47 Senators Line Up For Excise Tax Repeal

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. George Smathers (D-Fla.) reported today that 47 of the 80 senators who favor a majority stand up for repeal of federal excise taxes based on transportation.

He conceded, however, that President Eisenhower's stand against tax reduction might have caused some supporters of repeal to change their minds.

In a speech prepared for the Senate, Smathers described the 3 per cent excise on freight and 10 per cent levy on personal travel as "an unfair, unrealistic, unprofitable burden on a wartime economy." He said the taxes were levied to a retail use of transportation during the war.

Smathers said the freight tax penalizes particularly producers in the South and West by adding to their freight costs for long hauls. He said the tax also encourages uneconomic transfers of plants and warehouses to points closer to markets.

The treasury collected 400 million dollars from the freight tax last year, but the actual gain was only about 225 million, he said, because corporations as a result paid lower income taxes.

Smathers is chief sponsor of a proposal to repeal transportation taxes. He said he had invited all senators to join in co-sponsoring it and that 46 had agreed.

He added, however, that some of the replies had been received before the President's announced stand last week against any tax reduction this year.

The House Democratic leadership and Ways and Means Committee have gone along with the administration. The House may act this week on a bill to extend existing corporate income and excise tax rates.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Former Postmaster General James A. Farley has thrown his hat in the ring for the Democratic nomination for U.S. senator.

Farley, who was 70 years old Friday, said he would "consider it an honor and a great privilege to represent my state in the United States Senate . . . If I'm honored by the Democratic Party at its convention in Buffalo as its nominee, I am prepared to wage a vigorous and what I consider would be a successful campaign."

Farley made the statement to newsmen at a birthday lunch in the Manhattan Club.

His announcement came just one day after another long-time political pro, Republican Leonard Hall, announced his candidacy for his party's nomination for the governorship.

Florida Cited For Reducing Highway Deaths

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The National Safety Council has cited Florida for reducing highway deaths during the past year, the first such award the state has received.

Ironically, as the award was being announced, the state was counting up its worst Memorial Day holiday fatality toll in recent history. In all, 23 persons died violent deaths in Florida over the long weekend, 18 of them on highways.

The national award went to Florida for keeping the 1957 toll 149 under the previous year. The Council praised Florida for its aggressive highway safety program. For the third straight year, the state Department of Public Safety's record-keeping also received recognition.

The 23 holiday deaths included 11 drownings, and electrocution, one suffocation and two fire victims. One previously unaccounted-for drowning victim, Victor B. Schuetz, 64, Tampa, suffered a heart attack while swimming in Tampa Bay Sunday.

The 18 traffic victims for the holiday period compared to 13 deaths in a comparable 78-hour period a year ago when one work day intervened between the holiday and the weekend, and 15 during the 78-hour holiday period in 1955.

In addition to the state Patrol award nine Florida cities received individual awards for traffic

ATLANTA (UPI) — Southern Airways says a Civil Aeronautics Board examiner has recommended it to give three route changes to serve national defense needs.

The routes were recommended by Examiner Paul Pfeiffer in response to a Defense Department request for "expedited action" to meet commercial air needs in southern defense areas.

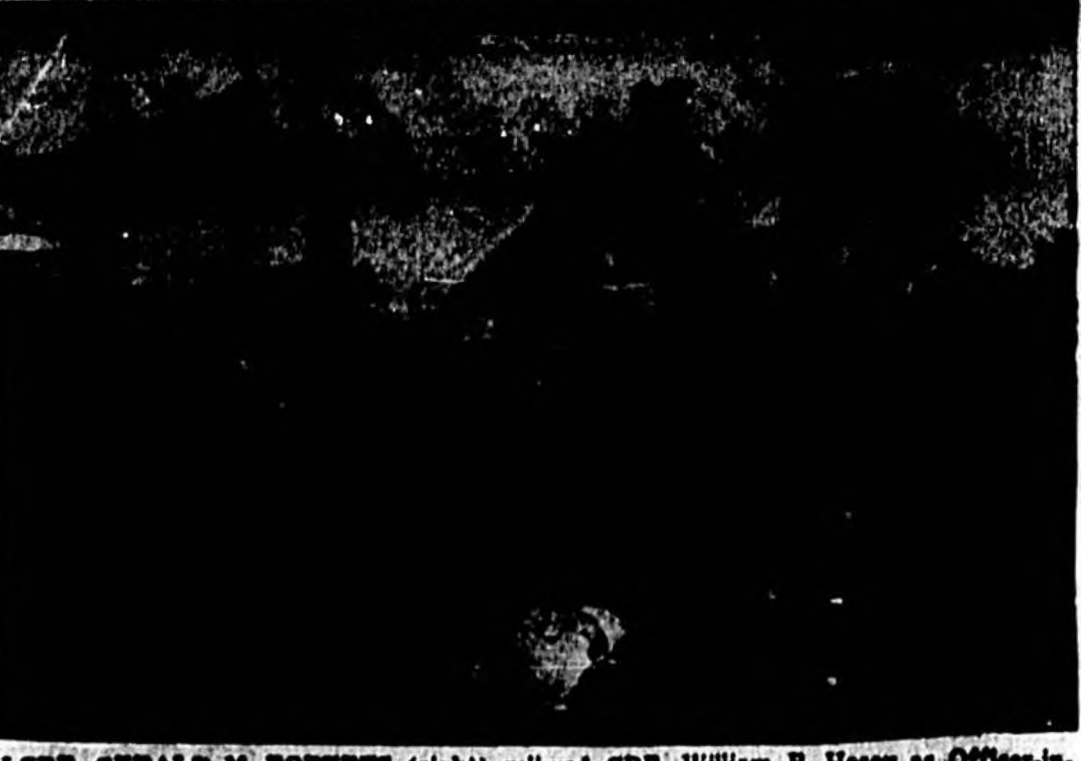
The new route proposals:

1. Make Huntsville, Ala., site of Redstone Arsenal and the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, a stop on the Atlanta-Memphis route.
2. Make Anniston, Ala., site of the Women's Army Corps Center and the Army Chemical Corps School, a stop on the Atlanta-Gadsden, Ala., route.
3. Make Melbourne, Fla., serving the missile test base at Cape Canaveral, a terminal point, along with New Orleans, on a route with stops at Tampa, Fla., and Eglin Air Force Base, Fla.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The government reported today that employment rose 1,800,000 and unemployment dropped 300,000 in May.

The Commerce and Labor departments said unemployment went down to 4,004,000—a larger than usual decrease for this time of year. April unemployment was 5,180,000.

Government economists regarded as most significant in today's figures the fact that the seasonally adjusted rate of unemployment dropped to 7.3 per cent of the labor force in May as compared with the high of 7.5 per cent in April. This was the first reduction in the seasonally adjusted rate since it started to climb last summer.

Early Morning Wreck Fatal To Sanford Woman

A 44-year-old Sanford woman was killed early this morning when her automobile crashed into a power pole east of Casselberry on Seminole Boulevard.

The automobile wrapped around the wood power pole pinning Mrs. Hazel Marie Wade Schmeizer in the car between the center post and the top. Florida Highway Patrolman J. L. Sikes and Johnny R. Hobbs said "no doubt the car was traveling at a high rate of speed."

Investigating officers said that the automobile traveling 182 feet after leaving the highway, turned over at least twice, and then smashed into the power pole snapping it in two and bringing a heavy transformer and a web of "hot" wires to the ground.

Jack Owens, first to arrive at the scene, said the car was on fire but he put it out with sand and water. Owens disconnected the battery cable to keep fire from breaking out again.

The 1946 Dodge automobile was smashed completely with wreckage scattered over its entire 182 feet between its stopping place and the highway.

Lights were doused in the entire area east of the wreck scene where the transformer and wires were pulled down. Time of the accident was set at 1:45 this morning.

A power company employe said that damage to the pole, wire, and transformer is estimated at \$200.

Mrs. Schmeizer was reported as the operator of the Ben Moore Nursery on Celery Ave. She lived, according to one law enforcement officer, on Laurel Drive at Elder Springs.

Collins Seeks Legislation To Force Reassessment

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Gov. LeRoy Collins said Thursday legislative action is needed to untangle the complexities of assessing real estate at full cash value.

In his first news conference in more than a month, Collins said he will call on the next Legislature to give the state power to force local authorities to assess real estate at full cash value but at the same time make corresponding reductions in property taxes.

However, he added, this will not assure assessors from doing a reasonable job of property revaluation on this year's tax rolls with present tools and authority.

Collins admitted the term full cash value is hard to define and will require legislative action to implement.

"After studying the situation in other states and based on my own continuing study of the situation in Florida, I am satisfied we are confronted with a complex problem and need law-reforms in the next session," he said.

Collins added that the state comptroller should be empowered to review assessment practices in each county and "ultimately approve or disapprove the over-all job done by each tax assessor."

"There also must be legal control so that county commissions will be required to reduce tax millages in reasonable relation to

The service is in operation on a part time basis at 810 Magnolia Ave. with voluntary assistance.

Four civic organizations, the Pilot Club, Seminole County Medical Auxiliary, Woman's Club, and Xi-Beta-Eta Sorority, are sponsoring a benefit ball Friday, June 19 to provide funds to keep the service in operation. The event will be held in the Sanford Civic Center with Peter Buhar's orchestra furnishing music for the occasion.

"The purpose in providing this Family Counseling Service," said Mrs. Chapman, "is because there is an urgent need for it in Seminole County."

She explained that the main function of the service is to provide an answering service for people with emotional problems.

"We have many problems in Seminole County which remain unattended and often end in tragedy," Mrs. Chapman pointed out. "Recently, in one afternoon, 100 counseling service assisted 12 people with their problems with suggestions as to where proper aid might be received in some instances and concrete support in the first visit in other instances," said Mrs. Chapman.

Mrs. Chapman explained that "when problems are pressing it is a welcome sight to meet someone who can direct you to a solution. Our records show that we are in need of a 'clearing house' for the problems of people in our community needing emotional rehabilitation," Mrs. Chapman stated.

People of Sanford and Seminole County are urged to support the four organizations in their efforts to establish a community need. Tickets are available from any member of the four groups, Mrs. Chapman stated.

Fisherman Drowns In River Yesterday

A commercial fisherman lost his life late yesterday afternoon when he apparently fell from his boat into the St. Johns River.

The body of J. P. Mitchell, 33, whose address was given this morning as 318 East 13th St., Sanford, was recovered this morning shortly before 7:30 from the exact spot where he disappeared yesterday.

Time of the boat accident was set at 5:30 Thursday afternoon when Mrs. Joe Jarrell first saw the boat spinning around in circles at an apparent high rate of speed.

The alarm was given while several men of the area watched the foundering man through binoculars. He attempted, one law enforcement man said this morning, to disrobe and swim ashore. He had stripped his clothing from his body.

Late yesterday, when the boat was brought in to the Municipal Landing on Seminole Boulevard, the man was first identified as R. W. Flowers. A commercial fisherman's license was found in the fishing gear with Flower's name as the owner.

However, Flowers identified the man as J. P. Mitchell and said that Mitchell had taken his boat and "went off up the river."

Twenty minutes after the alarm was sounded, the Seminole County Sheriff's Rescue boat was put into the water and went to the scene. Later, the City of Sanford's Rescue boat, operated by the Sanford Police Department, was pressed into use.

A Naval Air Station helicopter was also at the scene for more than an hour yesterday afternoon in an attempt to find Mitchell's body.

Wade Singletary recovered the body as he dragged over the area one time.

Without such a plan, business becomes bogged down into the day by day wading through unplanned, unadministered, unattended problems of the county.

Those who can foresee the future of Sanford and Seminole County know the need for advance planning—a ten-year-plan perhaps would be better. And such a plan is necessary for the building of roads unless the county plans to develop roads in order to enhance the value of private property.

As a matter of fact, a comment at last Tuesday's meeting of County Commissioners might be the philosophy behind the present antiquated system of county government. One commissioner said "We're going to mess around here with election coming up and we won't have any roads built."

That's absolutely true! The messing around, though, has probably already been done—with no thought of the "county as a whole" in the need for roads and facilities. Instead of "messing around", we need progressive thinking, aggressive planning and plenty of action!

It may take time, but our prediction is that Seminole County will be administered by a business-like progressive, money-saving organization that will look at no name but instead consider only the need.

Time Now To Test It!

After the last presidential election there was the usual rash of protests about the high costs of campaigning and the giant contributions that made it possible. There was talk of widening the base of campaign support by encouraging millions of citizens to contribute small amounts to the party they favor.

If that were done successfully, three good things would result. The parties would have more money to help bring candidates and policies before the electorate. There would be less excuse for the disgraceful evasion of the present unrealistic laws setting contribution limits. And finally, in the face of big totals piled up by many small contributors, the giant contributors might become less influential than they have been in the past.

An effort to attract small contributions from large numbers of voters is under way. The two major parties are co-operating in this effort. It is a program greatly in the public interest. The time of testing is at hand. How well the test succeeds will depend on how well the public, which acclaimed protests about the big contributors in 1956, responds to the plea for financial support in 1958 and 1960.

Unemployment Down In May

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Unemployment declined at a greater than seasonal rate during May, government officials disclosed Tuesday night.
Unemployment dropped 70,000 in April to 2,120,000. Officials said the decrease last month was believed to be greater than 70,000.

President Eisenhower presumably was told the good news during a White House meeting Tuesday with Raymond J. Quinlan, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisors. The administration has contended the recession was "bottoming out."

The May figures also will show employment went up during the month, the officials said. Employment increased by 600,000 in April to 22,500,000. Many more persons probably found work in May as outdoor jobs opened up.

NEW YORK—Things one New Yorker thinks about:
By and large there still are as many people in this town who walk around ladders instead of under them and who go into katewaies if you toss your hat on the bed—but it is encouraging to note that, in at least one direction, superstition seems to be slowly bowing out of Manhattan. They're putting up buildings with 15th floors in them. Only office buildings, to be sure I have before me figures from a rental agent which disclose that from 90 to 95 per cent of all New York's post-war apartment structures don't have 15th floors—but the trend is otherwise in office buildings. Of 30 new skyscrapers just thrown up—and there seem to be five new ones mushrooming to the blue every time you look around—only five have no 15th floors.

According to one builder, the difference is due to sex. Businessmen, he has found, don't care what number is on the floor where they work—while housewives, on the other hand, are inclined to shudder at the prospect of living in a 15th-floor apartment. The builder's faint observations are, of course, that women's hearts and minds still are in the Dark Ages.

The New York City Housing Authority, as befits a brusquely official body, takes no cognizance of superstition and so includes a 15th floor in each of its developments. The NYCHA has no trouble renting its floors, either. In one Madison Avenue building, a company leased the "14th floor"—there was no 15th in site structure—and then insisted that it be re-named the 15th.

For builders trying to break away from superstition, there sometimes are complications. One Park Avenue building was thrown up WITH a 15th floor—but when the elevator came arrived, it was discovered there were no "15s" on the floor indicators. So, the floors were renumbered.

THE VETERANS CORNER JIM Here are authoritative answers from the Veterans Administration to questions of interest from former servicemen and their families.

Q. Does my service in a National Guard outfit during 1916, when we were sent to the Mexican Border, qualify me for a VA pension?
A. No. VA pension may be paid only to veterans of a war or the Korean conflict. Your Mexican Border service does not qualify as "service during war" under the law.

Q. What are the rules for getting admitted to a VA hospital?
A. There is a priority system: First, veterans who have a service-connected disability; second, veterans with non-service-connected conditions, if there is a bed available, and they certify they cannot afford private treatment.

If that were all I wouldn't mind too much. There are some who might consider it a curious form of entertainment to star down the mouths of hundreds of members of a studio audience while they bawl "Cuddle Up a Little Closer," but not me. I've always found teeth kind of fascinating.

Top there's nothing wrong with a community sing. The movies, after all, saved the ping pong ball business back in the '30's by turning out hundreds of community sing shorts.

However, "Sing Along" falls on a far more serious count—it wallows in phony folkiness, making an awkward bid to come up with front porch-lemonade-swinging gilder charms but winding up only with Madison Avenue corn.

Thus the performers are referred to as "the family" and the announcer coos: "Our family invites your family to join with us and sing along..." Singers are called back on stage with heaping golden bantam like: "Come on, Somethin' Smith and the Red-heads—there's no sense in the world for you to fall there like a wart on a pickle."

And, of course, the chatter is full of soothing inanities like this exchange between emcee Jim Lowe and singer Tina Robin:
Lowe: "When they told me you were going to be on the show, I was just tickled pink."
Miss Robin: "Well, that makes me happy cause pink is my favorite color."

Lowe: "Well, dog my cat!"
Well, dog my cats, too. And pickle my warts if this show doesn't make Lawrence Welk look like Noel Coward.

NBC-TV's "Kraft Theatre" closed out its life in TV Wednesday night with F. Scott Fitzgerald's "Last of the Bellies." It was an affecting piece, effectively steeped in the melancholy gaiety of the Flapper era. Next week "Kraft Mystery Theatre" takes over.

I talked with Jackie Gleason on the phone Wednesday night after CBS-TV announced Gleason would return next season as star of a new live half-hour series on Friday nights.

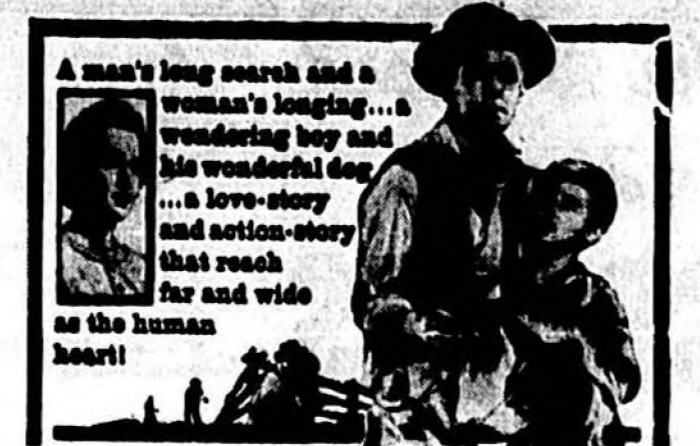

Webb Producing Animal Program

EDITOR'S NOTE: Vernon Scott is on vacation. Television's Jack Webb takes typewriter in hand to reveal his problems in producing an animal program.

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—I felt like the DeMille of the animal kingdom while making the color TV series, "Noah's Ark." My thinking always was that an animal show ought to have animals.

As a result, we had more than 50 in Noah's Ark. This doesn't include birds, of which there were more than a dozen. Our cast included everything from a snarling dog to a race horse with a vitamin deficiency. Among the species represented were ostrich, seal, rabbit, sheep, kangaroo, squirrel, deer, cow, lion, cat, dog and even a monkey.

But one thing I drew the line at was having an elephant on the set. I figured if we had to get to that, I'd open a circus.

Actually, all the animal actors in the series had important parts in the stories in which they appeared. For instance, the story of

Flipper and Flipper, a pair of seals, revolves around the emotional problems of Flipper and how the two veterinarians starred in the series resolve the psychopathic seal's dilemma.

There are always three chief problems when you take on animals as actors: casting, direction and handling the animal on the set. The latter worry was the least of the three for us. We always had an authorized veterinarian on the set, who served both as technical adviser and guardian of the safety and welfare of the animal.

Casting was a special concern. A lot of dogs look alike, for example, so finding the right one for the story, specifications is an exacting chore.

As for direction, this no one can sweat out for the director but himself. All the animals have their trainer, it's true, but each script presented certain tricks which in most cases were new to the animal and had to be taught fresh. Mr. Troubles, a clever dog trained by Tex Chambers, knows 100 different tricks but he had to learn how to dial a telephone for one of our stories. This Mr. Troubles had to learn, not to the satisfaction of his trainer, but to that of the director of the program.

It's one thing to ask an actor to dial the phone, and quite another to ask a dog to do it.

Tourist Mail Problem

Postmaster Joel S. Field calls attention to the fact that most of the highways across the country will soon be full of vacationers going in all directions. He reminds folks also that the mails will soon be filled with all kinds of messages to folks and friends who were left behind.

There will be matter-of-fact reports done in conventional style. There will be ungrammatical but effective postal cards, beautiful and expensive picture cards, and tags to which souvenirs and gadgets are affixed. There will be various rates of postage, various types of messages, and varying degrees of success in the communications effort.

It can be taken for granted that some of the cards will be improperly addressed, some will carry inadequate postage, and some will be devoid of both postage and address. Experience indicates that this will happen thousands of times—sometimes when the message doesn't seem to matter much and the attachment is of small intricate worth, sometimes when both the message and the attachments are obviously of considerable importance.

The most persistently troublesome tourist item for Postmaster Field and his associates is the postcard with an attachment but without sufficient postage. Occasionally, the matter will not "show that his attachment gives the card first class status; sometimes the printer will complicate the situation by indicating that a 2c stamp is sufficient. The printer was right before some other merchant advised to the card a printed advertisement, a national park, or a bag of ore or a specimen of sacred soil, or some other geographically representative gadget.

Postmaster Field says that the rule for avoiding trouble with tourists' mail is simple. If post cards with attachments contain a handwritten or typewritten message, they require postage at the first class letter rate of 3c per ounce. If they do not contain a typewritten or handwritten message, they require the third-class postage rate of 2c for the first two ounces and 1c for each additional ounce or fraction of an ounce.

When insufficient postage is used more happens than the delay of the item in question. A lot of people get their feelings hurt. And all who are offended feel forces eventually in getting mad at the postal service.

"So when you are far away and want to remember friends and folks at home, don't forget that post cards with attachments require first-class postage," he said. "If you have any question about this or any other postal matter, call FA 3-8888 before you leave, or inquire at any post office information window along your route," Field concluded.

LAKELAND—Florida's reputation for quality citrus and citrus products has now been established in Europe and Scandinavia, and "we are moving steadily toward making them permanent and lucrative markets for Florida citrus," two foreign merchandising experts of the Florida Citrus Commission said today.

Irene A. Nelson, Commission regional manager in Stockholm, Sweden, and Alfred LaRoque, regional manager in Frankfurt-Am-Main, Germany, voiced this opinion after a two-day journey halfway around the world. It is the first time the two have returned to Florida after being assigned their foreign posts more than two years ago.

"We've made tremendous progress in creating foreign markets for Florida citrus products during the past two years," Nelson said, "but after starting from scratch, we still have a long way to go."
