sant a system of flexible supports, along the lines of the GOP-passed law.
This GOP law authorizes supports ranging between 60 and 90 percent of parity for major crops and from zero to 90 percent for other products.

Mr. Truman said this law, which he signed, "represents an important step forward in recognizing the difficulties associated with over-rigid supports. But he said it needs revisions to make it even more flexible."
The President said flexible supports would be useful in helping—that is, away from crops in surplus shifts in crop production plus supply to those in short supply. Rigid or equal supports for all crops would hinder such shifts, he said.

U.S. Acts To Ease Tension In Palestine

Britain And Israel Are Urged To Consider Plane Incident As Regrettable

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—(AP)—The United States urged Britain and Israel today to treat the shooting down of five British planes as a "regrettable incident only."

A statement by the State Department expressed hope that the incident will not interfere with Palestine truce negotiations expected to open Wednesday on the island of Rhodes.

The department disclosed at the same time that the United States was informed in advance, but not consulted on the movement of British forces to the Trans Jordan port of Aqaba. Press officer Michael J. McDermott declined to say whether any American objections were raised to the move.

TEL AVIV, Israel, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Israel will accuse Britain before the United Nations of violating the U. N. truce in Palestine, a source close to the government said today.

The cabinet decided yesterday to send instructions to Aubrey Eban, its representative at Lake Success, to lodge such a charge the information said.

The Israeli government twice has refused to accept a British protest against the downing of five RAF planes in the Egyptian border area Friday, because the protest was not addressed to the government. Britain does not recognize Israel as a state.

The government will not ask the Security Council to define Britain's "unilateral" position in the Palestine conflict most seriously, the informant added. The protest will refer to Britain's aid to the Egyptian army in the Sinai Peninsula and the shipping of British troops to Aqaba, Trans Jordan port of the Red Sea. It also will accuse Britain of large-scale arms shipments to the Egyptians, the source said. Meanwhile Britain concentrates troops and warships in the Mediterranean while the cabinet apparently was considering the Palestine problem and how far she would go in a show of force in the tense Middle East.

Britain's protest reserved the right to demand compensation for the lost planes and to fall possible subsequent action. British government sources said the next step may be a demand to the United Nations Security Council that Israeli troops stay within their boundaries and that the truce government pay for the five planes.

Forrestal Resignation Is Denied By Ross

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—(AP)—The White House denied today that Secretary of Defense Forrestal is leaving the cabinet this week.

At a news conference, a reporter told presidential Press Secretary Charles G. Ross that Robert H. Allen has published a report that Forrestal's resignation would be accepted this week.

"That is untrue," Ross said. Ross said all cabinet members offer their resignations as a matter of course in advance of each new administration. He did not know whether Forrestal's resignation has been received by the President.

January 20 is the date of Mr. Truman's inauguration. The one cabinet change that Mr. Truman has announced—replacement of Secretary of the State Marshall by Dean Acheson—is effective on that date.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Elliott Roosevelt is recovering satisfactorily from a minor operation at LaRoy Sanitarium, a spokesman for the private hospital said today.

The late President's son was operated on Saturday. His family declined to comment on his ailment.

VISITS MACARTHUR

TOKYO, Jan. 10.—(AP)—General Douglas MacArthur, supreme Allied commander in Japan, was visited today by a two-man discussion of the war and subjects. This was the seventh visit by MacArthur by the Japanese emperor. His last visit was in 1945.

Cold Weather Does Little Damage To Most Of State's Vegetables

JACKSONVILLE, Jan. 10. (Special)—"Florida's share of the nation's cold weather during the past week did very little damage to the majority of the vegetables and probably was beneficial to some as well as to citrus," William L. Wilson, Director of State Markets, reported today in his weekly review of State Markets' activities. "Coming at a time when the fall crop was about over and just before the spring crop, with a few exceptions, had advanced far enough to be affected."

"Peanut reports serious damage to the beans remaining from the fall crop—90 to 95 percent loss, but cabbage and celery actually benefited from the cold."

Peanut estimated damage to beans at about 40 percent, including an increase in price over the previous week—prices averaging \$4.00 per bushel. Cucumbers lost 75 percent damage with prices of \$1.50 per bushel on the commodity market. Beans, which suffered 75 to 75 percent damage, but average prices rose to \$4.50 per bushel. Lima beans suffered 30 to 40 percent damage, mostly to the bloom, with the average price being \$4.50 per bushel. Practically no pepper damage with prices averaging \$0.50 per bushel.

Court To Keep Hands Off In 12 Reds' Trial

Supreme Court Declines To Consider Attack On Part Of Taft-Hartley Law

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—(AP)—The Supreme Court today refused to interfere with the indictment and scheduled New York trial of 12 leaders of the American Communist Party.

The 12 asked the Supreme Court to compel the government to produce a list of prospective jurors from which their trial jury may be drawn.

The Supreme Court issued its brief orders announcing its refusal to interfere in the cases at this stage. It gave no reason.

The 12 all members of the National Board of the Communist Party in the United States, were indicted on charges of conspiracy to advocate the overthrow of the United States government by force and violence.

The high court's usual Monday opinion session was continued today by order.

Along with refusing to interfere in the Communist trial, the high court:

1. Declined to consider an attack on constitutionality of that section of the Taft-Hartley law which obligates employers to file self-accusations to bargain collective bargaining contracts. The act has the effect of upholding validity of the section. The Federation of Labor Unions of America had attacked it.
2. Dismissed a labor union appeal attacking the validity of Tennessee's "anti-labor shop" law.

ORLANDO, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Escambia County today dealt a death blow to open gambling in the county.

The county board of commissioners today passed a resolution which forbids any person from operating a gambling establishment in the county.

The resolution was passed by a vote of 10 to 2. The two dissenting votes were cast by the county commissioners who are in charge of the county's gambling operations.

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\$282.82 Is Your '49 Budget Share

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Your share in the cost of government, as proposed by President Truman averages out to:

\$282.82 for the 12 months beginning next July 1, compared with \$274.94 preceding 12 months.

Based on an estimated population of 148,000,000, that is the cost for each living American man, woman and child of the government's operations at home and abroad as reflected in the President's budget message today.

The composite cost in the year ended June 30, 1948, the last full fiscal year before Pearl Harbor, was \$274.94. The population then was only 147,050,000.

And he pointed out that the price of building the world's largest peacetime budget is a price tag of \$11,000,000,000.

heating was general last night.
Snow fell again for about two hours in Long Beach early today.
While it melted on the ground, it remained on grass and trees.
Intermittent flurries fell in many parts of the citrus area again today.
The Federal Frost Warning Service at Pomona reported that the snow had kept temperatures up and lessened the danger of fruit freezing.
A blizzard with 75-mile-an-hour winds in the mountains 60 miles east of San Diego unroofed a Girl Scout party of 14 and indirectly led to an airplane crash which killed five persons in the same vicinity.
The girl scout party reported it had shelter but was short of food.
Snow in Los Angeles, which occurs rarely, sent youngsters frolicking, although most of it melted quickly.
Few made snowballs, if they could find enough of the strange white stuff.
Even Weather Bureau Forecaster A. K. Showalter got excited. At the end of one teletyped weather bulletin to news offices he said: "Flash-snow just began here at L. A. airport again—I must be looking."
The California Highway Patrol advised motorists to drive out of the mountains. Many roads were closed, including Angeles Crest and rim of the world highway.
In San Diego the gas company warned residents to cut down on use of gas for heating, lest there be a shortage for cooking.
A blizzarding cold wave brought more misery today upon the West. In the Plains and Rocky Mountain region which still were counting their losses from last week's paralyzing blizzard.
The frigid blast in the Great Plains and Rocky Mountains was 10 years' coldest in 10 years. It brought renewed fear for the survival of livestock already weakened from the lack of feed during the blizzard which brought death to at least 22 persons and tied up rail and highway travel for three days.
Blizzarding conditions again were reported in some Wyoming areas, and in northeastern New Mexico, but snowfall throughout the area generally was moderate with railroads and bus lines operating on or near normal schedules.
At Livingston, Mont., the mercury had climbed to 20 below zero early today. International Falls, Minn., had a -18. Bismarck, N. D., -11, and Casper, Wyo., -14. Readings generally below zero were in prospect for the entire region as far south as Northern Kansas.

made on highest authority following issuance of the budget message.
1. The President figures on July 1 being the effective date for the \$4,000,000,000-a year tax hike he wants on corporation, estate and "middle and upper" bracket income. He thinks it may yield only \$2,000,000,000 in fiscal 1950, however, because of a time lag in collection.
2. The President expects to finance his proposed national health insurance program with a 4 1/2 per cent total tax on payroll, beginning next July 1. Employees and employers each would pay 2 1/4 per cent.
3. An estimate that individual income tax collections in 1950 will yield \$19,135,000,000, less than the \$21,500,000,000 and the federal income tax alone will drain off nearly one-third of that.
As a starter, the President suggested advancing to next July 1 a six months speed up—the scheduled rise in Social Security payroll levies from 1 to 1 1/2 per cent on employees and employers alike. Also, he proposed making the tax apply to earnings above \$3,000 a year, the present top, without saying what the new limit should be.
In today's message Mr. Truman said: "The United States must continue to exert strong, positive effort to achieve peace in the world and growing prosperity at home." And he asserted that "in the light of continuing national policies already adopted."

There were some repeats of requests often turned back by past Congresses: \$600,000,000 to start a Universal Military Training program, which he said would cost \$2,000,000,000 a year later; an \$8,000,000 starting outlay for the St. Lawrence seaway and power project.
Congress—which heard Mr. Truman deliver his tax bomb plea in person last Wednesday—has given little sign of paying heed.
And if the lawmakers needed any fresh excuse for ignoring it, they seemed likely to find it in one or more of these:
1. The surprisingly small \$175,000,000 deficit predicted for the coming fiscal year—barely half the red ink entry that had been widely predicted.
2. The \$600,000,000 request to get started on UMI by shelving such military training program—as is indicated by the first reaction in Congress—even that deficit could be pared to \$278,000,000.
3. And by ignoring another proposal to set up a \$150,000,000 "reserve for contingencies," the lawmakers would have the budget within \$123,000,000 of balance without counting on any other cuts or on another presidential underestimate of tax receipts.
Mr. Truman today said revenue this year will be \$66,611,000 higher than he had forecast just five months ago. He said tax receipts had gone up with incomes and profits.
Mr. Truman recommended that Congress cut back the veterans hospital construction program by cancelling 24 hospital projects and reducing the capacity of another 14 among the 30 originally planned. He said, too, that further economies can be effected by "improving the management of the public business."
"There is no easy way" of doing it, he said, but he asked Congress to help out by:
(1) Giving him \$1,000,000 "to carry on necessary and worthwhile

Tientsin Is Captured By China's Reds

Official Nanking Sources Concede That City Has Been Taken By Commies

NANKING, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Official sources today indicated the Reds either have occupied the great northern industrial city of Tientsin or that terms have been agreed on by its surrender. These sources conceded that "Tientsin is gone." They declined, however, to furnish details. The northern city has been under heavy attack for several days. Last previous reports here said Red troops were fighting in Tientsin's suburbs.

On the central front, Communist troops were reported systematically mopping up the trapped government armies on the northern approaches to Nanking. Government airmen called it "the heaviest fighting we have seen at any time at any time in China."

With the military picture darkening, government officials stepped up their flight from Nanking. Technically all ministries are still in Nanking. That's because the great vaults with which all official papers must be stamped are still here. But actually, few government functions continue, except the most urgent.

One official estimated more than half of the National government personnel has disappeared from Nanking. The ministry of health will move en masse tomorrow to Canton in Southern China.

Canton and Formosa (Taiwan) are favorite refuge of government officials. As many as 20,000 Chinese a week are reported arriving on Formosa, and the same number are expected to leave for Formosa.

Equipment and key personnel of four government-owned factories have been loaded aboard a steamship for transfer to Formosa.

Asked what the wholesale flight of Chinese officials from the capital, one official still here explained: "For awhile strict orders were issued to keep all officials at their posts here. Now most ministries are anxious for their departure to the government of the necessity of supporting them."

Hundreds of top level government officials are leaving the lower echelons to decide for themselves what to do. One ministry (Confidence) is expected to leave.

333 Cities Increase Tax Rates In 1948

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—(AP)—A six per cent increase in tax rates on 333 American cities in 1948 over 1947 was reported yesterday. A survey also showed that there was a six per cent rise in the per capita assessed valuations in these cities, which have populations of more than 30,000.

The per capita increase was 15.7 per cent in 1947. The study, published in the January issue of the National Municipal Review, said: "The rate increases are not unexpected. The pattern is familiar and manifests the relentless demand of local government for more money with which to operate."

The survey said the highest "adjusted" tax rate for cities over 30,000 population was 97.97 in Bayonne, N. J.

States of \$53.40 in Boston and \$48.99 in Jersey City, N. J., were listed as the highest rates among the largest cities with 150,000 or more population.

Among cities of over 100,000 population, the lowest rate was 55.80 in Dayton, Ohio.

PLU IN FRANCE

PARIS, Jan. 11.—(AP)—An epidemic of influenza is spreading through France and threatening other countries in Western Europe.

Unlike the "Spanish Flu" in 1918, when the death toll ran into the thousands, the present epidemic has so far claimed only about two deaths per 1,000 cases, a government medical source said today.

The current epidemic is being referred to as "Italian Flu." It struck first in Italy and spread into France.

Israel Blames Plane Incident On British For Ordering Mission

TEL AVIV, Israel, Jan. 11. (AP)—Israel today placed the blame for the shooting down of five British planes on British authorities who ordered the mission.

The foreign office said in a formal statement to newsmen "any airplane appearing in skies above Israel forces shot down the Palestine border. Israel officials dressed to the government. Britain protests concerning the incident, because the protests were not addressed to the government. Britain since has indicated she would not carry the dispute to the United Nations.

The foreign office statement said that while the Israeli government "deeply regrets" the loss of life involved, "it puts the blame wholly on those who in London on RAF Middle East headquarters, who were responsible for sending British pilots on adventures whose motives can only have been hostile."

It added that the "results might easily have been foreseen." British planes, the statement said, "had no more right to be flying over Israeli territory in this border area than had aircraft of any other country."

The foreign office asserted that the air engagements "materially took place over Israeli territory. It said the "British government has admitted and captured pilots in reconnaissance of Israeli positions in a battle area where they clearly had no right to be and where they could not penetrate without realizing the risks entailed."

Winter Weather St. Joe Paper Co. Deals Damaging Blows To Nation

CALIFORNIA SHIVERS AS DIXIE BASKS IN WARM TEMPERATURES

By ASSOCIATED PRESS
Weather's wintry elements unleashed further damaging blows to storm-weary states over most of the western half of the nation today. Snow, ice and sleet storms hit an area from the Texas-Oklahoma panhandle to the Pacific coast.

California shivered again in freezing temperatures. There was snow and ice from the state's winter resort spots to the mountains. Many highways were closed because of ice and snow. The fruit and vegetable crop was further endangered by the wintry blasts.

The freezing weather followed last week's killing frost which caused millions of dollars of damage to crops.

The Rocky Mountain region and parts of the Midwest got another blast of sub-zero temperatures. Cold weather in the Pacific north-west threatened a severe power shortage.

While wintry icy blasts dealt severe blows to the west, drier weather was blowing over temperatures. The mercury shot up into the 70's and 80's yesterday from Louisiana to the Atlantic seaboard and from Florida to East Tennessee and most of Virginia.

The freezing rain and sleet covered an entire belt over the Central and Southern Plains as far eastward as Iowa, Missouri and Western Illinois.

Travel over the glazed highways was at a slow pace. Fallen trees blocked roads.

F. P. & L. Improves Sanford Area Service

Increased demand for electric service in the Sanford area is being met with improved service by the Florida Power and Light Co., which is expanding \$100,000 on distribution system west of Sanford, H. H. Coleman, manager, announced today.

The electrical distribution system in this area is being converted from 4,500 to 15,000 volts to provide improved service and to meet the demands of increased load in an area that includes Lake Monroe, Paola and the Country Club Road. This will enable the company to accommodate three times as many customers in the area as at present, Mr. Coleman pointed out.

The growth of the Seminole area is indicated by the fact that during 1948 nearly seven miles of new rural lines were built and 860 new customers added to the company's facilities. Prospects are that general improvements in service will continue to increase during the coming year and that these demands will be met with improved service, said Mr. Coleman. "The future prospects for this section of Florida look more promising than ever before," he declared.

DETROIT FIRE

DETROIT, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Two firemen were killed and four others seriously injured as a \$200,000 fire swept a west side apartment building early today.

More than 20 homes were destroyed in night clothing. The dead were James A. Dugan, 27, and Clifford E. Bennett. Officials said they died of suffocation.

OVERRULES IRELAND

LONDON, Jan. 11.—(AP)—British officials have overruled a plan to transfer the island's name to Ulster. It was learned today.

The Prime Minister of Northern Ireland, Sir Basil Brooke, made the suggestion in cabinet talks last week. He said he thought the name ought to be changed to avoid confusion with the Republic of Ireland.

Argentina To Become Strict On Citizenship

President Would Compel Foreigners To Ask For Papers Or Get Out Of Nation

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 11.—(AP)—President Juan D. Peron, with the solid backing of his controlling Peronista Party, proposed today that the constitution be amended to compel foreigners to apply for Argentine citizenship after two years residence in this country.

The proposal, which would require those not conforming to be deported in the final form to be drafted by a constitutional convention opening next week.

Foreign embassies here expressed amazement at the proposal, which was read to the assembled Peronista members by the President himself. He met them at his summer home in a Buenos Aires suburb.

The measure would affect some 30,000 Italian, 4,000 United States citizens and thousands of Latin Americans as well as smaller numbers of persons here from other foreign countries. Many of the Italians, Spaniards, and Germans here already have taken Argentine citizenship.
