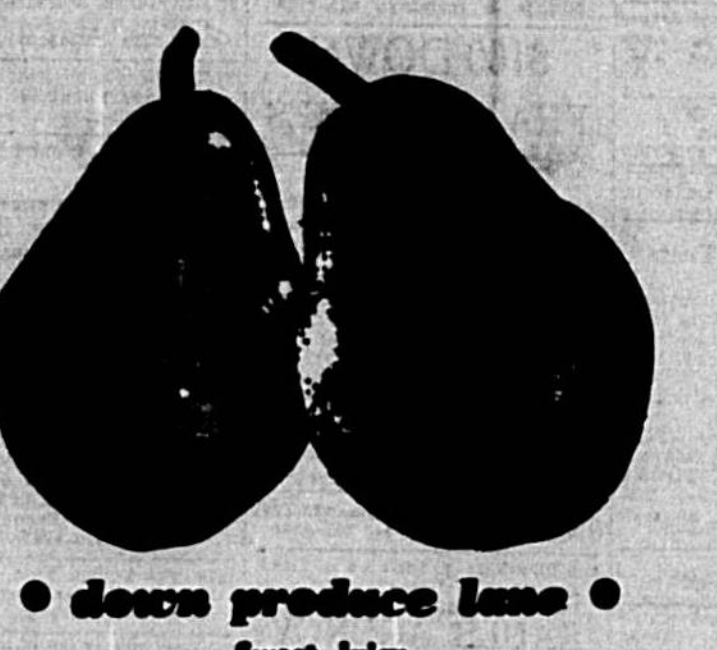

**Negroes Ballot Strong in Sanford, Oviedo**

Sanford voters streamed to the polls this morning in heavy numbers at the Civic Center with close to 1,000 voting ballots by 1 p.m. Poll watchers reported close to 40 per cent of those voting were Negroes.

In the one race for the City Commission seat vacated by Mayor Joe Baker, Lee Moore is running against Negro dry cleaning instructor Samuel Wright.

There are 4,500 eligible to vote in Sanford and some 1,500 are Negroes.

The polls will close at 7 p.m. In the county municipal elections, voter interest appears heaviest in Oviedo where a Negro candidate is running for council seat for the first time in the city's history. Check by The Herald at 11 a.m. showed a total of 264 of the 787 turned had voted at city hall. A turnout of 75 per cent is predicted.

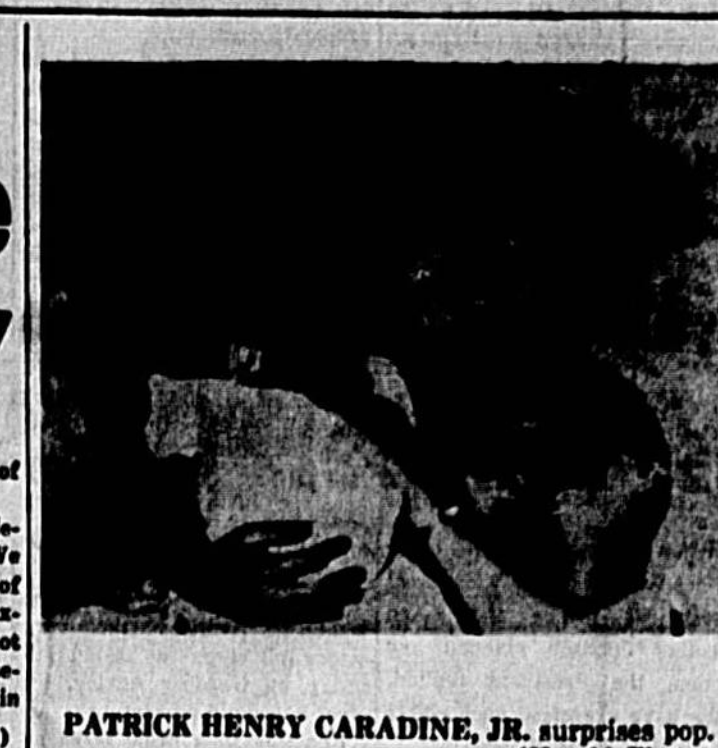

The attorney said other necessary papers will be filed within the next ten days.

Suit was originally filed last December. It particularly pointed out that no public hearing had been held on necessity of constructing a courthouse, as required by law.

However, since the judge ruled that the suit was premature, a public hearing has been set by the Board of County Commissioners for Dec. 19.

This is 18 days. And rebuffed to dollars and cents it means that 100,000 tourists staying for that length of time would produce \$32 million a year income.

Thus the chamber would urge Sanford people to think big, realize that the tourist market is coming and capitalize on it with the creation of a climate of hospitality spotlighted with a major attraction that would appeal to the entire touring family.
