 American invasion forces were concentrating.
 Returning naval fliers said they added at least a score to the 711 Nip planes knocked out last Thursday and Friday and an untold number of ships. Sixty-six other Nip surface craft were added to this toll by land-based aircraft under General MacArthur and naval search planes.
 Massive Soviet blows included the Tokyo-reported drive from outer Mongolia, which threatened to split 1,500,000 Jap troops on the mainland and the Moscow-announced Marine invasion of Korea.
 The Chinese 18th Communist army group has launched a strong attack in co-operation with the Soviet, the Brussels radio-quoted Chinese dispatches as saying.

GUAM, Monday, Aug. 13 (AP)— American and British carrier pilots, alerted against Japanese treachery under guise of a conditional surrender offer, attacked the Tokyo area at dawn today—some hours before an enemy aerial torpedo damaged a major U. S. warship at Okinawa.
 Possibly several hundred carrier planes launched the attack, which Admiral Nimitz' communique a short time later reported was directed against military targets in the Tokyo area and was still in progress.
 Absence of his familiar phrases "in strength" or "heavy attacks" might indicate that Admiral Halsey had not sent as large a force as the 1,200 to 1,500 planes which repeatedly attacked the Japanese homeland 21 days in July and again last Thursday and Friday.

Major Warship Hit
 After both Nimitz and Halsey had warned the fleet to be on the alert against treachery while peace terms were being studied and while the fleet was idle Saturday and Sunday, a major U. S. war vessel anchored in Buckner Bay, Okinawa, was struck by an aerial torpedo from an enemy aircraft Sunday night, Nimitz announced. "The damage has not yet been determined," he said.
 A major vessel is a battleship or large aircraft carrier.

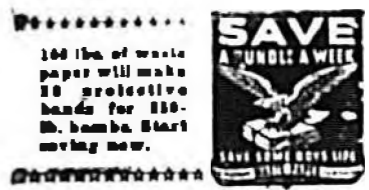

JAPS ACCEPT SURRENDER TERMS

Sanford Observes End Of War With Great Celebration

Sailors And Civilians Join In Holiday; Union Services To Be Held At Church

By WILLARD CONNOLLY
The peace and quiet of eventide descended on Sanford shortly before 7:00 o'clock Tuesday, Aug. 14, 1945, as the minutes ticked away on the big four sided clock on First Street.

A brief few minutes later the clock was the center of a far different scene as the wall of the big air raid siren formerly used for blackouts suddenly exploded and Naval residents into action. They left their radios where with heartfelt thanks they had heard the message of Japan's surrender and whole families piled into cars and headed, horns wailing, for the downtown section.

Tension, anxieties and fears engendered by three years and eight months of war, of fear for sons, husbands and brothers and sweethearts overseas all let go in a wild burst of steadily mounting enthusiasm that climaxed at about 8:30 o'clock as men from the Sanford Naval Air Station flocked in to help celebrate. It was the biggest celebration in Sanford since the Armistice Day on Nov. 11, 1918.

Entire Allied World Joins In Rejoicing Over End Of War

(By Associated Press)
Millions of people lifted their hearts and voices today to hail the dawn of peace.

There were tears, laughter, hysteria and prayers throughout the Allied world as Japan, last undefeated aggressor nation, announced it had surrendered.

"Thank God—Thank God it's over at last" were words repeated again and again. In every language. The bloodiest most destructive war in history was at an end.

America flung off its wartime restraint and exploded in the greatest, wildest, most ecstatic celebration of all time. Boisterous, happy crowds sang, danced and cheered into the early morning. Thousands prepared to continue the fiesta during the two-day holiday proclaimed for today and tomorrow by the United States and Britain.

Everywhere, veterans of the war were in the forefront of the jubilation.

County Agent Asks More Diversified Crops In Sanford

Growing of more diversified vegetable crops other than celery in the Seminole County area in order to meet future demands at the Sanford State Farmer's Market, was today urged by C. R. Dawson, county agent, who warned that future business at the market may be imperiled if more vegetables are not grown locally.

Said Mr. Dawson: "Crops other than celery, such as cabbage, escarots, carrots, beets, cauliflower, tomatoes, etc., should be grown locally to fill the demand at the Sanford Farmer's State Market. For several seasons the demand has greatly exceeded the supply. This inadequate supply of vegetables for the most part originated elsewhere and was brought here by auto trucks for resale. If there were no other reason, our growers should produce those items called for by the trade at the market to keep this market in a flourishing state, because once the Farmers' Market gains the reputation among the truckers of 'no regular supply,' the truckers will stop calling by Sanford in favor of some market as does celery to their demand. And while we may think now that this makes no difference, what with unprecedented demand and out of sight prices for celery, this demand and price structure can make an 'about face' in the not too distant future.

Double Holiday Is Given Personnel At Navy Station

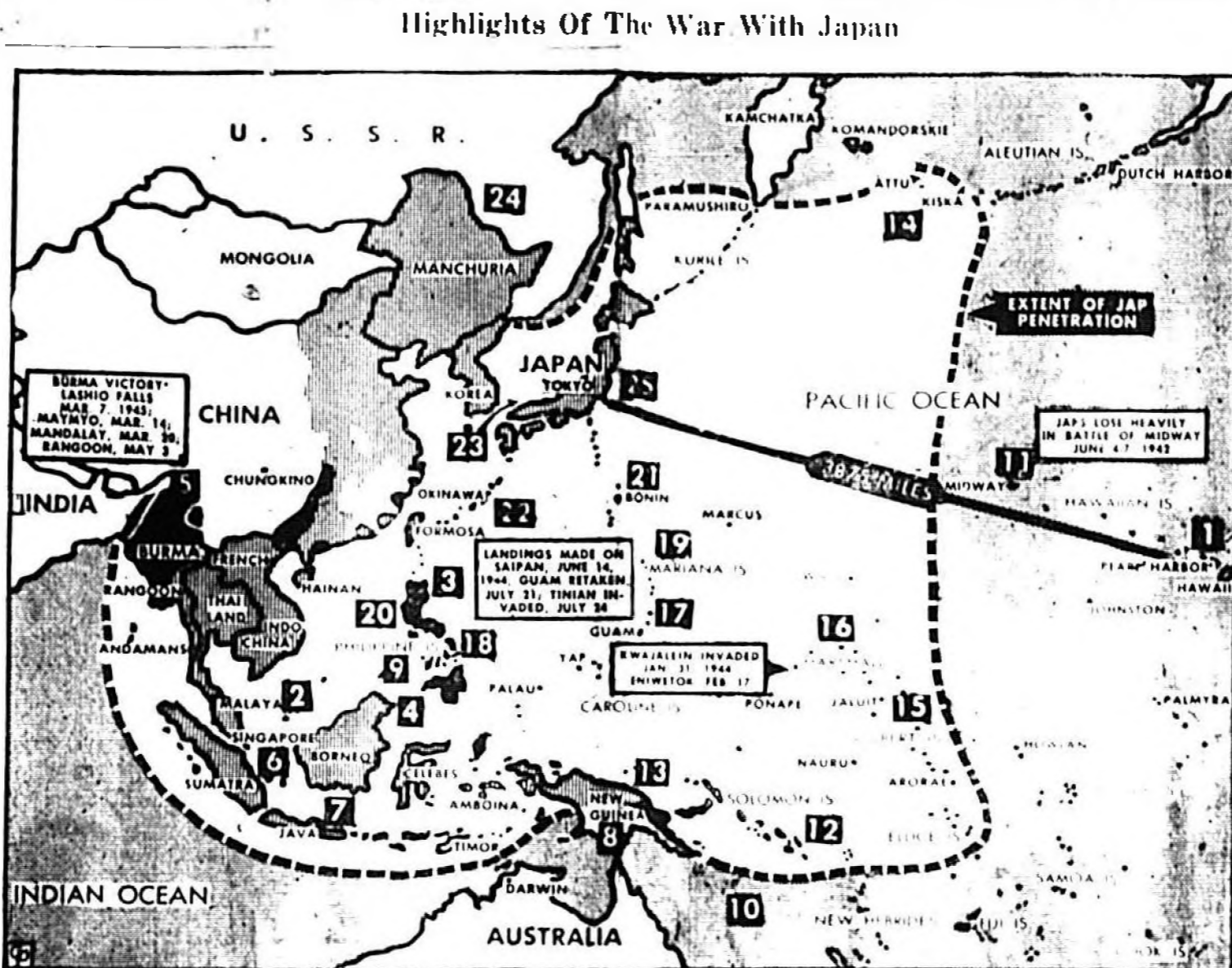

State, Nation, In Good Condition To Return To Peace

Social Security Has Big Unemployment Fund, So Has State

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Federal Security Chief Harold A. McNutt made public today what he predicted would be a big boost in social security unemployment payments.

At present, according to the report submitted by Arthur J. Altmeyer, chairman of the Social Security Board, unemployment compensation benefits are much lower than expected in view of war production cut-backs.

However, Altmeyer pointed out, the number has doubled since V-E Day.

On August 1, he said, nearly 190,000 persons were receiving weekly benefits in partial replacement of wages lost through unemployment—44 per cent more than the number in the same month last year.

Altmeyer said various states had \$2,870,000,000 for unemployment funds as the start of the current fiscal year.

"This," he declared, "leaves the country much better prepared to meet the shock of post-war transitional unemployment than was the case at the end of the (Continued on Page Three)

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—(AP)—End of fighting in the Pacific would bring no immediate improvement in the newspaper supply situation, Oranston Williams, general manager of the American Newspaper Publishers Association, said today.

"The situation we can hope for further relaxation in consumption quotas for newspapers," he said, "is the fourth quarter."

ANPA is investigating a number of unknown factors "which can have a vital bearing upon newspaper production," Williams said in a statement, and has hopes of "something clear-cut" by the next meeting of the War Production Board's newspaper industry advisory committee in Washington, September 11-12.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15. (AP)—Blamed and brought into defeat, Japan has accepted unconditional surrender. Thus the world entered a new era of peace today with great rejoicing.

Along the battlefronts of the Pacific and in Asia, the mightiest forces of destruction ever assembled rolled to a halt ending a war which began on Sept. 1, 1939, when Germany invaded Poland.

President Truman announced the surrender at 7:00 P. M. EDT last night, starting a truce of a few days until General MacArthur, as the Supreme Allied Commander, can accept a formal surrender on the basis of the Potsdam declaration.

Japan Is Reduced From First To 3rd Rate Power

The Japanese empire, once the most powerful in the world, is reduced to a third-rate power. It is now a subject of the United States, Great Britain and the Soviet Union.

What To Do With Emperor Remains One Of Main Problems

Thank Heaven! Nobody will be able to say any more, "Don't you know there's a war on?"

A Swedish broadcast is quoted as saying that the Japanese emperor would not be able to negotiate with anyone except of royal blood leaving everyone of the Allied high command out of the question. But dropping an atom bomb somewhere in the neighborhood of Tokyo would very effectively take care of that situation.

Secretary of State Byrnes, former War Mobilization Director, has been awarded the Distinguished Service Medal. Once called "assistant president" to President Roosevelt, now certainly "assistant president" for President Truman, Secretary Byrnes was long one of the ablest men in the Roosevelt administration and is probably the most influential man in the government today.

WANTED: one man hired swimming pool. The Rotary Club is in pursuit of a place to swim, now that the strain of wartime efforts is being relaxed and the noon day sun is hot. The City has the money for the swimming pool. The construction materials required, mostly cement, are readily available. Why wait any longer? Why not have something to show the boys when they return from overseas?

Now that the war is over and prospects for the closing of the Naval Air Station loom larger every day, plans should be made for some use to be made of it in this post-war world. It would be a good thing for Sanford if some commercial air line would take it over, or if a flying field for training commercial pilots could be established there. But surely it should not be allowed to disintegrate altogether.

Dr. Roprecht thinks something should be done to improve living conditions of local farm labor or we may wake up some day to find our labor has moved elsewhere. In any event, nearly half of Sanford's population is colored. You can't provide parks and playgrounds and other recreational facilities for half your people and not do anything at all for the other half. If segregation is to continue, separate places for entertainment will certainly have to be provided.

A home building boom is predicted for the period following the war. More than two million people are expected to build new homes within three years after the war, the head of one of the country's largest real estate firms declares. Surely Sanford will have its fair share of home building. With two thousand servicemen coming home, many of them married and started raising families during the war, there is bound to be a big demand for homes in which to live.

Those who are abiding creeping leprosy are the unemployed war factory workers' leave us cold. Most of them have been making \$100 a week ever since the war started. They would have been able to find re-employment in private industry immediately if they were not for the fact that the federal government, ever since the war started, has been paying them \$100 a week.

The War Is Over

It was just a little over three years and nine months ago that the Japanese carrying olive branches to Washington dropped bombs on Pearl Harbor, thus beginning the greatest struggle of all time in the most treacherous manner history records. The road to victory has been a hard and bloody one for millions of American boys but from the early reverses in the Philippines they have fought their way steadily forward from Midway to Okinawa and have never once faltered.

New names have been written on the pages of American history, memorable never-to-be-forgotten names which will take their place in the minds of men for generations yet unborn alongside Bunker Hill, Gettysburg, San Juan Hill, Chateau Thierry, Marston, Guadalcanal, Buna Mission, Bougainville, Attu, Tarawa, Guam, Saipan, Iwo Jima, Okinawa, not forgetting the brilliant campaigns on New Guinea, the Philippines, and the naval battles of the Makassar Straights, the Coral Sea, Kula Gulf, and the two great battles of the Philippine Sea.

New weapons, new methods of waging warfare, which if they existed at all on that fateful Pearl Harbor day, were little dreamed of by the men who were destined to use them, have been perfected, the aircraft carrier, and the carrier task force, the Grumman Wildcat, Hellcat and Heppcat, the Garand rifle and the flame thrower, the amphibious landing boats, alligators and sea-going tanks, the B-25s, the B-17s and B-24s, the B-29s, and finally the P-80s, 500 pound bombs, blockbusters, rocket bombs and at last the atom bomb.

It was only a few days after the first atom bomb wiped Hiroshima off the face of the earth that the Japanese surrendered. It may not have been necessary to drop that second bomb on Nagasaki—the Japs probably would have surrendered anyway. But it is just as well to let them know that we had it, just as well to let the whole world know about it, just as well to drive home the frightful truth that this new weapon has been discovered which makes future wars too horrible to contemplate.

Let us hope, now its mission is accomplished, that this supernatural instrument of human slaughter will be safely laid away in some secure place where it can never be raised again except in defense of peace, and let us pray that its possession in our hands will never make us smug or overbearing, will never tempt our political leaders to dare or threaten other nations, lest we bring down on our own heads the devastation which has befallen Japan.

And let us never forget the debt of gratitude which we owe the scientists who discovered this bomb before our enemies unearthed its secrets—no less than the brave soldiers and sailors who carried its destruction to the enemy.

More Meat, Less Soap

There will be more roasts and steaks this fall and winter, says Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson in the American magazine. That's good. But the epicure, fussy about what he eats, will miss some favorite foods. Sugar, eggs, chickens, pork, lard, butter, will be short at least until next Spring.

As for soap, he doesn't say, "No soap!" But he does say there will be less. "We are not getting our usual quota of oils, used in soap manufacture, from the Argentine republic, even though she has an abundance." He hopes a better arrangement may yet be worked out, but meantime housewives will not be able to use soap with their usual prodigality and demand for special brands. They must take what soap there is, and make each bar and package go as far as possible.

Mr. Anderson asks farmers and gardeners to produce to the limit at this time. "Surpluses which used to wreck us may save a hungry world from collapse", he says.

TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY

Once in awhile a public official will take a job seriously enough to stick his neck all the way out in an effort to serve and protect the folks who elected him and that happened in the little town of Vidalia, Georgia, the other day when Mayor J. E. Darby got fed up with governmental nonsense, red tape and bureaucratic bungling and decided to take action on his own account.

Toombs County, Georgia is a good general farming and cattle producing section and the farmers of this area have been producing plenty of good beef and pork, which was selling at local auction markets as fast as it was offered.

But housewives of the communities of Vidalia and Lyons found that meat market shelves were as empty as Old Mother Hubbard's well known cupboard. Even those who had both points and money couldn't even find a stew bone. It didn't make sense to Mayor Darby so he made a tour

of local markets, talked with the butchers and found that not only did they not have any meat, but they couldn't get any because of OPA rules, regulations and fold-down.

The Mayor just didn't like the idea of seeing his townfolks starving when there was no scarcity and he decided to do something about it. He wired

Senator Walter F. George and explained that the people of Toombs County had plenty of meat on the hoof, were selling it at auction and it was being shipped away while local market shelves remained bare. It seemed that Walter, being a mere U. S. Senator, had no standing in influencing or shoving about the ridiculous situation. Thinking, no doubt, that Mr. Darby was "just another Mayor", they gave him the regulation (Form XYZ-OPA-4589) brush off. This should not be confused with (Form L-17863), which is the run around.

He was advised to just be calm and patient and let things take their normal course and by and by everything would be all right. Things like this took time. "You couldn't upset the routine for one little town or county."

But the Mayor wanted ACTION. He politely informed OPA officials that "his people" had plenty of cattle and hogs and "by damn" they were gonna eat 'em. He issued an ultimatum to the effect that he'd give the OPA just 24 hours to get its red tape untangled and release some Toombs county meat for home consumption or he'd issue the order himself and it would be carried out and they could come over to Toombs County and crack their little whip. The Mayor said he didn't mind raising food for the armed services, the starving Armenians or Washington bureaucrats for that matter, but he felt that the home folks ought to have a break along with the rest of the world, particularly since they were doing the raising.

Three Young Girls From Palatka Get Into Trouble Here

Three young girls from Palatka, one of them only 13 years old, arrived by bus late Friday evening, unattended, and attracted some attention in the downtown section by their loud and boisterous talk and obvious attempts at attracting the attention of servicemen. In City Court Monday, one of these girls, 14, who gave her occupation as a waitress, was fined \$25 and sentenced 30 days for vagrancy, and is being held by the police for examination.

The 13-year-old girl, who told police that she had been married, was transferred to the Juvenile Court at Palatka. Police today had no information to give regarding the third girl of the trio.

"We are continuing our drive to keep Sanford cleaned up in this respect, and will roundup all vagrants," said Police Chief Roy G. Williams today.

Other white cases were: Lee V. Sogga, dismissed of a charge of disorderly conduct; Henry J. Hazewak, and Henry T. Blirgson, were dismissed of like charges. Bonds were returned on the following charges: Nellie Ray Matthews, reckless driving; Doyce Felton Warren, improper parking, \$2.

A number of bonds from negroes who failed to appear in court were returned. These were: Allen Mitchell, Alex Mitchell, Horace King, James McGuffin and J. H. Rollins, charged with gambling, \$10 each; James Barnett and James McGuffin, drunk and disorderly, \$10 each; and Joseph Bryant, reckless driving, \$4.

In court Friday, five white youths charged with violation of the curfew law were dismissed. Bonds of \$5 of E. Vihlen, charged with improper parking, was returned.

Negro cases were: John Anderson, escaped city prisoner charged with carrying off city property, was fined \$25 or 90 days; James Thornton, reckless driving, \$10; traffic, was fined \$3 or 10 days, and dismissed of a charge of making threats. Bonds returned were: \$20 bond of John Henry Brown, charged with disorderly conduct, and \$5 of Sam Dupree, charged with reckless driving.
