Dotson talks to students, civic groups, scout troops and the like because snakes and other poisonous creatures can be dangerous. Florida is one of the three leading states for snake bites, and Central Florida has more snakes than coastal areas because many snakes are found near lakes, rivers and streams. It can be important to be able to tell a harmless snake from a poisonous one. Dotson became experienced in recognizing snakes and handling snake litts as part of his surgery training at Tulane Medical School in Louisians.

Grows between 34 and 28 inches in length.

The Eastern Diamond Back Rattesnake, on the other hand, is considered to be the most dangerous snake in the country because of its length. It grows to 6 feet in length. It can be found anywhere in Central Florida, but usually where people infrequently go.

If you are bitten by any snake, Dr.

Dotson advises, avoid excitement and go calmly but directly to the nearest hospital.

Iran Finally Chooses Its 1st Prime Minister

By United Press Internationa Iran's Parliament today welcomed as the first prime minister of the Islamic republic a hard-line Moslem who last year closed the country's foreign schools and outlawed English.

Agreement on the selection of former education minister Mohammad Ali Rajai as prime minister was expected to clear the way for a decision on the 52 Americans held hostage by Iran's Moslem militants for 280 days.

Tehran radio, monitored in London, reported that President Abolhassan Bani-Sar introduced Rajai to Parliament as prime minister and said, "I pray to god to give the esteemed deputies and him Rajai success." Tehran Radio said Friday that a major block in Parliament, which is controlled by the Islamic Republican Party, proposed Rajai as prime minister.

22 Get Death Sentences

ANKARA, Turkey (UPI) - The trial of almost an entire Turkish village on rioting chrages has ended with 22 people sentenced to death, 14 others being sent to prison for life and 107 receiving prison terms totaling

The trial that concluded Friday was one of Turkey's longest and certainly its largest trial. The martial law court was sitting in judgment on 835 defendants virtually the entire population of Kahramanmaras, a village in southern Turkey.

They were charged with offenses ranging from murder and attempted rebellion to assault, looting and theft, resulting from rioting and clashes in Kahramanmaras in December 1978.

Nagasaki Remembers Bomb

NAGASAKI, Japan (UPI) — Thousands of people gathered at the Nagasaki Peace Park today for a memorial service to mark the 35th anniversary of the second and last city to be destroyed in war by an atomic bomb.

At 11:02 a.m., when a "sudden flash" leveled Nagasaki Aug. 9, 1945, bells tolled as 20,000 people, including a number of foreigners, stood for a one-minute silent prayer before a huge flower-decked altar at the center of the park.

Nagasaki, 625 miles southwest of Tokyo, was the second Japanese city to be devastated by a U.S. atomic

The blast killed 78,000 people and came three days after a similar detonation at Hiroshima and forced the surrender of Japan on Aug. 15, 1945.

Bolivia Holds Journalist

LA PAZ, Bolivia (UPI) - Bolivia's Interior Ministry is holding an American journalist incommunicado, accused of "defamatory libel" for linking Bolivian officials to drug trafficking.

Information Minister Fernando Palacios said Friday Mary Helen Spooner, 28, a free-lance journalist from St. Louis, was arrested Wednesday and charged with "defamatory libel" for a story sent over the wires of the Latin-Reuter news agency, according to Rene Villegas, the local Latin-Reuter correspondent.



Americans, Iranians Hold **Shouting Match At Rallies**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Iranian students, their two days of protests in wilting heat met by fierce anger, eggs and tomatoes, said they weren't against the American people - but American counterdemonstrators weren't buying. "Our demonstration is not against you," an Iranian

spokesman shouted into a bullhorn Friday at angry Americans across a wall of policemen keeping the rival demonstrators apart. "It is not against the American people. "We don't want this confrontation with the American people." The Americans yelled back: "Bull -, bull-

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A nationwide telephone strike was set for midnight Saturday unless negotiators for three unions reached agreement on new contracts with the Bell System.

AT&T spokesman Charles Dynes anticipated little problem on calls dialed without an operator's help, but said there might be delays in getting operator assistance, "particularly on directory assistance."



Phone Tampering

Federal Offense, Says Manager

Stealing from the telephone company by using electronic or other illegal means for free long distance calls is a federal offense, according to Woody Wilson, Sanford's Southern Bell-

"This is because the interstate telephone network is volved," Wilson said, "There are state laws on the books, b we encourage prosecution in the federal courts.' The vast majority of persons caught trying to steal telephon service are not electronic hobbyists or what would ordinarily be thought of as part of the criminal element. "We've rur across lawyers, students, housewives and businessmen,

He attributes this variety to a feeling some people have that no one is hurt by this kind of theft. "Of course, that's not true," Wilson said. "The expense of these fraudulent calls is spread over everyone's bill. It affects every telephone customer when people steal from the telephone company, just as shoplifting affects prices in a retail store." That's why Southern Bell devotes so much time and effort

tracking down long distance fraud. "Our techniques are getting more sophisticated and we are identifying and prosecuting more long distance thieves. Wilson continued. Nationwide during the past year nearly 89 percent of those people arrested were convicted of long distance theft in areas served by the Bell System. Lifeblood Of Everglades **Begins Disappearing Act**

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (UPI) - Muck, the rich, black lifeblood of the Florida Everglades, is slowly beginning to disappear, jeopardizing the future of the world-famous national park, experts say.

The cause: man's tampering with the delicate water balance in south Florida. Water is an essential ingredient in the sticky topsoil that has formed over the past 5,000 years as the sawgrass died and decayed. "Muck supports the growth of just about all of the vegetation

in the Everglades," said Dr. Dennis Wackerly, a University of Florida statistician who has analyzed data collected by state wildlife researchers since 1971 in a 480,000-acre section of the park in Broward and Dade counties. "If the muck is depleted," Wackerly warned, "the Ever-

James Schortemeyer, a wildlife biologist with the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, monitored the muck depth at 300 points in six different areas of the Broward-Dade year period. "This is a very dramatic loss, particularly for a natural

area." Schortemeyer said. "Peat losses in agricultural areas have been drastic and a cause for concern but there has been little concern over natural areas previously." Under normal conditions, the almost 100 percent organic material is covered with water nine or more months out of the year, but in recent years the water has been drained completely in the muck-farm areas.

County Announces Pay Hike Schedule

Yesteryear's carwash and bake sale solutions for athletic funds are being hard pressed to keep pace with the growing demand on sports budgets, and the spiraling costs o equipment, uniforms, transportation and the like is forcing many programs, especially at the high school level to severly reduce and in some cases completely eliminate sports programs. It's happening on a national basis from coast to coast, mostly at the high school level.

In Seminole County it's no secret that prep sports programs are supported solely on what funds the respective high school booster clubs can generate.

On a national basis, an average of one-percent of the school budget goes towards sports and extra circular activities. One percent may have footed the bill a decade ago in most cases. But combined with the addition of sports equality for women through Title IX and the skyrocketing prices of everything from footballs to popcorn, athletic organizations are finding themselves behind a financial eight ball. Monetarily speaking, non-professional sports survival is reaching worrisome proportions nation wide. One of the traditional fund raising methods now carries with it the traditional two-edged sword that comes about anytime the federal government gets involved with something. During the past school year the feds told schools it wasn't permissible to sell candy and other "junk foods" in the schools. Yet in the same breath it's supposedly alright for the youngsters to peddle those same forbidden candy bars to their next door neighbors.

The financing of sports activities has reached such critical magnitude in California, that some schools require participating athletes to "pay for play." By the time Proposition 13 fall out trickled down to the high school budget, schools such as Harbor High in Santa Cruz and Saratoga High School were forced to charge athletes \$25 per sport, with a maximum charge of \$75 or

In New York City, at the beginning of the 1979 school year, sports funding was at such a poor state that athletic budgets were slashed 25 percent; prompting an immediate strike by the city's 800 teacher-coaches. The strike by the coaches prompted rioting in several of the high schools and reached the point where one principal

labeled the situation as "A war zone." City officials in Brooklyn and sports figures like Reggie Jackson stepped in with personal fund raising efforts in attempts to aid the problems. Ron Korb, past president of the Seminole Soccer Club points out some of the problems at the local level.

"How many places can 55 teams go and wash cars," asks Korb. "We've had reasonable success in raising the money we need for just the basic operation of the organization, but most fund raising activities just don't generate the kind of money it takes to purchase land and improve it." Where is the problem of financing sports headed?

If a 1978 survey by the American Sports Education Institute in West Palm Beach is close to being correct, the picture is not all that rosey. According to the institute's survey, 56 percent of the

reporting schools stated they faced serious financial trouble in continuing their programs at the current level. Another 37 percent of the schools reported they were forced to drop at least one varsity sport due to lack of funding; still more reported a complete elimination of prep sports programs due to the basic lack of money. 

Research Council: Public Employees **Should Not Strike** VIENNA, Va. - The Public Service Research Council has released the fourth edition of "Public Sector Bargaining and

The 1980 report shows a correlation between passage of a public sector bargaining law and a fourfold increase in strike activity.

"Since public sector strikes have an adverse effect on public well-being and there is a correlation between strikes and bargaining legislation, it can only be concluded that compulsory public sector collective bargaining is unsuited as a system of labor relations in the public sector," the report

The study is an analysis of all reported public sector strikes in the United States passage of compulsory public sector collective bargaining legislation. All statistics are from reports by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics, U.S. Department of Labor.

The study includes information regarding the growth of unionism in the public work force. It states: "Government employment, over the last 20 years, has been one of the most expansive areas of the economy. In the period between 1956 and 1978, the private sector work force increased by 41 percent, while the public

workers is employed by government. More of bargaining collectively than ever before." 24 percent of the work force, 16,575,000 members. At the same time, public sector

union membership represented only 1. percent of the work force." "By 1978, the difference between the two narrowed noticeably. Maximum Pressure In Tires Saves Gas

U.S. Department of Energy Remember way back, years ago, when the neighborhood service station filled your tires while filling your tank with 30-

In those good old days passenger car tires were mostly one size, and many service station attendants recommended in-flating them to their 32-pound maximum. The tires would last

tire pressures dropped to 24 or 25 pounds to yield a softer ride.

Well, with gas at \$1.20 or so, it's time to go back to 32 pounds, or whatever is the maximum pressure marked on the tire it-self. This may be eight more pounds pressure than the manual or the sticker on the door of your car recommends. The more pressure you put in your tires, up to the stated maximum, the less gas it takes to drive a mile. That's because harder tires have less resistance to rolling.

All tires slowly lose air pressure. One tire company checked 1900 cars and found that 28 percent had tires that were severely underinflated. And tests conducted by tire companies and by others confirm that more pressure means better gas mileage.

In a report to the Department of Transportation, an independent company concluded after examining test results that each two pounds of additional pressure in bias-ply (non-radial) tires improves gas mileage by one to one-and-one-half percent. Because there may be a difference of eight pounds between the corner's manual and the tire manufacturer's etween the owner's manual and the tire manufacturer's maximum, this presents the possibility of a four to six percent

That's like reducing the price of your gasoline by seven cents pressure between front and back tires the owner's manual These savings possibilities are for highway driving. In town,

recommeds. For example, the manual might recommend 24 in the percentage will be less because of the time your car spends idling at traffic lights or being braked to a stop. The saving from increased pressure will also be less with radial tires. With radials, eight pounds of increased pressure yields about a two-and-one-half percent fuel saving. Radials, however, give better gas mileage than non-radials when inflated to the same pressure. At full inflation, you should get about three-and-one-half percent better in combined

One last word: Full inflation undeniably produces a harder ride over bumps. But it does not damage the suspension system (as some people believe), and it does not shorten tire life. In some cases it will increase tire life.

This is the second of a two-part series on the "born again" movement and its impact on the American religious and

political scene. The profile of the typical born again Christian does not suggest anybody very influential. It shows a white woman of 60 who lives in a small town. Her income is limited. She is either

married or has been married. If her husband is alive, he is a man who works with his hands or is retired. They feel the country is going to the dogs morally. They don't like the Russians and think it is time we get tough with them. They hate the big spenders in government and liberals of all stripes - political and religious.

They listen to Rex Humbard or Oral Roberts, or both, on TV

and attend the Baptist Church. What is most impressive about these born again Christians is that there are 50 million of them who can vote. When you consider that 80 million people voted in the last presidential election — and that Jimmy Carter got just under 41 million votes — it can be seen that the born again Christians could

constitute a formidable political force. In the national political races they could conceivably determine the outcome - if they vote as a bloc. That worries many people. However, it is not at all certain that they will do that in November. Many can be expected to vote for "one of their own" - President Carter, an avowed born again

An even bigger problem in trying to mobilize the born again vote into a bloc is the tendency of many evangelicals to stay out of politics—and out of the voting booth. The Wall Street Journal recently referred to a study of the non-voter which showed a high proportion of religious people who "attend prayer meeting twice a week but never vote in loal or national elections."

If there is potential power in the born again movement, there is also glory and glamour, standing in stark contrast to the humble status of the average born again Christian.

This show biz image is deliberately fostered by those "born

agains" who never lose an opportunity to exploit the likes of Pat Boone, Roy Clark, Anita Bryant and Roy Rogers and Dale Evans — or sports page heroes such as football stars Terry
Bradshaw and Roger Staubach; Tom Landry, coach of the
Dallas Cowboys; and Andre Thornton of the Cleveland
Indians. This exploitation may even have something to do with
the movements' growth.

The critics of the born again see them as threatening personal freedoms and failing to grasp the realities of achanging world.




