



The sleeping giant of western coal is being

aroused from a long slumber by the energy So vast are the known deposits in a handful of

states west of the Mississippi that they constitute 80 per cent of America's coal reserves. And the 3.2 trillion tons of total U.S. reserves in

turn constitute 88 per cent of all recoverable energy fuels in the United States. Even better, western coal, although it has less

heat content, contains less sulfur than eastern coal. Sulfur in fuels is a major problem in meeting current environmental standards. The greatest of the western deposits are in

three states. North Dakota has 350 billion tons of mapped and exprored reserves of lignite. Montana has nearly 222 billion tons of mostly subbituminous coal. And Wyoming has more than 120 billion tons, again mostly sub-

Other western states have substantial amounts also, including New Mexico, Utah, Colorado, Arizona, Washington and even Texas. New Mexico alone has 60 billion tons and the largest coal mine in the nation. It is also the chosen site of two future commercial coal gasification plants.

Coal is ranked by heat content. The lowest is lignite. It is a brown to black coal containing 30 to 40 per cent moisture. Next in upward progression are subbituminous, bituminous and anthracite.

The last is called hard coal. It is known for its brilliant juster.

Although some development of western coal is under way, an interrelated array of problems have long curtailed extensive use.

For many years the western deposits were considered too far away from major industrial markets. Western coal was also hemmed in by

Up And Away, Late As Usual

WASHINGTON - A confidential House report charges that the two federal agencies which are supposed to make air travel tolerable for the traveler, pander instead to the airline industry.

As a result, says a staff report to the House Commerce Committee, passengers' complaints have more than doubled since 1970, and some airlines run late flights 75 per cent of the

"The increased number of complaints is significant evidence that the problem...is pervasive throughout the United States," declares the report. "The inaction of the CAB and the FAA in the face of numerous complaints and apparent substandard service . . . warrants legislative hearings."

Tracing the history of late arrivals, the report states that rules were proposed in 1956 to curb controllable delays. These were "watered down by the CAB," however, because of "air carrier opposition."

Postal Problems: Sworn affidavits from former postal employes, who worked in the Senate Post Office, have raised some erious questions.

All the ex-employes swore that they tried to discuss their charges with their superiors, with no results. They brought the charges to us, therefore, as a last resort. Here's what they allege

- Despite regulations that the mail of each senator must be subjected to an X-ray search for possible explosives, the mail is requently delivered uninspected. Even after a warning early last month that some letter bombs may have been mailed to Capitol Hill from Canada, the mail wasn't fully screened.

- Some of the postal employes who operate the X-ray scanning device have had no training at all. One of the postmen was told by a superior "that these individuals will receive proper training sometime early next year."

- A postal employe named Renaldo "Muzzie" Spitelle, according to the sworn affidavits, inspected "piece-by-piece Senator Joe Biden's mail, despite the fact that Spitelle neither delivered his mail nor 'pitched it' himself." Spitelle got his post office job under the sponsorship of ex-Sen. Caleb Boggs, R-Del.,

The officials responsible for investigating or preventing these abuses were reluctant to discuss them with us. Postmaster Hobart Williams told my associate Bob Owens that "we can't allow any newsmen here" in the post office. He asked Owens to leave saying, "We can't tell you or anybody else anything."

Q. I understand that Ken Stabler played with the Spokane Shockers before going to the Raiders. How long was he with the Shockers, and how did the Raiders discover him? - Richard Carnell, Spokane, Wash.

You have your facts a little scrambled. The southpaw quarterback did play a couple of games with the Continental League team in Spokane in 1968. It'll tell you how much of a balance you have in your escrow account and what the company has calculated your total monthly mortgage payment will be for the next 12 months, starting in

There's a possibility that your monthly payment may increase slightly, even a remote chance that it may be decreased a few dollars, but in all probability it'll remain about the same for the

Some Never Change

Of course, your monthly principal and interest payment will never change during the life of your mortgage. Any change in your monthly payment will be due chiefly to increased or decreased taxes or an increase or decrease in your hazard insurance policy.

Also, a smaller payment might be in order if, for example, your mortgage principal balance has been reduced to a point where premium which you agreed to do when you applied for and obtained your mortgage some years ago in order to get a reduced

There are still quite a few people who contact us from time to time and ask that we explain exactly what we mean by an escrow

Most mortgagees, when they accept a mortgage as collateral for making a loan to a mortgagor to purchase a home, require that the lender-the mortgagee-to collect each month not only the principal and interest on the loan but also an amount that the mortgagee estimates will be enough to enable the lender to accumulate, at least 30 days before the due date, the necessary funds to pay statements for taxes, special assessments - if any, hazard insurance premiums and mortgage insurance premiums -

These funds are kept by the mortgage company in a special escrow account and may not be used by the mortgage company for any other purpose other than for which they have been

Part Of The Contract

The escrow portion of your monthly payment to your mortgage dropped - except at the option of the mortgagee.

homeowners, "Why, does my monthly payment change?" Well, your payment changes - as we have previously stated anytime any item being paid out of your escrow account increases

compare "present monthly deposit to escrow account" with "new monthly deposit to escrow account." The next question we're usually asked is "What causes taxes or

increases or decreases your tax millage rates, or anytime the county tax assessor increases or decreases the assessed evaluation of your property, or - finally - any change in your homestead exemption status. We know of one county homeowner who last year saw his taxes

The answer: After a through check it was discovered that the assessed evaluation of the taxpayer's home had been increased a little over \$6,000. On top of that, the same taxpayer had forgetten to apply for his homestead exemption that particular year. You can imagine what that did to the taxpayer's escrow ac-

probably purchased a three-year policy with the premium payable in three annual installments through your escrow account. If at the end of your three-year contract you did not notify the mortgage company that you wanted an increased amount of coverage or you wanted to change insurance carriers, the mortgage company automatically purchased a new threeyear contract for you and there may have been a slight increase in rates. This, too, could affect your escrow account.

Aside from a tremendous increase in your home's assessed evaluation, the main reason for an escrow account shortage usually is due to a homeowner forgetting to apply for homestead

If the homeowner has never applied for homestead exemption on the property in which he now resides and was occupying as of Dec. 31, 1973, he must take his deed in person to the Tax Assessor's office at the County Courthouse and make application.







From time to time we hear Sanford's Memorial Stadium referred to as a "white elephant." How about the Sanford Civic Center. Seems like everytime I pass by that place it's not being used. Is this another of Sanford's "white elephants?"

Apparently you're passing the Civic Center at the wrong time. We asked City Manager Pete Knowles and City Recreation Director Jim Jernigan for some specific figures on the Civic Center to determine just how much the facility was utilized. You. and other readers - especially cruzens of sanford who pay taxes, will be interested to know that during the period Oct. 1, 1973 through Sept. 30, 1973, the City Center was leased for 316 functions. Almost 51,000 people were in attendance on these occasions. The City received almost \$7,000 for the use of the Center by these 316 groups. Of the nearly 51,000 people who used the Center, over 12,000 people used it under standing leases. Attendance on other occasions exceeds 38,000. Consequently, the Center is far from being a "white elephant."

From time to time you have mentioned in news items about the Seminole County Board of Realtors that the organization is the largest professional organizations in the county. Just how large is the Seminole County Board of Realtors as far as membership is concerned?

Dear Mrs. HWM:

Perhaps the Seminole County Education Association is the largest single professional organization in Seminole County. However, the members of that organization are salaried and do not work on a commission or fee basis as most professionals do Consequently, that leaves the Seminole County Board of Realtors as probably the largest of its kind in the county. At this moment the latest membership roll of the Seminole County Board shows that there are 105 Realiors listed along with 303 Realion-Associates, making a total membership of 408. The organization is one of the top 20 in Florida.

Not too long ago you gave us homestead exemption figures

which indicated that as far as my City of Sanford taxes were concerned homestead exemption amounted to \$7.00 per \$1,000 of assessed evaluation. On the other hand, I read where Sanford's tax millage rate is \$8.50 per \$1,000 of assessed evaluation. Why do we not get full homestead exemption on the first \$5,000 of assessed Your figures are perfectly correct. However, since

homestead exemption applies only to the general operating fund of the City of Sanford you are exempted from paying taxes on the basis of 7.00 mills. But, since homestead exemption does not apply to bonded indebtedness you are required to pay \$.50 mills on the full amount of your assessed evaluation. In other words, everybody - even though their homestead may not be assessed at more than \$5,000 - pays taxes to help retire bonded indebtedness You might be interest to know that in 1977 all of the bonded indebtedness of the City of Sanford will be paid in full. The City, of course, will still have outstanding revenue certificates but these are retired with funds from sources other than advaloren taxes.

Moorer, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, has emerged as a central figure in reports of military spying against Henry A. Kissinger in

But Pentagon associates of the nation's top uniformed officer say he has not lost the confidence of President Nixon, and, in fact, received notice well in advance from the White House that he was being nominated for a second two-year

term as JCS chairman in 1972.

The Pentagon officials were commenting in response to a report by the Chicago Tribune that Nixon wanted to fire Moorer after the White House investigative unit known as the plumbers told the President of the spying against Kissinger, then a foreign policy adviser and head

of the National Security Council (NSC). The Tribune said it had not learned why Nixon did not fire Moorer.
