LITTLE MOTHERS GIVEN RAG DOLLS TO USE IN STUDY

Dolls Used in The Michigan Schools To Promote Basic Training For Parenthood; Plan Declared Successful

DETROIT, Jan. 12.—The little rag doll which, tightly clutched in many children's hands, is taking on a new meaning for the older girls in Michigan's primary schools. Through cooperation between the Michigan State Health Department and the "Little Mothers League," the little effigy upon which is lavished the "mother instinct" of the youngsters is being used to promote basic training for parenthood.

Care For Them As Babies Each little member of the League has her chance to "mother" one of the dolls, to dress it in the most comfortable of clothes and learn what practical care is necessary to make "babies" grow. The smallest girls, watched by competent nurses, bathe and dress their dolls and lay them in comfortable beds of their own making.

More than 22,000 girls enrolled in the Little Mothers' league the first half of this year. Many have graduated, receiving their merit badges and diplomas, with the privilege of continuing their work as long as they care to, through correspondence.

Victor Will Oppose Any Attempt To Divert Part Of State Gasoline Tax

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla., Jan. 12.—(AP)—Representative Louis Victor from this district will go to the state legislature's next session with his mind already set to oppose unqualifiedly any attempt to divert part of the state's gasoline tax from road construction to the maintenance of a state advertising department, according to an announcement made by the representative here recently.

"I do not oppose the advertising department proposed itself," he said, "but I am unalterably opposed to anything that will in any way interfere with the construction work."

There is no better advertisement for the state than a complete system of well built and well maintained roads.

"I have noted with regret that the effort to divert funds from the highways will be made at the next legislature, and I shall oppose it with all my power, but I will support any other measure looking toward the establishment of such a department."

Mr. Victor commented that he had met every one of the 33 men who will compose the legislature, and called them, without exception, "good fellows, every one seeking an opportunity to serve the state in the best manner possible."

Hotels Operated According To Law, Says Jerry Carter

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Jan. 12.—(AP)—Winter tourists to the east coast of Florida this year will find all structures coming under the supervision of the State accordance with the law, Jerry W. Carter, commissioner, declared before leaving here for that section to begin a general crusade.

Mr. Carter took with him R. H. Christenbury, deputy commissioner, and issued instructions to inspectors in the northern and west coast sections to go to the east coast to report for duty prepared to coordinate a general inspection of hotels, restaurants and apartment houses, with the view of having owners conform to the provisions of the statute. A higher standard of maintenance, Commissioner Carter said, is sought by his department.

The hotel department here has received a number of inquiries from other states having similar departments, and from states contemplating the establishing of such divisions, regarding Florida's laws on the subject, and the systems of maintenance followed by the Florida department. Complimentary references were made in a number of communications over the manner in which Florida operates such work, Mr. Carter said.

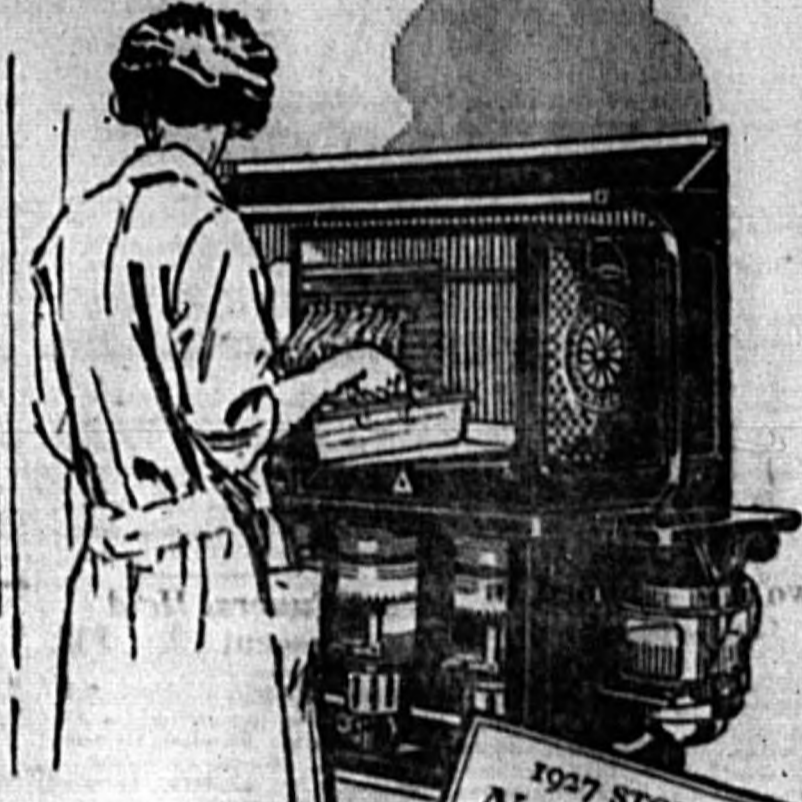

## YOUNG CHINESE GENERAL LIKES DANCING, POKER

### Oriental Officer Has Never Been Abroad But Has Preference For U. S. Customs

PEKING, Jan. 13. — (AP)—Chang Hsueh-Liang, 26 year old general and son of Marshal Chang Tso-Lin, is fond of dancing, poker and tennis.

The "Young General" has never been abroad, but he likes the modern western dances and is a familiar figure in his military uniform on the floor of the popular Peking Hotel on dance nights.

A good-looking youth of medium stature, Chang can be very serious when occasion demands but has no aversion to "frivolous" when off duty. He speaks a little English, and understands more, so that when submitting to a quizzing by foreign newsmen he rarely waits for a question to be interpreted in Chinese before beginning his reply.

Father's Status Higher. He plays a good game of poker, according to those who have "sat in" with him. His poker activities at the Mukden club where he seems to enjoy meeting the foreign men of the town, is said to have aroused some disquietude in the mind of "Old Chang," himself an able devotee of Mahjong and paijoo.

The father inquired of one of his foreign friends how much the younger could lose in a game. When told that the maximum was 500 to 1,000 Chinese dollars the marshal seemed relieved that his son was indulging in such a harmless recreation. By contrast with his own play, wherein his is alleged sums running into the hundreds of thousands frequently changed hands, the young man's game appeared to him like "penny ante."

Military Importance Growing. Young Chang is fast becoming an important personage in northern military affairs and more and more the dictators of Manchuria are delegating authority to him. In recent campaigns he has been his father's eyes and ears at the front, and seemingly he has won the confidence of the former's allies—men much his superior in rank and experience.

He is a favorite with foreigners, many of whom esteem it a special pleasure to have him as their guest at dinner or other social affair.

## RUSSIAN MUSIC WILL BE FEATURE OF EPISCOPALIAN SERVICES

Russian music will be an unusual feature of the evening services at the Holy Cross Episcopal Church on Sunday. Rev. # 1926 Business Conditions Compare Very Favorably With Those of Previous Year

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 12.—(AP)—Business conditions in 1926 in the Sixth Federal Reserve District compare favorably in most instances with those of 1925, the December monthly business review compiled here shows.

Retail trade in the sixth district during 1926 has exceeded the volume reported for each month of 1925, except October, that month being 5 per cent higher than for the same period in 1925.

Wholesale trade also was greater during the first six months of 1926 as compared with the corresponding period of 1925. In connection with the whole sale trade, however, the report stated, "it should be noted that the level of wholesale prices has been lower than that which prevailed a year ago, and the latest statements compiled by the bureau of labor statistics shows the general index number of wholesale prices of 401 commodities for November, 1926, was 145.1, compared with 157.7 for November last year, a decline of 8.4 per cent.

States included in the sixth federal reserve district in which business conditions are set forth in the monthly review are Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi and Tennessee.

The volume of business at wholesale in the sixth district in eight different lines showed seasonal recessions during November and in all these lines except drugs, sales in November were smaller than in the same month of 1925, the report stated. The index number of sales by wholesale firms dealing in groceries, dry goods, hardware and shoes which have been regularly reporting since 1919, is 90.6 for November compared with 100.1 for October, and 92.9 for November 1925, it was stated. With the ex-

ception of November, 1925, the current index number is higher than for November, any other year in the series which began in 1923, the report stated.

Statistics compiled by R. G. Don and company, indicate a greater total number of commercial failures in the United States in November than in the month previous, but liabilities of firms which failed were slightly smaller, it was reported. In the sixth federal district, however, the number of failures in November, 1926, is considerably smaller than in October, but greater than in November, 1925, and the total of liabilities smaller than for other of those months. The total number of commercial failures in the United States last month was 1,830 with liabilities amounting to \$32,672,993. The liabilities of the 92 failures in the Atlanta district amounted to \$1,873,122 for November as compared with \$2,171,336 for October, 1925, and \$2,625,090 in November, 1925, the review showed.

The latest crop report of the United States department of agriculture estimating the cotton crop at 18,618,900 bales is greater by 2 1/2 million bales than the large crop produced in 1925 and nearly five million greater than the 1924 crop, the review says. This report, it continued, indicates an increase of 246,000 bales in the sixth district. This does not take into consideration, the review said, that parts of Tennessee, Mississippi and Louisiana are located in other federal reserve districts. The increase over 1925 in this district is due to larger crops in Alabama and Georgia, as production in the other four states is smaller this year than last. Average abandonment in the sixth district averages 10 per cent.

## Florida Road Department Will Continue Extensive Operations During 1927

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Jan. 12.—(AP)—That the State Road Department intends to continue its extensive highway building program during 1927, and that the coming year will probably see an even greater amount of roadwork done, was indicated by the recent announcement that a second great letting of construction contracts will be made in January.

Some time ago, the road department set Jan. 5 for receiving bids on a large amount of road work. Another announcement has just come that on Jan. 20, additional contracts will be awarded, bringing the total for the month, in round figures, to over \$3,000,000.

The Jan. 20 bids will be on projects in St. Lucie, St. Johns, Palm Beach, Franklin, Lake, Brevard, Marion and Clay counties. There will be one in all, except one, will be on main or preferential roads. The one exception is that in Franklin county, where county funds will be used.

Following is a list of the Jan. 20 projects:

Two in St. Lucie county, Road No. 24 (Dixie highway), hard surface, 17.21 miles; Road No. 4, (Dixie highway) St. Johns county, St. Augustine south-

road base, 15.20 miles; Road No. 4 (Dixie highway) Franklin county, clearing, grubbing, grading and drainage structure, 17.43 miles; Road No. 2, Lake county, clearing, grubbing, grading and drainage structures, 10.50 miles, extending from Silver Lake Forks to East.

Road No. 4, Dixie highway, Brevard county, concrete bridge across Turkey.

Same highway, Marion county, overhead pass across the Florida East Coast railroad.

Road No. 3, Clay county, bridge across Doctor's Inlet and Black Creek are of interest to counties traversed by Road No. 3. That highway, it was stated, will probably be the first of the preferential list to be completed. The only work remaining on that route is a bridge across the Nassau river, a fill across the sound, hard surface of the stretch from Orange Park to Green Cove Springs, which is now being graded, and paving from Sanford to the Orange county line, and Orange county line to Orlando.
