; and American Harold Solomon, No. 7, and Eddie Dibba, No. 9.

In the women's singles, Chris Evert Lloyd will be looking to defend her Open title and is seeded. Pam Shriver, who lost to Evert in the final last year, is also seeded. The Detroit Lions placed one player on the injured reserve list and cut seven others, including disappointing veteran wide receiver J.D. Hill.

Steve Kiser, a Houston Oilers linebacker who had Coach Bum Phillips' nod, helped make the team a winner, and was waived along with three other players.

The Philadelphia Eagles waived fullback Earl Carr but did not announce that other two cuts because the players had not been notified, a spokesman said.

The Oakland Raiders waived back Bruce Taylor, a one-time All-Pro, also with three other players.

The Washington Redskins cut return specialist Tony Greene, who made the Pro Bowl as a rookie, and three other players.

The San Francisco 49ers cut third string quarterback Jerry Gatzert leaving quarterback Steve DeLong and rookie Steve Mosher with good depth throughout the team.

MIAMI

MIAMI (UPI) — Garo Yepremian, the diminutive Cyprus necktie maker who came out of obscurity in 1970 to become one of the National Football League's most remembered placekickers, is looking for another job today.

Yepremian was one of five players trimmed from the Miami Dolphins squad Monday. The 28-year-old Yepremian was waived along with three rookies and Larry Harris, last year's No. 1 Dolphins fullback, who was traded to the Philadelphia Eagles for an undrafted draft choice.

"I was shocked when I came out this morning and found out I was a former Miami Dolphin kicker. That sounds funny," former Miami Dolphin Yepremian said. "I'm always be a Dolphin and I'll even be pulling for them even if I'm kicking for somebody else."

In 11 years — eight with Miami — Yepremian has a career field goal accuracy mark of 84.7 percent, ranking second on the all-time list behind Cleveland's Don Och-skoft at 87 percent. He has a total of 869 points in the all-time list.

The 4-foot-4, soccer-style kicker will be remembered longest for NFL fans for his 57-yard field goal that won pro football for the Dolphins in the Miami-Dade County Stadium. The kick, made in 1977, and only once in his career, was made in the 1977 season. It was the only kick that won for the Dolphins in the stadium.

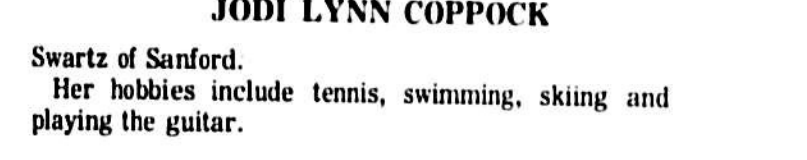

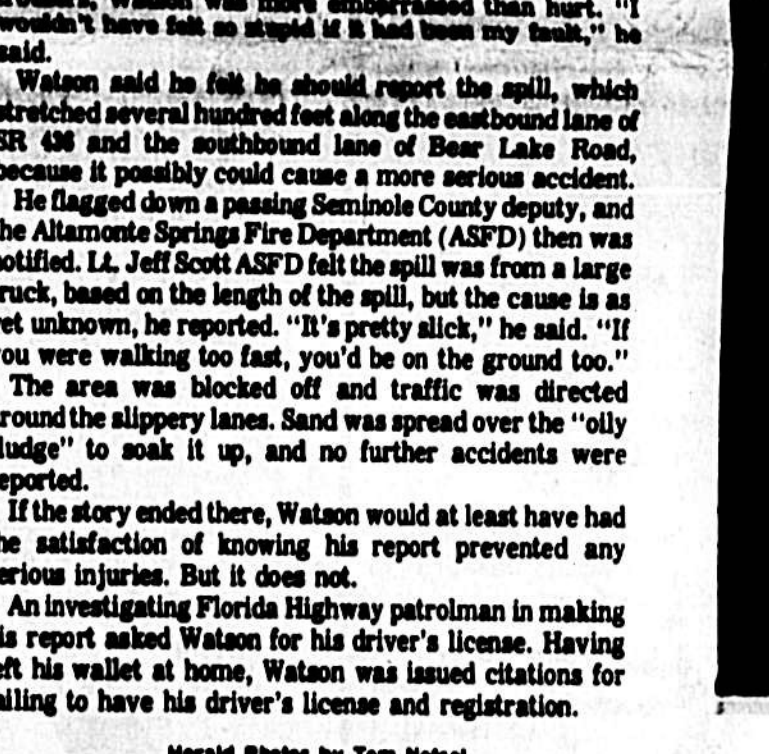
